Hardeman County will have two candidates to place into county positions when early voting begins on July 15.

County-wide, voters will choose from incumbent Josh Pulse and challenger John Vickers for Assessor of Property. Four years ago, Pulse was elected to his first term, beating Vickers and Tracy Byrum in the August election.

The county will choose a candidate to assume the unexpired term of Donald McTizic, who resigned in January. Gary Barber (see B4 for more on Barber), who is currently serving in McTizic's stead, is a candidate for the position and will compete with fellow independent candidate Winfred Ray against Democratic nominee Johnny Weems for the District 2, Position 2 spot.

The other county commission spot up for grabs is already in the hands of Connie Young, who is running unopposed for the District 4, Position 1 slot.

In addition, voters in the third district will vote in a new road supervisor, choosing between Matt Knight and Jared King to replace Tony Ross.

The Hardeman County School Board will re-elect three incumbents, as Beverly A. Bodiford,

What Would Jesus Say? by Jimmy Sadler

What would Jesus say about the news lately? How would he frame the mass shooting and make sense of it? How would He go about helping us understand the girls who were kept for a sadistic man's whims? Would He show us what real indignation looks like? Would he give us simple truths so elegant that we would be settled in our hearts and minds? Would Jesus lay out truth only to be followed up by a human rebuttal?

I have a lot of questions lately. I think we all tend to ride a pendulum between deep searching and callous indifference. We are so easily handed the "news", stockpiled with tragedy, that we can't stand to care too much. We will find ourselves mired in the weight of the fallen world. I've done it too often. I take in so much sadness from the far reaches of the world that I lose my bearings to manage the little part of the world God has called me to. It's hard to hear so much more need than we are anywhere near capable of handling on our own.

Even Jesus, in his earthly body, was frustrated with the limitations versus the incessant needs of human beings. In Matthew 17:17, He seemed overburdened by the endless line of people in need of healing. I find it interesting that you can show some frustration and emotion but still keep it from going over the edge into sinfulness.

So, in view of the streaming flood of bad news, what would Jesus say in response to tragedy? Would he condemn the terrorist and call on His people to fight for those around the world who are victimized by terror? Would He instead encourage us to love our enemy, to give him the shirt off our backs, or lift him to his feet and bandage his wounds? Would Jesus tell the families of people caught in tragic circumstances to turn the other cheek?

From many years of searching, scratching my head over how susceptible we are to the sins of others, there still remains but one passage that I feel addresses the randomness of these situations. You may not like it, it is not necessarily comforting, If you dig into what He says in the context of who He is, however, I think you might just be moved to deeper understanding,

The Romans had cornered the news this one particular day. Pilate made a statement of some who were still following the God of the Hebrews. He had them killed and mixed their blood in

with the blood of the sacrifices they were making. You would think Jesus would fly off the handle on this sacrilegious crime. Instead, he pulled in another recent tragedy where a tower had fallen and killed 18 people. In that day, that was an incredible number killed at once. His answer to both was to remind people that those who were killed by evil or by accident that it wasn't because of their sins or their parents' transgressions that they died in such a way. Instead, he reminds them the same fate of death awaits us all unless we repent and turn to God.

So, though it may not be comforting initially, it is nice to know that we don't have to have all the answers. It is incumbent upon us to do soul searching within ourselves at times like this. We are all sinners in need of Grace, and God would have us spend time introspectively challenging ourselves to stepping up to the life God has called us to.

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
Sunrise: Hurtful Words by David Coy

Some who will read this have been on the receiving end of words that I am sure were not intended to hurt, but did because they were not thought out before they left one's lips. Such phrases as; "I know how you feel", "You'll be stronger because of this", "It is God's will", or "It could be worse you still have...", are just some examples. There is a song whose first line reads, "Angry Words! O let them never, From the tongue unbridled slip, May the heart's best impulse ever, Check them ere they soil the lip." (Horatius R. Palmer) This clearly illustrates even unintentionally, words can do other than heal, if we are not careful.

