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State of Emergency or Confusion?

While Tennessee Governor Bill Lee gave details on opening the economy for the State of Tennessee on April 28, some were left to just try to figure it out on their own, even as Lee asserted his power over their activities.

With churches and funeral homes seeing great changes in April due to COVID-19, Lee's Executive Order 30 guidelines managed to avoid taking a stand on what is allowed.

"Social and recreational gatherings of 10 people or more are prohibited, including but not limited to festivals, fairs, parades, youth and adult sporting events, and overnight summer youth camps," began the release, but then addressed churches and funeral homes.

"This does not cover places of worship, for which there will be guidelines for safe operation of worship services and gatherings if in-person services are conducted, but the order strongly encourages places of worship to continue virtual or online services where possible. This does not prohibit weddings and funerals, but encourages **County-Wide Church Service Scheduled** A county-wide church service will be held at the AgriBusiness

Center on Highway 64 West in Bolivar.

The Agribusiness Center is located on the site of the Old Fairgrounds in Hardeman County.

The service will begin at 6:30 a.m. and will feature local ministerss. Attendees and anyone else can listen on WMOD (96.7 FM) and WOJG (94.7 FM).

postponement of large-gathering components of such events."

At press time, Shackelford Funeral Directors and the Dixie Funeral Home were still considering how they would do business, with the governor's order that both left it up to them but discouraged them from business as usual at the same time.

Last week it was expected hair salons, barber shops, and nail salons would open along with retail shops and restaurants, but the April 28 order from the state stopped short of letting them operate under restrictions.

"Close-contact personal service businesses must remain closed to the public for now, including, but not limited to, barber shops, salons, spas, body-art/tattoo services, tanning salons, and massage

facilities," it reads.

The following day, April 29, Lee reversed course, announcing that hair salons and barber shops could re-open on May 6. Lee also stated that other restrictions of the order could be lifted prior to May 29.

In the order, Lee asserted his power to supercede county directives, stating, "in addition to other emergency management powers granted by law, Tennessee Code Annotated, Section 58-2-107(e), provides that during a state of emergency, the governor is authorized to suspend laws and rules regarding the conduct of state business if necessary to cope with the emergency, order evacuations from certain areas, make orders concerning entry and exit and the occupancy of premises within an emergency area, and take mea-

sures concerning the conduct of civilians and the calling of public meetings and gatherings, among other things..."

If followed, Lee would keep Music on the Square in Bolivar on hold, as the order says "entertainment and recreational gathering venues must remain closed to the public for now, including, but not limited to, bars, night clubs, live performance venues, bowling alleys, arcades, concert and sporting event venues, theaters, auditoriums, performing arts centers, racetracks, indoor children's play areas, adult entertainment venues, amusement parks, senior centers, and skating rinks."

Youth sporting leagues would also not be able to begin until the expiration of the order, which is scheduled for May 29.

Lee's release says his order "supersedes and repeals Executive Order Nos. 17, 21, 22, 23, 27, and 29, effective Wednesday, April 29, but does not affect Executive Order No. 25 concerning dental and medical procedures, which is currently effective until April 30."

Lee reiterated his mandate on nursing homes and retirement facilities, saying they "must remain closed to visitors, except for critical assistance and in end-of-life situations."

The order asked that face masks be worn, "in places where in close proximity to others, especially where social distancing is difficult."

And for counties that think they might come up with their own plan, Lee reminded them, "For the 89 counties without a locally run county health department (Davidson, Hamilton, Knox, Madison, Shelby, and Sullivan), this order supersedes any contrary orders or measures, meaning that the counties cannot issue independent or-



AN ORDER ALLOWING TENNESSEANS TO RETURN TO WORK SAFELY WHILE ENCOURAGING CONTINUED ADHERENCE TO HEALTH GUIDELINES TO LIMIT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19

WHEREAS, in recent weeks, local, state, and federal officials have taken numerous actions to limit the spread of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19); and

WHEREAS, between March 22, 2020, and April 2, 2020, I issued executive orders directing that Tennesscans stay at home unless engaging in essential activity or essential services, prohibiting large social gatherings, and limiting the operation or visitation of certain businesses and venues, in accordance with guidelines issued by President Trump and the Centers for Disease Control and Pseuporica (CDC) and

WHEREAS, the efforts and sacrifices of Tennesseans, businesses, places of worship, and governmental and nongovernmental entities and organizations of all types in accordance with these measures have flattened, and continue to flatten, the COVID-19 curve in Tennessee, as the rate of increase in cases has declined considerably since the beginning of April, hospitalization rates have

ders regarding the opening, closure, or operation of businesses, organizations, or venues covered by this order, though counties may continue issuing or enforcing orders or measures on other matters related to CO-VID-19, such as opening or closure of their governmental buildings, governing their employees, or dealing with the operation of their local government."

