As I've mentioned before, the family that lived at the Yellow House was poor. I did not know it because we were one among many families. We were never without an abundance of family love, friends and music. All of which I know helped sustain us during that period of my life. I always believed in hoping, dreaming and having an optimistic outlook on life. I was constantly dwelling on these three things when I was growing up as the saying goes. Another thing that we had was pride, which a certain amount of that is healthy to any individual. The lack of having everything has helped me in appreciating all good things that come my way, from the biggest to the smallest.

Getting something new at the Yellow House was far and few between. I remember that Dad finally got the money to buy a new battery powered radio. A Silvertone which he ordered from Sears, Roebuck & Company. That purchase was a God-send to us, as we all loved music so much. We only got to listen to certain programs though, which were mostly music. If Dad or Mom was out of the house, I would turn on the radio. If they came back in, they would tell me to turn it off, that we had to save the battery. The unit used a huge battery about sixteen inches

long. After a few months use of the battery it would begin to get weak and Dad would put it in the warm oven of the cookstove for awhile which was supposed to recharge it. I would listen to the songs and music on that old radio and dream that someday someone would be listening to me through that wonderful and amazing object. Then came the day that Dad saved enough money to purchase a new bedroom suite which he ordered from Sears also. Mom and Dads bedroom was transformed from a Route 66 motel room to a suite in Waldorf Astoria Hotel. Lila, Joyce and Juanita spent hours in front of the big oval mirror which was tall enough to mirror the whole body, primping, prissing and posing as if they were on a fashion models runway in Paris, France. I have to admit that I halted in front of that glass quite a few times myself practicing my John Wayne stance which I believed would just drive the girls wild.

One day Don and I engaged a rock throwing fight with the two brothers who lived across the railroad tracks. It was close combat fighting near our front porch when one of the enemy threw a railroad rock through the door to the bedroom where the new bedroom furniture was. It hit the new headboard so hard that it left a large indention in that shiny piece of wood that was still there when the bed seen its better days. Some little things that I remember that made me happy was the day that Mr. William Joyner gave me a stack of Outdoor Life and Field and Stream magazines. I read them from cover to cover and imagined that I was in the deep woods of Alaska on an elk or mountain goat shoot. I have always been an arm-chair hunter and fisherman and loved nature and the outdoors. These magazines had an ad in them from the Northwestern School Of Taxidermy. I was amazed that a person could take an animal, stuff it keep it. I talked my Great Uncle into purchasing me a course in taxidermy, which he did. I took the course and passed it. I did not have the money to buy all the materials it called for, but I made do. I did mount a river otter, dried a huge crawfish, and mounted a screech owl that I found dead. I put him on a cedar branch and set him on top of the Silvertone radio. A few mornings later, I woke up and the head was gone from the critter.

About a week later, I found the head in a cotton row middle out from the house. I suppose a cat did it, but I never knew. After mounting a river otter, I gave up my dream of being a world renowned taxidermist with mounts displayed in the Smithsonian Institute. I still hope and dream and appreciate any blessings that come my way, whether large or

Submit Your Common Acreage Information Just Once by Gene Davidson

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) requires farmers and ranchers participating in our programs to submit an annual report on all cropland use on their farms. Crop insurance agents for providers approved by the USDA Risk Management Agency (RMA) also require these reports to ensure accuracy with your premiums and when you file claims. Yet for years, farmers and ranchers have entered the same basic common information from their acreage reports at these two different places.

No longer. Now, farmers and ranchers can provide the common information from their acreage reports just once - - either to FSA or to their crop insurance agent - - and that common information will be securely and electronically shared with the other.

This new process is part of US-DA's Acreage Crop Reporting Streamlining Initiative (ACRSI), an interagency collaboration to streamline the collection of common information to better serve our customers.


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More than 93 percent of all annual reported acres to FSA and RMA now are eligible for this common data reporting, and USDA is exploring adding more crops. Although you must still visit both offices to validate and sign their respective acreage reports, complete maps or provide program-specific information, the common data from your first-filed acreage report will now be available to pre-populate and accelerate completion of the second report, eliminating redundant reporting. In the coming months and years, USDA will continue to build upon this framework. In fact, already we anticipate that some insurance providers will allow reporting to include precision agriculture geospatial data from a producer's planter along with regular crop and

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


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

Small-Business Owners Must Protect Their Futures

If you're a small-business owner, you think a lot about today. Is your cash flow sufficient ... today? Are your products and services competitive ... today? Are you confident in your marketing and advertising efforts ... today? And because you are so focused on today, you may be neglecting a key aspect of tomorrow – your retirement. Specifically, do you have a good retirement plan for yourself?

your plans for the business will obviously greatly affect your financial situation when you retire. Whether you want to transfer the business to another family member, sell it outright to someone else, or possibly just wind it down, you'll need to plan ahead and consult with your legal and tax advisors.

