Bolivar Mayor's Race Attracts Two (So Far) Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens and Councilman Julian McTizic will kick off their campaigns for Mayor of Bolivar with events in the coming week.

Councilman Julian McTizic will officially kick off his campaign on Monday, December 5 at 7:00 p.m. from Maria's Restaurant, which is located on Highway 64 in East Bolivar, while Mayor Stevens will announce his intentions to run for a third term at the former Barrett and Stevens Building on 117 South Main Street in Bolivar on Thursday, December 8 at 5:30 p.m.

Also up for election are four seats on the Bolivar City Council, currently held by Suzanne Rhea, Randy Hill, McTizic, and Willie McKinnie. The deadline for petitions to arrive at the Hardeman County Election Commission is February 16, 2017. Early voting is scheduled for April 26-May 11. Election Day is May 16. The last day to register to vote in the 2017 Bolivar City Election is April 16, 2017.



County Jobless Numbers Decrease

Hardeman County unemployment numbers dropped slightly in October of 2016 versus September and showed great improvement over the last years, according to the numbers from the Tennessee Department of Workforce Development released November 23.

The raw data shows Hardeman County with 9,580 in the workforce, with 600 of them unemployed, or a 6.3% percent rate. The September 2016 rate was 6.5%.

The rate is a vast improvement over October 2015, when the rate was 7.3%.

The 6.3% puts Hardeman County at 72nd in the state and ahead of McNairy (7.3%) County, but trailing Madison (5.0%), Chester (5.0%), Fayette (5.5%), and Haywood (6.2%) Counties.

County unemployment rates for October 2016 show the rates decreased in 80 counties, increased in seven, and remained the same in eight counties.

The lowest unemployment in the state belongs to Williamson County at 3.5%, while the highest is in Lake County at 8.0%.

Unemployment in Tennessee is listed at 4.6%, slightly lower than the United States rate of 5.0%.

The state and national unemployment rates are seasonally adjusted, while the county unemployment rates are not. Seasonal adjustment is a





We often imagine God's love is somewhat like a person trying to pick up an insect without hurting it. There are things in our life all around us that we kill if we try to handle them. The truth is, God's love is like a fine, indestructible thread. It is strong enough to lift anything, and fine enough to bind our most intimate frailties.

Don't get me wrong, there are certainly times we need God to exert his strength. To hold atoms in place whose center are opposing forces. We need God to move in when all else has failed in war, disease and natural disaster. We need God's sustaining power that created the world to keep all the intricacies in play. hide Moses from his full glory. He chose us to see the fullness of His attributes in human form. He literally bowed down to our level to reach us in His Son.



and answered their prayers.

I sensed God's care in visiting a little church before the holidays. I have been informed that certain medications may increase the risk of developing this disease if taken over long periods of time. Second, challenges in planning or solving problems. This is clearly a skill we learn early in life and use throughout our routine that is life. Third is the difficulty in completing familiar tasks. This would be extremely frustrating. Fourth, is the confusion that exists with time or place. This involves the losing track of dates, and or seasons. Our loved one may forget where they are, why they are there and how they got there or even how to return. Fifth, is the difficulty or challenge understanding visual images and things relating to space. If we have a good memory regarding the way a location is laid out and the amount of room it takes up, it is believed a person has a good spatial memory.

# Pearl Harbor Day

## Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

In just a few days, we will remember the anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941 – the 75th anniversary of that day. If you are ever in Hawaii, you really must go to the World War II Valor in the Pacific National Monument; it is one of the most moving places I have ever visited. On the day I was there, there happened to be a group of gentleman from all over New England who had been stationed somewhere or the other in Hawaii in December 1941.

Part of that group was on the same boat I rode on over to the Arizona Memorial, and I found myself sitting next to a gentleman from the group. I introduced myself and thanked him; he gave me a big hug and whispered a tearful "thank you for remembering". I asked him if this was the first time he had been back and he said he had been back once before; I asked him where he was that day; this was his story.

"Me and some of my buddies actually had a day of liberty that day. It was an especially beautiful day and we had met some local girls and we were all going to go on a picnic on the beach – a real treat for some guys a long way from home. We were just leaving to drive to the other side of the island when one of the guys said, "those

planes sure are coming in close". We found a radio and heard that there was some sort of attack going on; we took the girls back home, and headed back to the ships. What we saw when we got there was indescribable; it looked like the whole world was coming to an end. I could see those big, beautiful ships with all of that smoke coming out of them; I will never forget the noise of those planes overhead, one after the other. We just reported to the first officer we saw and spent the rest of the day trying to do whatever we could to help out. It was hard to believe it was happening."

Just as he finished his story the boat pulled alongside the Memorial and we started to disembark. He gave me a big bear hug and said, "please, always remember what happened here." I didn't see him again during the trip, but I never have forgotten his story or being on that hallowed spot with their group. Most all of them are gone now, many took their stories with them. At least one survivor of that day shared his story with me, and now I've had the chance to share it with all of you. I always remember all of them on each December 7.

It's not every day of your life that you have a hero recount history on the very spot where it happened, but I did. Hug a veteran; say a prayer for those on active duty (and for their families too); and most of all, do what this gentleman asked me, "please always remember what happened".