As of April 28, eleven Hardeman County citizens were listed on the State of Tennessee website as contracting the virus, with seven already recovered.

Statewide, Davidson and Shelby counties account for 47% of the cases statewide, and the top ten counties (Davidson, Shelby, Sumner, Bledsoe, Rutherford, Williamson, Wilson, Knox, Bedford, and Hamilton) accounting for 75% of all cases in the state. Forty-five counties have reported less than 15 cases.

Judge McCraw Steps Aside in Lawsuit

Judge J. Weber McCraw has agreed to step aside in the Hardeman County case involving funding of the Sheriff's Department, as requested by Sheriff John Doolen's attorney, Roy Herron of Dresden.

Replacing McCraw will be Tony Childress of the 29th Judicial District. Appointed as Chancellor in 2008, Childress is a UT-Martin graduate (1988) and received his law degree from the University of Memphis in 1992.

McCraw's order of recusal said that while he disputed "many of the assertions for recusal presented by the petitioner (Doolen)" he would step aside quoting Tennessee Supreme Court Rule 10, which states a Judge, "shall disqualify himself in a proceeding in which the Judge's impartiality might reasonable be questioned, and in order to avoid any appearance of personal bias or prejudice in this matter."

McCraw did, in his order, state that "this Court works with numerous officers of the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department, including Sheriff John Doolen, on a routine basis as well as with the County Mayor, in the Court's performance of its administrative and legal duties of judicial office; the Court notes that such relationship with the parties has existed all along yet it did not become and issue until the Court, on its own initiative, set aside its order awarding the Petitioner's attorney fees."

It is unknown when the court will resume the hearing that began on February 27, in which McCraw set aside the order involving attorney fees as both parties presented their case on the issue of setting aside the October consent order that, for the time being, appeared to settle the lawsuit brought by Sheriff John Doolen vs. Mayor Jimmy Sain.

In July of 2019, following the passing of the budget, Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen sued for \$1.4 million dollars, but eventually settled for \$102,000, as detailed in the disputed October consent order.





Silerton Mary Lynn Lambert 609-6455 Remember to pray for Matt Tyson as he continues to deal with health issues. Joie Freeman, Brenda Cooper and Sarah Chandler covet your prayers. John Jordan has been admitted to Jackson Madison County Hospital and would appreciate prayers. Since being quarantined, I have enjoyed looking through some old photo albums. Today I saw a picture of myself receiving the first polio vaccine in Hardeman County. The picture was probably made in 1955 or 1956. On this day, I remember

all the Silerton Elementary School children boarded the bus to travel to Bolivar to Dr. R. L. Cobb's office to get a polio vaccine. I remember getting off the bus and not knowing where to go. Mrs. Hazel Beshires, teacher, took my hand and asked the students to follow. I had no idea I would be the first in the line. To my amazement, a photographer from the Bolivar Bulletin was there to get a picture of Dr. Cobb administering the vaccine. The next week the picture was on the front page of the paper with the story of Hardeman County School students being vaccinated with the new polio vaccine. As a very young child, I can remember experiencing an ego trip, thinking I was quite important. Usually Dr. Cobb, the county physician, came to the school to give shots to the students. But this was a big event in the medical field.

While thinking about the research going into the Coronavirus vaccine, I decided to google the polio vaccine. Posted by The Conversation on 4/20/2020 was the following post, 'How the Deadly Polio Epidemic Changed American Life for Decades Before a Vaccine Was Found.' The fear and uncertainty surrounding the Coronavirus pandemic may feel new to many of us. But it is strangely familiar to those who lived through the polio epidemic of the last century. The polio virus arrived each summer, striking without warning. No one knew how polio was transmitted or what caused it. Usually those who survived the disease could end up with some form of paralysis. Dr. Jonas Salk, the developer of 'The Shot Felt Round the World' did his work when the public trusted the medical community and believed in each other. The large-scale use of the polio vaccine began in the 1950's when it was administered to American school children."

As a child, I remember hearing my parents and other adults discussing their opinions on the horrors of the disease and the pros and cons of getting the vaccine. As children, we were told not to put chilly water on our bodies if we were hot. We were to wait until we had cooled off, before we went wading in the creeks or ponds so we wouldn't be taking a chance to get the disease. Quoting from the article: "These are frightening times as the Coronavirus spreads. According to his son, Dr. Salk wondered every day why we couldn't apply the spirit of what happened with the development of the polio vaccine to other problems. In fighting Coronavirus, perhaps the citizens and governments of the world will rise to the occasion and demonstrate what is possible when we work together for the common good of all."

