

In 2015, voters in the Bolivar City Election approved package stores by an overwhelming margin. The city then crafted an ordinance which governs the placement of liquor stores, placing a stipulation that the store be located inside the Bolivar Downtown (DEVCO) area. City Declines to Vote on Sewer Issue

Four families who live in the city limits are asking the city of Bolivar to fix a sewer issue.

The properties located on Meadowbrook Drive in Bolivar have asked the city to maintain the pumps that service three houses and potentially a fourth lot. While the city agrees the property is in the city limits, they say an agreement to allow the four parcels to be serviced privately by privately installed equipment was reached in the 1990's.

Developed by Burton Shearin, the lots were to be put on gravity flow sewer in phase two of his plans, but phase two was never implemented, leaving the property owners with the need for pumps to handle their waste.

The council has discussed the issue in the last two meetings, but referred the issue to the Bolivar Utility Board in December. The January meeting ended without a vote on whether to offer to maintain the properties.

What Should You Know About Taking RMDs?

As we get older, the end of another year takes on greater meaning, in many ways, than it did when we were young. And if you're a certain age, December 31 has a very specific meaning in terms of your finances, because it's the deadline for withdrawing money from some of your retirement plans. What should you know about these withdrawals? And how much control over them do you have?

Here's the picture, in a nutshell: Once you turn 70½, you generally need to start taking withdrawals – the technical term is "required minimum distributions," or RMDs - from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or similar plan, such as a 403(b) plan (for employees of pubic schools, religious institutions and other tax-exempt organizations) or 457(b) plan (for employees of state and local governments and governmental agencies). After the first year in which you take these RMDs, you must take them by the end of each year thereafter.

If you don't withdraw at least the minimum amount (calculated based on your age, account balance and other factors) you face a penalty of 50% of what you should have taken out – a potential loss of thousands of dollars. So, here's priority number one: Take your RMDs before the end of the year. The financial services provider who administers your IRA or 401(k) can help you determine the amount you must withdraw.

However, after that point, it's your decision as to whether you want to exceed the minimum. Of course, you may need to take more out to meet your living expenses. But if you have enough additional income from other sources – such as Social Security and interest and dividend payments from investments held outside your retirement accounts you may be able to stick with the minimum withdrawals.

And this could prove to be beneficial, because you obviously want your retirement accounts to last as long as possible, considering you might spend two or even three decades as a retiree. Another reason not to take more than you need from your retirement accounts is that these withdrawals are typically taxable – so the less you take out, the lower your tax bill.

You can also potentially lower your tax burden arising from RMDs by being generous. If you take money from your IRA and donate it to a qualified charity (one that has received tax-exempt status from the IRS), you can exclude the withdrawal from your adjusted gross income and count the donation against your taxable RMDs. Suppose, for example, your RMD for 2016 is \$5,500. If you take \$5,000 from your IRA and donate it to a qualified charity, your taxable RMD obligation will be reduced to just \$500. If you were to take another \$500 from your IRA, you would satisfy your entire RMD for the year. (Consult with your tax advisor to make sure you're following the rules governing these charitable donations from your IRA.)

You worked many years to build your retirement accounts. So when it's time to tap into them, make the right moves – and do whatever it takes to maximize the benefits you get from your required minimum distributions.

Civil Rights Leader Remembered for Non-Violence Martin Luther King, Jr., was an American Baptist


minister and activist who was a leader in the Civil Rights Movement. He is best known for his role in the advancement of civil rights using nonviolent civil disobedience based on his Christian beliefs.

King became a civil rights activist early in his career. He led the 1955 Montgomery bus boycott and helped found the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) in 1957, serving as its first president. King also helped to organize the 1963 March on Washington, where he delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" speech. There, he established his reputation as one of the greatest orators in American history.

In 1968, King was planning a national occupation of Washington, D.C., to be called the Poor People's



The Creation of the Holiday to Celebrate Dr. King





After King's death, U.S. Representative John Conyers (a Democrat from Michigan) and U.S. Senator Edward Brooke (a Republican from Massachusetts) introduced a bill in Congress to make King's birthday a national holiday. It failed in 1979, but in 1983 it was introduced to congress Indiana House of Representatives member Katie Hall, where President Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law. It was first observed three years later. At first, some states resisted observing the holiday as such, giving it alternative names or combining it with other holidays. It was officially observed in all 50 states for the first time in 2000, as the state of Utah joined the other 49 states in observance. The last state to make it a paid holiday for all state employees was South Carolina, also in 2000.

The holiday is observed (in various ways) in Japan, the Netherlands, and the city of Toronto, Canada.

Only two other figures have national holidays in the U.S. honoring them: George Washington and Christopher Columbus. The holiday to honor Washington was first observed in 1879, while Columbus Day was first celebrated as an official holiday in 1937.

