lown at the Col Round two of the Hardeman County Commission's battle of the budget is set for June 20 in the Hardeman County Courthouse Courtroom.

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain broke an 8-all tie to pass the 2017-2018 Hardeman County Budget on the first reading on May 16.

Mayor Sain broke the tie after the debate that centered on the county schools funding. Sain wanted to shave four cents off last years school budget due to a decrease in students in the county, but the schools have asked that the county only cut two cents to bring the rate back to \$1.48 from \$1.50.

"The county is recovering from a financial crisis. The budget committee has been very successful meeting goals by cutting expenses without asking the schools for concessions. The past two years they could have cut over 15 cents of the school tax rate, but chose not to. This year the budget committee asked the county to cut four cents and the schools to cut four cents. The county has complied," said Sain.

Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross said the schools are sympathetic to the plight.

"We recognize there are challenges at the county level, and we want to work with the coun-

tv Court ty, so we developed our budget at \$1.48," he said. The budget passed in May did not give a tax rate, but Sain says the tax burden will not be in-

> creased. "We have no plans to raise the overall rate of \$2.55," explained Sain. "Every surrounding county has a lower tax rate. We need to compete in West Tennessee. That means keeping the rate low and living within our means. Our committee is smart, conservative, and has been proven very successful in the past three years."


Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman


Hello to all! Well I hope everyone is enjoying the Dollar General Store as much as I am. It is so convenient to be able to go get what you need without having to drive too far.

Leverage and Weight by Jimmy Sadler

Recently I built a large headboard, seven feet by seven feet. It required pulling old pallets apart and building a frame to reposition the finished pieces. Pulling the things apart, as some of you may know, is not that easy. It takes some time, patience and sweat. In the end, the thing that made the most difference was to get a heavier hammer with a longer handle. The distance gave it more force and made the job much faster. The even more laborious job of pulling nails followed. The key that, I found, was to find a crow bar of decent length. The extra distance created more leverage for a much easier and faster pull. Once again, when nailing them back down to the new frame, I found a hammer with a longer handle made each swing more productive. It seems that, although distance created greater force with weight, it is quite useful at times like these. In our walk as Christians, our heaviest problems sometimes lie in our past. We can allow the weight to make everything we lift harder or we can ask God to help us use it to leverage our new-found strength under our daily struggles.

I started thinking about some of the tragedies in my life. I was reminded of God's promise to use them to reach out to others. The deaths of family members and early depression in life created open doors for me to empathize with others in hard situations. Now that the sting of those times has subsided, I can leverage the weight of those hardships and others to lift others and help them through their journey.

I remembered a family I mentioned in an earlier writing. This couple, a minister and wife, were traveling to Wisconsin to celebrate the birthdays of two of their children. Scott Willis ran over a brace for a tractor trailer mud flap. The piece of metal jammed into the gas tank and caused a massive fire that engulfed the inside of the van. The couple made it out, as well as their thirteen year old son. The parents were burned but alive. Tragically, the van held five more of their children who did not escape. The thirteen year old son died that evening in the hospital. As I relay this event, tears are streaming down my face. I cannot begin to get an inkling of an idea how I would cope with this event. The dad beat at the van windows to no avail, realizing there was zero chance anyone could have survived the inferno. Still in shock but also in faithful trust. Scott told his wife "God has prepared us for

this."

God had led both of these two to His Son, Jesus Christ. The kids trusted and followed as well. The parents knew their fate was wrapped up in Christ. Still, I wondered how the distance of time might have affected the minister's faith. It was no doubt shaken. More than a decade later, he still will not drive with children in the car. He is back to ministry now, and has shared the story of Christ with so many along the way. It seems that God allowed their trials to be a catalyst, a leverage for God's Word to penetrate some hardened souls. Indeed, their faith has challenged me. If they can make it, then certainly I can.

Don't let tragedies, failures or offenses toward you cast an overpowering shadow over your life. Don't resign yourself to allowing time and distance to harden your heart, but use it to leverage and use the weight in a way that will bring about good in an already heavy laden world.

Sunrise: Control by David Coy

Grief is one of the most difficult pains a person will endure. It is unique to every person and it takes work to recover successfully through mourning. The goal is to live through the deepest valley of sorrow, realizing there is light and hope at the end of the valley. If this sounds bombastic, it is not. I have met with many who felt certain of being in the valley of despair and did not see any way out. We all are creatures of habit and live in a perceived world that we are in control of our surroundings. When we find ourselves in the valley of sorrow,

we come to understand at least in part, that we are not in control as much as we think. Someone said recently that in life we should focus on what we can control and not despair with what we cannot control. This is good advice.

The Psalmist records, "I cannot eat, I weep day and night" (42:3). They who grieve deeply, often do not eat or sleep yet they live on, even if they think they are all alone. When such sorrow comes upon us, we grasp after anything that can make sense of what has happened. This is similar to the discussion of Solomon in Ecclesiastes. He examined human wisdom with folly and foolishness. He came to understand that it was like chasing after wind. So is trying to control circumstances beyond our control or blaming ourselves (with assumed guilt) as if we could have brought about a different outcome. I have had clients tell me that as well. We cannot control every event in life. We can and should control what is in our power and seek support when and where we cannot.



Kenneth was an avid genealogist, frequently doing cemetery look-ups, a nember of APTA and Hardeman County Arts Council.



Financial Gifts – and Tips – for New Graduates

It's Graduation Season again. If your child is graduating from high school or college, you have reason to celebrate. But what should you give to your newly minted diploma holder?