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

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

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

1/2 cup solid vegetable shortening 1/2 cup sugar

1 1/2 tsp salt 2 packets fast acting yeast

5 cups all-purpose flour

2 eggs 1/2 cup butter (1 stick), melted (plus more for brushing baked rolls with)

1 1/2 cups very warm water

Instructions

Place sugar, salt, 2 cups of flour, and yeast in a large mixing bowl.

Cut in shortening with a long tined fork.

Add eggs, beating lightly with fork before stirring them in.

Add remaining flour, melted butter, and water. Stir together well. Mixture will look like a big old lumpy blob. Cover with a dish towel and let sit in a warm place for twenty minutes. After twenty minutes, turn out onto a floured surface.

Sprinkle flour over the top and knead three or four times.

Pat out into a square that is about 3/4 inch thick. Cut into squares with a pizza cutter.

Place in greased 9×13 pan and cover with towel. Let rise another twenty minutes.

Once again, like the first rising, I pop it back in the oven to rise.

Take the pan out of the oven after it has risen and then preheat the oven to 350F degrees. Bake at 350 for about 25 minutes, or until tops are golden. Brush rolls with melted butter.

Imagine No Religion: Welcome to Dark America

Jesus Now? Part 2 by Jeff Capshaw

Last week's column focused upon the present, high priestly work of Christ who is seated at the right hand of Father. There he "appears in the presence of God for us," and "he ever lives to make intercession for us." "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15).

Since the current situation is taking its toll on us all, I thought it would be encouraging to elaborate a bit more on Christ's current "session (seated)" work. Like last week's column, I will rely on texts from Hebrews regarding Christ's current ministry. Even at the very beginning of the book, the writer introduces us to that ministry saying, '... after making purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high . . . " (1:3). Much of the book then elaborates on that aspect of Christ's "now" work.

What does this mean, and how do believer's benefit from Christ's current, priestly ministry? First, believers don't have to be timid about entering

into Christ's presence in prayer. Unlike the required ritualism and restrictions of the Old Covenant, New Covenant believers have 24/7 access to God through Christ, especially during our times of need.

For example, the writer encourages us by inviting us to seek help. "Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need" (4:16). There probably has never been a time in recent memory where the Church, collectively, needed more grace and mercy for current needs. People feel alone, distressed, face financial and, perhaps, extra relational strains. If that's the case, then ask God for the grace and mercy to endure those hardships and for wisdom to know how to move forward.

But how is that possible? Consider this about Christ. In him there is eternal hope. We are not left to doubt and despair, although we may have every reason to feel that way during these hard times. The secret lies in trying to rise above what we feel or think by focusing on what

the Lord tells us is true. The writer of Hebrews reminds us that, when God made a promise to Abraham, he swore an oath to himself, because he could not swear by anyone greater (6:15-18).

On that basis, we can know for sure that "we have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner place behind the curtain, where Jesus has gone as a forerunner on our behalf, having become a high priest forever after the order of Melchizedek" (6:19-20).

In summary, Christ eternally sits a God's right hand in a place of honor serving his people. He encourages them to seek mercy and grace with bold confidence. God gives believers eternal hope in Christ, regardless of their circumstances. Finally, don't lose sight of the fact that Jesus is a sure and steadfast anchor during turbulent times.

The Tennessee Department of Education and the University of Tennessee's Center for Educational Leadership are partnering to provide virtual professional learning opportunities to principals to support them in addressing the immediate challenges facing schools as a result of the COV-ID-19 pandemic during these tu-



multuous and uncertain times. These sessions will be completely free, optional, and eligible for TASL-credit. Sign-up information will be provided early next week through principal study councils in coordination with CORE offices.

Tennessee Principal Professional Learning Series, offered to all public school principals in the state at no cost, will leverage the intellectual resources of the university, as well as other external expertise, to address the most pressing problems of practice facing school principals.

"Strong school leadership is more important than ever, and we know our school principals are facing new and unprecedented challenges as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic," said Commissioner Penny Schwinn. "We have seen so many examples of how our principals have stepped up for students, and we want to do whatever we can to provide them with support and resources during this critical time. This partnership with the Center for Educational Leadership will help bring best-in-class, focused professional development to help school leaders meet students' most pressing needs."

Digital professional development sessions will be led by University of Tennessee, Knoxville faculty under the leadership of Dr. Jim McIntyre, Director of the Center for Educational Leadership. In the near-term, principal support will focus on immediate issues, such as best practices in digital learning, whole child needs, and leading remotely.