Slaying Giants by Jimmy Sadler

When I was younger, I had a select few kids who wanted to pick on me. I was "four eyes" to the less creative bullies. I was a shy, extremely quiet kid. The doctor asked my father if I had a developmental disorder, because I didn't say a peep during office visits. I was a prime target, a scrawny kid with an awkward persona. Initially, my brother stepped in to save me. One particular kid got a threat of "no more messing with my brother, or else."

By fifth grade, I had enough. I left class to go to the restroom, and this kid soon followed. He stopped me in the hallway on the way back to class. Where you going, punk?" I tried to pass, he punched me on the shoulder. My face grew red with anger, and for the first time in my life, I punched back. For the next five minutes, we had a gentleman's war of shoulder punches, each one increasing slightly in power.

My teacher came to find us and jumped in the middle. He wanted to know if I wanted the other kid to go to the office, but I declined. That day I somehow earned respect from the giant. He never messed with me again, in fact, he seemed to want to consider me a friend. The giant, or something inside him, had been slain.

Another kid who always asked for my extra money approached me at the school book store. This time I said "no"

and he was shocked. He said to meet him in the playground after school, and I took him up on the offer. He then smiled and declined. Though it would be six years before we would become friends, this giant was slain by shock. the unexpected little guy getting to the end of his patience.

Another giant was more pervasive. He put something in his hat, and while riding the bus, hit my head with it. He was twice my size and several grades ahead of me. He eventually tired of it, and moved on to more practical things. I didn't see him for many years after. Thanks to an intense summer job and the natural hormones of youth, I bulked up significantly over where I had been. Then, I ran into the kid again at the small convenience store in town. He recognized me, and I just spoke as if we had been friends forever. I was now bigger than he was, and it seemed to humble him tremendously. It wasn't the awkward friendship that blossomed from my first bully encounter, but instead an unspoken attitude of mutual disarmament. The past was history, and he was polite. This giant, though not a great friend, was slain by time and change.

When coming into high school, I was greeted by an upperclassman. "Hey, are you David's brother?". When I said yes, he told me he would kick my backside (politely put). I walked up to

him, eve to eve, and said I would give him that opportunity after school. He smiled and declined, and after a moment of sizing up my sincerity, laughed it off and basically welcomed me to high school. It was the last time I was bullied. This giant was slain by calling his bluff. I rolled around the idea of adding him on FaceBook. After about three days of considering, I noticed an obituary for him the day it was posted. I was saddened. I wanted this giant to go out a different way. I believe he had a great heart and I hoped we could reconnect. This giant was ultimately claimed the same way every bully is, time.

I'm not sure who the giants are in your life, or what way is appropriate for you to overcome them. There are two simple truths I've found along the way. One, to defeat an ongoing threat to someone, you must come to a point of dismissing the consequences of standing your ground. Secondly, you must allow God to be the one to judge. You might just find that the next giant you slay becomes a friend.

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

The blast of wintry weather a few days ago reminded me of some winter days when I was a child and how we turned ice and snow into something of an adventure. It was more than 40 years ago when we had a major ice storm in the winter of 1974.

The biggest memory, and the best, I have of those cold, cold days was spending them with my family at my Granny Kiestler's old house. We did not have electricity for three or four days; she didn't either but she had one of those huge old gas heaters, you know the kind that took up the entire corner of a room. My brother and I loved to play in her old house, and one of its main attractions to us was the marvelously (we thought) slanted floor. If you positioned yourself just right under the bedroom window, you could send a whole fleet of cars across the floor and down to their eventual stopping place under the sofa. As children we didn't understand that the slanted floor was some kind of foundational problem, we thought it was just a great car freeway right in her house. It was also good for playing jacks because it taught you to be super-quick - if you weren't that slanted floor would cause things to start going the opposite way.



That ice storm kept us all together there at her house and we played games and she told us stories about growing up on a farm just outside of Cloverport. We cooked soup and other things right on top of that old heater and I thought we were just right in the middle of a great adventure for sure. I was in the early years of my "Little House on the Prairie" phase and I just knew we were living like they had in the Big North Woods. I also thought we were sort of like hobos on a train since some of what we cooked we ate right out of a can. At night we had candles and Granny's old kerosene lanterns for light, and when it was time for sleep we bundled up

under blankets and quilts I knew that my Mom and Granny had made. Is there any better sleep than under the fabric that has been lovingly pieced together by familiar hands?

After a few days, the temperatures started to rise, the electricity came back on, and we went back home. Every time we have cold, cold weather I remember those winter days that were warmed by our love and togetherness. One of my favorite Laura Ingalls Wilder quotes sums up the memories of those winter days spent together, "It is the sweet simple things of life which are the real ones after all." Y'all enjoy winter days and warm memories.

The Bolivar-Hardeman County Library will take a direction for story time with Children's Librarian Shana Mehr on Thursdays.




