Divided Council Passes Budg

It's THAT time of year again. It's time for our baseball players and teams to go out and try to win one for Bolivar.

From the Other Side of the Desk

Well, let's hope it's for Bolivar.

Note: Normally, this column is a feel-good thing, or if it's not a feel-good thing, the feel-bad is reserved for things like the Oakland Police Department.

But I've noticed something and I need to get it off my mind. Lucky you.

It's about baseball. It's summer, or almost. Summertime is baseball time.

So our kids start out in local leagues. Our leagues provide a great experience for everyone.

Some stay until they age out, some go and seek greener pastures. That's fine. Some see travel ball as a better alternative. For some, it is. I'm all for players finding the best competition they can find.

But I'm seeing more and more that when one or two decide to make the jump to travel ball, they try to get a half-dozen or more to go with them. I suppose that's ok. I guess. It's kind of insulting, but at least everyone gets to decide.

But sometimes, coaches advise or in some cases, require their players to NOT play in their local league.

Well, I've got a problem with that.

If you were out at the field last Thursday or Saturday, you saw a collection of kids and uniforms that made up the Bolivar Dizzy Dean Baseball and Softball Leagues. Kids with their friends from school. Parents who have shared the same community for years.

The Bolivar City Council passed the first reading of the city budget, but not without heated discussion among the members of the city council

At issue for the dissenting members were raises for the Bolivar Police Department, but no raises for any other city employees.

"We expect the Streets and Sanitation Department to be the beautification committee for the city, but they are the lowest paid employees," said Councilman Randy Hill. "You want to clean the city up, but we aren't helping them with money for life "

Mayor Barrett Stevens responded that the employees are "well renumerated" and have excellent benefits. "I'd love to give raises to everyone, but we can't afford it," he added.

"If everyone can't get a raise, I

don't think anyone should," said councilman Larry McKinnie. "We are opening up a can of worms."

Mayor Stevens defended giving raises to police officers, saying other communities pay more and the city is losing officers to these opportunities.

Bolivar Police Chief Pat Baker said the raises for officers are needed and are paid for within his budget.

"I'm asking for the same money that I got last year," he said. "And with all due respect to the Sanitation Department, they don't get shot at. We are operating with the same number of police officers that we had in the 70s."

Baker later noted that his department has made more drug related arrests in the last five years than the three previous chiefs have made in approximately 35 years. Drug money has funded equipment and vehicles without taxpayer assistance to the tune of more than \$500,000.

Mayor Stevens said not giving raises to other employees was not a fair comparison.

"If five firemen quit, I have 10 people wanting their jobs," he began. "But we don't have enough people in the police department. And we are losing them to other cities. The \$3,000 raise doesn't even get them up to standard. We are not making them rich people."

"And it's the only department that puts money back into the city," he added.

Councilman Julian McTizic, who is the son of a Bolivar police officer, argued that extra funds should come back to a fund balance that has been dipped into at the end of each year in each year of his tenure.

"It's the city's money, not the police departments," he said. "We have not put any money in the fund balance in three years. If we keep taking money out instead of putting

Mayor Stevens Breaks Deadlock back in, we will run out."

Councilman Willie McKinnie said he sided with the mayor and Chief Baker.

"If they have extra money in the department, they should be able to use it for whatever they want," he concluded.

After the question was called, Tracy Byrum, Todd Lowe, Willie McKinnie, and Suzanne Rhea voted yes, while Randy Hill, Quantessia Hamer, Julian McTizic, and Larry McKinnie voted no. With a deadlock among the eight council members, Mayor Barrett Stevens voted yes to move the budget to the next phase.

The budget will be read again with a public hearing to follow on June 21 at 6:30 p.m. at the Bolivar Municipal Building Courtroom. If passed, the rate will remain at \$1.1542 for the 2016-2017 fiscal vear.

City Announces Grant Successes

Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens announced during the council meeting on June 7, that the City of Bolivar was awarded a Tennessee Housing Development Agency (THDA) grant of \$321,000. The money will be used to help homeowners who qualify fix property in Bolivar. Details will be released after the June 21 meeting of THDA and Bolivar officials.

"This is a great thing to happen to the City of Bolivar," said Stevens. "This will give people who can't repair their houses the resources to do it."





