Warrants Issued by County

Two Hardeman County citizens will face misdemeanor charges and fines as a result of investigations by the Hardeman County Solid Waste Department.

Warrants were issued for Lemarcus Danyelle Walker of 205 Hollywood Acres in Bolivar and for Jeremy Antonio Young of 760 Middleton Loop by the General Sessions Court of Hardeman County this past week at the request of Solid Waste Director and Reserve Deputy Kenny Brown.


Walker's warrant lists the charge as Aggravated Criminal Littering and Young's is for Criminal Littering.

"Dumping old mattresses, furniture, construction debris, household garbage and other items in the ditches is not only a major eye sore but it impacts our county both environmentally and economically. It not only gives an immediate negative impression of our county, but

these items also end up in our waterways and streams affecting wildlife and drinking water. Through a joint effort by Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, Sheriff John Doolen and Hardeman County Solid Waste, we use photos, videos and other evidence from the problem areas and members of the public to track down illegal dumpers and hold them accountable for disrespecting Hardeman County's residents, businesses and taxpayers," said Brown.

All proceeds generated from the fines will be deposited into a fund created by Mayor Sain to be used solely for Hardeman County litter prevention program and to offer rewards for any person who reports illegal littering.

Through this fund, Mayor Jimmy Sain is offering a \$50 reward to any person reporting littering that is less than five pounds and a \$250 reward to any person reporting littering in excess of five pounds.



In order to receive the reward, the report must result in the prosecution and conviction of the offender.

Tax-Free Holiday Begins July 28

Make your shopping lists and grab your wallet because the Sales Tax Holiday starts on Friday, July 28 at exactly 12:01 a.m., and ends on Sunday, July 30 at exactly 11:59 a.m.



General clothing, school supplies, and school art supplies with a purchase price of \$100.00 or less per item are exempt from sales tax. Clothing exemptions include shirts, dresses, pants, coats, gloves, mittens, hats, caps, hosiery, neckties, belts, shoes, uniforms (athletic or non-athletic), and scarves. However, belt buckles, patches, and emblems sold separately, sewing equipment and supplies, or sewing materials that become a part

Democrats Vote for a Primary

By a unanimous vote, the executive committee of the Hardeman County Democratic Party decided to hold a primary for county elections in 2018.

According to Hardeman County Democratic Party's Meryl Rice the Hardeman County Democratic Party Primary Board will examine the voting record of each candidate to determine if they have voted in three of the last five state and federal primaries. If they meet this criteria, and there is no reliable evidence that they are not a democrat, they will be allowed to run.

If a candidate does not meet that criteria, but can give a reasonable explanation to the primary board as to why that is the case, he or she still may still be allowed to run as a democrat.

Any challenge to a person's status will be forwarded to the Executive Committee of the Tennessee Democratic Party for the final decision.

Hardeman County Remembered

This week we remember the anniversary of what surely has to be one of mankind's greatest achievements – the landing and spacewalk on the moon of Apollo 11 on July 20, 1969. I have been fascinated by the space program all of my life and at one point in my young life wanted to be an astronaut, but was devastated to learn (at that time) that the space program didn't accept girls.

As a child of the 1960s how could I not have been caught up in all things outer space related? Just a few months before I was born John Glenn became the first American to orbit the Earth aboard the Friendship 7. Less than a year before that (in 1961) President John F. Kennedy, in an address to Congress, issued this challenge, "First, I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before the decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to the earth. No single space project in this period will be more impressive to mankind or more important for the long-range exploration of space; and none will be so difficult or expensive to accomplish."

Even though I was just a child of 6-1/2 years old (remember when you were young how important it was to add "and a-half" to your age?), I remember the night of the moon landing. My Dad was a big fan of the space race too and he and I watched the big console television in our living room that night and saw the grainy photos of Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin landing on the moon and announcing their arrival with the oft-repeated phrase, "Houston, Tranquility Base here. The Eagle has landed." I remember we were literally sitting on the edge of our seats as we watched things unfold. And later that night, we watched Astronaut Armstrong go down the spidery steps of the lunar module and put the footprint of a man from Earth on the surface of the moon. It was awesome. If you've never watched the moon landing, go to the internet right now and do a search for "Walter Cronkite Moon Landing"; it is still breathtaking and inspiring after all these years.


