Dozen Deputies, Please

A consultant hired as part of the terms of the settlement of the lawsuit between Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen and Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain returned his finding, saying that the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department is understaffed.

While expert opinion in this area is not immediately considered enforceable (see Cunningham v Moore County, 1980), Madison County Sheriff Overton's report, completed February 4, recommended the staff increase by hiring 12 additional deputies.

Overton was hired by Hardeman County to advise on staffing hours and staff size as part of the county's request for a consultant to review staffing and scheduling for the sheriff's department.

In an email dated November 21, Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain again brought Mr. Overton to Doolen's attention, touting him as qualified.

"Chief Overton is a native Hardeman Countian that had a successful career in administration at the Jackson Police Department and retired. After retiring, Madison County Sheriff Steve Mehr recruited Mr. Overton as his Chief Deputy. Chief Overton is a graduate of the prestigious Northwestern University Center for Public Service (Staff and Command)," he wrote, adding his recommendation if hired, came at no cost to the county.

Earlier in the month at the county commission meeting on November 19, Sain assured Doolen that Mr. Overton was an expert, saying, "He's got forty years in."

"The current staffing levels on each shift are inadequate and do not meet the demand of the workload. On any given day, with regular scheduled days off, there may be a few as two deputies working a shift, patrolling 670 square miles and servicing over 25,000 residents," he wrote.

"If the staffing levels on each shift could be brought up to the recommended numbers listed below, this would allow each deputy to spend 50% of their time conducting proactive patrols, self-initiated activities and have higher visibility, which would reduce crime throughout Hardeman County."

Overton also said his recommendation is that salaries be raised across the board, saying that law enforcement agencies compete for talent and that the lower paying ones become "training grounds."

"If the agency does not keep their pay and benefits as a competitive level, the officers start looking for something better. The agency then loses a lot of money in training and experience. Most Law Enforcement Agencies in West Tennessee are very young. In other words, a large percentage of the officers in the agency have less than five years' experience. In most cases over 50% of the officers have less than two years. It has been my experience that if an agency can retain an officer for at least five years, that officer will more than likely stay. Several things will be responsible for that happening. A good working environment being one, which keeps the morale high. Feeling safe while working (available back-up), future expectations (promotions, etc) and pay and benefits."

"The Hardeman County Sheriff's Office does not have to be a "training ground" for other agencies, costing the county thousands of dollars each time a deputy or detention specialist resigns. A salary comparison was made with similar departments in West Tennessee. I would recommend that the starting salary for law enforcement and corrections be increased by at least 7%. A graduated pay scale should be instituted with increases each reaching an increase of at least \$10,000 per year above starting pay at the five year mark and at least \$20,000 per year above starting pay at 14 years. In my opinion, this would make Hardeman County continued on A5

Child Care Centers Wanted

Do you know a childcare center that could put \$4,000 to good use?

Hundreds of child care centers throughout the state of Tennessee already have signed up to take advantage of Support and Enhancement Grants made possible through a partnership with The Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee and the Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS).

Announced in late October 2019, the partnership provides shared services and administers grants through ChildcareTennessee.com for child care agencies licensed by TDHS.

Shared services are essential to helping child care centers save time and money.

ChildcareTennessee.com makes available to

2,300 child care agencies more than 2,000 resources to assist child care directors with administrative tasks, from HR resources to staying compliant with federal and state regulations. These downloadable resources take some of the administrative load off directors so they can focus on what matters most - more than 161,000 of Tennessee's children.

By logging into the ChildcareTennessee.com website, child care directors can also view multiple vendors offering discounts that provide cost savings in child care administration. Directors can then reallocate those savings to better support the children they serve.

Examples of potential savings include 20% on child care products and supplies, 10%-30% on food and food service supplies and 12%-45% on office supplies.

TDHS Support and Enhancement Grants will allow any child care provider licensed with the state agency to apply for up to \$4,000 to enhance equipment, programs, including supplies, and consultants and coaches.

Child care agencies in one of the 15 economically distressed counties identified in Tennessee Governor Bill Lee's Executive Order No. 1 may apply for up to \$5,000. These counties include Bledsoe, Clay, Cocke, Fentress, Grundy, Hardeman, Hancock, Jackson, Lake, Lauderdale, McNairy, Morgan, Perry, Scott and Van Buren.

Annette Bishop, a child care agency director located in Lawrence County, was recently awarded her organization's grant money.

"I am more than excited about the Enhancement Grant, in particular for group and family child care," Bishop said. "The morale boost is much needed and very timely.

"The application was very manageable,' she continued. "Plus, the ChildcareTennessee team treated me with respect and prompt attention whenever I had questions and concerns about the process."