Sometimes words can hurt intentionally or are delivered indifferently and with callous intent. Inspired writers remind us of the power of words, ".. the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great things. How great a forest is set ablaze by such a small fire!" and "Death and life are in the power of the tongue." (James 3:5; Proverbs 18:21). Words not carefully chosen or intentionally aimed to inflict damage can kill a spirit and a person's self-worth. This is the destructive power of verbal abuse. Another line of ancient wisdom says, "Reckless words pierce like a sword." (Proverbs 12:18) The old children's rhyme, stick and stones may break my bones, but words can never hurt me, has never been true nor accurate. It is never proper to unleash cruel words to prop our self-esteem or ensure our domination over the life of another. Is there ever a time that carefully prepared words might inflict a sting and be justified? Yes, faithful are the wounds of a friend (a caring person may smite me in kindness and reproof, because they care for me and my wellbeing, Proverbs 27:6; Psalm 141:5). Sorrow is born when a spirit has died because of cruel hurtful words that are not spoken in love (Ephesians 4:15) nor for the purpose of loving gentle correction. When a loved one physically dies, we experience the pain of grief. What happens when a person is alive yet is experiencing verbal abuse? Do they experience grief? How should we respond when we come to know and understand what they are enduring? We support and seek solutions in their journey with grief in every way possible. 
She is survived by seven children, Martha Klee of TN, Madeline Phillips of GA, John De Enoch of TN, Brenda Castleman of VA,

Tennessee's preliminary unemployment rate for May was 4.1 percent, down two tenths of a percentage point from the previous month's revised rate. The U.S. preliminary rate for May was 4.7 percent, down three tenths of a percentage point from April.






Prior to becoming Administra-



OUR COUNTY Summer Fun on the Hatchie River by Calley Overton

Summer. It's finally here, bringing ninety degree temperatures with it. When it gets up to ninety, its time to go down to the water to cool off, whether it be all the way down to the ocean, to a lake, or to a river. Some of my best summer memories are from being on the Hatchie River, just sitting on the riverbank with my family having a picnic underneath the hardwoods with nothing in view or earshot but nature. Every once in awhile there would be a



boater or two floating down, but even that was rare. Sometimes the sound of a pileated woodpecker, those giant ones, would ring out. I would never see it, but it sounded like a person was hammering a tree. When it grew too hot, the creek that runs into the river was the place to be. Poking around was a phenomenal way to cool off, albeit carefully.

In my short lifetime, the Hatchie River has seen much change. The creeks that run into it flood out and change course due to the shifting sand. The river itself eats away at the surrounding land, constantly carving a new course, especially after the floods that we are used to seeing. It is the only remaining unchannelized and undammed tributary of the lower Mississippi River Valley. We have a real gem in the Hatchie River here in Hardeman County. Our very own Hatchie River is on the Nature Conservancy's list of "One of the 75 Last Great Places on Earth to Save." It is special because of how little manmade change has affected it along with its staggeringly diverse ecosystem. There are around 50 species of mammals, 250 species of birds, and over 100 species of fish in the Hatchie River ecosystem. The Hatchie has been relatively unchanged by man throughout the years.

Whether you drive over the Hatchie, enjoy a picnic alongside it, or even float down it this summer, remember that the river you see is the river the Native Americans first called hatchee. The river you see is the same river that ran by Old Hatchie Town and Hardeman County's early settlers. It is the same river that our parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents may have grown up with. 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



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

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman



I was chosen to be Uncle Sam because I was the tallest person in the fourth grade at the time. My Mom made my marvelous costume (I still have it) and she and I made my very tall hat out of poster board and construction paper. It was a big event.

Thinking about our country's upcoming birthday on July 4 always makes me think about the days leading up to July 4, 1776 and the writers of the document that continues to govern us today - our Declaration of Independence. Over the past couple of years, thinking about that document makes me think about this silly debate on whether or not to continue teaching cursive writing to students. How is that even a debate? You need to be able to read cursive writing and signing your name comes in pretty handy. I learned cursive writing from my third and fourth grade teacher, Mrs. Nancy Leitschuh, and let me tell you, it is a skill that comes in handy each and every day of my life. She had a device that would draw multiple lines on the chalkboard and she would then teach us how to write our cursive letters (the chalkboard is another outdated mode of communication, apparently; although chalkboard paint for the home became popular when chalkboards were taken out of school - coincidence? But I digress.)

The Declaration of Independence was written by the Committee of Five which consisted of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Jefferson, who was considered the most eloquent writer by his peers in the Continental Congress, penned the majority of the document. There were 56 men who signed the document, and in doing so, they committed acts of treason against the King of England. Just like the new country they created, the signors came from all walks of life. And, they all signed the document in cursive handwriting. Not printing, but cursive handwriting; July 4, 1776 was a big day in cursive handwriting history too.