Shortly after that Dad and I went out in the driveway and found the moon in our Southern night sky. It had been a hot July, but there were clear skies that night and the moon was in the crescent (at just past 32% to be specific). While we were standing there looking up at the moon so far away and yet now so much closer than before, my Dad said something I have never forgotten, "well, they made it up there and we got to see it happen; that is pretty amazing to think about. I wonder if they are up there looking down at us?"

I have followed the space programs all throughout my life and still do today. I've visited places like Cape Canaveral, Huntsville, and the NASA headquarters in Houston. My brother and I got to be the "special guides" on the tour at Cape Canaveral once (which meant, among other things, that we got to walk inside exhibits with the guide, oh so cool), I have done the gravity simulation at Huntsville, and I tried on a helmet like they were using aboard Skylab (NASA's first space station) during our visit.

Later in life when I found this Mark Twain quote, it reminded me of the men and women (finally, they let girls be astronauts) who have dared to dream and explore in the skies beyond us, "...so throw off the bowlines. Sail away from the safe harbor. Catch the trade winds in your sails. Explore. Dream. Discover." Almost anytime I look up at the moon and stars, I remember that night in 1969 and watching the men on the moon. Explore, dream, and discover, y'all.



Our band did a show in my old home town of Pocahontas this past Saturday. Got to see a lot of people I have not seen in years. It brought back a lot of memories. I had a lot of people to ask me where the old Yellow House was located. As soon as I stepped off the bus, I stepped right into the middle of a clump of beggar lice, which covered the legs of my jeans and the back of my shirt. Several people tried to brush the flora critters off my clothes. I told them just to let them stay, that when I lived in Pocahontas, I had beggar lice on my jeans six days a week and it just made me feel at home. After the show, I visited a dear friend who lived down the street and she gave me enough cotton balls to remove pesky seed from my clothes. We used to keep balls of cotton around our house just to remove beggar lice from our clothes, as the plant was ever present around the Yellow House. My heart goes out to the people on the main street of Pocahontas who lost their homes and possessions during the recent storm. Those same homes were standing when I lived in the community, and I remember the families that lived in them at that time. One house was where the Wrights lived. One of their sons was an engineer on the Southern railroad that runs through the town. He had a certain whistle he would blow when he came through. The next house was Dr. Fortune's homeplace. Dr. Fortune owned a store in town and treated people for all sorts of ailments. I remember that if you had a sore throat, he would take a long cotton swab, tell you to open your mouth

and say ah, then he would swab your tonsils with an awful tasting blood red antiseptic called Mercurochrome. He also practiced faith healing. He had a son named Leslie who had been bed fast since a teenager. He spent his days and nights in a bed on wheels. I admired this man. This did not stop this man from always having a smile on his face and working every day. Working may sound strange, but Leslie was a notary public, filled out income taxes, played the guitar, went fishing, and after his parents died, actually ran a store. I would love to have half the courage that this man had. I never complained about a thing when I visited him, I was too ashamed to even mention any ailment or problem that I might have. The family that lived next to Dr. Fortune was the Joyners. Mr. Joyner also ran a store in Pocahontas for awhile. He was an avid fisherman and hunter. He was the man that gave me a prized stack of Field and Stream and Outdoor Life magazines that I wore out reading. Also, one day he opened up one of his tackle boxes which





After the death of her mother, she went back to work as a foster grandparent and a domestic worker. Even at the age of ninety-eight she stated, "I wish I could have me a little job."

Mary Ethel was an immaculate housekeeper and cook. She was famous for her Coconut Pies, Sweet Potato Pies, homemade Biscuits, Potatoes Salad and anything she wanted to cook.

Mary Ethel was the mother of two biological children, Hattie and Robert Earl. Robert Earl died as a young boy. She was united L.J. Johnson numerous years and immediately became a mother to three other children, Girlene, Annie B. and Paul. Her husband, L.J., Girlene and Paul preceded her in death. She was also preceded in death by two grandsons, Ray and Kevin. Kevin recently passed May 2017.