ChildcareTennessee has regional coordinators meeting with child care centers statewide to train on usage of the website, as well as to assist with grant applications.

Registering on ChildcareTennessee.com is free until September 30, 2020. Child care directors can register now and set up an account to start utilizing shared services.

Support and Enhancement Grant applications are open and licensed agencies can apply on ChildcareTennessee.com. Applications close on August 31, 2020.

About the Tennessee Department of Human Services

The Tennessee Department of Human Services is responsible for licensing and monitoring more than 2,300 child care agencies across the state. The primary purpose of licensing is to support child care agencies in providing environments that are safe, healthy, and educationally rich.

Volunteer Fire Department \$\$\$ Available

State Senator Dolores Gresham of Somerville is urging all local volunteer fire departments in her district, including Hardeman County, to apply for grants through a new Volunteer Firefighter Equipment and Training Grant Program. The program was established through legislation passed by the General Assembly last year which was co-sponsored by Gresham.

"Our volunteer firefighters are always there for us, willing to risk their lives to keep others safe," said Senator Gresham. "This grant is an opportunity for them to get needed funds to help them protect both their lives, and the lives and property of citizens in our communities. I urge all of our local volunteer fire departments to apply before the March 27 deadline."

The program earmarks \$500,000 for the purchase of firefighting equipment by Tennessee's volunteer fire departments or to help volunteer departments meet local match requirements for federal grants for purchasing equipment. Fire departments must hold a valid recognition from the SFMO and have a staff made up of at least 51% volunteers to apply. Grant proceeds may be used to purchase equipment used by a firefighter to extinguish fires and protect the life of a firefighter, other than fire trucks or vehicles. Applications received during the submission period will be scored internally and submitted to a seven member committee who will make the final decision and award selection. The committee is composed of three representatives from the Tennessee Fire Chief's Association, three representatives from the Tennessee Firemen's Association, and TDCI's Assistant Commissioner of Fire Prevention. Per statute, the funds will be awarded equally among Tennessee's Grand Divisions. Applications will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. CT on Friday, March 27, 2020. For a full list of rules and an application, applicants can visit the Department of Commerce and Insurance website.

Specialty Block Grants Available

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture is now accepting applications for the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (SCBGP).

"Tennessee's diverse landscape is home to a wide variety of farms, and many of those grow the specialty crops supported through the SCBGP," Agriculture Commissioner Charlie Hatcher, D.V.M. said. "We're proud to administer this program and support research, education, marketing, and innovative projects that will have long-term impact on Tennessee's specialty crop sector."

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture administers the grants, which are authorized through the USDA. SCBGP funds are granted to enhance production and competitiveness of specialty crops, including fruits and vegetables, dried fruits, tree nuts, honey, floriculture, and other nursery crops.

Universities, institutions, cooperatives, producers, and industry or community-based organizations may submit a proposal for funding. The program aims to support projects that directly affect multiple Tennessee producers and have a positive, long-lasting impact on Tennessee agriculture

Previous grant funding assisted Agricenter International to conduct research on developing sustainable practices for growing hops in Tennessee. The non-profit research hub planted three acres of hops in 2019, and they are evaluating how different varieties perform in the local climate.

"Our mission at Agricenter International is to advance knowledge and understanding of agriculture," Agricenter International Director of Farm and Research Dr. Bruce Kirksey said. "With the recent interest in growing local and the Pick Tennessee Products campaign, Agricenter chose to conduct research in the area of hop production in Tennessee. This project will provide meaningful agronomic data to growers in Tennessee who are interested in growing hops for the local craft beer market."

Eligible individuals and organizations must submit proposals using the 2020 project template. The project template, performance measures, and information required to apply are available online at www.tn.gov/agriculture/businesses/business-development/scbg.html.

Proposals are due by March 16 and should be submitted by email to tn.scbg@tn.gov. First-time recipients have a funding limit of \$25,000. Early submission is encouraged.

The Gospel: Part 3 by Jeff Capshaw

this series, the English word "Gospel," along with its Latin and Greek predecessors, were defined as the "Good News." Last week's column centered upon the classic explanation of the Gospel in the Bible. According to 1 Corinthians 15:1-4, the Gospel is the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ. However, that explanation isn't according to Paul's opinion. Rather, these historical events happened "according to the Scriptures" (the Old Testament).

Paul also said that he proclaimed that Gospel to much of Mediterranean world. He wrote, "so from Jerusalem all the way around to Illyricum, I have fully proclaimed the gospel of Christ." Moreover, he indicated that he was ". . . not ashamed of the gospel for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek" (Romans 1:16), and this text provides for this week's reflection.

