From the Other Side of the Desk

With baseball over for the summer for us, we managed a trip out of town this past weekend and the weekend happened to include golf, which is rare since I haven't played golf more than five times in the last five years.

But it was a Father-Son tournament, so I played, just like we did last year and we did better this year, at least according to the local insurance agencies. Backstory: Prior to moving to Hardeman County eight years ago, I was a golf pro. Now, don't go research me on the PGA Tour, I didn't play for a living. I ran tournaments and gave lessons. I won some prize money in my career, but if we put it all together, I couldn't make a house payment with it.

But I never stopped trying to get better. One night, I saw an infomercial for a shoe that was guaranteed to "shave 3-4 strokes" off my game. It told of how the shoe was balanced and would give me a more powerful swing.

Sounded good to me. Forget practice and electroshock therapy/psychoanalysis to cure the yips, I was going to buy myself a game. I got ready to copy down the phone number that would take me from "if he's a pro, anyone can be a pro," to "that guy's really not that bad."

And then I realized: I already had those shoes. So much for that idea.

Citing "strong budgetary performance" and "very strong liquidity" Standard and Poor Global Ratings assigned its A+ long term rating to Hardeman County's series 2016 general obigation bonds. Previously, the rating was A-.

An A+ rating, according to the company, means an obligor's capacity to meet its financial commitment on the obligation is strong.

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain says the rating will help the county reach its goals. "I am estatic at the rating of A+. The current bonds were rated at Awhich makes the new rating a game changer. It could mean points in the bond rates saving the county thousands of dollars. Audits, budgets and tax rates make a huge difference in the ratings. Future budget goals and fiscal policies of the Commission and Budget Committee also played a role," he said, adding that the interview with the S&P representative was quite thorough.

Among the observations re-

leased by Standard & Poor included, "officials ended fiscal 2016 with a projected \$1.3 million surplus, which officials attribute to a \$900,000 reduction in operating expenditures and revenues exceeding budgetary projections. We expect actual operations will continue to outperform the budget, resulting in ongoing strong budgetary performance."

Standard & Poor is an American financial services company and a division of McGraw Hill Financial that publishes financial research and analysis on stocks and bonds. Standard & Poor is considered one of the Big Three credit-rating agencies, which also include Moody's Investor Service and Fitch Ratings.

Standard & Poor's ratings range from BBB to AAA.

Note: The July 24, 2014 issue of THE COUNTY JOURNAL noted a jump for the county from A- to A+, but that was in reference to the Hardeman County Board of Education bond rating.

McCord Steps Down from Board

Hardeman County School Board Member Jerry McCord tendered his resignation to Hardeman County School Superintendent Warner Ross, due to his change of residence out of District 2 that he served since 1998.

McCord's absence will be filled by the Hardeman County Commission, who are expected to appoint someone to the position 3 seat on an interim basis during their regularily scheduled August meeting. The seat will be filled for the remainder of McCord's term, which expires in 2018, during a special election November 8 of this year, as part of the Federal and State elections that will take place on that day.

Petitions to fill the spot are due in the Hardeman County Election Commission office at noon on August 18, 2016.

Early voting in Hardeman County at the Hardeman County Election Commission offices saw 569 vote through four days of voting, which began on July 15. Of the 569, 348 declared they would vote in the Democratic primary, 189 declared Republican and 32 voted only in the county general election.

Early voting in Hardeman County is continuing through July 30, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. weekdays and from 9:00 a.m. to Noon on Saturdays. Election Day is August 4, where the polls will be open at 13 precincts from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. SEE A8 FOR A COMPLETE LISTING.

County-wide, voters will choose from incumbent Josh Pulse and challenger John Vickers for Assessor of Property. Four years ago, Pulse was elected to his first term, beating Vickers and Tracy Byrum in the August election.

District 2 voters will choose a candidate to assume the unexpired term of Donald McTizic, who resigned in January. Gary Barber, who is currently serving in McTizic's stead, is a candidate for the position and will compete with fellow independent candidate Winfred Ray against Democratic nominee Johnny Weems for the District 2, Position 2 spot. The other county commission spot up for grabs is already in the hands of Connie Young, who is running unopposed for the District 4, Position 1 slot.

The Last Holiday of the Summer

For this holiday season, you won't need a turkey baster or fireworks. You'll just need your wallet to save money on school supplies during the annual Tennessee Sales Tax Holiday July 29-31.

