Ruiz, 19, of Bolivar perished that night when he was shot while washing dishes at El Ranchito Mexican Restaurant in Bolivar. Ruiz was a senior at Bolivar Central High School and on path to graduate


The shooting occurred at approximately 9:00 p.m. that evening when two gunmen entered the back door of El Ranchito demanding money. But while video surveillance shows Ruiz appearing to be complying with the demands of the men, he was shot and

A hearing is set for January 17, where either sentencing will take place or another date will be set for sentencing.

The indictment by the Hardeman County Grand Jury said Douglas, "did unlawfully, feloniously, and knowingly, attempt to obtain property, cash, with the intent of depriving El Ranchitos restaurant of the property effective consent, and accomplished by the use of a deadly weapon, to wit: an assault styled rifle and a pistol, against the peace and dignity of the state of Tennessee."

The second count detailed the murder charge against Douglas.

A trial is expected to begin next week for another suspect in the case.

Democratic Party Elects New Leaders


The Hardeman County Democratic Party Executive Committee elected a new chair and vice-chair at their regular monthly meeting on January 7.

FAFSA Frenzy in Middleton by Dr. Dorrie Powell

Middleton High School recently received recognition from the Tennessee Higher Education Commission for its high percentage of seniors who have already filed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) for the 2020-2021 academic year. Before Thanksgiving, more than 85% of Middleton seniors had filed the FAFSA (at the time the 7th highest completion rate in the state). That rate has now increased to more than 95%.

Both Bolivar Central and Middleton make a strong push to have every senior take advantage of financial aid available from state, federal, and institutional sources. The key to accessing these funds for college is the FAFSA, which qualifies students for need-based aid such as the federal Pell Grant as well as merit-based state aid such as the Hope Lottery Scholarship. Most colleges and universities also base their own institutional scholarships and grants on the FAFSA.

To maintain eligibility for the TN Promise Scholarship (available to any graduating senior who chooses to attend an eligible Tennessee postsecondary institution including the state's 13 community colleges and 27 TCATs), seniors must file the FAFSA no later than midnight, February 1, a deadline that is fast approaching.



One of the most daunting aspects of the FAFSA process is gathering the required information for parents and seniors: birthdates, social security numbers, marriage or divorce dates, number of dependents, 2018 tax information, verifiable email addresses and cell phone numbers. However, every senior at Bolivar Central and Middleton received a Class of 2020 Next Guide that contains a very detailed section on financial aid and the information needed on the

Once all of the information is collected, the actual process for filling out the FAFSA can be a simple one, completed and submitted online at studentaid.gov or even on

a cell phone using the new myStudentAid app available for both Apple and Android devices.

While the FAFSA may be a little challenging, it can earn students thousands of dollars to continue their education and training beyond high school. It is time well-

MHS Hosa Competes in Regional Competition

Middleton High School HOSA students traveled to Jackson State in Jackson, on January 8, to compete in the 2020 Tennessee Regional HOSA Competition. 16 MHS students placed in the top 5 in their competition, which will make them eligible to compete at the state level in April in Nashville, TN. Students placing in the top three of their competition at the state level will then be eligible to compete at the National HOSA Competition in Houston, Texas this June.

Due to the increasing number of HOSA students throughout the state, students were required to take tests online this year prior to competing at the regional level. Students had to score high enough to go to the second round in order to compete at the regional level. Not only has Tennessee HOSA grown over the past several years, but HOSA now has over 10,000 members nationwide.

Each year, Tennessee HOSA students attend the Regional HOSA Conference and compete in various health related events which help prepare them for futures in healthcare. They also attend various meetings/sessions and are given the opportunity to network with healthcare professionals and other healthcare students with similar interests throughout lower West Tennessee. Prior to this event, students are required to study, practice healthcare skills, prepare presentations, and various leadership tasks in order to compete at the state level. In order to prepare these students, community stakeholders, parents, and other healthcare professionals, such as John Weaver, Jerry Avent, and Hardeman County EMS, assist in working with these students and play a large part in their success.



