Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

Remembering the anniversary of men landing on the moon (July 20) reminds me not only of that incredible event, but of something that happened just four years later in the summer of 1973 that has become a great story within our family.

Every summer we would take a car trip and explore some part of America. Some trips were long and took us to far-flung places out West; other places were closer to home like Tennessee's magnificent Great Smoky Mountains. These trips are some of my most cherished memories of growing up as we were encouraged to explore and learn as we traveled, but we enjoyed lots of time together as a family and had picnics many days in some pretty breathtaking places - in the middle of Yellowstone and overlooking the Gulf of Mexico just to mention a couple.

Mom and Dad always tried to get my maternal grandmother, Alma (Smith) Kiestler to go with us but she always had a reason not to...except for one year. Somehow or the other they talked her into going on a 2-week trip with us that included trips into deep West Texas, Mexico (from which, she was fairly certain we would never find our way back), and the Grand Canyon (where she kept a death grip on my brother as she was absolutely positive that he would fall into the canyon, never to be seen again). She talked about how much she enjoyed that trip for the rest of her life.

While each day and each stop along the way, she had stories to tell, it is one afternoon that became the stuff of family legend. We were driving across New Mexico one July afternoon. It was shortly after we had stopped for lunch and everyone was in the quietafter-lunch-zone in the car as we traveled across the New Mexico desert, a place of beautiful desolation. My Granny was in the backseat with my brother and me, and out of nowhere she said, "That's where



those fellas were." Someone asked her "who?", and she said, "those fellas who thought they were on the moon. They just got lost flying around in the dark and landed here in the middle of this desert and picked up a bunch of rocks and came back. They didn't go to the moon!" She was graveyard-honest-to-goodness serious, and kept saying "they just landed that rocket in the desert and thought it was the moon!"

Now being good children of all things space-related, my brother and I immediately launched into the 5,237 reasons why we believed that they did in fact land on the moon and most certainly not in the middle of the New Mexico desert. Mom and Dad were also trying to explain to her why the New Mexico desert was not the moon landing spot. Granny finally silenced the cacophony in the car by saying, "I know they did, that out there looks just like those moon pictures, and that right out there is where they landed."

We never, ever in her entire life ever convinced her that the moon landing was real and that the astronauts were not lost in the middle of the night in the New Mexico desert.

For the record, y'all, she thought TV wrestlin' was real, but that is a story for another day.



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Sunrise: Helping Children by David Coy

Children's concept of loss whether by death or other causes depends upon many different circumstances. This week we will examine children between the ages of two to four years of age. Their response to grief depends upon different criteria. At this age they view death as reversible. They may show an intense but brief response. Their life is totally involved with the here and now, very much in the present. They may be prone to ask questions repeatedly.

Children in this age group need an understanding tone of voice and demeanor from those adults in their life when a traumatic loss has occurred. It would be helpful to provide an open invitation for them to express what they think and how they feel in whatever way they can, even if they use drawing or some other way of expression. They need to know that our posture with them is one that says, we are together in happy times as well as difficult times of sadness and there are no secrets. It would be reassuring to them if we had been through something similar and could give them the comfort that they and we will take care of one another through all of this.

Children do grieve, just not the same as others. Remember, we are all individuals and will mourn differently, but at this age they are still developing into the Mr. or Miss that we will come to know when they are in their teens. Many factors affect their response: gender, age (mental, emotional development), religious and ethnic customs, and relationship with the deceased or involvement with the loss, prior grief experiences, circumstances of the loss, and etc. Children feel the pain of loss or they radiate the feelings of their guardians. They often express their grief through behavior. Their grief may be internalized or be displayed in a cycle, going from periods of what seems to be normal behavior to periods of irritable or sad behavior. Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin



The latter part of August at the Yellow House was sweltering hot like it is today. In weather like this, as I mentioned before, immediately after breakfast, Mom would begin covering the four eyes of the cook stove with black iron pots and skillets in preparation of preparing the daily meals before the temperature reached it's peak for the day. The house was filled with the aroma of the contents of those cooking utensils which kept me hungry all day. Fresh cabbage, peas, beans, potatoes, corn, and usually fatback simmered all morning long. At dinner time (lunch), the family sat down to a rib-sticking, delicious lunch of the produce from the garden. We knew that what we had for dinner would also be what we had for supper, (dinner), served at room temperature.. It was just too hot to fire the old stove up for the evening meal. After dinner, Mom would group the bowls of food in the center of the dining table and cover them with a white table cloth where they sat untill the supper meal. We never suffered any effects from E Coli, botulism, ptomaine poisoning or such. Many days in the summer months, the stove had a fire in it all day long while Mom canned all the vegetables and fruit to store for the winter months. She canned everything from corn on the cob to pork sausage. I don't see how she stood the heat, but I guess that we were all somewhat accustomed to it. I remember a lot of times, I would walk into the kitchen where she was cooking. She would stop, wipe her brow