Given that your personal finances are so tied up with your business,

However, you can take steps now to help ensure you can enjoy a comfortable retirement. You have access to a variety of retirement plans appropriate for small-business owners, including these:

Owner-only 401(k) – This plan, also known as an individual or a "solo" 401(k), is available to self-employed individuals and business owners with no full-time employees other than themselves or a spouse. As the owner, you can contribute to your plan as both an employer and an employee; your total contribution limit for 2016 is \$53,000, or \$59,000 if you are 50 or older.

SEP IRA – If you have just a few employees or are self-employed with no employees, you might consider a SEP IRA. You'll fund the plan with tax-deductible contributions, and you must cover all eligible employees. (Employees themselves cannot contribute.) You can contribute up to 25% of compensation, up to \$53,000 annually. (Contributions for a self-employed individual are limited to 25% of compensation minus one-half of self-employment taxes.) And you can fund your SEP IRA with many different types of investments. Plus, you can establish a SEP IRA for 2016 until April 17, 2017.

Defined benefit plan – Pension plans, also known as defined benefit plans, have become less prevalent in recent years – but you can still set one up for yourself if you are self-employed or own your own business. This plan has high contribution limits, which are determined by an actuarial calculation, and as is the case with other retirement plans, your contributions are typically tax-deductible.

SIMPLE IRA – As its name suggests, a SIMPLE IRA is easy to set up and maintain, and can be a good plan if your business has fewer than 10 employees. Still, while a SIMPLE IRA may be advantageous for your employees, it's less generous to you, as far as allowable contributions, than an owner-only 401(k), a SEP IRA or a defined benefit plan. For 2016, your annual contributions are generally limited to \$12,500, or \$15,500 if you're 50 or older by the end of the year. You can also make a matching contribution of up to 3% of your compensation.

You need to establish a SIMPLE IRA between Jan. 1 and Oct. 1 of any year. In fact, if you'd like to set up any of the retirement plans we've looked at, don't delay. The sooner you open your plan, the more years you will have to contribute – and, as you know, time is often an investor's best friend.


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


In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by a brother, Jewell Wiggins and a daughter, Sandra Kay Holloman.

SUMMERTIME...

Attracting and Hosting Butterflies by Carolyn Tomlin


Driving down an off-the-beaten path in rural West Tennessee, a driver swirled and stopped immediately in front of me. After hitting my brakes, I realized it was my fault. I should have read her bumper sticker which stated: I BREAK FOR BUTTERFLIES.

Ranging in colors from yellow, black, blue, and shades in between, you see them on country roads—suburban gardens—to sunny nature centers. Driving on the back-roads, butterflies (Lepidoptera) flutter above Queen Anne's Lace, Black-Eyed Susan and Purple Cone Flowers that grow along the roadside. Regardless of how often they appear, one never tires of their beauty. These marvels of nature fly by day and rest with their wings erect.

The ideal way to attract butterflies," says Carol Lovell-Saas, Director of the Biophilia Nature Center in Elberta, Alabama, "is for gardeners to provide both host and nectar plants. For example, Monarchs need milkweeds (any plant in the genus Asclepias), but every butterfly species has a plant or group of plants that it specifically needs for its caterpillars to eat. Zebra Swallowtails only lay their eggs on Paw Paw trees. Gulf Fritillaries prefer Passion Vine. Long-tailed Skippers choose native Wisteria and other bean family relatives."

The primary host plant for the Monarch is the Common Milkweed, which grows in some sections of Tennessee. However, the rest of the state contains a long list of native milkweeds. If this plant does not die back in winter, cut back to the roots. Otherwise, the plant carries a disease than can harm Monarchs. New growth is excellent food for the Monarchs. With the overuse of chemicals and the milkweed that may produce a disease, the Monarch needs our help.

Nectar plants that grow well in the state include those above and native Honeysuckle, milkweed,



Dwarf zinnia, Lantana, Mexican sunflower, Blazing star, Joe-pyeweed, and Phlox,

Often wildlife enthusiasts ask: How do I find out the best host and nectar plants that attract butterflies? Start with your local Extension System, website for local universities or colleges, and search for local clubs or interest groups that focus on botany, wildflowers, butterfly gardening, or other nature-related clubs.

Aside from providing host and nectar producing plants, there are additional concerns Tennessee gardeners can control. Amanda Maples, director of the Purdy Butterfly House at the Huntsville Botanical Gardens suggest filling bird baths with moist sand. "If a butterfly tries to drink water from a birdbath and accidently falls in, they drown. Place saucers of

moist sand or clean water daily around your plants. Smooth rocks or stone also provide a warm resting place." Any ideas for over-ripe fruit? Instead of discarding, slice bananas or apples and offer these tidbits for munching. Butterflies not only receive moisture, but the fruit provides energy. A common problem affecting butterflies and non-harmful pests are chemicals and pesticides used to control weeds and insects. In my garden, I use full-strength white vinegar to manage grass and weeds near nectar producing flowers. This will not eradicate tough foliage, but will help control without the use of dangerous ingredients.