Middleton High School was very successful at this year's Regional HOSA Competition. All of the students competing this year represented Middleton High School and Hardeman County Schools well. The following students placed first in their competitions: MaKenzie Eady - Dental Terminology, Shariyah Buggs Medical Terminology, Ethan Doyle - Veterinary Science, and Aubry Hayden – Extemporaneous Writing. The following students placed second in their competitions: Connor Dixon - Medical Law & Ethics, Yasmine Burns Pathophysiology, Amanda Atkins and Romeo Ayala - CPR & First Aid. The following students placed third in their competitions: Kailey Bizzell - Physical Therapy, Ella Willis – Behavioral

Health, Ally Davis – Nursing Assisting, Emily Shoemaker & Katie Todd – Forensic Science. The following students placed fourth in their competitions: Callee Lanier – Medical Assisting, Anna Leslie – Sports Medicine, Madeline Coupe – Medical Math. These students will be eligible to compete at the state level along with other students that are competing in state only competitions from

MHS.

Through these competitions, students assess their strengths and weaknesses and hopefully find a path of study for the future. Competitions also help students become more responsible and confident in their skills. Competitions help students answer the question, "What can I see myself doing in the future?"





Bacon Wrapped Bratwurst Bites

Ingredients

1 (14 oz) package fully cooked smoked bratwurst

6 slices bacon

1/2 cup light brown sugar

1 teaspoon dry mustard

Instructions

Preheat oven to 425F degrees.

Line baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a small bowl, combine brown sugar with dry mustard.

Cut up each brat into three pieces (you can make them smaller if you like).

Cut up each bacon slice into three pieces as well.

Wrap each brat slice with a slice of bacon.

Roll each bacon wrapped brat with the brown sugar mixture. Then place on baking sheet and continue with the rest of them.

Bake brats for 25-30 minutes, until bacon is crispy.

These brats do produce some grease from the bacon. If you'd like, after baking, you can place the brats on some paper towels before putting them on plates to absorb any extra grease.


Martin Luther King Jr. Day, a federal holiday observed nationwide since 2000 will be Monday, January 20.



As a business owner, you're always thinking of what you need to do now. But you can't forget about the future - yours and that of your business. So it may be a good idea to consider your personal retirement plan and business succession strategy.

Let's start by looking at a few retirement plan possibilities:

Solo 401(k) – This plan, which is also known as an Owner-only 401(k), is available to self-employed individuals and business owners with no full-time employees other than themselves or a spouse. A Solo 401(k) offers many of the same advantages of a traditional 401(k): a range of investment options, tax-deductible contributions and the opportunity for tax-deferred earnings growth. You may even be able to choose a Roth option, which allows you to make after-tax contributions that can grow tax-free. Your Solo 401(k) contributions consist of two parts: salary deferral and profit sharing. In 2020, you can defer up to \$19,500 of income, or \$26,000 if you're 50 or older. Your profit-sharing contribution is based on your earnings. The sum of your salary deferral and profit sharing can't exceed \$57,000 (or \$63,500 if you're 50 or older). If your spouse is employed by your business, you each can contribute the maximum amount allowed.

SEP IRA – If you have just a few employees or are self-employed with no employees, you may want to think about a SEP IRA. You'll fund the plan with tax-deductible contributions, and you must cover all eligible employees. (Employees themselves cannot contribute.) You can generally contribute up to 25% of compensation, up to \$57,000 annually. And you can fund your SEP IRA with virtually any type of investment.

Solo defined benefit plan – Not many businesses still offer pension plans, also known as defined benefit plans, but you can set one up for yourself if you're self-employed or own your own business. This plan has high contribution limits, which are determined by an actuarial calculation, and your contributions are typically tax-deductible.

A financial professional can help you choose the appropriate retirement plan. But you'll still need to think about succession planning. Of course, you can always sell your business outright at any time you like. Or you could leave your business to your children in your will, but if you give it to them gradually during your lifetime, you can become more confident they'll be able to manage the business on their own.

Another alternative might be to transfer the business with a buysell agreement, which allows you to determine when, to whom, and at what price you can sell it. Because you can establish the purchase price as your business's taxable value, a buy-sell agreement is useful in estate planning. If you want to keep the business in your family, you might want to consider funding the buy-sell agreement with life insurance, so family members can use the death benefit proceeds to buy your ownership stake.

In any case, given the complexities and tax issues involved with succession planning, you'll need to consult with your legal and tax advisors when creating a strategy. But don't wait too long. You can't predict the future, but by planning ahead, you can help achieve the outcomes you desire.

