reck Claims Nine-Year-Old

A one-car accident on Pine Top Road tragically claimed the life of nine-year-old Braxton Lane Wilson Adkisson on January 31.

According to the police report, Adkisson and his mother, Nicole Page Hill Adkisson, hit a tree on Pine Top Road between Highway 18 North and Ebenezer Road at a location designated as 275 Pine Top Road in Toone sometime just after 3:00 p.m.

A call came to Hardeman County dispatch at 3:23 p.m. and although the ambulance traveled eleven miles in fourteen minutes to the scene, it was too late to save the life of the young man as he was reported trapped in the automobile and unconscious at 3:37 by the first responders.

The mother was reached and transported beginning at 4:09 p.m. by an ambulance from the MED Center EMS in Jackson, as two of the three available ambulances from Hardeman County were on other calls. According to reports, while her injuries were extensive, they were not life threatening. According to Sheriff John Doolen, the Tennessee Highway Patrol is still investigating the incident.

Hardeman County will be treated to three nights of dinner theatre when Murder at the Big Horn Ranch will run at the Hardeman County Arts Center February 13-15.





Lain and Avery to be Honored in Nashville

Bo Lain of Bolivar and Anna Avery of Middleton will be honored on the state level this weekend in Nashville as the Twelfth Annual Governor's Volunteer Stars Awards ceremony will honor volunteers from 69 counties in Franklin on February 9. The awards will celebrate the efforts of 115 volunteers statewide who have strived to improve their communities through service.

One youth and one adult volunteer were selected from participating counties to receive this prestigious award. Nominees were judged based on the community's need of the volunteer service performed, initiative taken to perform the service, creativity used to solve a community problem and impact of the volunteer service on the community. The individual awards are sponsored by Community Care of Rutherford County and Tennessee 4-H.

Bo Lain, is an active member of Bolivar First Baptist Church. He is a disabled Veteran, member of the local VFW lodge, and Shriner Andrew Jackson Lodge. He served as a volunteer chaplain at the Whiteville Correction Facility for three and a half years. He has been an active member of the National Disaster Relief Team for ten years as a cook and chaplain. In 2015, Lain started working with the Red Cross in Hardeman County assisting victims of disaster. Bo also established a medical fund with assistance of many bankers and citizens, to assist in the aid of medical prescriptions for those unable to afford essential medication. Since 2005, Lain has been serving as a volunteer assistant director and director with Loaves and Fishes, a



Lemon Crumble Bars

Ingredients

1 box yellow cake mix 1 stick salted butter (1/2 cup) softened to room temperature 1 (22 oz) can lemon pie filling

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350F degrees. Spray 9 x 13 baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. In a bowl, combine softened butter with dry cake mix. Mix until crumbly. Set aside 1/2 cup of this crumbly mixture for the topping. Take the rest of the crust mixture and press it into a 9 x 13 baking dish. Spread it out evenly and then just go around and pack it down in there with your hands. Spoon lemon pie filling onto crust. Then take the 1/2 cup of crust mixture that you set aside earlier and sprinkle all over lemon pie filling. Bake at 350F for about 20-25 minutes. The crumble on top will just start to turn a very light golden brown. Slice up and serve.

Be Aware of Social Security Myths

Social Security can be one source of retirement income for you and your spouse. To maximize your benefits, you'll need to make some key decisions and be aware of some common myths.

• Myth 1: Always take Social Security early. You can file for Social Security benefits as early as 62, but you could get 25% to 30% more if you wait until your "full" retirement age (likely between 66 and 67). You can receive even more if you wait until 70, at which point your benefits will "max out." However, there's no right time to file for everyone – it depends on your situation, including factors such as your life expectancy, employment, financial need and spousal considerations.

• Myth 2: When you claim Social Security won't affect your spouse's benefits. This is not true. How much you receive in Social Security can affect your spouse's benefits while you are alive (spousal benefits) and after you've passed away (survivor's benefits). Your spouse could receive up to half of your retirement benefit, offset by his or her own benefit, so the longer you work before collecting Social Security, the greater the potential spousal benefits. For survivor benefits, your spouse would receive 100% of your benefit or his or her own, whichever is larger, so when you file affects how much your spouse would receive if you pass away early. In any case, you'll want to consult with the Social Security Administration about how much your spouse can receive, as his or her own benefits can also affect your decision-making.