First, Paul was not ashamed to preach the Gospel as a historical fact; namely, that Jesus of Nazareth was crucified, buried in a grave, and after three days, God raised him from the grave. Why Paul may have said he wasn't "ashamed of the Gospel" isn't clear. Perhaps some in Rome

itself without any effort on our part.

In the first installment of were like many today: skeptical, cynical, or even mockers.

According to Leon Morris' Commentary, maybe there were some in Rome who looked down on the simplicity of the message. Maybe they thought it was intellectual non-sense to believe such a miraculous thing. Even if it did happen, it doesn't follow that the Gospel had anything to do with anybody's standing before God or their eternal destiny. Whatever the case, Paul was convinced of the Gospel's truth, and he believed that everyone else should be convinced too.

Secondly, Paul preached that the Gospel was "power of God unto salvation." Similarly, Luke in Acts 4:12 said, "and there is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." Thus, it is God's power alone that saves sinners. That fact nullifies any humans' efforts to save themselves or to contribute to God's work of salvation. If the Gospel isn't totally and uniquely a

supernatural work of God, then it is just a comforting myth!

Finally, Paul writes that this Gospel is "for the Jew first and also to the Greek." In this phrase, "for the Jew first," Paul acknowledges the special place they held in the history of redemption. To amplify, he raised the question, "then what advantage has the Jew? Or what is the value of circumcision" (Romans 3:1)? He answered, "much in every way. To begin with, the Jews were entrusted with the oracles of God" (the Word of God). Even though all true, those same religious Jews still needed the Gospel of Jesus the Messiah, just like the pagan, non-religious Greeks, and just like you and me.

Are you ashamed of the Gospel, or do you believe it with your whole heart?

more competitive with surrounding counties and cities and allow for trained and experienced employees to be retained."

Overton further stated that the data was collected during the 2019 calendar year, was based on eight hour shifts, and that a one week sample was taken from the months of January, February, March, April, May, June, July, August, and October to determine an average of obligated time (workload) per day/month/year.

Attorney Roy Herron of Dresden, who has represented Doolen in the lawsuit, released this statement:

"The Mayor recommended to the commission and fought to have Madison Chief Deputy Overton work as the Hardeman County consultant. As the mayor pointed out to the county commission, this military veteran has 40 years of law enforcement experience. Sheriff Doolen, Hardeman County law enforcement and the many citizens endangered by the shortage of deputies, hope and pray the mayor will follow the advice of his own consultant."

A request for a comment from Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain went unanswered.

According to an estimate from the Hardeman County Assessor of Property's office, if an extra \$500,000 were spent on the sheriff's budget to cover deputies, each \$100,000 of appraisal value on residential property would cost each taxpayer \$30, while commercial property of the same appraisal value would be \$48 per tax payer.

The settlement that triggered Overton's hiring has been challenged by Mayor Sain. A hearing on that matter is scheduled for February 27.

Doolen stated the report would be given to the Hardeman County Commission on February 18.

- Know your area's tornado risk. In the U.S., the Midwest and the Southeast have a greater risk for tornadoes.
- Know the signs of a tornado, including a rotating, funnel-shaped cloud; an approaching cloud of debris; or a loud roar—similar to a freight train.
- Sign up for your community's warning system. The Emergency Alert System (EAS) and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts. If your community has sirens, then become familiar with the warning tone.
- Pay attention to weather reports. Meteorologists can predict when conditions might be right for a tornado.
- Identify and practice going to a safe shelter in the event of high winds, such as a safe room built using FEMA criteria or a storm shelter built to ICC 500 standards. The next best protection is a small, interior, windowless room on the lowest level of a sturdy building.
- Consider constructing your own safe room that meets FEMA or ICC 500 standards.

Survive DURING

- Immediately go to a safe location that you identified.
- Take additional cover by shielding your head and neck with your arms and putting materials such as furniture and blankets around you.
- Listen to EAS, NOAA Weather Radio, or local alerting systems for current emergency information and instructions.
- Do not try to outrun a tornado in a vehicle.
- If you are in a car or outdoors and cannot get to a building, cover your head and neck with your arms and cover your body with a coat or blanket, if possible.

Be Safe AFTER

- Keep listening to EAS, NOAA Weather Radio, and local authorities for updated information.
- If you are trapped, cover your mouth with a cloth or mask to avoid breathing dust. Try to send a text, bang on a pipe or wall, or use a whistle instead of shouting.
- Stay clear of fallen power lines or broken utility lines.
- Do not enter damaged buildings until you are told that they are safe.
- Save your phone calls for emergencies. Phone systems are often down or busy after a disaster. Use text messaging or social media to communicate with family and friends.
- Be careful during clean-up. Wear thick-soled shoes, long pants, and work gloves.

