# Sain Investigating the CJC Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain asked the Hardeman County

Commission during their meeting on June 21 if they knew who owned the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center.

Turns out, nobody knew. And according to Sain, it has cost the county plenty.

"Industrial boards do no have to bid out work," he explained. "The county has to follow a public bidding procedure. Someone wanted Bell Construction to build our facility, so they ran it through the industrial board. This was all done to circumvent the purchasing laws of Hardeman County. The contractor did not have to bid on it."

And the financing, according to Sain, was a problem as well.

"If we would have done it, we could have used a general obligation bond," he said. "It has a lower interest rate, since it uses the county tax

But with the industrial board building the facility, Sain explained, they had to get a revenue bond. The industrial board had to have revenue to guarantee the bond. So the county agreed to lease the building from the industrial board, which gave them money to borrow against.

And Sain said, there's the problem of the balloon payment.

"Not only did we get a higher rate with the revenue bond, but we financed 30 years on a balloon. Right now the payment is \$1,020,000 per year, but it will end up somewhere around \$1,220,000 per year before it is paid."

"I don't know if there is criminal activity," he said. "But it's disheartening to see what has gone on."

After Sain's explanation, he asked the commission to approve a refinance of the building that would be used to pay off the industrial board, get the building back in the county's name, and save an estimated \$1,000,000 over the life of the loan. The commissioners complied

Sain said he hoped to have his investigation completed and presented in writing at the next commissioners meeting, which is scheduled for August 16.

## Three "Yes" Votes Pass Budget

For the second year in a row, the final vote on the Bolivar city budget was passed on June 21 with a bare minimum of city council members present.

Absent from the meeting were Randy Hill, Tracy Byrum, and Larry McKinnie, who all cited work conflicts. Councilwoman Quantissia Hamer was absent as well, but the reason is unknown.

In the public hearing portion of the meeting allowing citizens to air their thoughts and concerns to the city, Jimmy Howell of Bolivar opined that since his council people (Hill and Byrum) were not present, the vote on the budget should not take place.

In the first reading of the budget on June 7, Mayor Barrett Stevens had to break a 4-4 deadlock that was caused by a disagreement on giving raises to police department employees, but to no other city workers. Three of the "no" votes on June 7, were absent from the meeting. Council member Julian McTizic, who voted against the budget in

both meetings and who is the son of a Bolivar police officer, said it wasn't a stand against the police department, but a stand against waste in other city departments.

"I have a problem with overspending in other departments," he said. "We are doing budget amendments each year at the end to pay for it. That's why I voted against this budget."

Four of the eight councilmen were absent from the final budget vote meeting on June 22, 2015 as well, but it was decided that a majority was present because Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens could be added to the total number of council members.

#### County Budget Vote Unanimous

The Hardeman County Commission voted unanimously to pass the 2016-2017 budget, albeit with two commissioners absent from the June 21 meeting.

County Mayor Jimmy Sain said the budget has a \$905,000 surplus

built into the figures, with the same tax rate of \$2.55 in place. Absent from the vote were Elvis White and Mac Vaughan.

The passage of the budget before July 1, was completed for the second year in a row and for only the second time in the past 33 years.

The Hardeman County Budget Committee consists of Chairman Jerry Watkins, Mayor Sain, Commissioner Elmer Cobb, Commissioner Jim Daniel, Commissioner Jackie Sain and Junior Jimmerson.



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

## Watch Your Verticals by Jimmy Sadler

I spent ten years in video production at a Christian University and then at a large church. Initially, I learned the ropes from my early mentor, Jeff. There was one particular phrase Jeff would use with me often when I ran a hand held camera, "Jimmy, watch your verticals." I would correct with a slight tilt and all was well until I let it slip the next time. I still hear him in my head sometimes when I am shooting video or photos. Occasionally, I will have a slight tilt to the picture and I usually correct it before getting back to a computer.

What happens when your verticals are off is a tilt in the plane of the picture or video. Imagine looking at a picture of the ocean and the horizon is higher on one side of the photo that the other. It makes it appear that the earth is tilted, and your mind wants to imagine the water from the ocean pouring from the low side. We all make the mistake occasionally and have a bad tilt to a photo. We can do the same for people, and they lean to one side. The mind seems quicker to catch it when it has been printed or displayed that when you are taking it.

