year, the Hardeman County Commission voted to send a private act to the State of Tennessee to eliminate partisan elections for Hardeman County positions. This would mean that on

Election Day for Hardeman County political offices, candidates would not be identified by political parties. Their names would appear on the ballot without affiliation. There would be no primary, no party to declare in order to take part in elections in the county.

The pros and the cons can be debated all day, if you like, but that's not the subject of this little

No, how we've made history here (at least recent history) is that even though the Hardeman County Commission voted 11-5 to put this law into place, the State Legislature of Tennessee voted it down.

This is a rare occurrence. Normally, the State Legislature shows respect for local governments in letting them determine the law and passes any private act that comes to them. It then would go back to the commission to be re-ratified before becoming law.

But this time, the State Legislature thinks they are smarter than our commission on what our county needs. From their vote, they must think we are too dumb to govern over here in Hardeman County and we need them to tell us what laws we need to pass or that our commission can't be trusted with the vote on the issue. And if anyone from here had a hand in getting Nashville to stop it, they must think we are stupid too. They need to worry less about getting their way and more about respecting the process.

Whichever it is, we shouldn't

be happy about it.

The point is that if we don't like our leaders' decisions, we can vote them out of office. But the people that killed this act don't represent us and we can't vote them out.

All we can do is watch them meddle in our affairs.

Which they did. I assume our representatives (Johnny Shaw, Dolores Gresham, and Ron Gant) are outraged as well.

I don't care which side of this issue you are on...to me the most important thing is that this is OUR issue, not theirs.

We had pet rabbits and baby chicks that Roger and I spent time playing with and taking care of. When we were in 3rd and 4th grade, we moved to the Curtis Ross farm. I daydreamed a lot when picking cotton. Roger would say, 'Sister, you better hurry up and get your sack full' because he didn't want me to get in trouble when we got home. Roger loved working at the dairy barn with Mr. Robert and Mrs. Annie Mae Oaks. He also loved learning how to drive. I can still see him smiling sitting on those big tractors. He also loved riding Champ, the horse that lived on the farm. Roger joined the National Guard. His group was called to Memphis when Martin Luther King was killed. I was so scared for him. I cried but once again Roger reminded me he was a big boy, and said to me, 'Sister, don't cry.'" Ailene writes that I will always remember Roger. We did have many sibling quarrels but I knew that Roger would do anything he could for me. Roger was a hard worker, a loving husband, and a caring and loving father and grandfather. I miss him. 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
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

Ingredients 1 (15.25 ounce) package yellow or white cake mix

1 (3.4 ounce) packages instant pudding, lemon flavored 1/3 cup sugar

1 and ½ cup water

2 cups cold milk

*optional - confectioners sugar for dusting, whipped cream or vanilla ice cream, fresh raspberries, strawberries, or blueberries

Serve warm with whipped cream or vanilla ice cream and/or fresh raspberries, strawberries, or blueberries. Serves: 12, refrigerate leftovers.

Prepare cake as directed on back of package.

Instructions

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray a 9x13 inch cake pan with non-stick spray.

Whisk by hand 2 minutes.

Dust with confectioners sugar.

Pour cake batter into prepared pan. Add dry pudding mix, granulated sugar, milk and water in a bowl.

Evenly pour lemon pudding mix over cake batter. Do not stir. Place cake pan on a larger baking pan with at least a 1-inch edge in case the cake bubbles over.

Bake 55 minutes to 1 hour or until cake is brown on top and wooden pick inserted in center of the cake comes out clean.

Cool 20 minutes before serving.





I had the great privilege of spending time with a dear family on the Emerald Coast of Florida. Early one morning, I was on the back deck hanging out with the kids while they played. I was certainly happy there were no missions happening just then.

Soon, I started to realize what a powerful image this provided. Jesus calls us to walk the straight and narrow path. Either side of that path can be fraught with danger. God's Word provides warnings along the way to guide us without disaster. This is not to say there won't be injuries, hurts or danger. You will stay clear of those explosive forces that could utterly destroy your life.

