Hostages Brought Out Safely

An almost seven-hour standoff involving close to 40 law enforcement personnel ended peacefully on August 14 as a hostage taker released his three children and was taken into custody.

On site for the incident that began at 1:43 a.m. with a phone call to Hardeman County Dispatch describing a male subject outside of

385 Ferguson Street in Whiteville armed with a handgun holding three children against their will.

Upon arrival by four Hardeman County Deputies, three investigators, Sheriff John Doolen and Chief Deputy Billy Davis, it was learned that two shots had been fired inside the home, allegedly by Angel Bustillos.

As other law enforcement came, Bustillos barricaded himself and his captors in the residence. Two squads from the Madison County Swat Team, including a translator were brought in and after negotiations, Bustillos was taken into custody and charged with three counts of Especially Aggravated Kidnapping, one count of Domestic As-

sault, and three counts of Reckless Endangerment. His bond was set at \$300,000.

Bustillos' intake documents show him as a non-citizen of the United States and according to Sheriff John Doolen, Immigrations and Customs Enforcement was contacted and his status as a resident could be in jeopardy.

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

Many folks who know me know that I am a great fan of what we know in the South as a "hamburger joint", and I use that term with reverence. A true hamburger joint is something you are going to find (usually) on a marvelous two-lane road, and (usually) in a small town. In one you will find good food and fine people. I have eaten many a fine meal and have memories of good times with family and friends that happened in a hamburger joint in some small Southern town. One of the world's great hamburger joints had a great impact on my young years – Shag's, right here in Bolivar, Tennessee.

This photo shows the second location of Shag's on Market Street. The first location, which many of us remember, was a small little place on Washington Street (in the area of where a bank is located today). That place gave a new definition to the word "small"; it had 6 stools inside plus a pickup window. Along with the grill and a little room for storage it was an exercise in efficiency in a small space. It is the first place I remember going to "eat out" with my Dad. I remember going to it before that day but we would always get something at the pickup window and take home for the family. On that day, though, Dad and I went inside and sat on one of those green leatherette and



chrome stools and ate right there at that tiny counter (which seemed big to me). I am fairly certain that experience has to have been when my fondness for hamburger joints, diners, and drugstore fountains started.

When Shag's moved to this larger location, the burgers were still just as good, and I ate many a Shag's cheeseburger there....and took many home to enjoy as well. Any time you mention the word "hamburgers" to folks I grew up with (and others as well), the hallowed Shag-burger is always mentioned. Often when some of us start talking about Shag-burger-memories, they included special trips with a parent or grandparent for a burger or a shake.

It was truly a sad day for all of us Shag's fans when they closed down. All of us who have eaten there tried to figure out what made those Shag-burgers, fries, and milkshakes so good, and why we remember them oh-so-fondly after all this time. I think those Shag-burgers are still loved by so many of us because wrapped up in that good quality hamburger is the seasoning of our shared memories, with a large dose of our collective nostalgia, along with a dash of the innocence and enthusiasm of our earlier years, and of the moments shared there with family and friends.

Seriously, y'all, how can any other hamburger compete with that?

FAITH **Enamored with the Shell**

I was driving in a small Texas town recently, and, as a photographer, I find many photoworthy stops along the way. There was one little building that seemed worth the stop. It looked like a barn, and was probably a tractor garage at one point. The sun has beaten the paint and wood to a bleach-streaked vintage work of art. The details of the cracks and chipping paint make it picturesque. As I continued to drive and think of those times I've jumped out of the car on the side of the road, I realized I was enamored with something these buildings were never meant for. They were built for very important reasons, to keep the weather from precious contents inside. The barns kept things dry, the garages protected essential equipment and the old farm houses were still standing because they were made to protect families. I'm certainly guilty, as a photographer, of appreciating what you see.

We live in a world enamored with the shell. We focus on what we look like far more than what we ARE like. It's easier to change our clothes and seem accepted, on point, in charge or cooler than the rest of us than it is to work on our heart. Jesus said some of the people of his day were like whitewashed tombs. Inside the tomb, there was only death and disintegration, while it could look stately and beautiful on the outside. That's a sobering thought as I walk along historic cemetery routes. Regardless of how tall, wide or pristine the memorial, the inside contents are the same. What we yield to and do for God and others will last. The externals are a poor judge of the internal contents.

The visual I had of church as a child was a group of nice, pleasant people who all had it together. Looking back, I realize there was no correlation to how well you were dressed and how "together" your life was. I appreciate when people want to put on their best for worship, and admire that. That is not focusing on the internals but changing the externals for an honorable internal value. I also appreciate people who tend to dress as they normally would coming to God with a dressed up heart attitude toward God.