When you tilt an image, your end viewer will get a skewed look at your vision for the image. Their mind will not allow them to enjoy anything in the photo because the

angle of the photo is off. The world inside the picture is juxtaposed, off center, unnatural. We want to see a straight horizon, a flat ocean and upright family members.

Some of the times I've thought about Jeff's instruction have not been media related. I started imagining his advice applying to life in general. I would love to hear a voice that says "Jimmy, watch your verticals" before I say something unkind, judgmental or harsh. When our vertical relationship with God is off balance, tilted, or skewed, everything will be out of sorts. I never heard Jeff say "Watch your horizontals." We typically work to try to keep our human relationships somewhat in check. When our verticals are off, everything is off.

So how do we keep our verticals in check? How do we avoid skewing everything else in our life because our relationship with God is off-center? I think it is simpler than we try to imagine. Conversation, conviction and correction will take place in a healthy spiritual

We must, to keep ourselves right with God, communicate with Him. We are encouraged to pray non-stop. Pray throughout the day in the big and the small decisions. As you pray, ask God to illuminate His Word. Read the Bible and ask

# Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

Many of you may remember when churches in our county held their baptisms in a pond; many of you may have been baptized in a pond or river here in Hardeman County. I know these types of baptismal services were commonplace across our part of the world for many years, and some churches even continue the practice of a pond baptizing once a year or so.

Outdoor baptisms got a bit of a boost from the marvelous 2000 movie, "O Brother, Where Art Thou" (which my Mom says you have to have a "Coleman sense of humor" to like; of course, my Dad and I have a great love of that particular movie and are known to quote lines from it from time to time). A key scene in the movie occurs when the three prisoners on the run find themselves in the middle of a baptismal service, and two of the three join in to have their sins and transgressions washed away ("Come on in boys, the water is fine," Delmar urges them in a classic line from the film).

This marvelous photograph, probably from the late 1940's or so, shows a crowd gathered at Goddard's Pond for a Sunday afternoon baptizing. As with many events of the churches in the South, a singing and/or a meal might follow the event, along with another Sunday afternoon staple – visitin' with the folks. This service was held for Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist Church near Grand Junction. The church was organized sometime around 1872 and held its first services in a brush arbor. Founding members of the church included S. J. Hunt, Jordan Hunt, Ephriam Pugh, and



Cornelius Pugh.

I've seen several articles from around the country in the past couple of years that indicate the outdoor baptismal services may be making a comeback, and often an outdoor baptism is requested either for nostalgia or to follow a family tradition. For obvious reasons, the outdoor baptisms are more popular in the warmer weather, provided spring and summer thunderstorms are not in the area.

When the first settlers came to this place we now call home, one of the very first things they built was a church, and I imagine Har-

deman County ponds and maybe a river or two have been the site of many baptizings of the faithful along with dinners, singings, and prayers over the years. Come on in, y'all, the water is fine.

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
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# **Bolivar 8U Brings Home Some Hardware**



The 8U team will get another chance against Germantown July 8-9 as the two teams face off in a three game series to determine the Tennessee State Dizzy Dean 8U Champions.





#### Sales Tax Holiday Comes a Week Early

Tennessee's sales tax holiday will now be one weekend earlier than it has been in the past, due to a 2016 law change. Starting this year, the sales tax holiday will be held during the last weekend in July, instead of the first weekend in August each year.

From July 29 through July 31, Tennessee shoppers can save nearly 10 percent on clothing, school supplies and computers, as students prepare for the back-to-school season. "The sales tax holiday for back-to-school items is earlier this year. We

encourage Tennesseans to mark their calendars so they don't miss this opportunity to save on important items," Governor Bill Haslam said. Under the new law, Tennessee's annual sales tax holiday will be held beginning at 12:01 a.m. on the last Friday in July and end at 11:59

p.m. the following Sunday night. This year, the sales tax holiday begins Friday, July 29 at 12:01 a.m. and ends Sunday, July 31 at 11:59 p.m. "We hope Tennessee shoppers will take advantage of the tax relief offered by this year's sales tax holiday," Revenue Commissioner Rich-

ard Roberts said. The new law did not change any other aspects of the sales tax holiday. As in prior years, consumers will not pay state or local sales tax on clothing, school and art supplies that cost \$100 or less per item and computers that cost \$1,500 or less. Tennessee had its first sales tax hol-