Shoppers can buy qualifying items, including apparel, computers and backpacks, without paying local or state sales tax

from 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 29 and ends Sunday, July 31 at 11:59 p.m.

The holiday applies to purchases of clothing and school supplies less than \$100 in value per item and computers less than \$1,500. The Tennessee Department of Revenue's website has a comprehensive list of tax-exempt items, which includes binders, books, backpacks, crayons, paper, pens, pencils and rulers.

Other items, including jewelry, handbags, wallets and watches, are still taxable during the holiday. Sports equipment, cellphones and computer-related items such as printers also get taxed.

Things such as monitors and keyboards, when sold by themselves and not in conjunction with a computer, are not exempt.

IPads and other tablets, are exempt from sales tax. But video game consoles are not eligible.

Internet and sales over the telephone, by email or by mail are exempt from the sales tax but only during the sales tax holiday and the retailer accepts the order during the three-day window. All the same exemptions apply for Internet purchases.

Tennessee is one of 18 states with a tax-free holiday for back-toschool purchases. New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisi-



OUR COUNTY Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

While growing up at the Yellow House, we were acccustomed to many odd home remedies and superstitions. The superstitions were practiced only for fun and play, at least most of them. The home remedies were taken more seriously. One of the home remedy staples around our house was rabbit tobacco. The scientific name being Gaphalium Obfusifolium. It is said that the Cherokee Indians used this plant often and called it Life Everlasting. In the fall we would go out into the fields for our annual rabbit tobacco gathering. When we had a cold or chest congestion, Mom would make a tea from the leaves and we would take a dose for our coughs and whatever. I do know that it actually works. I keep a batch of the leaves on hand even today. While having a bout of the crud recently, I chewed several cuds of the stuff and it definitely stopped my cough and eased my affliction. And many times us kids would slip behind the house and roll some of the leaves in a brown paper wrapper and smoke it. It has been said that smoking the leaves will relieve asthma. Coal oil (kerosine) was used for all cuts. It must have worked, because we never had a tetnaus shot and we never lost life or limb. Many times when we had the croup, Mom would put a drop of coal oil and turpentine on a spoonfull of sugar and give it to us to relieve our malady. There were other remedies that were used which most times worked. They say that half of the cure is believing in the cure itself. I remember seeing a young boy wearing a piece of lead on a string around his neck. This was supposed to prevent nose bleed. Some of the more stranger remedies that I have heard of is to break off the head of a Bessybug and squeeze a few drops of blood in the ear for earache. And a more bizare remedy is to take a few drops of chamber lye and put it in the ear. Now who would dare put anything from a bed pan in his or her ears. Tie a pair of scissors

back of the collar, with a penny under the tongue is supposed to stop nosebleed. For a stye, run the tip of a black cats tail over the eye. Headache, bury clippings of your hair under a rock. Athletes Foot, tie a string around a toe, step in cow manure. Sore throat, tie a dirty sock around your neck. Warts, steal a neighbor's dishrag and bury it in the woods.

Some of the superstitions that some people practice and believe in are odd to say the least. One of them is if you tie a knot in the corner of a sheet, it will stop whipporwills from singing. Some people carry a buckeye in their pockets for good luck and for rheumatism relief. The black cat crossing the road in front of you is said to be bad luck, or walking under a ladder. And there is the seven years of bad luck associated with breaking a mirror. The eating blackeyed peas on New Years for good luck.

One trick I heard about with this practice is that you are supposed to leave three peas on your plate and put them in your left pocket. With all the blackeyed peas that I have eaten all my life, I should have a continuous string of good luck. My Dad believed in planting by the signs. And Mom believed that if you made sour kraut when the signs were in the bowels, that the kraut would turn black in the jars. I saw this happen one time, whether it was from the signs or not, I do not know. One last superstition. One old one says that if the full moon shines on a woman's

navel, she would become, as the nice old saying goes, "In a family way." I'm sure that the moon can affect the oceans tide and serve as a landing pad for our astranauts, but I think that's the limit.

There are literally thousands of home remedies and superstitions. Some of the old home remedies do work and I use them occasionally, but the superstitions, that's another story. But as I mentioned before, to each his own.





