Statewide support for the Hatchie River Park and Museum continued in late July as Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam and Economic and Community Development Commissioner Randy Boyd announced that Bolivar would be among 29 communities in Tennessee to receive a Tourism Enhancement Grant worth \$50,000.

The money will be spent to build a new boat ramp at the Hatchie River Museum, which has needed repair. Money will also be spent on museum and scenic area parking.

The \$50,000 comes on the heels of another grant worth \$260,000 that will be received by the city to help with the building renovation to build an outfitters location behind the museum. Bolivar will match the \$260,000 award to bring the money going into the project to \$571,000.

Jobless Numbers Go Up for County

Hardeman County saw unemployment go up in June, as rates rose in every county in the state for the May-June period.

The 6.4% estimated rate for Hardeman County is better than 27 other counties in the state, including neighboring McNairy County, who came in at 7.6%. The rise in rates was explained by the state as being caused by the seasonal closing of schools.

In Hardeman County, the state says a potential workforce of 9,440 had 610 out of work in June.

What most angered Saul was that God had chosen David. He pursued David to kill him. One night, Saul's army was sleeping in an encampment. David approached Saul as he slept. Although one of his companions saw it as the perfect opportunity to solve

David's biggest problem and kill Saul as he slept, David instead took Saul's water and spear. Once on the edge of camp, David called out and reminded Saul that he spared his life. Sunrise: Helping Children 2 by David Coy

Last week, we looked at how to help children between the ages 2 and 4 who are experiencing grief. This time we will look at children between the ages of 4-7. They also see death as reversible. Unlike their younger peer group, they have more verbalization, and are more curious as to the how and why of what has happened. They may act as though nothing has happened and display a general distress and confusion.


What they will need is clear answers in simple terms they can understand to the questions they ask, no matter how improbable their fears or perception may seem. They require an accepting listener to the memories he/she has of the deceased. They may need explanations to their imaginative beliefs that feed their fears. Don't be alarmed if they are seen to alternate between play, artwork, songs, etc. about the events surrounding the death.

Do children grieve as others? Yes and no. We all regardless of our age have common denominators that apply toward the subject of grief. There are also dissimilarities that separate us individually that define grief as unique and an individual experience. There are many factors that can affect the grief response of a child. Their gender, age both physically and emotional/mental development, religious and ethnic customs, their relationship to the person who died or their involvement with the loss. Also their prior grief experiences, the circumstances of the loss, the support available, the status of unfinished business, their physical and mental health, their personal resilience and their ability to cope with the stress associated with loss.

It is important to remember, children can and do feel pain of loss, but may not have the coping skills as those their same age and certainly not of adults. Children often express their feelings of grief through behavior. Be alert and observe, comfort and support. This is Sunrise Aftercare, sunrise@sfdcares.com





Fried Smashed Potatoes

Ingredients

12 small red potatoes (1-1/2 to 2 inches in diameter; 1-1/2 to 2 pounds total)

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 3/4 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons dried or finely chopped fresh parsley

Make-Ahead Directions

Scrub potatoes; set aside overnight. Combine the grated cheese and parsley in an airtight container; cover. Chill for up to 24 hours. Continue as directed.

Directions

- 1. Place potatoes in a large saucepan and cover with at least 1 inch of water. Add the 1 teaspoon salt to water. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer for 25 to 30 minutes or until potatoes are very tender; drain potatoes.
- 2. Preheat oven to 450 degrees F. Transfer potatoes to a foil-lined 15x10x1-inch baking pan. Cool for 10 minutes. Using a potato masher or the palm of your hand (be careful not to burn your hand), lightly press down on each potato to smash to about 1/2-inch thickness, keeping each potato in one piece.
- 3. Using half of the olive oil, brush on potatoes. Sprinkle half of the salt and pepper on potatoes. Bake, uncovered, for 10 to 15 minutes or until bottoms are lightly browned and crisp. Turn potatoes; brush with the remaining olive oil and sprinkle with the remaining salt and pepper. Bake for 10 to 15 minutes more or until potatoes are lightly browned and crisp. In a bowl combine cheese and parsley. Sprinkle on potatoes. Bake for 2 to 3 minutes more or until cheese is melted.



Diversification Is Still Important for Retirees

During your working years, your primary investment goal is generally growth – you need your money to grow so that you can eventually afford the comfortable retirement lifestyle you've envisioned. But when you retire, should you change course and adjust your investment strategy from "offense" to "defense"?

Actually, it's not quite that simple. To begin with, even while you are working, you don't want your portfolio to be completely filled with growth-oriented investments, such as stocks. If it were, you would likely be taking on a degree of investment risk that's too high, because, as you may know, stocks will fluctuate in price - sometimes significantly. And if you only own stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn. That's why you need to have an array of investments - stocks, bonds, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. By spreading your investment dollars this way, you can give yourself more opportunities for success while reducing the impact of volatility on your portfolio. (Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.) Now, let's fast-forward to your retirement date. Once you retire, you may need to look at your investment portfolio somewhat differently - instead of "building it up," you may now want to think of "making it last." So, your first impression might be that instead of maintaining the diversified portfolio you had when you were working, you need to switch to predominantly "safe" investments, such as CDs and Treasury bonds, to reduce the risk of losing principal. And such a strategy might indeed be effective - if your retirement were only going to last a year or so. 





With Hardeman County college attendance increasing in the fall of 2015, the Tennessee Promise has been labeled a success.

Tennessee Promise is both a scholarship and mentoring program focused on increasing the number of students that attend college in our state. It provides students a last-dollar scholarship, meaning the scholarship will cover tuition and fees not covered by the Pell Grant, the HOPE scholarship, or state student assistance funds. Students may use the scholarship at any of the state's 13 community colleges, 27 colleges of applied technology, or other eligible institutions offering an associates degree program.

While removing the financial

burden is key, a critical component of Tennessee Promise is the individual guidance each participant will receive from a mentor who will assist the student as he or she navigates the college admissions process. This is accomplished primarily via mandatory meetings that students must attend in order to remain eligible for the program. In addition, Tennessee Promise participants must complete eight hours of community service per term enrolled, as well as maintain satisfactory academic progress (2.0 GPA) at their institution.

Helping students realize their opportunities from the Tennessee Promise in Hardeman County is tnAchieves, a free program that was created to increase higher education opportunities for Tennessee high school students by providing last-dollar scholarships with mentor guidance.

"In only six years, tnAchieves has supported more than 10,000 students into a community or technical college. Our statistics indicate that our students are retaining at a rate 50 percent greater than the state average and graduating at a rate three times the state average. Needless to say, we are very proud of our students and their accomplishments, said tnAchieves Executive Director Krissy DeAlejandro.

Losing sleep effects your mind and body, and any stress effects how your body processes food. In a stressful situation your body may store more fat due to a survival mode. Find the time to take frequent short walks and stretch when you can, every little

bit helps to relieve the stress in

your body and mind.

Since 2016 started I have lost 8 pounds, 4 of those pounds have been lost since starting to write this article and sharing it with you. Smoothie: 4 inch cubes of frozen banana, 1/2 cup other frozen or chilled fruit, try canned pears in own juice - yummy!, or a fresh peach!, 1 cup unsweetened almond milk (only 30 calories), vanilla flavor and stevia, or 1 Tablespoon sugar free pudding mix, (vanilla, white chocolate, banana etc.), 1 cup crushed ice. Place in blender! If needed add a bit more ice or almond milk. Enjoy.
