Kilgore Gets \$75 Million Contract

Kilgore Flares Company, LLC (KFL) of Toone, a Chemring Group PLC ("Chemring") subsidiary, announced three contracts that will bring \$75.6 million to the company with all work being done in Toone.

Awarded were: 1.) US Navy, Naval Air Systems Command award of a 5-year Indefinite Delivery Indefinite Quantity contract. The estimated value for this effort is \$30.8M for the manufacture and delivery of SM-875B/ALE infrared training flares. These flares are training rounds used to familiarize pilots and ordnance technicians with the use and handling of decoy flares.

2.) A US Navy second year option award contract for the manufacture and delivery of MJU-61A/B flares worth \$17.6M. This item is a key aircraft survivability system component that protects warfighters and aircraft against infrared guided missile threats.

And 3.) US Army and Air Force award option on its current 5-year Indefinite Delivery Indefinite Quantity contract by the US Army



Garrison at Rock Island Arsenal. The \$28M award includes the manufacture and delivery of M206, MJU-7A/B and MJU-10/B infrared decoy flares. These flares are a key component of aircraft survivability systems that protect helicopters, fighters and transport aircraft against infrared guided missile threats known as Man Portable Air Defense Systems.

Kilgore Flares' President Tank Williams stated, "We are pleased with our long standing partnership with the warfighter and the continued confidence in our products by the Department of Defense. Our workforce takes great pride knowing the products we make will save the lives of our citizens and international partners that serve in harms way"

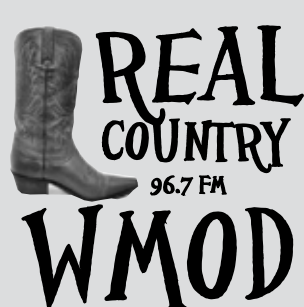

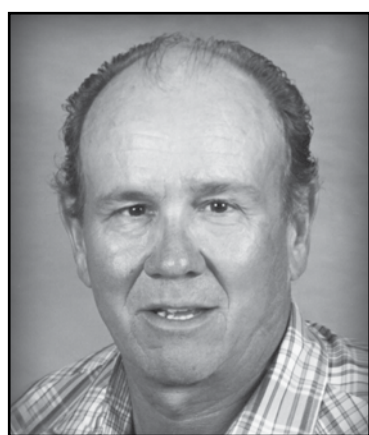
Norman Hatch, age 84, of Bolivar, passed away Monday, August 21, 2017 at Jackson-Madison County General Hospital.

of people, and that always goes both ways. More joy and more evil.

A few blocks away, we encountered a man who asked if I could spare some change. The way he asked was so polite and gracious that I gave him money. He didn't lay on the guilt trip or give me some crazy story about needing gas to get the rest of the way on his trip. He simply asked and was grateful for what little I gave him. A few more blocks and we saw a guy who would certainly be the best candidate of our day to be jaded from life. He lifted the lids on trash cans and dug around a bit. He pulled a few kernels of popcorn from a bag he found and popped them in his mouth. I handed him a dollar and gave him a bag of chips from my backpack.

This man was not only happy (his smile was one of the warmest I've seen), he worked for the dollar. He proceeded to tell us four jokes from a homeless person's perspective. His delivery was so genuine, we had to laugh. The last one hit me hard though. The punch line, finished off with that bright-