• Myth 3: You can't work during retirement and collect Social Security. Yes, you can. But if you start receiving Social Security before your full retirement age (likely between 66 and 67), you can only earn up to \$18,240 in 2020 and still get your full benefits. Once you earn more than this, Social Security deducts \$1 from your benefits for every \$2 you earn. But during the year you reach full retirement age, you can earn up to \$48,600 without your benefits being withheld. If you exceed this amount, \$1 will be deducted for every \$3 you earn during the months before you attain your full retirement age. Social Security will increase your benefits when you do reach full retirement age to adjust for the previous work-related withholdings. So, if you plan on working and receiving Social Security, it may not make sense to file if most of your benefits will be withheld. Once you reach full retirement age, you can earn any amount without losing your monthly benefits, although your benefits could still be taxed.

The Gospel: Part 1 by Jeff Capshaw

With the holidays behind and the New Year well underway, it seems appropriate to begin a new series of related articles. Therefore, for this and the coming weeks' columns, the focus will be upon the quintessential theme for Christianity-The Gospel.

Often, religious vocabulary gets tossed around without much thought. This is especially so with commonly used rosters of words, phrases, concepts and ideas used to create both spoken and written discourses. Therefore, it is helpful to take a step back, reflect and ask ourselves, "what do we mean by the word X, the phrase Y or the concept Z"?

Someone once said, "the way to refine the understanding of some notion, some concept or idea is to define it." In this week's installment, therefore, I will simply answer the question, "What is the Gospel"? Below is a brief description of the origin of the English word, "Gospel."

The contemporary, English word "Gospel" comes from the Old English word godspel which is derived from god 'good' + spel 'news or a story.' That Old English word was translated the Ecclesiastical Latin from

phrases, bona annuntiatio or bonus nuntius. Moreover, those Latin phrases came from a gloss of the Ecclesiastical Latin word evangelium, and it was a transliteration from the Greek word, euangelion, the word also used in the New Testament.

So, apart from its usage in Ancient Greek texts or the New Testament, that is a brief history of how the English word, "Gospel," came into contemporary usage. Therefore, the evangelium (Latin) the euangelion (Greek) and the Gospel (English) is «good news»!

Perhaps an illustration of the word's ancient usage in Greek will equip readers better to understand how the term, euangelion, was picked-up by the New Testament authors and applied to the story of Jesus> birth, life, death, burial and resurrection.

According to R.C. Sproul, "soldiers would go out to battle, while people waited for a report from the battlefield about the outcome. Once the outcome was known, marathon runners dashed back to give the report. The watchman





Lee Outlines Committment to Education

Tennessee Governor Bill Lee next two years. delivered his State of the State address, showcasing Tennessee's progress over the past year and outlining his legislative and budget priorities for the coming year.

The governor's address focused on one of his core priorities, supporting public education. The proposed budget includes the largest investment in K-12 teacher salaries in Tennessee history, and a series of initiatives designed to ensure that Tennessee is recruiting, retaining and training the best teachers in America. The governor also announced legislative and budgetary priorities to build a comprehensive approach to advancing literacy across the state which includes additional teacher training and development. In the coming fiscal year, the proposed budget includes more than \$600 million new dollars for public education.

"Make no mistake: we will do whatever it takes to make Tennessee the best state in America to be a student, and that means making Tennessee the best state in America to be a teacher. That means better pay, as we've said, but it also means better training and professional support, so that our teachers can perform at the top of their trade," said Lee.

Additional education initiatives include:

Investing an additional \$117 million in teacher salaries, an amount equal to a 4% increase in the state's contribution.

Recommending moving the minimum teacher salary schedule from \$36,000 to \$40,000 over the

Applying for a new AP education teaching course.

Establishing the Tennessee Teacher and Leader Institute which will solicit proposals from across the country to help launch



a new initiative to build the best educator preparation program in the nation.

Governor Lee emphasized that these education initiatives are designed to produce economic and workforce development.

"The true measure of a successful education system is a cohort of high school graduates who are well-prepared to be productive citizens, whether they choose a career or college. To me, education isn't just about a test score," said Lee.