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

When I was growing up, even the mere mention of getting a "switchin" was enough to strike the fear of God in a young heart. I remember the very first time my otherwise sweet Granny Kiestler gave me a lesson in the finer points of switches and such. Apparently that lesson has not carried down to current days as a news report last week told us that a 70-year old grandmother in Arkansas was arrested after police received a phone call from her 11-year old granddaughter that she was going to be "beaten/hit with a stick".

Upon hearing this story I uttered the words of one of my literary heroes, great Southern writer, and all-around find American, Mr. Lewis Grizzard, and exclaimed, "do what???" (Just for the record, Lewis wrote a story or two about switchings at the hands of his Southern, normally gentle and kind, grandmother. Wonder what he would have thought of this story?)

I don't remember what caused my Granny to utter the phrase, "Missy (her nickname for me) go out in the yard there and bring me back a switch. I am going to switch your britches." (For those unfamiliar with this colloquialism, switching ones' britches does not necessarily refer to the pants or garment one might be wearing, but includes the region entirely south of one's' waistline all the way to the tips of your toes. That area is "britches".) She certainly looked serious enough sitting on the front porch of her old house. In my utter naiveté, I went to the closest tree and pulled off the smallest little branch I could reach and walked it over to her. Not my best move.

My, and I must stress this – my normally sweet, kind, gentle, loving, Granny didn't say anything. She got off of the porch and walked over to a small peach tree in the yard and it looked to my young eyes as if she pulled the entire tree up from the ground, and calmly said, "Missy, when I tell you to get a switch,



next time you be sure to get me a switch!". (From my unofficial polling of late, it seems that the peach tree switch has been and remains the universal choice of switches among Southern grandmothers). I can report that on that day, I did not have my britches switched, but I learned a lesson or two that day. First off, I should have been minding my Granny; secondly, when she asked for a switch, I should just calmly walk to one of her peach trees, say a prayer, and pull off a reasonable size switch, and return it to her with the utmost expression of contriteness for whatever I had done.

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


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
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Dean State: Germantown versus Bolivar

ees in Tennessee can claim that kind of success. She cares about the county, the funding, and collections." Current collections for the 2015 year are at 94.47%, but Powell is confident it will end around 98%, as in the case of 2014 and most years prior.

Sain also gives credit to Chancery Clerk Janice Bodiford. "We have tax sales every year, and not every

county can claim that," he said. "She is a superstar in the business."

Individual departments deserve thanks as well, says Sain, noting that each department in Hardeman County came in under budget in the 2015-2016 fiscal year, helping the county bank almost \$800,000. Sain expects

the 2016-2017 budget to put \$900,000 more in the county coffers. "I am very pleased with our departments. They have been very frugal with the county's money."

According to Powell, the county fund balance stood at \$2,777,000 on June 30, 2016 versus \$1,918.000 the previous June 30. Also according to Powell, the balance was less than \$1,000,000 on June 30, 2014.

Since Sain took office on September 1, 2014, the county has not raised property taxes, nor has there been




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



The class delved into the six primary camera adjustments: aperture, shutter speed, ISO, lens focal length, focus, and color. Like any art form, photography takes training and discipline and, at the very least, word recognition. After learning what all of the scary words meant, the class moved to application. The class of five followed Mr. Ginsburg around the Courthouse area as he demonstrated taking portrait shots while talking through the process so the students could adjust their








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Cox and Fornara to Wed

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

Summer is a wonderful time to be outside. There are many activities that we enjoy in our community such as: gardening, swimming, walking, camping, and watching sports but we do not enjoy those pesky insects!

When insects bite people they release a form of saliva that can cause irritation. For some people their bites may

cause a small irritation that clears away in a few days but others may have an allergic reaction to their sting. The following can be used to repel insects: Vick's Vaporub, cinnamon leaf oil, clear liquid vanilla extract mixed with olive oil, citronella soap and catnip oil. Most insect repellents that we use contain deet, which should be applied with caution because many studies have found it to have harmful effects. Planting marigolds around your yard works as an insect repellent because the flowers give off a sent that bugs do not like. Using a house fan can ward off insects if you're having a get together in your backyard.

Herbs and other natural agents can help soothe insect bites, such as: aloe vera, calendula, cinnamon, chamomile, lavender, Neem oil, tea tree oil, basil, peppermint, lemon and lime, and using ice or heat. Placing a cooled tea bag over the bites can also help.

For several bites on your body: soak in a bathtub of warm water with 2-3 cups of apple cider vinegar. Dissolve baking soda in a bath and soak for 30 minutes. Finally, a paste of baking soda, water, and witch hazel can be applied to the bites.

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


