## **Courthouse Re-Opens After Scare**

Hardeman County Government resumed business on April 8 after shutting for a week to clean and disinfect the building after it was discovered two possible links to the COVID-19 virus existed.

The county shut the door of its courthouse on March 31 after someone who had contact with someone else who had tested positive for COVID-19 was in the Hardeman County Courthouse on Monday, March 30. County officials declined to identify the person, citing privacy concerns.

In opening their doors on April 8, the county courthouse will operate with the doors locked and services being given to those who need it by phone or email.

According to the State of Tennessee COVID-19 website, six people in Hardeman County have tested positive for the virus, while 104 have tested negative. HIPPA law prevent the identities to be released to the public. Meanwhile, nearly a week remains in Executive Order 23, which requires Tennesseans have a good reason

to be out and about. "Over the last few weeks, we have seen decreases in movement around the state as Tennesseans socially distance and stay at home," said Governor Lee. "However, in recent days we have seen data indicating that movement may be increasing and we must get these numbers trending back down. I have updated my previous executive order to clearly require that Tennesseans stay at home unless they are carrying out essential

Earlier in the month, Lee announced schools across the state would be closed until April 24.

Lee's order, which has been adopted in full by the county government and all Hardeman County Municipalities, remains in effect until April 14, at 11:59 p.m.

#### **Executive Order Violators Arrested**

Two Bolivar residents were arrested the evening of April 5 for violating the Executive Order 23 set by Tennessee Governor Bill Lee to maintain social distancing and only exit their home when it was considered "essential." A charge of disorderly conduct was added to the charges as well.

The incident occurred close to 7:45 p.m. on April 5 as officer Tony Parham (while investigating a reckless driver account on Johnson Street) observed the residence at 510 Johnson Street, Apartment B in apparent violation of the executive order. The evening prior, Parham had been to the same residence, informing the inhabitants of the order.

According to the report, assisting officers who arrived on the scene attempted to inform the occupants of the need to disperse, but upon attempting to enter the residence, Geneva L. Crowder, 43, of 510 Johnson Street, Apartment B, shoved Parham and told him he was not to enter her house. After several attempts to subdue Crowder, she was eventually restrained and placed into custody.

Immediately following, Ashley Nicole Woods, 27, of 513 Elm Street in Bolivar was arrested as well. The report says Ms. Woods refused to leave. She was eventually placed in custody as well and both ladies were transported to the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center, where they were released on misdemeanor citations. They are scheduled to appear in court May 19.

On April 2, Governor Bill Lee signed Executive Order 23, requiring fall persons in Tennessee are required to stay at home, except for when engaging in Essential Activity or Essential Services as defined in this

The order remains in effect until April 14, at 11:59 p.m.

Several car burglaries were solved by the Bolivar Police Department last week with the aid of video surveillance and employees of Bolivar Central High School, as an arrest was made in the cases.



#### Rural Hospital Grants Offered by State of TN

Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced the State of Tennessee will allocate \$10 million in Small and Rural Hospital Readiness Grants to support hospitals that are facing financial strain due to the ongoing response to CO-VID-19.

"Small and rural hospitals are critical to fighting COVID-19 and these grants will help complement federal aid dollars to ensure hospitals can continue delivering care through this crisis," said Governor Lee. "These organizations not only provide care for existing needs but are also a key part of our efforts to build and maintain bed capacity during the expected surge of COVID-19 cases."

The funds, capped at \$500,000 per hospital, will be allocated from the state's FY20 COVID-19

response appropriation and distributed by the Department of Finance & Administration.

For participating hospitals, the grants will serve as a bridge over the coming weeks while elective procedures are suspended and

new federal funds are still pro-

Due to the continually developing nature of the pandemic, the application will be held open for a month or until funds are expended.

#### Every Dog Can Still Have His Lake

With Tennessee State Parks closed across the state, one of the few chances to get into the great outdoors is to take advantage of the state's lakes and rivers and access areas controlled by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency that will remain open, which includes Whiteville Lake, and any access point of the Hatchie River controlled by the TWRA.

