We step aside this week for family, as my dad wrote of his experience on the road...with our kids...


It all began Friday afternoon at 5:50. That's when granddaughter Gracie bounded out to the car at the conclusion of her ballet lesson. She joined Grammie Gail, John and myself in the vehicle and we began our trek to Williamstown, Kentucky, some 450 miles northeast. I had planned to drive over half the distance before seeking lodging. The first mistake was leaving I-40 at mile marker 143 to eat dinner. Actually, that was not the mistake as there were several places to eat at the exit. It was my choice of a restaurant I had many times frequented. The food was fine and the prices reasonable but well-over an hour to complete our meal put us off schedule.

Ross Appointed to School Board

The Hardeman County Commission appointed Gene Ross to replace outgoing Jerry McCord on the school board in District 2, Position 3.

Ross, a former employee of the Hardeman County Board of Education, will serve until November, when a special election will be held in order to elect a replacement for the remainder of McCord's term, which expires in 2018.

McCord resigned his post that he has held since 1998, after moving out of the District 2 area.

Petitions to fill the spot were due in the Hardeman County Election Commission office at noon on August 18, 2016. At presstime on Wednesday, only Ross has filed to be placed on the ballot.

Saving Our Luez Reports Progress



The Luez Theatre will be able to host musical acts and other events, as a stage has been constructed in the circa 1948 theatre in Bolivar.

"We are pleased to get this phase of the work near completion," said Luez Theatre Committee Chairperson Cathy Frost. "We have some more things to accomplish, but we're on the move again."

The theatre, purchased in 2013 by the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation (DEVCO) after closing in August of 2012, still needs electrical and heating/air conditioning issues solved in order to be able to host live music and other productions throughout the year. The committee is also looking into projection equipment and cosmetic changes to the ceiling and walls.

Since the purchase by DEVCO, the committee hosted a screening of White Christmas and It's a Wonderful Life in 2013, followed by Gone with the Wind in 2014, attempting to raise money to do renovations on the infrastructure of the building.

This past year, DEVCO approved funds for the theatre and the City of Bolivar has gotten involved as well, applying for grants to fix the facade and to purchase equipment.

The committee is also expected to make decisions on the seating for the theatre. Interested persons are welcome to vote on various plans on the Luez Theatre facebook page.

Return Celebration Planned at TCAT Whiteville

As part of its larger Welcome Week activities for all students, TCAT Whiteville will hold a special celebration called "My Future's So Bright" to welcome new and returning Tennessee Promise and Tennessee Reconnect students to campus on Friday, September 16, 2016.

The 2016-17 academic year that opens next week is the second year of the Tennessee Promise program, which provides two years free of tuition and most fees at Tennessee's community colleges and Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology (TCATs) for new high school graduates starting with the high school class of 2015.

The new school year marks the return of the first class of TN Promise students for their second year, and the arrival of new students from the high school Class of 2016. The separate Tennessee Reconnect program is for eligible older Tennesseans who don't qualify for TN Promise to return to school to pursue certificates, diplomas and degrees at the TCATs and community colleges.

To underscore the "My Future's So Bright" theme, TN Promise and Reconnect students who stop by the campus celebration will be given sunglasses and invited to write messages on large banners about their hopes and what they want to do after graduating. There'll be a "future selfie" photo-op spot where students can photograph themselves and each other wearing graduation caps and attire or equipment associated with their future careers, and posting the photos on their favorite social media.

The event is scheduled for 11:00 a.m. at the TCAT Whiteville main campus located at 1685 Highway 64, Whiteville, TN.

"We support Governor Haslam's Drive to 55 initiative with the Tennessee Promise and Reconnect programs", says TCAT Whiteville Director, Carolyn Beverly. "TCAT Whiteville is committed to providing quality technical training and making higher education accessible to all. We look forward to the start of a new school year with the Tennessee Promise and Reconnect students and hope this event will show how much we

appreciate them choosing TCAT Whiteville for their postsecondary experience."