We need to heed the signs and we also have to learn to be at peace with the sounds of danger on either side. The signs could





Most of all, Sandra loved and supported her children and grandchildren and was always eager to spend time with them. They will all miss her greatly.





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

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

The area that would become known as Crainsville had (as frequently happened in the early days of settling our county) two different names. The little settlement was first known as Bright Prospect and later Prospect. Two brothers, William and Joel Crain, made their way to this "new" area of Tennessee and established a dock and commissary near the river. The Crain brothers became so entwined with the rapidly settling area that its third name, Crainsville, was the one that became most popular.

Crainsville was a flourishing little settlement and was on the stage coach line that traveled from Bolivar to Purdy and The Inn was opened there to provide lodging for travelers. The town also boasted churches, schools, several residences, and several businesses. Several schools were operated over the years in the town and the local Debating Club was a favorite for many years.

About 1905 a rural mail route came to the area (Rural Route #2) with over 130 customers on the route; Mr. Alliganey Fulghum was the first, and long time, mail carrier for the route. Telephone service soon followed in the area, with 20 phone customers in the town limits. Despite Crainsville's growth and advancements, big changes were ahead for the little commu-

Around 1917 work began for a new railroad bed for the Gulf, Mobile & Northeastern Railroad that would run from Middleton to Jackson. The proposed site for the



depot would bypass Crainsville by about one mile; as happened in other parts of the county, the town followed the train and Crainsville become a memory instead of a town. The depot was located on land that belonged to Kimbrough Hornsby and the new town was christened "Hornsby". Churches and schools moved and people began building homes in this new town site. The town also became known for its artesian wells and I've heard many stories about drinking the water from those good wells; one well was used for the school.

Many people have fond memories of the "Rebel" (shown in this 1940's photo), a passenger train that was used by travelers and locals alike. Janette Tigner, whose family has lived in the area for many generations, shared that her mother (Frances Huckabee Tigner) especially enjoyed riding the Rebel as a young girl and would get on the train at Hornsby and ride

it to Pocahontas to visit her grandmother - her first trip was around age seven and the conductor was asked to "keep an eye on her". What a thrilling trip that must have been for a young girl!

The trains were discontinued in Hornsby around 1954 as highway improvements and automobile travel became popular and afforded people a different mode of transportation. Hornsby is again a quiet little spot in our county, home to good and friendly people, many of whom can trace their family's histories back to Prospect, Crainsville, and Hornsby – three towns whose histories are linked together

On some days, if the wind is blowing just right, y'all might even hear a train way off in the distance; stop and listen and remember the Rebel and little girls who rode a train and enjoyed a big adventure along the way.

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

James K. Polk Might be on the Move

The Tennessee State Senate has weighed in on an issue regarding the final resting place of the 11th U.S. president and a former Tennessee governor, voting 20 to 6 in favor of moving the remains of James K. Polk and wife, Sarah, away from the state Capitol to Columbia.

"This is really family," said Teresa Elam, a seventh generation niece to Polk, said. "To us, it's family. It's such a tribute."

Elam said she has long brought the children of her family to this spot to tell them about their family

"We have so many wonderful scandals and stories," she laughed. "Nashville was his home."

"We're designing a master plan through landscape architects in Nashville that will accommodate the space for the tomb," said Thomas Price, curator of the President James K. Polk Home and Museum in Columbia.

Price supported the resolution to exhume the remains of Polk and his wife and relocate them to the museum site.

"This is the place where people have come from all over the country and all over the world to learn about the 11th president," he said. Price said Polk's father built the property and Polk lived there for several years before moving a block away, where he lived another 20 years.

"We think it's fitting his tomb should be here as well," he said.


However, Elam said Polk's will ordered his remains be buried at his Polk Place home in Nashville. When the Polk family no longer owned Polk Place in the late 1800s, his remains were moved to the Capitol. Several years after the move of the remains, the Polk Place site was demolished.

Price believes Polk has deeper ties to the museum site than the Capitol.