The heart attitude is something all of us work on, and we tend to know when we are putting on a show. We know how it is to look our best while we feel at our worst. To look "sharp" at a funeral, even our own some day, is quite the irony. This is something for other writings. Today I am interested in not how we portray or project ourselves, but how we place values on others.

Alone Time by David Coy Sunrise:

Life is short. When we lose something or someone of value, there is frequently emotional consequence. Webster defines bereavement: to deprive, especially by death; strip, dispossess, to take away. Synonyms are sorrow, sadness, mourning, anguish and grief. When loss of a significant level comes to us there is not a depth of pain that can equal grief. Sometimes that pain is a long time delayed by way of regret that develops over time. A youth breaks down in tears as she relays the feeling of abandonment and aloneness because her parents are divorced and she does not feel they have any time for her at all and she is lost in the adults in her world that have no time or concern to take care of her. Sometimes parents realize their error in abandoning their child as was the case with this one parent.

A very wealthy parent relinquished responsibility of their child they brought into the world when the child was an infant. The child was adopted by loving and caring adults who raised the child in a loving environment. Meanwhile the adult who brought the child into the world became very successful in the financial world, but twenty years after the birth of the child they gave up, realized a very big void, emptiness that existed. Regret giving up parental responsibility and rights twenty years previous grew along side a desire to find the child and attempt a connection. Regret is the feeling as we look back on an action we have taken and we could or should have done something differently. The problem arises when we come to the conclusion that our past cannot be undone nor corrected. If this happens there may be only two choices; accept the reality that now exists, and as someone has said, "If you do not like your past, build a new one." Sour Cream Biscuits with Sausage Gravy

Ingredients

- Biscuits
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more
- ¹/₂ cup (1 stick) chilled unsalted butter, cut into pieces; plus 2 tablespoons, melted
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup whole milk
- Gravy and Assembly
- 8 ounces breakfast sausage links, chopped
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2¹/₂ cups whole milk
- Kosher salt, freshly ground pepper

Preparation

Biscuits: Preheat oven to 425°. Whisk baking powder, salt, and 2 cups flour in a large bowl to combine. Using a pastry cutter or your fingers, work chilled butter into dry ingredients until mixture resembles coarse meal. Using a wooden spoon or fork, mix in sour cream and milk until a shaggy dough forms. Turn out dough onto a lightly floured surface and knead a few times just to bring together. Roll out until 1/4" thick, then fold in half. Roll dough out again until 1/4" thick, then fold in half again. Repeat once more, rolling out to a 3/4"-thick round. Punch out biscuits as close together as possible with cutter. Pat scraps together and punch out more biscuits; repeat until you can't cut out any more (you should have 12 total). Transfer biscuits to a parchment-lined baking sheet, spacing 1" apart, and bake, rotating sheet once, until golden brown and baked through, 10–12 minutes. Brush biscuits with melted butter. Do Ahead: Dough can be made 1 day ahead. Cover and chill, or freeze up to 1 week.

Gravy and Assembly: While biscuits are baking, cook sausage in a medium saucepan over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until cooked through and starting to brown, 5-8 minutes. Transfer to a small bowl with a slotted spoon. Add butter to drippings in pan and melt over medium. Whisk flour into butter mixture and cook, whisking constantly, until roux is very smooth and starting to bubble, about 2 minutes (don't let it color; this is a white gravy). Gradually add milk, whisking until incorporated. Reduce heat to medium-low and cook gravy, still whisking, until thickened, 8–10 minutes. Stir in sausage; season with salt and pepper.

Serve hot biscuits with gravy alongside for spooning over top. Serves 8.

Know what's in front of you. If you've ever ridden a roller coaster in the dark, you may find it scarier than if you boarded it in daylight - after all, it can be unsettling not to know where you're going. The same can be said about investing: If you have no idea what's in front of you, you might find the journey unnerving - and if that happens, you could make panicky decisions, which are usually bad ones. So prepare for the inevitable market volatility – it's a normal part of the investment landscape.

These Asian lady beetles are harmless insects that eat garden pests like aphids. They rarely bite and don't carry diseases. However, sometimes they can just come too close to home in too great of numbers. In the fall, they accumulate on the side, usually the southeast side, of a light-colored house or building because it is usually warm from exposure to the sun. As they rest on the side of



the house or building, they search for entryways.

It does not take a very large hole for the ladybugs to come in and set up housekeeping. They can enter through gaps and cracks around windows or doors or where siding meets the foundation or the roof. Once they are in, they send signals to let other ladybugs know they found a nice, new home for winter. They are more of a minor nuisance than anything. They don't eat housing materials or human possessions, but they can mess up your paint job. If they are squished, they leave a yellow stain and an unpleasant odor.

The best way to avoid the problem is to minimize the number of potential entry ways by caulking cracks and small holes, plugging large holes, installing door sweeps, and applying weather stripping around doors. It takes less than 1/8 of an inch for the ladybugs to make their move.

