
You'd need to make a deal with the person with the video camera to only record your better moments. On the other hand, she might decide to get a videographer of her own, which could really complicate things.

Early Voting Begins in Tennessee

The polls opened for the second time this year as early voting began in Tennessee, with primaries for state government and local government electing leaders in the General Election. Early voting in Hardeman County will be July 15-30 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. weekdays and from 9:00 a.m. to Noon on Saturdays. Election Day is August 4.

County-wide, voters will choose between incumbent Josh Pulse and challenger John Vickers for Assessor of Property. Other county spots on the ballot are two commission seats, three school board spots, and a road supervisor position.

Voters in Whiteville will have to choose three aldermen from a list of five and a mayor from three candidates. Running for mayor are incumbent James R. Bellar, challenged by Leon Crisp and Aubrey Phillips.

and Mac O'Daniel were on hand July 13 to approve the machines for voting on July 15. McQueen, a Democratic party appointee and O'Daniel, a Republican appointee are selected by the five-member Hardeman County Election Commission.

Employment Efforts Paying Off

A dozen Hardeman Countians have been hired by local industry in the last two weeks, due in part to an employment agency partnering with the Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce.

According to Hamilton Ryker Staffing Coordinator Mary Beth Anderson, the two Tuesdays that they have set up to take applications at the Hardeman County Chamber Office have averaged more than 60 Hamilton Ryker will be housed by the Hardeman County Chamber of



Saulsbury Baptist Church Celebrates 150 years



From Turner Robinson, age 4, to Cleo Smellings, age 100, a large crowd packed the pews in celebration of Saulsbury Baptist Church's 150 year anniversary. They came from near and far, Saulsbury, to Memphis, to Covington, to Winchester, and even as far away as Huntsville, Alabama. Former pastors Rhesa Davis, who served the church from 1965 to 1967 and Wayne Max who served from 1985 to 1987 along with widows of past pastors Johnny Johnson, 1987 to 1992 and Larry Corder, 1993 to 2003 attended. "My husband was the longest serving pastor in the church's history," said Evie Corder.

Rex Brotherton introduced the guest speaker, Mack Lowrey, great-great grandson of General M.P. Lowrey, founder of the church.

In his introduction, Brotherton brought guests up to date on the later history of Saulsbury Baptist. "I actually attended this church before I was born and have attended here the 56 years since," said Brotherton. "I was baptized here as a youngster and 33 years ago, I married Tonya at this altar,". He related several memories he had about his life growing up in the church. A long time Deacon, he picked up the church history beginning with the opening of the cornerstone at the 100 year anniversary. Unfortunately, the original documents were destroyed by moisture. Several coins were intact. The cornerstone was restored to its place and these coins, along with several documents, were placed inside. The new documents were placed in glass jars and paraffin sealed. "This is the oldest active church building in Hardeman County," said Brotherton.

Lowrey presented a history of Saulsbury Baptist Church beginning July 14, 1866 when his greatgreat grandfather along with John M. Chambers and A.G. Parrott organized a meeting held at the old Woodland Academy. General Lowrey was elected to be the first



pastor. The meeting lasted twelve days and resulted in thirteen conversions and nine baptisms. Additionally, several people presented their letters from other churches. The new church body realized a building was needed. This was accomplished with the first service held in the newly completed building on the third Sunday of August 1867.

In 1888 Pastor C.C. McDaniel suggested a new building was needed. His suggestion became a reality when the current church building was dedicated on December 15, 1889. As the town of Saulsbury grew and prospered, so did the church. Over the years several updates and additions were completed. Lanterns were replaced by electric lighting. A new heating system replaced the potbelly stoves. Additional Sunday School rooms were built. The final addition was completed in 2005. This included an updated kitchen, fellowship hall, a new Sunday School room and new restrooms.

Lowrey related a brief biography of the life of "The Preacher General" as his Grandfather Mark was known. Born in McNairy County on December 30, 1828, Mark grew up in Farmington, Mississippi. He became a bricklayer and worked in that trade until he entered the Baptist ministry at age 24. He rose rapidly as a preacher and pastor and within

a few years was pastor of several churches in Tishomingo and Tippah Counties.

In 1861, Lowrey was recruited, as a Captain, into an emergency force by created by Gov. Pettus for service in Tennessee and Kentucky. He was wounded in the Battle of Perryville, Kentucky. After recovering from his wounds, he returned to duty. He was promoted to Brigadier General on the battlefield of Chickamauga. He resigned his commission in March, 1865 and returned to his work as a preacher.

Among his most notable accomplishments, General Lowrey founded the Blue Mountain Female College. First discussed in 1868, his dream became a reality in September, 1873. He died suddenly in February, 1865 at the age of 57.

The celebration's message was delivered by Dr. Matthew Emerson. Born and raised in Saulsbury, he is the son of Rich and Sheila Emerson. He is currently the pastor of the Hornsby Baptist Church. While using Galatians, chapter six, as his sermon's scripture, Dr. Emerson related several memories of his boyhood in the Saulsbury Baptist Church. "We talk about the good old days but when we look back, some things were perhaps not all that great. As Christians, we don't dwell in the past. We look forward to the future," he said. He placed emphasis on verse nine where Paul encourages Christians to never become discouraged or give up doing what is right because in the future they will reap a harvest of blessings.

Following Dr. Emerson's message, the congregation had the opportunity to fellowship while enjoying a luncheon prepared by the ladies of the church.



Right now my favorite thing about summer is all the great fresh local fruits and vegetables that are available at our Farmers Markets, local farms, and our local grocery stores. Here is one of my best summer dips.

Fresh Salsa: 2 Large Fresh Tomatoes, diced small, 1 Medium Vidalia Onion, diced small, I love to dice also bell peppers and add to salsa: red, yellow, green. ½ of each. Dash of salt, pepper, and I like a bit of garlic to taste. 1 Tablespoon of lime Juice, Add a bit of chopped jalapeno, or a can of Rotel tomatoes or a couple of dashes of Tabasco, depending on your taste for hot!

Now for me, I am trying to go low carbohydrates, so I just slice up zucchini, celery and other vegetables to dip into salsa. This is very low calorie, low carb, and only has a bit of sodium. If you love chips, just read the label to find out what a serving actually is, usually 13-16 chips. I also love this on top of grilled chicken, a hamburger

patty, and on a veggie omelet.

Treat yourself, don't think of all the things you think you cannot have, but of all the wonderful foods you can have! Just remember, we will not be perfect in this journey. By the way helpful friends; there is nothing worse than to have someone say, "Aren't you on a diet? Are you supposed to eat that?" The friendly food police is not encouraging! On many weight loss programs you can eat everything, it is about portion control and being accountable to myself in those decisions that I

I can find good choices everywhere. I try to review a menu

before eating out. Maybe I really want a burger, but get a side salad instead French fries. Or maybe I split both with a friend, or take ½ home. Maybe today is the day I decided to have bread for breakfast and not have any carbohydrates for dinner. It is what is best for you to eat healthier for the long term. Start your exercise program and be consistent, even if you have to do 10 minutes at a time 2-3 times per