Moving into the summer, the focus will shift to transforming schools to address student learning needs in the coming academic year through differentiation, personalization, and intervention, as well as re-establishing collaboration and school culture.

"Our school principals have been leading admirably through this unparalleled crisis, and this effort will support them in continuing to meet the needs of their students, parents, educators, stakeholders, and communities," noted Dr. Jim McIntyre, Director of the Center for Educational Leadership. 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

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government as part of the \$2 trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act. How can you make the best use of what you receive?

First, here's what to expect: If you file taxes as a single person, you're eligible for a one-time payment of up to \$1,200, but this amount decreases if your adjusted gross income on your 2019 tax return (or 2018 return if you haven't yet filed for 2019) was more than \$75,000, and the payment is eliminated altogether if your income was \$99,000 or more. If you're married and file jointly, you'll get up to \$2,400, reduced for incomes over \$150,000 and eliminated at \$198,000. You'll also get an extra \$500 for each dependent child under age 17.

So, what will you do with this payment? Here are a few sugges-

Use it for current expenses. Of course, you may well need the money to help meet your current expenses, particularly if your employment has been affected by the virus. However, first look for other ways to reduce these costs. For example, the CARES Act also provides assistance and payment deferral for federal mortgages and federal student loans. Your financial institution also may be offering assistance if you do not have a federal mortgage or student loan. You might also consider delaying your taxes until July 15, when they are now due.

Build an emergency fund. In any economic environment, it's a good idea to keep three to six months' worth of living expenses in cash or a cash equivalent – and in these challenging times, this type of emergency fund may be more necessary than ever. Plus, by having such a fund at your disposal, you may be able to avoid dipping into long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a major car repair.

Invest for other goals or reduce debts. If you already have an adequate emergency fund, and you feel that you're financially stable, you could use your CARES payment to invest for retirement, education or any other goals you may have, and given the recent market downturn, with investment prices down, you may find some compelling opportunities. Or, you could use your payment to eliminate, or at least reduce, any high-interest, non-deductible debt you may be

Support charitable organizations. During this difficult period, the demands on many charitable groups are greater than ever – and these groups could use as much support as possible. And now, thanks to another provision of the CARES Act, when you contribute cash to charitable organizations, you can receive a tax deduction - known as an above-the line deduction - of up to \$300 from your taxable income, even if you don't itemize. (This rule only applies to charitable contributions made in 2020.)

You can find some good uses for your CARES payment – so plan ahead and make the moves that are best for your situation.

ecommends Hunting Changes

The Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission heard a preview of the 2020-21 and 2021-22 hunting and trapping seasons at its April 24 meeting. It was a virtual meeting held online due to the Covid-19 pandemic with commissioners and staff members participating remotely.

The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency is recommending that the Unit CWD for deer hunting be expanded to include Crockett, Gibson, and Lauderdale counties. The three counties are classified as CWD High-Risk counties, but they had not yet been added to Unit CWD. The addition of these counties will bring the number to 11 counties in Unit

The proposal also allows the use of guns in Unit CWD throughout all of deer season, except during the traditional archery-only segment. The Agency is also proposing an unlimited number of earned bucks. The current limit is two.

Regarding spring turkey hunting, the TWRA is recommending a two-week season delay in the five Mississippi River counties of Dyer, Lake, Lauderdale, Shelby, and Tipton and in four southern Middle Tennessee counties to include Giles, Lawrence, Lincoln, and Wayne. The Young Sportsman Hunt would be held the weekend prior to the delayed opener. In the five Mississippi River counties, it was also recommended to reduce the bag limit from four to two. It was proposed to eliminate the fall turkey hunting season in Lincoln County.

Regarding elk, the TWRA is

proposing to allow incidental take by licensed deer hunters in nonrestoration counties only. There would be a limit of one elk (either sex) per deer season.

Bear hunting proposals included shifts in some hunt segments to minimize conflicts with deer hunters, to hunt during times when the least amount of U.S. Forest Service road closures occur, and to allow rest periods before partydog hunts. These would not affect the total number of hunting days.

The commission also heard proposals regarding wildlife management areas across the state and the manner and means of hunting. The full proposals will be posted soon on the TWRA website and a public comment period will be open through May 15.

TWRA Fisheries Chief Frank Fiss, presented updates on the current distribution of carp, control measures, and anticipated federal funding. There have been no new reports of Asian carp in East Tennessee reservoirs. To date, the ACHIP program has harvested four million pounds of carp, but contractors need additional support to sustain and grow their markets.