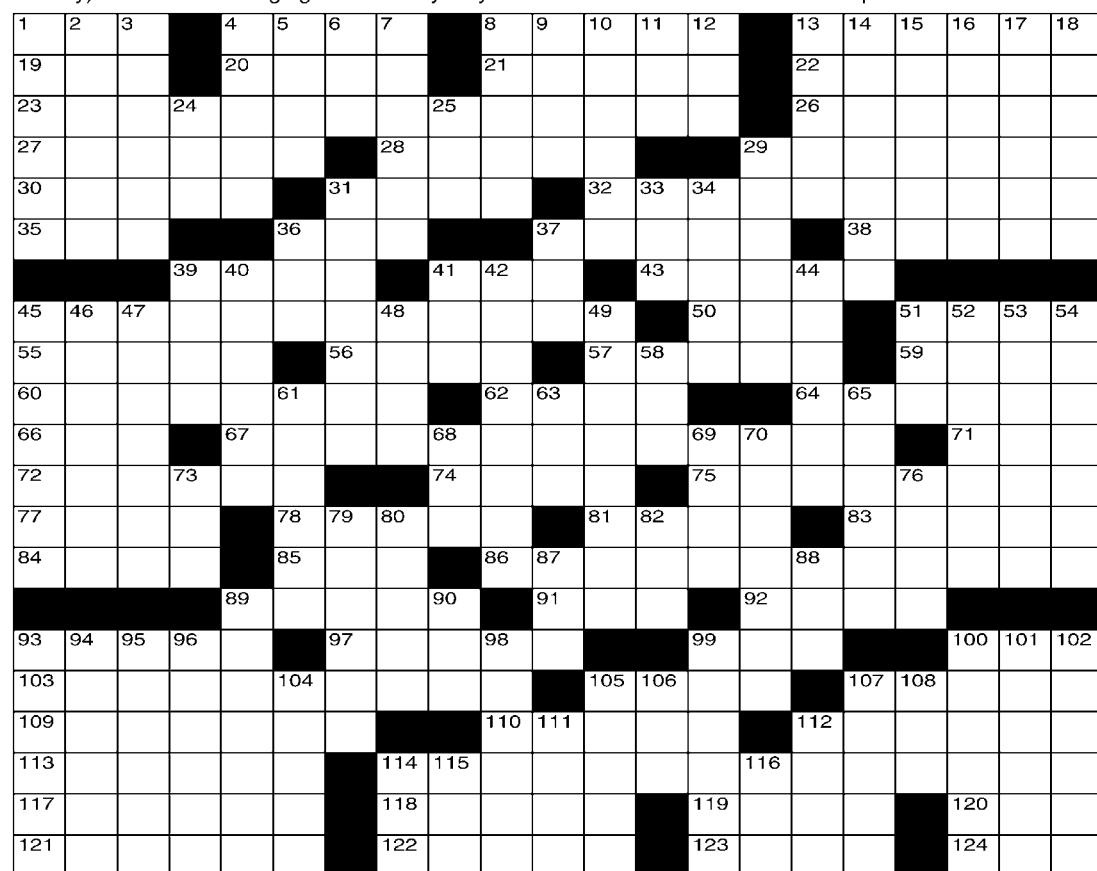

The Best Fish Tacos

- Ingredients**
- 1-pound flaky white fish, tilapia, mahi mahi, cod or other mild fish.
 - olive oil
 - butter
 - 1/4 cup sour cream or Greek yogurt
 - 2 tablespoons Sriracha sauce or favorite hot sauce
 - 6 corn tortillas
 - 2 cups shredded cabbage
 - pico de gallo
 - 1 lime, cut into wedges

Heat skillet or griddle over medium heat. Drizzle olive oil and place fish onto griddle or skillet. Cook until fish is blackened or reaches an internal temperature of 145° F. Remove and allow to rest for about 3 minutes before cutting into large pieces for tacos.

As fish is cooking, mix together sour cream or Greek yogurt with Sriracha sauce in a small bowl.

To assemble fish tacos, layer lettuce or cabbage greens inside the middle of a corn tortilla that has been softened with oil or butter and heated until pliable. Then add pieces of cooked white fish, spoon on Sriracha cream, then top with pico de gallo. Serve with a wedge of lime to be squeezed over fish taco before eating.