Survival and Fundamentals

In late 1991, a Canadian military plane crashed in route to the northernmost settlement on earth, Ellesmere Island. The airplane was supplying personnel changes and food supplies for the long winter. The destination was a radar listening post. The secret facility serves as a first alert system in case of nuclear or other attacks from other countries. All 18 people on the aircraft initially survived. In the next thirty hours, in temperatures dropping to 60 below zero, five of the survivors succumbed to the frigid weather. The pilot refused to put on warmer clothes, instead passing them to others who needed them. He was among the five who passed away.

The Canadian military had to devise a brand new procedure to reach the survivors, jumping out of planes at a mere 700 feet. The survivors made it out because of the heroic efforts of others, but also because they relied on the very basic fundamentals of survival: Stay warm, huddle together, conserve energy and consume steady calories to avoid the body breaking down into full-

on frost bite. I worry that we are living in an age where we don't know the fundamentals of life.

When life gets hectic, when communities resort to violence or countries implode financially, where do the masses turn for hope and survival? In a world saturated with strategies, we seem to have forgotten the basics of life. We have to go back to the abc's. I worry that many of us have never known the spiritual basics. We want what God originally created (harmony, peace, hope, sustained marriage, honesty) without wanting God who created it. It is like being in an arctic crash and denying the need for warmth and food for survival.

At what point do we come back to the simple truths that are deeper than our so-called primal urges. The ABCs of life are founded by the hand that scraped the earth to fashion our first family member. We are sustained by the same soil from which we were first fashioned. As the world crashes around us, our needs become more basic. I would suggest there is no greater need than to seek

I highlight this week a true, yet different story of hardship and grief not through death.

Enter Rie Saito, the author of her autobiography, Hitsudan Hostess. She was born into a family in a northern part of the main land of Japan. She lost her hearing between the age of one and two through illness. She was sent to school by her parents where she learned to read lips and use her voice to speak. She wrote a autobiography to depict her struggle to achieve her independent success as a hostess and using Hitsudan (written communication) with customers in the nightclub wherein she worked. Granted she was not without rebellious aspects in her youth in her junior schooling years according to reports in japantoday.com yet in spite of this and other criticisms from possible competitors in her chosen field, she endured and triumphed.

One of the difficulties suffered by deaf children is the difficulty of learning to speak as this is usually acquired by listening to one's parents and peers. This can lead to a feeling of being isolated and an outcast from their peers or even being bullied. Even the renowned musician, Beethoven, described his life in a letter to a friend as miserable. - 1 small zucchini, halved lengthwise
- 1 red sweet pepper, stemmed, seeded, and quartered
- 1/2 small red onion, cut into 1/2-inch thick slices
- 1/2 pound asparagus, trimmed
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 cups cooked whole grain rotini pasta
- 1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons fresh chopped or dried oregano
- Shredded Parmesan cheese (optional)

Directions

Lightly brush vegetables with 1 tablespoon of the oil. For a charcoal grill, place vegetables on the rack of the grill over medium-hot coals. Cover and grill for 3 to 5 minutes for asparagus, turning once, and about 10 minutes for the zucchini, sweet pepper, and onion, turning once, or until vegetables are tender. Remove and cool slightly. (For a gas grill, preheat grill. Reduce heat to medium-high. Add vegetables to grill rack and grill as above.)

Cut vegetables into 1/2-inch pieces and toss with pasta in a large bowl. Add remaining oil, balsamic vinegar, salt, and black pepper to pasta mixture; toss to coat. Top with fresh oregano and, if desired, Parmesan. Makes 4 servings.



Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

I have had a camera for almost as long as I can remember. I got my first one when I was about 9 or 10 years old and it was my Dad's first camera, an old Brownie Hawkeye. My camera is a part of me, of how I see and remember the world, and it fits just perfectly in my right hand. I love to take photos of all sorts of things - people, events, puppies, flowers, shadows, rain drops on the leaves of a flower, and probably some of my favorites, everyday things. I have always tried to notice and appreciate and embrace things we call everyday things/events.

With this love of photography and storytellers, you can imagine my absolute delight, a few years ago, to learn about a Hardeman County photographer, Miss Henryetta Gray Campbell. Miss Henryetta was born February 27, 1866 and died April 12, 1926 and lived her life in Pocahontas. As a young woman, she took up the fairly new hobby of photography and found that she enjoyed it very much (and, if I may say so,



she was quite good at it). Miss Henryetta, as far as I know, lived all of her life in Pocahontas. She didn't travel much (if any) and she was a reluctant subject for photos herself, which makes this photo of her doubly wonderful. This is where she greeted many visitors, on her front porch, often working on her delicate sewing.