stand in this hot kitchen". Later in life, when she had air conditioning in her kitchen, I would ask her if she rememberd saying that phrase a lot. She would just smile and nod her head. Moms are so precious and giving, most times not thinking of themselves in order for the sake of their families. Mom would spend hours peeling and slicing apples to dry in the sun, and shelling peas. She would put the dried apples in a flour sack, along with a pod or two of red pepper, to ward off any wandering insects. She also stored the dried peas the same way. She canned some of the best spiced apple quarters and chow chow that I have ever eaten. Sometimes after the canning season was over, I would ask her to open a jar of this and that. She would tell me that we had better save it for some cold snowy day in the coming winter. And on one of them "cold snowy days in winter," she would open the jars up and prepare a mouth watering country meal for all the family. As I've mentioned before, we did not have any indoor plumbing, but we did have some outdoor plumbing. Our kitchen sink was outside the back door of the kitchen nailed to the wall. Being the innovative sort that country people are, Dad attached a funnel shaped tin bucket to the outside wall on the left of the kitchen door, attached a long metal pipe to the bottom of it and ran the pipe out across the yard into the edge of the cotton patch. You could open the door and pour the dish water into the bucket and it was carried away to the cotton patch, No sewage bills here, and

it made a great place to dig big fat earthworms for our fishing trips. My youngest sister Joyce and I usually had the dishwashing chores. We used two dish pans for the process. One for washing and one for rinsing. I was the dryer. I just never could get into dishwashing. I did get into a lot of trouble while drying the dishes. I couldn't resist the temptation of splashing a little water in sister's face, or popping her with the dry towel. And she was happy to see me get into trouble. While I was getting my punishment, she would stand aside and giggle, which made me want to do it all over. I remember a few times that prior to my punishment with the switch for a nono that I might have done, I would run around the house with Mom and the switch steadly a few paces behind. I would gain ground and bend over, look under the house (no underpinnin) to see where her legs were located and play cat and mouse with her. That worked for awhile until my oldest sister came out the back door and they cornered me between them, where I gave up. The whooping was twice as bad at these times because I got my deserved licks for the deed I done, and extra licks for running. So goes the life of a country boy.

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
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When your children leave home and you become an "empty nester," you'll probably make several adjustments in your lifestyle. But how will your empty nest status affect your financial

Everyone's story is different, involving a range of variables. But here are a few issues to consider:

Insurance – If your kids are through school, your mortgage is nearly paid off and your spouse has accumulated a reasonable amount of money in an employer-sponsored retirement plan, you may not need life insurance to replace income or pay off debts. However, you might start thinking about other goals, such as ensuring your savings will last your lifetime or leaving a legacy to your loved ones or a charity. Life insurance may be able to help

Downsizing – Deciding whether to downsize your living space isn't just a financial decision – it's also a highly personal one. Still, downsizing can offer you some potential economic benefits. For one thing, if you still are paying off your mortgage, a move to a smaller place could free up some of your monthly cash flow, which, again, you could use to boost your retirement accounts. Furthermore, if your home has greatly appreciated in value, you might make a sizable profit by selling. (If you are single, you may be able to exclude \$250,000 of the gain on the sale of your home; married couples may have a \$500,000 exemption. Some restrictions exist on this exemption, though, so you'll need to consult with your tax advisor before selling.)

Estate plans - Years ago, you might have made various arrangements in a will or a living trust that dealt with taking care of your children if something should happen to you and your spouse. For example, you might have established a trust and directed it to make payments to your children at certain times and for certain purposes, such as education. But once your children are grown and have left your home, you may need to review and update your estate plans.

Keep in mind, though, that "empty nester" status is not always permanent. You've no doubt heard about "boomerang" kids who return home after college and stay until they can afford a place

If your children become "boomerangers," even for a short while, will it greatly affect your financial situation? Probably not. However, if your children are going to drive your car, you may want to be sure that they are listed on your car insurance. Also, if they are going to bring guests to your home, you might want to consider an "umbrella" insurance policy, which typically provides you with significantly greater liability protection than your regular homeowners policy. (In fact, it may be a good idea to purchase an umbrella policy even if you don't have grown kids at home, as this coverage offers you wide-ranging protection from potentially devastating lawsuits that could arise from injuries on your property or through an auto accident in which you are involved.)

You may have mixed feelings about becoming an empty nester, but, like most people, you will adjust. And by making the right financial moves, you can get off to a good start on this new phase



short in three games in pool play before bowing out in the second round of the consolation bracket. Their lone win was a 13-5 victory over Greenville, MS.


The 6U team lost three pool play games, two of them to perennial powerhouse teams and then dropped two straight in bracket play.

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


Tennessee Black Caucus to Meet in Whiteville

2017 USDA COC Election Deadline Nears

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Executive Director for Tennessee, Tyeisha Samples, today reminded farmers and ranchers that they have until August 1, 2017, to nominate eligible candidates to serve on local FSA county committees.

County committees are made up of farmers and ranchers elected

by other producers in their communities to guide the delivery of farm programs at the local level. Committee members play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA. Committees consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month or as needed to make important decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs, county office employment and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide there are over 7,700 farmer and ranchers serving on FSA county committees.

"The August 1 deadline is quickly approaching," said Samples. "If you know of a great candidate or want to nominate yourself to serve on your local county committee, go to your county FSA office right now and submit the nomination form. I especially encourage the nomination of beginning farmers and ranchers, as well as women and minorities. This is your opportunity to have a say in how federal programs are delivered in your county."

To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, and reside in the local administrative area where the election is being held. A complete list of eligibility requirements, more information and nomination forms are available at http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.

All nominees must sign the nomination form FSA-669A. All nomination forms for the 2017 election must be postmarked or received in the local FSA county office by August 1, 2017. Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by Nov. 6 and are due back to the local USDA Service Centers on December 4. The newly elected county committee members will take office January 1, 2018.