"Governor (Bill) Lee's Executive Orders 22 and 23 identifies outdoor activity as an essential activity provided that individuals follow Health Guidelines," said Kurt Holbert, Chairman of the Tennessee Fish and Wildlife Commission. "I want to assure all sportsmen that Tennessee's turkey season will open Saturday as scheduled and public lands controlled by the TWRA will remain open. Likewise, lakes and rivers and access areas controlled by the TWRA will remain open to anglers and recreational boaters."


### **Sunshine Toast with Bacon and Tomatoes**

- **Ingredients** 4 bread slices
- 4 teaspoons olive oil
- 4 eggs Salt
- 3/4 chopped tomatoes
- Ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons snipped fresh parsley or sliced green onion
- 2 tablespoons finely shredded cheddar cheese
- 8 slices thick bacon, crisp-cooked Sun shaped cookie cutter or other desired shape cut out

Using a 2 1/2-inch sun-shape cookie cutter, cut a hole from the center of each bread slice. (Save cutouts for another use. \*) In an extra-large nonstick skillet heat 1 tablespoon of the oil over medium-high heat. Add bread slices; cook about 1 minute or until lightly toasted. Turn bread over.

Break an egg into a cup, being careful not to break the yolk. Hold the lip of the cup as close to the hole in one of the bread slices as possible and slip egg into hole. Repeat with the remaining 3 eggs. Reduce heat to medium. Sprinkle eggs with salt. Cook, covered, for 6 to 7 minutes or until whites are completely set and yolks begin to thicken.

Transfer egg toasts to serving plates. Toss tomatoes with the remaining 1 teaspoon olive oil. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Spoon tomatoes atop egg toasts and, if desired, sprinkle with parsley. Sprinkle with cheese. Serve with bacon.

During this stay-at home time, I found an interesting article that was written in the Jackson Sun on March 12,1985 by reporter, Delores Ballard, regarding Ronie Beshires. She was the husband of John Beshires. They were the parents to twelve children, nine boys and three girls. Mr. and Mrs. Beshires and their family were loved and respected by our community. The reporter interviewed Mrs. Beshires about her laundry day, known in her day as washday. As we endure the virus crisis, this article will probably make readers realize how blessed we are. The article reads, "Today the morning sun is doing its best to burn through the chill, but the wind is up, and it is less than 40 degrees. The washer is on the back porch. Each piece of laundry must be fished out of the wash water by hand, one at a time and fed through a wringer. Ronie, 78, a veteran of the tuband-washboard generation, says, 'This is a pie next to the way it used to be done.' She usually has to run a hose from a spigot to fill the washer, but today she uses rainwater, a free compliment of God, and she doesn't believe in wasting anything. The rainwater was collected in buckets under the eaves of the house. She heats the pails of water on the wood-burning stove in the living room. When she has finished her first load, she slings the homemade calico bag with the clothespins over her shoulder and hefts a pail of wet laundry. She says, 'Put the sheets on the line nearest the road so they can hide the unmentionables from passing traffic.' This is the kind of work that your mama told you was good for you because it 'builds character.' She grew up on a farm where they had no tractor, just mules to farm with. She is not afraid of hard work and she's got her freezers full of garden produce and her hand-pieced quilt tops to prove it. She'd rather quilt than do just about anything else." The older generation might suggest this younger generation could use some hard, gruesome work to help build the character we saw in Mrs. Beshires' generation.

## Bobby Doyle ~ Interim Director of Schools Academic Update and Optional Remote Learning Resources

The Hardeman County School System has announced that schools will remain closed through at least April 24, 2020. Most of us have never experienced this level of disruption and uncertainty in our lifetime. Our families and communities are concerned about the health of their family members and neighbors and many are facing economic challenges. Your child's safety and health is our top priority, and we will continue to work hard to minimize the impact related to their education. The Tennessee Legislature General Assembly voted to waive the 180 day attendance requirement for all schools in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. While it is not possible to know how long schools will be closed, for operational planning, we realize the possibility that schools may be closed for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year to limit the spread of the COVID-19 virus.