The days are getting warmer and summer will soon be upon us. Your air conditioners will be running a lot to keep the house cool and comfortable. To help cut your electric bill, I have listed some summer time energy saving tips.

Turn up the thermostat to 78 degrees when you are home and 85

degrees when you are on a trip. Use ceiling or room fans to keep air moving to cool rooms. Replace air conditioner filters monthly to increase airflow.

Weather strip, seal, and caulk leaky doors and windows to keep cool air from escaping.

Install patio covers, awnings, and solar window screens to shade your home from the sun. Also, use trees, shrubs, and vines as shade to keep your home cooler.

Do your laundry efficiently by using the warm or cold water setting for washing clothes. Always use the cold rinse cycle. Line dry clothes whenever possible. Run full loads when you use the dryer. Clean the clothes dryer lint trap after each use.

Conserve energy by running your dishwasher only when it is fully loaded. Turn off the dry cycle and air dry dishes. Your dishwasher uses less water than washing dishes by hand.

Having lots of food in your fridge keeps it from warming up too fast when the door is open. So your fridge doesn't have to work as hard to stay cool.

Turn off appliances, lights, and equipment when not in use. Unplug electronic devices and chargers when they are not in use. Turn computers and printers off at the power strip. Enjoy your summer savings on your electric bill!

With the weather warming rapidly, boating on the lake is beginning to boom. Operation of water vessels was covered last week. This week is a review of rules pertaining to boats when not in operation. First of all, your boat must have a current Grand Valley Lakes sticker on it in order to bring it through the gate or to operate it on the lake. Boats left on the lake overnight must be secured to a personal dock or a marina slip. The slips may be rented at the POA office. The boat ramp is for launching and retrieving watercraft only. The new dock adjacent to the ramp may not be used for overnight mooring. Do not leave an unattended vehicle on the ramp. No swimming or fishing from the ramp.

We have rules for boating, tubing, water skiing and jet skiing. We also have a few for fishing. No fishing with nets, trotlines, yoyos, electrical shocking devices, chemicals, fish baskets, or any explosives. Jug fishing is allowed from sunset until sunrise. Jugs must be labelled with the owner's name and lot number. Fishing is allowed from the marina. Neither fishing nor boating is allowed in the roped off area around the beach.

These rules are necessary for the safety of all residents and visitors using the lake.

Happy Birthday wishes to, Jackie Kelly, who celebrates her big day on, June 14. In addition to their


regular jobs, Jackie and her husband, Billy, serve Toone and Hardeman County as members of the Emergency Services "First Response" program.

Don't Keep Family in the Dark About Your Plans

You might work diligently at building a financial roadmap for your retirement years and a comprehensive estate plan. But you can't just create these strategies - you also have to communicate them. Estate executor – An executor is the person or entity you name in your will to carry out your wishes. An executor has a variety of responsibilities, so you'll want to choose someone who is honest and capable of dealing with legal and financial matters. Again, you could ask a grown child to serve as your executor, but, to avoid potential conflict of interests among your children, you might want to go outside the family. Talk with an attorney about how best to name your executor.

Status of will and living trust - Assuming you have already drawn up a will, share it with your grown children. The same is true with a living trust, a popular estate-planning tool that may allow your survivors to avoid going through the time-consuming, public and expensive process of probate. A will and a living trust will obviously contain a great deal of information your children should know about - so take the time to explain your thinking when you created these documents.

You want to enjoy a comfortable retirement, and you want to leave a meaningful legacy through your estate plans. To help accomplish both these goals, you need to include your loved ones in your arrangements so open those lines of communication.

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

and remained together until God reclaimed him on May 23, 2016. One brother, Themon Duncan preceded him in death.



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

Leverage and Weight by Jimmy Sadler

Recently I built a large headboard, 7 feet by 7 feet. It required pulling old pallets apart and building a frame to reposition the finished pieces. Pulling the things apart, as some of you may know, is not that easy. It takes some time, patience and sweat. IN the end, the thing that made the most difference was to get a heavier hammer with a longer handle. The distance gave it more force and made the job much faster. The even more laborious job of pulling nails followed. The key the that, I found, was to find a crow bar of decent length. The extra distance created more leverage for a much easier and faster

pull. Once again, when nailing them back down to the new frame, I found a hammer with a longer handle made each swing more productive. It seems that, although distance created greater force with weight, it is quite useful at times like these. In our walk as Christians, our heaviest problems sometimes lie in our past. We can allow the weight to make everything we lift harder or we can ask God to help us use it to leverage our new-found strength under our daily struggles.