"This is the only other home than the White House that James K. Polk ever lived in," he said. "James K. Polk was a president for all of us, and I think he'd appreciate the democratic process we're going through, wanting to hear both sides of this argument."

And then there's Bolivar. If he leaves Nashville, people in Bolivar feel they have as much a claim as Columbia.

"I think they should leave them there in Nashville or move them to Bolivar. The house is his "father's house" not his," says Ken Savage of the Hardeman County APTA. "Columbia had torn his



house and law office down years ago. Polk only lived there a few years as a kid. He spent about the same amount of time in Bolivar, with his grandfather. It was Bolivar's wealth that got him the White House. I think he should be in, Polk Cemetery if they move him. The museum was just an after thought... nothing in the house or museum belongs to the president."

The bill must pass the House, the Tennessee Historical Commission, the Tennessee Capitol Commission and the Chancery Court of Davidson County. There would be a \$500,000 price tag on moving

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

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

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Jackson State Offers Co-op Program

Students at Jackson State Community College can earn a cost-effective degree along with wages at a local manufacturer through a workforce development co-op within the Industrial Technology program.



The Advanced Maintenance Technician (AMT) co-op launched in 2014 to encour-

age graduating high school seniors to pursue careers in the manufacturing sector and to generate much-needed skilled labor for local companies. The first cohort of 20 students graduated last May with an associate of applied science degree in industrial technology, and all of them landed a job in manufacturing. The cohort that will graduate this May is on track to do the same.

"The co-op allows students to get an associate degree along with on-the-job training, and then go into a career that is very lucrative," said AMT Completion Coordinator Cathi Roberts. "If they like working with their hands, if they like math, and if they want a good job with the potential for growth, they can get that in five semesters."

Students attend two full days of classes each week, learning subjects such as electricity, fluid power, mechanics, automation and robotics. They spend three days working at a local manufacturing company. They are paid for their work on a graduated scale, earning \$12 an hour during the first semester and \$14 an hour during the last.

And, most of the educational expenses are paid for by the Tennessee Promise Scholarship, so students aren't saddled with student-loan debt when they enter the workforce.

"I thought it was a great opportunity," said Geo Jimenez, who will graduate this spring and has accepted a job with Gerdau after college. "It not only focuses on education, but you can actually go to work. You get out of college debt-free with a good degree."

Manufacturing jobs have transformed through the years. Safety is the priority, and working conditions have improved. They require highly skilled employees, and annual wages are typically \$40,000 to \$60,000.

The co-op was created at the request of a consortium of local manufacturers concerned about training the workforce. The lack of workers in skilled trades had worsened, and companies were looking for ways to strengthen their pipelines of qualified employees.

To participate, students enrolled at Jackson State must complete a job application and write a 500-word essay. They then attend a series of interviews over the course of an hour with representatives from local manufacturing companies. The companies then select the students that are the best fit.

Taking the Lead in Forgiveness continued from A1 back citizens to the workforce and to society.

"Right now, a convicted felon basically is not considered for employment at so many industries in Hardeman County. These offenses could be more than 20 years in the past, but no matter the behavior of the person since, they are disqualified. This is limiting our available workforce and our viability to recruit industry to come into the county."

Prior to the filing of the bill, a meeting (see photo on A1) with law enforcement, judicial, legislators and community activists was hosted by Sain who had two convicted felons to testify at the meeting.

"Both made mistakes as young people, but both had a clean record for more than 15 years. Their only obstacle to becoming more productive for themselves and their family were the negative public record," explained Sain.

One of them is currently working for the county. "I couldn't ask for a better employee and I'm glad we gave this person and opportunity that he couldn't get in the past."

The other is about to graduate from college, but is afraid her efforts to improve her earning potential will go unrewarded.

"Her discouragement comes from the reality that one mistake can ruin a career opportunity," said Sain. "Criminals should be punished for the crimes they commit and should pay their debt to society, but should have the opportunity to be forgiven.

The bill has passed the State Senate and has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee.