TENNESSEE COLLEGE

Tennessee Promise was proposed by Governor Bill Haslam and approved by the Tennessee General Assembly in 2014 as both a scholarship and mentoring program focused on increasing college attendance - a key component of the Governor's Drive to 55 initiative aimed at increasing the percentage of working-age Tennesseans with college degrees and certificates to 55 percent by 2025. The Tennessee Promise provides students with a last-dollar scholarship, meaning that it covers tuition and fees not covered by the federal Pell Grant, the state's Hope Scholarship and other financial aid.

The University of Tennessee at Martin Somerville Center will host a one-day prep course for high school students hoping to take or retake the ACT college entrance exam. The class, held from 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m., August 27, at the Fayette County Career Center, is designed to help students improve performance and boost exam scores.

Alex Beene, a lead instructor with Tennessee Adult Education, will instruct the course. Beene works primarily with rising high school juniors and seniors preparing for major national exams such as the ACT and SAT. He has mentored more than 1,000 students since 2013, who have since been awarded a combined total of \$4.2 million in scholarships and other financial aid.

Registration for the course is \$45 per student. The Fayette County Career Center is located at 121 W. Court Square in Somerville. Registration is first-come, first-serve.

State Announces Mock Election



This fall students across Tennessee will be able to do something most

kids can't: vote for president of the United States.

The Secretary of State's office is pleased to announce Tennessee's first ever Student Mock Election. Students in preschool through high school from all public and private schools as well as home school associations in Tennessee can participate. Paper ballots letting students choose between Democratic presiden-

tial nominee Hillary Clinton and Republican presidential nominee Donald Trump will be provided, but schools may elect to include additional candidates or conduct elections locally in different ways.

Early voting for the mock election opens October 17 and results must be submitted by Mock Election Day, November 1. Mock presidential election results will be revealed on November 2, less than a week before the real General Election.

"Hopefully participating in a mock election now will encourage students across this great state to continue to exercise their right to vote as adults," Secretary of State Tre Hargett said.

The program also offers lesson plans created by Tennessee teachers. The goal is offer an easy way for teachers to incorporate civic engagement and citizenship into their curriculum leading up to the Student Mock Election.

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

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

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The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

Cashew Zucchini Rolls

½ cup cashews, soaked overnight in water

- 1 Tablespoon rice vinegar
- 3 4 zucchini (each yields 6 8 slices) 2 carrots, sliced into matchsticks
- 1 cucumber, seeds removed and sliced into matchsticks
- 4 medium radishes, sliced
- 1 avocado, peeled and sliced
- 1 small bunch cilantro or desired herb
 - 1. Drain cashews and put into food processor with rice vinegar.
 - 2. Process, scraping sides with spatula if necessary, until cashews are a soft paste but still have some texture. (Depending on how long cashews were soaked you might need to add a tablespoon of water to get the right consistency.) 3. Chop the ends off of your zucchini and use a vegetable peeler to peel your zucchini
 - into long, thin strips. 4. Lay zucchini strip flat and add a small spoonful of cashew mixture onto one of the ends of zucchini.
 - 5. Add a few matchsticks of veggies, avocado, and a small piece of cilantro or a desired herb.
 - 6. Roll up and enjoy!

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

Enamored with the Shell

I was driving in a small Texas town recently, and, as a photographer, I find many photo-worthy stops along the way. There was one little building that seemed worth the stop. It looked like a barn, and was probably a tractor garage at one point. The sun has beaten the paint and wood to a bleachstreaked vintage work of art. The details of the cracks and chipping paint make it picturesque. As I continued to drive and think of those times I've

jumped out of the car on the side of the road, I realized I was enamored with something these buildings were never meant for. They were built for very important reasons, to keep the weather from precious contents inside. The barns kept things dry, the garages protected essential equipment and the old farm houses were still standing because they were made to protect families. I'm certainly guilty, as a photographer, of appreciating what you see.