I started thinking about some of the tragedies in my life. I was reminded of God's promise to use them to reach out to others. The deaths of family members and early depression in life created open doors for me to empathize with others in hard situations. Now that the sting of those times has subsided, I can leverage the weight of those hardships and others to lift others and help them though their journey.

I remembered a family I mentioned in earlier writing. This couple, a minister and wife, were traveling to Wisconsin to celebrate the birthdays of two of their children. Scott Willis ran over a brace for a tractor trailer mud flap. The piece of metal jammed into the gas tank and caused a massive fire that engulfed the inside of the van. The couple made it out, as well as their thirteen year old son. The parents were burned but alive. Tragically, the van held five more of their children who did not escape. The thirteen year old son died that evening in the hospital. As I relay this event, tears are streaming down my face. I cannot begin to get an inkling of an idea how I would cope with this event. The dad beat at the van windows to no avail, realizing there was zero chance anyone could have survived the inferno. Still in shock but also in faithful trust, Scott told his wife "God has prepared us for this."

God had led both of these two to His Son, Jesus Christ. The kids trusted and followed as well. The parents knew their fate was wrapped up in Christ. Still, I wondered how the distance of time might have affected the minister's faith. It was no doubt shaken. More than a decade later, he still will not drive with children in the car. He is back to ministry now, and has shared the story of Christ with so many along the way. It seems that God allowed their trials to be a catalyst, a leverage for God's Word to penetrate some hardened souls. Indeed, their faith has challenged me. If they can make it, then certainly I can.

Don't let tragedies, failures or offenses toward you cast an overpowering shadow over your life. Don't resign yourself to allowing time and distance to harden your heart, but use it to leverage and use the weight in a way that will bring about good in an already heavy laden world.

When separation comes whether anticipated or not, we will most likely be deluged with a multitude of emotional, physical, social and spiritual symptoms as we begin our journey with grief. Traumatic loss occurs when we have developed a strong bond with something or someone that we have placed high value upon. Where our treasure is there will be our heart also. These attachments are not seen with acquaintances. We may not know where they live or any details of their family life.

With friends we develop more of a foundation. We share more about us and they with us more of themselves. We let them in to know more intimate details about ourselves. Then there are those with whom we love whom we let in to even a greater depth any other. Thus loss may be experienced (felt) at different levels. Many caring family and friends will seek to offer condolence. While it is very helpful to possess a strong support system, it can be challenging to know what to say and how and when to say it without offense. I have frequently exhorted people who do not seek to comfort others in their time of need, because they do not know what to say, that it is perfectly alright to say nothing. It is wise to be swift to hear and slow to

speak. We should be active listeners more than we should be plentiful talkers. When people are hurting, they need someone who is willing to listen. They no doubt are in shock immediately after the time of their loss and will need a comforting ear. In this position in their journey they may be confused with their mind in a whirlwind. They may also be experiencing disorientation periodically and may desire to talk about their loss. This will be the beginning of healing. They will need someone who is willing to be close often and willing to listen even if they repeat themselves frequently. There should be no time limit places upon their need for support. Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

In researching and learning about the history of our county, I've learned that schools and churches were two of the first things that the early settlers made a point to have in their new communities. I suppose we could take a lesson or two from their examples and say that Jesus and learning – taking care of mind and soul – are important in life. (I would guess that the hard work of living day-to-day back then in a new town in a new place took care of your body.)

The church and church/campground were vital parts of life on the American frontier - remember, we're talking about 1827 or so when West Tennessee was the western frontier of our country. Summer and fall were the most popular seasons for camp meetings. Traveling preachers would come through an area and hold services for days, sometimes even weeks. These camp meetings were a part of the Second Great Awakening in the 1800s. Small frontier towns often could not afford a full-time preacher and so these meetings were a chance to hear preaching on a somewhat regular basis. Families would travel to church campgrounds and would spend time there visiting with family and friends and enjoying singing, prayers, sermons, communions, and, being that we are in the South after all, they enjoyed many a meal together.