Miss Henryetta would often treat visitors to her homemade lemonade and cookies and other goodies. During World War I, she met every train that passed through Pocahontas carrying troops, and sent with them her best wishes, prayers, and basketsful of homemade treats. She was active in the Presbyterian Church and played the organ for Sunday services for many years. Her photographs give us a priceless look into the life of a small Southern town at the turn of the 1900s (and before). Oh! How I would love to have been able to sit down and talk with her about why she enjoyed photography and the people and places she captured forever with the click of her shutter.

Take a few minutes this week and look around at the "ordinary" things in your everyday life. Take photos of sleeping pets, children with popsicle smiles, the bounty of the garden, or the quiet light at the end of the day. Get really nuts and even have some of your photos printed rather than leaving them in your phone or camera. Remember Miss Henryetta who wanted to capture Hardeman County the way it was in her lifetime, and capture it the way it is in your lifetime today.

TN Health Dept: Get Kids Immunized

Another school year will soon begin for many students in Tennessee and now is the time to make sure they receive the required immunizations for school attendance.

"Vaccines are critical protection for our own children and help keep other kids around them safe from many diseases," said TDH Commissioner John Dreyzehner, MD, MPH. "The measles outbreak we just emerged from in Memphis should serve as a vivid wake-up call and remind us how lucky we are to have vaccines that protect us. Please make sure you and yours have the vaccines you need."

In Tennessee, children enrolling in school for the first time and all children going into seventh grade must provide schools with a state immunization certificate before classes start as proof they have had all the immunizations necessary to protect them and their classmates from serious vaccine-preventable diseases.

Requirements for school vaccinations in Tennessee:

• Kindergarteners and other children enrolling in a Tennessee school for the first time must provide schools with a complete Official Tennessee Immunization Certificate before classes begin. The certificate must be signed by a qualified healthcare provider or verified by the state's Immunization Information System.

• All current students entering seventh grade are required to give the school a limited Official Tennessee Immunization Certificate showing they have had a second dose of chickenpox vaccine (or a history of the illness) and a booster shot for tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis. The

HPV cancer vaccine and first meningococcal meningitis vaccine are also recommended, but not required for school, for this age group.

• Incoming college students in Tennessee public colleges who will live in on-campus housing must provide proof of immunization against meningococcal meningitis after age 16. Most private colleges also have requirements for this vaccine and some schools require it of all new students. Check with your college for details.

"The HPV vaccine is one of the recommended vaccines and we strongly urge girls and boys to get this vaccine because it's an important part of lifetime cancer prevention," said Dr. Moore. "The HPV vaccine is proven safe, effective and long-lasting." (MS) counties. The Bolivar Energy Authority covers 1,350 miles of lines with an average of eight customers per mile.


Coleman Goes to the Library by Anna-Alicia Sails





Investing: A Marathon, Not a Sprint

Next week, the 2016 Summer Olympics begin in Rio de Janeiro. One of the most compelling events is the marathon, a 26.2-mile endurance contest with roots dating back to ancient Greece. It may be that we've kept our interest in the marathon because it can teach us much about life – and it certainly has lessons for investors.

In fact, if you were to compare investing to an Olympic sport, it would be much closer to a marathon than a sprint. Here's why:

Long-term perspective - Sprinters are unquestionably great athletes, and they work hard to get better. Yet their events are over with quickly. But marathoners know they have a long way to go before their race is done, so they have to visualize the end point. And successful investors, too, know that investing is a long-term endeavor, and that they must picture their end results - such as a comfortable retirement - to keep themselves motivated.

Steady pacing - Sprinters go all out, every second and every stride. But marathoners have to pace themselves - too many spurts of speed could tire them out and doom their performance. As an investor, you, too, should strive for steady, consistent progress. Rather than attempting to rush success and achieve big gains by chasing after supposedly "hot" stocks – which may already have cooled off by the time you hear about them - try to follow a long-term strategy that emphasizes diversification among many different investments. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can reduce the impact of market downturns that primarily affect one type of asset, it can't guarantee success or prevent all losses.)