## Gen Xers Must Juggle Both Money and Time

If you're an older member of Generation X – that is, if you were born in the early- to-mid-1960s – you may have a lot of "balls in the air." You are saving for your own retirement – which might not be that far away – while at the same time possibly wanting to help pay for your children's college education. And you may also be assisting your aging parents in some ways. How can you manage this juggling act? To begin with, you need to emphasize your retirement. Now that you are likely in, or near, your peak earning years, you should contribute as much as you can afford to your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. Your plan likely offers you a range of investment options, so you can create a portfolio that's appropriate for your needs. The money in your 401(k) or similar plan can grow on a tax-deferred basis, and your contributions are typically made with pretax dollars. So, the more you put in, the lower your annual taxable income. You won't have to pay taxes until you take withdrawals, but if you do withdraw money before you reach 59½, the withdrawals

may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty.

Even if you're contributing to a 401(k) or similar plan, you're probably still eligible to contribute to an IRA. Like a 401(k), a traditional IRA offers tax-deferred growth potential, while a Roth IRA can provide tax-free earnings distributions if you've had your account at least five years and don't take withdrawals until you're at least 59½. If you devote most of your investable income to your retirement plans, you may not have much left to help pay for your children's college education. But that may not be a disaster – after all, they could get scholarships and financial aid. And even if they need to take out student loans, they have a lot more years to pay them back than you have until your retirement. If you can afford to help your children, choose a smart college-savings vehicle, such as a 529 plan, which offers tax-free earnings distributions as long as the money is used exclusively for qualified higher education expenses. (If it's used for other purposes, you'll be taxed on it and also could face a penalty.) How about your elderly parents? How can you best help them? Hopefully, they will not require any outright financial assistance from you – but that doesn't mean you can't assist them in other ways. If you haven't already done so, try to find out as much as you can about their estate plans and any arrangements they've made should they become incapacitated. Ideally, you'll want to get answers to questions such as these:

Have they named a durable power of attorney? Have they chosen an executor for their estate?

Have they thought about how they would pay for any long-term

care services they might need, such as a nursing home stay? It may not be that easy to have these conversations, but they are

important – especially if you are going to play an active role in your parents' plans. Clearly, as a Gen Xer concerned about retirement, college-age

children and aging parents, you'll have a balancing act involving both money and time. But with planning, patience and realistic expectations, you can help yourself and the ones you love.

#### **Increases in TN for 2016** Average Wage

Statistics released by the Tennessee Department of Labor and Workforce Development (TDL-WD) show the average hourly wage earned by Tennesseans in May increased from the same time period in 2015. The finding is part of the TDLWD Labor Market Information Unit's recent annual occupational wage and employment survey.

"We are pleased to report that the average wage for all occupations in Tennessee increased \$0.30 per hour from \$19.55 to \$19.85 hourly," Commissioner Burns Phillips said.

The increase in the state's average hourly wage represents a yearly income of \$41,296. The



Office space will be provided at both hospitals and the SOAR Case Manager is expected to divide their 40 hour work week between the 2 institutes and is projected to spend 3 days per week at Western and 2 days per week at MMHI. Mileage will be paid for travel to and from Western.
- Primary goal of this position will be to assist people preparing for discharge whose SSI/SSDI benefits have been previously approved but have been stopped due to extended hospitalizations. The SOAR Case Manager will advocate and work to have benefits reinstated and payments restarted upon discharge as well as assist in getting new applications processed. It is expected that medical determination will be made within 30 days of discharge.
- Will serve as primary liaison between Social Service staff at Western, MMHI and SSA regarding (5) SSI/SSDI applications being prepared and submitted.
- SOAR Case Manager will be required to participate in monthly state oversight meetings to discuss (6)progress and outcomes as well as routine meetings with the SOAR Coordinator and Director of Special Programs and Services to ensure we are on task of meeting goals and expectations of the position.

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
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






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