OUR COUNTY

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

We had a lot of neighbors when we lived at the Yellow House. In fact the whole community were neighbors, a large majority of them seemed like family. We had a lot of black neighbors. At the time, we did not know what the word segregation and integration was, or meant. We all loved, shared and cared for each other, black and white. When there was sickness in families, black or white, black and white helped those families out. Seemed like we always lived close to Charlie and Mandy Holland even after we moved to several houses after leaving the Yellow House. Mandy did washing and ironing for several of the white families in Pocahontas. I remember I would stand amazed when I saw her coming down the road with a cotton basket full of clothes balanced atop her head. Charlie would get Mom to write letters ever so often to his sister who lived in Arkansas. In the fall one year Charlie asked Mom to write a letter for him. Mom asked him what he wanted to tell her and he said, "Sister be sure to come home for Christmas, we're gonna have goose and possum." Charlie and Mandy were always there to help out anyone in need. I have an old wooden door hanging in my den that was in the last house that Charlie and Mandy lived in at Pocahontas. Then there was Mag Patterson who lived by herself. She usually kept a fire burning in her fireplace

during the summer. Mom and Dad would carry her food when we had left overs. Mom asked her why she kept a fire in the summertime. She said it would keep the snakes from coming in her house. One black man that I admired was Dick Winston. He was born with one of his legs twisted around the other one. It did not bother him from making a garden. He would lean on a crutch placed under one arm, and hoe the garden with his other arm.

I remember so well Hattie Poe and her daughter Louise who lived in a big white house down a drive from the main road, lined with tall cedar trees. The house looked like an old plantation house. Her two sons Dave and Paul went to Chicago and went to work. Us kids would be hoeing and picking cotton in a field next to Hattie's house and Dave and Paul would come in for a visit and they would give us kids nickels and dimes. Up the road from the Yellow House lived Rufus and Peggy, his wife. I cannot remember their last names. They were musicians and every week they would come to our house to play music. Some of the best blues I've ever heard. Rufus had a harmonica fastened to a coat hanger around his neck. He played the blues type guitar, and Peggy would sit in front of him and with two pencils, would keep a beat on the guitar body and strings while he played and sang. I remember going to a revival at the black church

in Pocahontas when I was a young boy. I remember that there were small shelves along the walls of the church with coal oil lamps sitting on them, and a couple on each side of the pulpit. I can still hear the congregation singing a song called "Keep Your Lamps All Trimmed And Burning For You'll Soon Be Going Home." The harmony was beautiful to the point that it raised the hairs on the back of my neck.

Across the tracks and up on top of a hill lived Levi and Rozella Garner and a family whose last names were Bean. Some nights they would be singing on their front porch and we would be singing and picking on ours. We would stop and listen to them for awhile, and they would stop and listen to us. We played together, prayed together, loved, cared and shared with each other there in the little community of Pocahontas. It was sort of like one big family. A big majority of the families were poor, and it was instilled into all of us to respect, care and love each other and life would be much easier for all of us.

Can You Save for College and Retirement?

Few of us have unlimited financial resources — which means that almost all of us need to prioritize our financial goals. Consequently, you'll have some decisions to make if you'd like to help pay for your children's college educations someday while, at the same time, saving for your own retirement.

Your first step in addressing these objectives is to maintain realistic expectations. Consider the issue of paying for college. Right now, the average four-year cost (tuition, fees, room and board) is about \$80,000 for in-state students at public universities and approximately \$180,000 for private schools, according to the College Board. And these costs are likely to keep rising in the years ahead. Can you save this much for your kids' education?

Instead of committing yourself to putting away this type of money, take a holistic approach to saving for your children's higher education. After all, you probably won't be the only one to help pay for college. Depending on your income and assets, your family might be eligible for some needs-based financial aid awarded by the college. Also, you should encourage your children to apply for as many scholarships as possible — but keep in mind that most scholarships don't provide a "full ride." Here's the bottom line: Don't assume you will receive so much aid that you don't need to save for college at all, but don't burden yourself with the expectation that you need to pick up the full tab for your children's schooling.