Ability to overcome obstacles - When sprinters stumble or fall, they are finished for the race; there's simply not enough time to recover, so they typically just stop. But over 26 miles, a marathoner can fall and - providing he or she is not injured - get up again, compete and possibly even win. When you're investing for the long term, you have time to overcome "mishaps" in the form of market volatility. So instead of dropping out of the "race" and heading to the investment sidelines, stay invested in all types of markets. As you near retirement, and you have less time to recover from market downturns, you



The Unites States Navy ship, USS Shiloh (CG 67), is a Ticonderoga Class Guided Missile Cruiser currently forward deployed out of Yokosuka, Japan. It is named, of course, for the bloody Civil War battle fought at Shiloh, Tennessee, on April 6 and 7, 1862. CITY OF GRAND JUNCTION FAIR HOUSING LAW

Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 prohibits discrimination in the sale, rental, and financing of dwellings based on:

- Color
- Religion
- Sex
- National Origin

The Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988, which became effective March 12, 1989, expands the coverage of Title VIII to:

- 1. Prohibit discrimination in housing on the basis of:
 - a. Disability
 - b. Familial Status
- 2. Strengthen the administrative enforcement provisions of Title VIII.
- 3. Provide for the award of monetary damages where discriminatory housing practices are found.

The following actions are considered to be discriminatory under the Fair Housing Law:

- 1. Refusing to sell, rent, deal, or negotiate with any person.
- 2. Discriminating in terms or conditions for buying or renting.
- 3. Advertising that housing is available only to persons of a certain race, color, religion, sex, national origin, or of a specific family size.
- 4. Denying that housing is available for inspection, sale or rent when it really is available.
- 5. "Blockbusting" persuading owners to sell or rent housing by telling them that minority groups are moving into the neighborhood.
- 6. Denying or making different terms or conditions for home loans by commercial lenders, such as banks, savings and loans, and insurance companies.
- Denying to anyone the use of or participation in any real estate services, such as broker organizations, multiple-listing services or other facilities related to the selling and renting of housing.
- 8. Refusing to allow reasonable accommodation to be made for a person with disabilities.

Making Plans at Lone Oaks by Calley Overton



Hardeman County citizens came together at Lone Oaks Farm to hear from Senator Dolores Gresham and Senator Randy McNally along with Lone Oaks director Dr. Ben West. The main topic of the afternoon was the future of Lone Oaks and its educational opportunities.

The purchase of Lone Oaks by the State of Tennessee had strong legislative support thanks to Senator Gresham. Both her and Senator McNally were influential in the effort. Some in Congress originally had doubts about the concept for Lone Oaks, but Senator Gresham was adamant that Sen. McNally and others come to see it for themselves. In reference to Senator Gresham and her efforts with Lone Oaks, Senator McNally said, "She led us down here to see it and it was so beautiful and the location was really great. It sold itself after that and she did a great job leading us down to see the great potential. Lone Oaks ties into so many things: education and the outdoors. It combines so many great things."

The anticipation in the room as Dr. West discussed the future of Lone Oaks was palpable. The foremost plan for Lone Oaks is for it to become a nationally recognized state of the art 4-H conference center. Other aspirations for the farm include becoming a regional adult conference center, having an inn on the property and being a place for family vacations and leisure, hosting weddings and other special events, and of course having many educational opportunities.

Some of the conceptional activities on the farm include an equestrian center, national 4-H museum, antique tool museum, zip lines and a ropes course, a climbing tower, wildlife and natural resources demonstrations, bicycle trails, hiking and a cattle program. The TWRA has recently agreed to \$2.6 million dollars in funding for a shooting range at Lone Oaks.

Another step forward is that in October, all of the superintendents for schools in Southwest Tennessee will be coming to Lone Oaks to check out educational opportunities for their students. On the direction Lone Oaks is taking, Mr. Scott Ledbetter the original owner, spoke for he and his wife, Kathy, "We could not be more thrilled with the plans that Dr. West is starting to put in place. We think Lone Oaks is going to go to heights that neither I nor Kathy have ever dreamed of, but it's in the direction that we always wanted. So we're excited."

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain also took a moment to address the steps Hardeman County has taken forward. Along with Lone Oaks and the TWRA grant, the City of Bolivar has also recently been approved for a \$50,000 tourism grant and a \$28,000 grant for renovations for the courthouse.

During the question and answer portion of the afternoon, Senator McNally took questions from those in attendance. The concerns the attendees had ranged from broadband growth in the area and roads to health care and hospital closings in small communities. The senators also took a moment to discuss reductions in taxes in Tennessee that they were a part of. In closing, Senator Gresham stated, "I am so honored to have Chairman McNally come and visit Fayette and Hardeman County today. He is a tremendous leader in Tennessee and we are blessed to have him."