If they make their way indoors despite all of your prepping, a vacuum cleaner is the way to go. A broom will still result in staining and a foul odor.

Yellowjackets are a stinging insect that looks similar to a honeybee, but they are relatively hairless, a little brighter in color, have more defined black stripes, and they have a narrower waist. They nest underground in old rodent burrows, in woodpiles, in hollow trees, and in brush piles. They can sting repeatedly and are aggressive. They are also prone to chase the unfortunate soul who stumbles across their nest.

By late summer, yellowjackets' nests have grown in size tremendously, with some nests containing thousands. After a spring and early summer of workers gather-



ing protein, aka flies and centipedes, for the growing larvae of the nest, they are ready to have some me time by late summer/early fall when the larvae are all grown up. In late summer, they are searching for quick bursts of energy in their brief retirement before the first frost. In their exhaustion of being caregivers for most of their life, they want liquid sugar, they want it now, and they will fight you for it. This is why you can often find them flitting around fairs, picnics, ice cream stands, and rotten, fermented fruit around apple or pear trees. They are also attracted to open garbage cans or dirty garbage cans.

Yellowjackets will not bite or sting a person unless they or their nests are agitated by fast movements, stepped on, or sat upon. It's wise to avoid going barefoot in the yard since they nest in the ground. Don't squish or swat a yellowjacket because they release a chemical that puts you on the radar of their stinging brethren. Also, they have been known to crawl in soda cans and sugary drink containers, so drinks with lids are advisable. Nothing will ruin a fun day at the fair like being stung on the mouth by an irritated wasp.

If you are one of the unlucky ones who is stung, there are a few ways to treat stings at home. Applying a cold compress to the site for about twenty minutes can reduce painful swelling. An antihistamine will help reduce the itching and swelling as well. Mixing up a paste of baking soda and water and applying it directly to the sting brings some relief. The basic baking soda helps neutralize the acidic venom.

For the brave at heart who find a nest that is a little close to home and want to take care of it, make your attack at night or in the early morning, when it is still dark. They will mostly be in their nests and cannot see well in the dark.

There was never a dull moment at the Yellow House. There were so many funny things happening all the time. As I've mentioned before, the Southern Railway tracks ran at the edge of our yard, so close that you could not carry on a converstaion when a train was passing. They would literally rattle the windows in the old house and move the picture frames on the wall. Out of town friends would come for a visit and and ask us how we could sleep with that noise going on. We were so used to it that we

really didn't hear them. The conductors on the cabooses would sometimes throw us kids off a bunch of comic books. We were always out by the tracks smiling and waving when the trains came by. I guess they felt sorry for us, but we always looked forward everytime a roll of comic books came rolling across our yard. We would return the favor in the spring as there was a work train and crew that would come by the house, and some of the workers would be sitting on a flat car.

We would go to the apple tree and pull a bunch of green apples and toss them up to the men on the slow moving train. One day Dad was plowing in the cotton field which ran up to the side of the tracks. The train would stop up above the house to take on coal and water and move slowly by our house and usually stop in Pocahontas. Dad had hitched a ride several times and jumped off when the train stopped in town. This particular day, Dad was out of chewing tobacco. He left the old mule hitched to the plow in a shade at the end of the



row, hopped on the train to ride down town to get him a plug of Days Work chewing tobacco. The problem that day was that the train didn't slow down or stop at Pocahontas, but picked up speed and going too fast for him to jump off. It's next stop was at Cypress Tank, which is about six miles east of Pocahontas. Dad had to walk all the way back. He did stop at Sheas store in town to get his tobacco, walked back to the house and the old mule was still standing where he left it.

There were three train engineers who lived in Pocahontas who worked for Southern Railway. Mr. John King, Mr. Nile Wright, Mr. Andrew Mohundro. Each of them had certain whistle patterns they would use when entering the town.

I've written a lot about outhouses in my articles. You hardly ever see one of the little houses anymore. A few years ago they were seen behind most houses in the rural areas of the country. This particular incident didn't happen at the Yellow House, but at another house we lived at shortly after

moving. Brother Don started training as a depot agent for Southern Railway as soon as he finished high school. He purchased a 23jeweled Waltham Railroad watch which was required for his work. This watch cost \$45.00. On one of his visits to the outhouse, his new pocket watch fell through the hole into the pit. He was going to leave it be, but dear old Dad, being the brave soul that he was, and not wanting to lose that precious watch, layed down on his stomach, rolled up the sleeve on his right arm, and searched the pit until he found it. Jacques Costeau didn't have a thing on Dad. Don carried the watch to a repairman in Corinth to be cleaned. It ran perfectly after that, but brother Don didn't tell the repairman where the watch had been.