There are questions that many parents and students have regarding the impact of students not finishing the school year in the traditional campus setting. We pray that after this closure ends on April 24th, 2020, and our schools are back in session as intended. For the purposes of reporting, the intended school days which we are not in session will be classified as "waived missed instructional days." There will not be attendance taken, grades taken, or any REQUIREMENTS for students to participate in remote learning while we are out. While offering online participation is an option, we feel that the tremendous and unusual levels of stress in homes right now would impact the ability of students to complete and be held accountable for formal lessons and assessments, no matter how effectively they were shared. We are also sensitive to the fact that our own educators may be in similar situations. As such, we've made the decision that holding teachers and students accountable for the same levels of teaching and learning that we would find in a regular school year is unreasonable and not in the best interest of our students and families. We have provided optional resources for families on the website at <a href="https://www.hcsedu.org">www.hcsedu.org</a> under the COVID-19 tab (academic resources). More information regarding optional remote learning may come as we continue to monitor the evolving facts of this pandemic.

The Hardeman County Board of Education will likely need to modify current grading policy to make an exception for the 2019-2020 year only and determine how grades will be calculated for this year. If there are exceptional circumstances that may have impacted a student's academic performance so far to determine grade promotion, retention, or graduation, then we will address those on a case by case basis. Please address any exceptional and/or unusual circumstances with your child's principal via email. We will provide further guidance as it is received from the State Board of Education.

Due to the flexibility provided by the Tennessee General Assembly, Hardeman County Schools will not participate in any end of year standardized tests including TNReady, End of Course (EOC), TCAP-Alternate testing, portfolio evaluation, final exams, or any end of year tests. The lack of data will not negatively impact any school, teacher, student, or school system.



#### **Coronavirus FAQ for Parents**

Tennessee Department of Health has launched a Tennessee Coronavirus Public Information Line in partnership with the Tennessee Poison Center. The hotline number is 877-857-2945 and will be available from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. CT daily.

#### How does the coronavirus (COVID-19) spread?

The spread pattern appears to mirror those of the common cold or flu. The virus is thought to spread mainly from person-to-person, generally between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet).

This spread appears to occur through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs.

#### What are the primary symptoms of the virus? What should I be looking for?

Reported illnesses have ranged from mild symptoms to severe illness and death for confirmed coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) cases.

The following symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure:

- Cough
- Shortness of breath

#### What should I do if my child or someone in my family is exhibiting symptoms?

Call ahead to a healthcare professional if you develop a fever and symptoms of respiratory illness, such as cough or difficulty breathing, and have been in close contact with a person known to have COVID-19 or if you live in or have recently traveled to an area with ongoing spread. Tell your healthcare professional about your recent travel or contact. Your healthcare professional will work with your state's public health department to determine if you need to be tested for COVID-19.

#### Can someone spread the virus without being sick?

People are thought to be most contagious when they are most symptomatic (the sickest). Some spread might be possible before people show symptoms; there have been reports of this occurring with this new coronavirus, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.

It may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads.

#### Are children more at risk for the coronavirus and how should infection be prevented?

No, according to the health officials, there is no evidence that children are more susceptible. In fact, most confirmed cases of COVID-19 reported from China have occurred in adults. Read more here.

Children should engage in usual preventive actions to avoid infection, including cleaning hands often using soap and water or alcohol-based hand sanitizer, avoiding people who are sick, and staying up to date on

#### **An Unprecedented Easter**

This is Holy Week, and it is one of the most important events on the Church's liturgical calendar. Unfortunately, for the first time in our nation's nearly 244-yearhistory, a majority of Christians will not personally gather in their local churches to celebrate this most holy of days. But what is Easter all about anyway?

According Wikipedia, to "Easter, also called Pascha (Greek, Latin) or Resurrection Sunday, is a festival and holiday commemorating the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, described in the New Testament as having occurred on the third day after his burial following his crucifixion by the Romans at Calvary c. 30 AD. It is the culmination of the Passion of Jesus, preceded by Lent (or Great Lent), a 40-day period of fasting, prayer, and penance."

That is right. Easter--just like Christianity itself--is all about the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead! Easter isn't about celebrating Jesus' not being grave-yard dead and, thus, was resuscitated. Easter isn't about celebrating alleged hallucinations people had who claimed to have seen his resurrected body. Easter isn't about celebrating some conspiracy theory; namely, that his disciples stole his body from the grave and fabricated the resurrection story. These are among the most popular theories that have been promulgated by non-believers (mostly academics) to account for the empty tomb.