On a practical level, you may want to commit to putting a certain amount per month into a college savings vehicle, such as a 529 plan. You can generally invest in the 529 plan offered by most states, but in some cases, you may be eligible for a state income tax incentive. Also, all withdrawals from 529 plans will be free from federal income taxes, as long as the money is used for a qualified college or graduate school expense of the beneficiary you've named. (Withdrawals for expenses other than qualified education expenditures may be subject to federal and state taxes and a 10% penalty on the earnings.)

By starting your 529 plan early, when your children are young, you'll give the investments within the plan more time to grow. Plus, you can make smaller contributions on a regular basis, rather than come up with big lump sums later on. And by following this approach, you may be in a better financial position for investing in your IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. Obviously, it's to your benefit to contribute as much as you can to these plans, which offer tax advantages and a wide range of investment options. If you're investing in a 401(k) or similar employer-backed plan, try to boost your contributions every time your salary increases. At the very least, always put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

And once your children are through with college, you can discontinue saving in your 529 plan (although you may want to open another one in the future for your grandchildren) and devote more money to your retirement accounts.

It can certainly be challenging to save for education and retirement — but with discipline and perseverance, it can be done. So, give it the "old college try."

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

I was talking with someone just the other day about the things we remembered from when we were growing up (which is surely a sign of one's advancing years). Our conversation took a turn toward memories of baby chickens.

I am pretty familiar with baby chickens and that peep/chirp sound that they make. First, my Granny Kiestler had chickens when I was little and she would let me hold the baby chicks so I knew the sound from first-hand experience. Secondly, I knew the sound from Dr. H.H. Barham, who used to mimic the baby chicken noise pretty well when he was trying to get you to be still and look in your ears. I asked him about it years ago, and he said that little trick had sure helped him keep a lot of little wiggly people still while he examined their ears. I never understood why we all went along with the idea that Dr. Barham could see baby chickens in our ears, but hey, when you are little stuff like that makes sense. (I'm guessing that right about now that those of you who saw Dr. Barham as a child are making that baby chick sound; it's okay.)



still send baby chicks that way, but there is a lot of paperwork involved to do it, so don't get any ideas about sending chickens for fun or anything.

My Granny Kiestler had chickens at her old house in a pen right behind the house. I only remember going in the pen with her once or twice as she just knew that a chicken would peck me (or maybe she figured that her inquisitive granddaughter would try to pick at least one of them up). For me there was a certain healthy fear factor of one particularly pesky old rooster that was enough to keep me out of the pen. I learned early on to hold the baby chicks gently and for goodness' sakes, don't squeeze them. I loved their oh-so-soft chick down and the warmth of them in my hand. Every so often a sickly chick would come along and I would always "adopt" it to try and nurse it back to health. I remember Granny and I would feed the baby chick with an eyedropper and would rub its throat to help it swallow. It was

inevitable that in a day or two the poor little thing would succumb and go to chicken heaven, and Granny would let us have a baby-chicken-funeral in her yard somewhere.

Fuzzy little baby chicks always bring back sweet memories of time spent with my Granny. I'm glad, too, y'all, that I always listened to her and steered clear of that rooster.

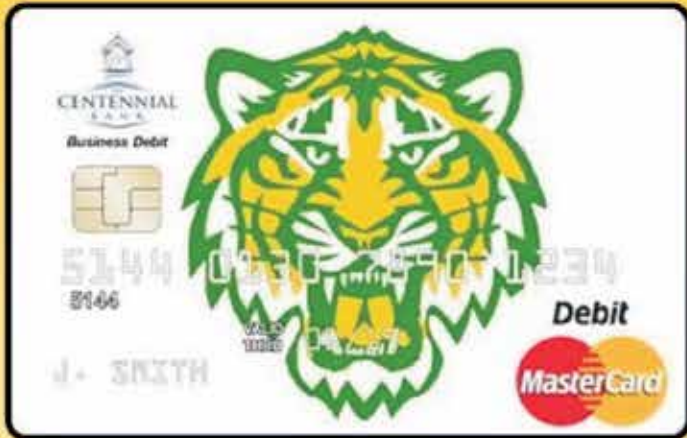