We live in a world enamored with the shell. We focus on what we look like far more than what we ARE like. It's easier to change our clothes and seem accepted, on point, in charge or cooler than the rest of us than it is to work on our heart. Jesus said some of the people of his day were like whitewashed tombs. Inside the tomb, there was only death and disintegration, while it could look stately and beautiful on the outside. That's a sobering thought as I walk along historic cemetery routes. Regardless of how tall, wide or pristing the memorial, the inside contents are the same. What we yield to and do for God and others will last. The externals are a poor judge of the internal contents. The visual I had of church as a child was a group of nice, pleasant people who all had it together. Looking back, I

realize there was no correlation to how well you were dressed and how "together" your life was. I appreciate when people want to put on their best for worship, and admire that. That is not focusing on the internals but changing the externals for an honorable internal value. I also appreciate people who tend to dress as they normally would coming to God with a dressed up heart attitude toward God. The heart attitude is something all of us work on, and we tend to know when we are putting on a show. We know

how it is to look our best while we feel at our worst. To look "sharp" at a funeral, even our own some day, is quite the irony. This is something for other writings. Today I am interested in not how we portray or project ourselves, but how we place values on others. We've all seen those amazing cars sparkle in the sun with rich, black tires and a big sign in the windshield that

promises anyone is already approved. We love the car but have to come to grips with the realization that the cars

probably have exceptionally high mileage. The exterior says nothing of the true value of the car, which is to trans-

port those you love with some degree of dependability. God's Word is our internal mirror. Our way to learn what to espouse in ourselves and what to cherish about others. When we truly make loving God and others our heart's desire, we will both realize and appreciate the deeper things of life. What was once ugly, easily dismissed, reproachable even, may become the most beautiful treasure you've ever held, the most gracious sight you've gazed upon.

"We now have this light shining in our hearts, but we ourselves are like fragile clay jars containing this great treasure. This makes it clear that our great power is from God, not from ourselves" (2 Corinthians 4:7, NLT).



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Sunrise: Helping Children 4 by David Coy

In this our final installment in this series on helping children we will examine the characteristics of youth from 11-18. Their concept of death in this age group is far more developed than those of previous age groups that we have examined. They have developed the ability to think abstractly by their ability to draw logical conclusions from observations. A person who is able only to think concretely is understood to be able to sort and organize facts while incapable of generalizing and dealing with abstract perceptions. They perceive things very literally, thus concretely.

With this group, they begin to conceptualize death rather than understand it just concretely and as reversible. Their response to traumatic loss may involve extreme sadness, denial, even regression toward isolation, and a greater tendency to talk to people, especially peers outside the family. The most dangerous aspect while in their journey with grief is their risk taking. In a worst case scenario, they may become prone to increased risk and reckless behavior.


From family and friends, those who support their successful transition from grief to acceptance, they will expect and benefit from being included in planning and decision making as is permissible. They will likely desire to be informed of what to expect in terms of events, ceremonies or rituals. It will not go well if they are left out of details they think are important, as to expectations of them or others. Unless they have experienced loss before, it would be helpful if they see their guardians, relatives expressing their grief in healthy normal manner. They should be encouraged to talk about what they think and feel and to have their thoughts and feelings respected.

In all the age groups we have examined, we who are older and more experienced should act natural. We should show genuine care and concern while making it clear that we are here to listen and be supportive in every way possible one with another. This is Sunrise Aftercare, sunrise@sfdcares.com

And just think, the Creation Museum is only 45 minutes further.



"Shoe" was an avid outdoorsman who especially enjoyed hunting and fishing. He was a member of the New Bethel Baptist Church, Middleton, TN and Meigs Masonic Lodge, #213, Decatur, TN.

He leaves as his survivors, his wife, Susan, of Middleton; two daughters, Heather (Bruce) Newman of Harrison, TN and Trudy (Jeremy) Brack of Decatur, TN; his brother and sister, Jerry Shoemaker and Chevi (Steve) Bearden, both of Decatur, TN; and four grandchildren, Karley and Garrett Newman; Caroline and Taylor Brack.



The Hardeman County Arts Council will open the box office for their production of Dearly Departed on August 29 for Arts Council members and for the general public on September 6.