This season, the Bolivar Bulletin Times will look back at ten years ago, following week by week the 2010 Bolivar Central Tigers State Championship season.

February 8, 2010: Bolivar jumped out to a 25-9 lead after the first quarter on their way to a 72-49 win over Jackson South Side at Jackson. O'Neal Woods and Kegan Fuller led Bolivar with 14, while Tevin Coleman (13), Jay Murphy (11), and Ricky Tisdale (10) were also in double figures.

February 9, 2010: Bolivar fell behind McNairy Central 16-12 at the end of a quarter, but outscored the Bobcats 30-16 in the second

and third quarters to grind out at 51-36 win. Only Ricky Tisdale with 13 was in double figures for Bolivar, who were now 13-1 in the district with one game to go.

February 12, 2010: Liberty came to Bolivar to finish the regular season. With the game tied at 26 at the half, Bolivar managed to get a 44-39 lead with a quarter left and then outscored the Crusaders 25-21 in the final quarter. Jay Murphy led the Tigers with 16, while Tevin Coleman and Ricky Tisdale each had 14. Bolivar went 19-31 from the foul line while allowing Liberty only 17 trips to the charity stripe.

February 18, 2010: Bolivar began the District 14AA playoffs with a blow-out of McNairy Central at Bolivar. The Tigers outscored the Bobcats 28-16 in the first and 20-11 in the second to cruise to a 90-64 win. Kegan Fuller led four other Tigers in double figures with 18.

February 20, 2010: Bolivar took their record to 24-4 with a 59-47 win over Jackson Central Merry in the semifinals. Jay Murphy led Bolivar with 25, Ricky Tisdale had 14 and O'Neal Woods had 10 in the win. Liberty was next in the district final.

Stepping Stones for the Garden by Carolyn Tomlin

If you're a gardener, perhaps your thoughts turn to creative ways to add a creative touch to your garden. Look for ways to copy ideas and apply them to your own backyards.

A simple How-To feature is making concrete molds for stepping stones or miniature gardens. This easy and inexpensive craft idea will make an interesting addition to your backyard.

Materials:

A14

• Stepping-stone concrete mix

- (from a garden or craft store)
- Plastic bucket (throw-away)
- Garden, hand-tool spade
- Plastic or foil-pie pan mold
 Pubber glasses, dust
- Rubber gloves, safety glasses, dust maskSmall decorative stones, marbles, or seashells
- Old knife
- Old measuring cup
- Vegetable oil spray
- Concrete sealant

If you assemble your materials in one place, this garden project can be completed in less than an hour. However, it takes at least 12 hours or more for the mold to dry.

Step-by-Step Instructions:

Follow these easy steps for a successful garden project.

1. Use a throw-away bucket and follow the package direction for mixing the water and concrete.

2. Spray the mold with vegetable oil for easy removing.

3. Use rubber gloves, safety glasses and a dust mask. Use an old spoon to mix the concrete to the right consistency...about the consistency of pancake batter. Mix until all lumps are removed. Not too hard—not too soft.

4. Place the mold on a flat level surface where it will remain until dry. Scoop the mixture into the mold. Lightly tap the mold to settle the mixture into all crevices. Insert a wooden pencil to remove any air bubbles. Smooth the top with an old kitchen knife.

5. Allow the concrete mold to set for about an hour before adding decorations. In warmer

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weather, concrete becomes firm quicker. Marbles, seashells (that remind you of a vacation), buttons, or small colored stones add your personal touch. A child's handprint, a name, and date can be a special gift for a family member. Use a wooden toothpick to inscribe words and letters. Concrete is very forgiving—smooth over the top with a flat-blade knife (before it hardens) and start over.

6. In hot weather, the mold may harden in about 12 hours.

7. When completely dry, loosen the concrete from the mold by slipping a knife around the edge. Allow to cure for about several days before placing the mold outdoors.

8. Spraying with a concrete sealant will prevent cracking and chipping from weather.

Tips for Using Concrete Mix

Follow package directions. Always work outdoors when using concrete. Do not inhale the concrete dust. Wear safety glasses, dust mask, and rubber gloves. Avoid letting the concrete mix touch your skin. If this happens, wash immediately with water. If a rash develops, contact a poison control center in your area or state. Adult supervision is required for children.

Types of Molds for Concrete Projects

Search garage and yard sales for inexpensive molds. These can be re-used or discarded. Or, you may have unusual objects in your own home. Inexpensive glass bowls can be successfully used for projects, also.

This concrete craft can be part of your yard or garden for many years. And if you move to another location, just pack the stone, also.