Forgiving Yourself by Jeff Capshaw

Last week's column challenged readers to embrace an attitude of joy this year. Paul advises ". . . this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead . . ." (Philippians 3:13). Putting past failures, disappointments, and a generally lousy year behind us is good psychological advice for everyone, but it is certainly right for believers.

That brings us to self-forgiveness. Many find this exceedingly difficult. Sometimes self-loathing and the inability to forgive one's self can last for years, all the while knowing there is nothing that can undo the past. Harboring guilt makes us miserable and is one root cause of both mental and physical illnesses.

According to a recent *LA Times* article, "guilt usually serves three main functions . . . to maintain relationships, to exert influence and to redistribute emotional stress." From a Christian viewpoint, however, Romans 2:15 says, ". . . the requirements of the law are written on their hearts, their consciences also bearing witness, and their thoughts sometimes accusing them and at

other times even defending them."
Our conscience has a "right" and
"wrong" pole.

Scripture teaches humans are made in the image of God, and they have their Creator's moral law written on their hearts. Unless the heart has become hardened and insensitive, most know deep inside "right" from "wrong." Why is that? Unguided evolution by random mutation and natural selection doesn't care about right from wrong, about human beliefs. It cares about the biological survival of the fittest. That's just one of the numerous problems with the theory.

There are many reasons why humans feel guilty; some reasons are legitimate, and some are not. But on a Christian view of the human condition, there is also the concept of legal, moral, or forensic guilt. In Romans 3:19, Paul writes, "now we know that whatever the law says, it says to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be silenced and the whole world held accountable to God."

When humans sin against God, most feel some guilt. It doesn't, however, change the fact of their legal guilt. Fortunately, there is

a remedy for that guilt. It is the Gospel. Christ died, not only to pay the penalty for our sins, but he also died to take on the burden of our guilt. Don't carry around unnecessary, psychological guilt this year. Forgive yourself. But, by all means, don't live in unforgiven, moral and legal guilt before God. He will forgive you! If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9). The key to forgiving self is to accept God's forgiveness first, and then live in light of that amazing truth!











Developing a Love of Reading by Carolyn Tomlin

Author Mark Twain said, "The person who chooses not to read has no advantage over the person who cannot read." Some agree; others do not. However, there are many benefits to reading. We read to educate ourselves, for enjoyment and for research.

• Reading is an activity without an age limit. It's never too late to start reading. Growing older, we may choose different subjects that reflect our interest. Do you enjoy historical novels? How-to books? Hobbies? Travel to faraway places? Cookbooks? Sports? Antiques? Whatever you choose, there are books and magazines available.

If you're like many adults, careers and raising a family took high priority. As you grow older, you have time to pursue those interests, such as reading for enjoyment. Commit to reading daily. If needed, pen in an appointment on the calendar—just like you would for a meeting. Honor this habit until it becomes a daily exercise.

• Collecting books in a different way. A retired educator prided himself in his vast collection of books. One large room had been turned into a library. From the floor to the ceiling, bookcases were double-lined with books. (Meaning: they were stacked one in front of another on all shelves.) Spending a fortune on this collection, he realized that before his life ended, he needed to give or donate these texts to a college or at least a person who would treasure the books like himself. To his amazement, no one wanted his collection. Libraries have neither space nor employees to catalog and sort the books. Many younger readers do not purchase bound books; instead they used free online sources and Kindle. Collecting books has changed the way we read.

· Sources for free and inexpensive books. Many people continue to purchase hardcopies of books.



But today, there are alternatives to reading. Check out library books. Request inter-library loan if your library doesn't have a copy you want. Start a community bookswap where you trade with others. Read online copies. Download Kindle books -often free or inexpensive.

· Organize a book club with other readers. Meet in your home or request a room in a church, public building or library. During this time, discuss the book. If your selection is from a local author, ask him/her to speak about the book. Keep the group small perhaps 12 members. Each person buys one book from those a committee selects to be read in the coming 12 months and then passes it around to an alphabetical list of members. Each person has one month each year to either host the club in their home or to provide a meeting place and serve light refreshments.

· Provide for those with limited vision. Large print books are available at libraries and for purchase from many publishers. Look for these when ordering from www.amazon.com. Some organizations provide reading devices that enable those with limited eyesight to enjoy books and provided at no cost to the person.

Challenge yourself to develop a list of favorite authors. Read their