In loving memory, Mary Ethel leaves to cherish; two daughters; Hattie (J.C.) Harvey and Annie B. Matthews: nine grandchildren, a host of great grandchildren, four great-great grandchildren, one adorable baby sitter; Irene Joy and a host of nephews, nieces, and other relatives.

In late 1991, a Canadian military plane crashed enroute to the northernmost settlement on earth, Ellesmere Island. The airplane was supplying personnel changes and food supplies for the long winter. The destination was a radar listening post. The secret facility serves as a first alert system in case of nuclear or other attacks from other countries. All 18 people on the aircraft initially survived. In the next thirty hours, in temperatures dropping to 60 below zero, five of the survivors succumbed to the frigid weather. "Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it" (Proverbs 22:6, NIV).



Ingredients

8 slices bacon, chopped
1 pound skinless, boneless chicken breast, cut into bite-size pieces
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
1 1/2 cups chopped red sweet pepper
1 cup chopped sweet onion
1 - 2 jalapeño chile peppers, finely chopped
4 cloves garlic, minced
1/3 cup all-purpose flour
6 cups reduced-sodium chicken broth
2 large Yukon gold potatoes, chopped
2 cups fresh sweet corn kernels
1 1/2 cups whipping cream
1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
2 bay leaves
Jalapeño chile pepper slices (optional)

Directions

In a 5- to 6-quart Dutch oven or skillet cook bacon until crisp. Remove with a spoon; set aside. Reserve 1 tablespoon drippings in pan.

Add chicken to pan. Sprinkle with salt and black pepper. Cook and stir over medium-high heat until chicken is no longer pink; remove from pan. Add sweet pepper and onion to pan. Cook and stir until tender. Add chopped jalapeño and garlic; cook and stir for 3 minutes. Stir in flour. Cook and stir for 1 minute. Add broth and potatoes. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Cook, uncovered, for 10 minutes or just until potatoes are tender, stirring occasionally. Stir in chicken, corn, cream, cayenne pepper, and bay leaves. Simmer, uncovered, for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Discard bay leaves. Top with jalapeño slices, if desired.




bring awareness on gun violence and the importance of love and showing unity throughout the community and surrounding counties.

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**Match Short- and Long-Term Goals With the Right Investments**

Tax-Free Holiday Marks End of Summer continued from A1 of "clothing" such as thread, fabric, yarn, and zippers are not exempt. Examples of school supplies and school art supplies that a student will need for their studies are folders, binders, book bags, pencils, notebooks, calculators, lunchboxes, tempera, oil paints, and paintbrushes for artwork. Supplies for businesses are still taxable.

Computers with a purchase price of \$1,500.00 or less (includes laptops and Ipads) are also exempt. However, computer parts (when sold separately), storage media, software (when sold separately), video game consoles, printers and supplies, electronic readers, personal digital assistants, and cell phones are taxable. Also, extended warranties for computers are taxable.

A retailer may not split items normally sold together in order to fall under the sales price threshold. The sales price threshold is based on the original, pre-discount, pre-rebate, and pre-coupon price. There is no partial tax rate for an item valued above the sales price threshold. If an item is above the sales price threshold, tax is due on the entire selling price.

The best part about the sales tax holiday is that you don't have to fight the crowds if you plan ahead. Qualified items ordered by mail, telephone, email, or Internet are exempt if the customer orders and pays for item and the retailer accepts the order during the holiday even if the delivery is late. Qualified items on layaway are exempt if the final payment is made during the sales tax holiday or if they are placed on layaway during the sales tax holiday even if the final payment is made later.

Oh no, what if the three-ring binders that you absolutely love are not in stock and they are backlogged or on backorder? They still qualify. But if you intentionally delay the sale of the qualified item, it is taxable.

After a three-day shopping frenzy to get everything on a school supply list, school clothes, or just something for yourself, it is likely that something will have to be returned. If a qualified item is purchased during the sales tax holiday and exchanged for the same item in a different size or color, that item will be exempt even if the exchange is made after the sales tax holiday. If a qualified item is returned for credit after the sales tax holiday, the new item will be taxed, even if it would have been eligible. If a qualified item is purchased before the sales tax holiday and is returned during the holiday, no sales tax is due if the new item is purchased on the sales tax holiday and eligible for exemption.


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