Space here precludes debunking those theories or giving any sort or reasonable defense of Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Instead, I will simply cite the best possible evidence any Christian could offer for Easter. July 23,1924 - March 28, 2020



First, you may face tax penalties if you withdraw money from your IRA and 401(k) before 59 ½, though there are exceptions. Also, if your withdrawals from your retirement accounts are large enough, they could push you into a higher tax bracket. Plus, the longer you leave your money intact, the more you'll probably have when you need it in retirement.

Let's use the survey results to look at some additional points you might evaluate before using funds from your retirement accounts for

Paying off debts – You could consider using a 401(k) loan to pay down some high-interest rate debt, but this move assumes two things - one, you don't plan on taking on additional high interest rate debt, and two, you plan on repaying the loan from your 401(k) within five years. If you don't, you could face penalties.

Making a down payment on a home – The IRS allows first-time home buyers to make a penalty-free withdrawal of \$10,000 from an IRA to make a down payment on a home; however, taxes could still be owed. You might be better off by delaying the purchase of a home, giving you time to build up additional savings, held outside your retirement accounts, that could be used for the down payment.

Paying for college – If you haven't saved enough for a child approaching college, you might consider withdrawing from your retirement accounts to do so. If the funds are used for qualified education expenses, you may be able to withdraw from you IRA without paying a penalty, but again, taxes could be owed on the withdrawn funds. Alternatively, if you have more time, you could consider opening tax-advantaged 529 accounts for younger children to help pay for their education.

As the name suggests, a retirement account is designed for retirement, so do whatever you can to protect it. You may want to consult with a financial professional for guidance on meeting the other needs people cite in tapping into their retirement accounts early. The more you know, the better prepared you'll be to make the best decisions you can for your situation.





#### TN to Distribute \$200 Million to County and City Governments

Tennessee Governor Bill Lee announced \$200 million in grants to be distributed to every county and city government across Tennessee for one-time, local expenses in fiscal year 2021.

"Capital maintenance, public safety and road projects don't pause for disasters like the March tornadoes and the COVID-19 pandemic," said Governor Lee. "This grant fund will ease the burden on local governments as they work to meet infrastructure and safety obligations."

Funding is based on population as published by the US Census Bureau. Each county will receive at least \$500,000, and each city or municipality will receive at least \$30,000. The three Metro governments (Davidson, Moore and Trousdale) will receive one allocation, whichever is largest. The application will be made available by April 30, 2020, and the funds will be made available after July 1, 2020.

Funds may be used for road projects, I.T. upgrades, capital maintenance, utility system upgrades, and public safety projects. Certain disaster-related expenses are also eligible for funding.

One-time expenses related to COVID-19 are eligible including supply and equipment purchase, cleaning, emergency food and shelter programs. Counties impacted by the March 2020 tornadoes including Benton, Carroll, Davidson, Gibson, Putnam, Smith, and Wilson counties may also use the funds for tornado relief efforts.





## NO SCHOOL, NO SCHOOL SPORTS?

With the school year looking like it could be cancelled (see page 6), the TSSAA High School Basketball State Championship and all spring sports could suffer the same fate.

A statement by TSSAA Executive Director Bernard Childress saying, "We're an organization of schools, an extension of the school day, so if schools are not in session our members won't be able to play," he seemed to indicate the chance to have spring sports rested in the hands of Tennessee Governor Bill Lee.

Lee cancelled schools across the state until April 24. If he were to cancel the rest of the year, it appears sports would go away as well.

With that problem existing all over the country, petitions in several states are trying to get it played in the summer. But one state does it every year.

Iowa is the only state in the nation that plays both its high school baseball and softball seasons strictly in the summer, starting the season in late May and continuing into July.

Now, there is still time. If schools were to get back in session this year, spring sports could start with the district tournament.

"We would like to remind you that there is no TSSAA requirement for schools to play regular season games in spring sports. We realize that a number of districts and regions use regular season results for seeding purposes at postseason tournaments. We encourage administrators to begin conversations with other schools in your district/region to discuss how these cancellations will be treated for the purposes of postseason seeding," says a letter on the TSSAA website.