Mr. Barnett helped to establish an early campground in the county around 1827. As an ordained Cumberland Presbyterian minister he was noted for delivering sermons that caused his audience to tremble under the power of his message. About a year later, Mr. Barnett died while preaching a service; now, folks, that was some powerful preaching he was doing. Another popular minister was Dr. Robert A. Moorman, who was also a local physician. Dr. Moorman was noted to become so involved in his message that he would fall to his knees, finishing his sermons with prayer.

The Bush Campground was a popular meeting spot for many years. This photo shows a group there in 1891 when a Dallas evangelist, Rev. W. H. "Wild Bill" Evans, delivered the messages. He earned his title at a meeting, when he literally walked along the backs of pews to talk to someone; someone in the crowd encouraged him by shouting, "Watch Wild Bill go!", and the name stuck. He was known as a "vigorous and picturesque evangelist".

Our early county pioneers were people of great faith – faith in God, faith in each other, and faith that they could make a new home in the wilderness of a still-new country. Many of us living here today owe a great debt of gratitude to those faith-filled ancestors of ours. Let's remember their faithfulness, y'all, and meet up real soon for a singing and dinner on the grounds.

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

I have been asked if the Tales From The Yellow House are truth or fiction. They are definitely the truth. I am proud of my country heritage and not ashamed in the least of my country upbringing. It has made me thankful for the little things in life. Now to January at the Yellow house.

It seems like every winter all of us kids would come down with a bad case of the croup, crud, or bad cold as we called it. I don't know exactly what it was, but it made us feel terrible. I always felt as though I had been run over by a team of mules pulling a wagon load of Bo-Doc logs, or the fancy name Bois d'arc. My nose would run like Niagara Falls, and be as red as Rudolph's. One minute I would be so hot that I had to change my hippens every so often, and the next minute so cold that I had to put on all of my wardrobe to keep warm. I didn't comb my hair for days and it looked like a stump full of sick grand-daddies. I tried eating everything from raw sauerkraut to dried apples, and nothing tasted no better than if I had been chewing on an old truck tire. Mom had a lot of remedies that she forced down our throats during these times of sickness. One of the remedies was that awful smelling, dreadful tasting Castor Oil. She would tell us to hold our noses with our fingers while we were swallowing it. Usually as soon as it reached my stomach, and most times before, it would come back up. I still can't see how it helped our illness, unless there was some remedy in our repeated marathon races to the outhouse down in the cotton patch. At night, Mom would put a few drops of turpentine, and sometimes coal oil in a spoon of sugar and give it to us. She would get a wool cloth, rub hog lard on it, heat it and place it on our chests at night. We never went to the doctor when we were sick. We depended entirely on home remedies for anything that might beset us. For our coughs, Mom would go into the fields and pull the leaves from a plant that we called rabbit tobacco. She would make a tea from



it and we would drink the potion for our coughs. We would also hide and roll us a cigarette with the leaves and smoke it. I do not know the botanical name of the weed. I believe that the Indians called it Life Everlast-

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ing. I do know that it helped our coughing. I still go into the fields in the fall and gather a bag or two.

One of the chores, or I should say necessitiy, that I recall in the winter was the daily treks to the outhouse, or outdoor toilet. We were blessed with a rather sturdy one, even though it leaned somewhat to the north, about on the angle of the leaning Tower Of Pisa, or catty wampus as the old folks use to say. Some people called them outhouses, johns, privies, necessary houses, etc. Some were one holer's, some were two holer's, and the fancy ones had two holes on a split level to accomodate both adults and children. Ours at the Yellow House was very simple and was a one holer. I have never been in one of the things in the summer when there wasn't at least one spider, a red throated lizard, or a sand-streaker. Our little building didn't have any of the squeezable soft, double quilted tissue, but we did have a well-worn issue of the Sears and Roebuck catalog. There was no half-moon cutout in the door, but there was cracks in the wall that you could throw a grown cat through, and the cold winters wind coming through those cracks would turn your backside into a bright hue of scarlet in a New York minute.
