Unapproved expenditures and a lack of information made readily available to council members were among the complaints lodged by city council members against the process used to build Pleasant Run Park in Bolivar. "I agree with the park, but there is a right way

and wrong way to do it. And this is the wrong way," said Bolivar City Councilman Julian Mc-Tizic of the almost 30-minute discussion of the efforts on Stevens Road in the Country Club subdivision of Bolivar. The dissension followed a 6-1 vote in favor of

the expenditure of up to \$50,000 more toward aspects of the park project. The approved outlay will be used for restrooms and a disc golf course for the park.

we spent \$3,000 moving the restroom to the park," adding that he was under the impression anything more than \$2,500 needed to be approved by the council and that the funds were being spent from the Parks and Recreation budget. "I wasn't aware that was the process."

Mayor Stevens answered that only two gravel sources were close enough to deliver and that the city had gone with the least expensive in each case. Stevens then said the relocation of the restrooms was also at a great savings to the city.

"We tried to get people to bid on it (moving the restrooms) but he (Logan House and Building Movers) was the only vendor that moves houses

"We've got a great park and it's going to be great "We spent \$9,800 on gravel for the park and if we ever get through with it," added Stevens.

Councilman Larry McKinnie questioned the legality of not bidding out projects when it is believed there is only one vendor, directing his question to the city attorney, who affirmed that the \$2,500 limit was in effect but an exception in the statute did allow for a single source supplier to be used without going through the bidding

"It would be nice if we know this beforehand. We are here to represent our people. We need to be able to explain what is happening. And when only a certain group of people know, I feel blindsided," said McTizic. "I'm asking for transparency on the front end."

"You have transparency," replied Stevens. "All you have to do is ask for it."

### Williams Selected for Hall of Fame

Former Bolivar Central Basketball Coach Marvin Williams will be inducted into the TSSAA Hall of Fame in early April.

Williams coached boys and girls teams beginning in 1959; coached at Morris Chapel, Ramer, McNairy Central, and Bolivar Central; coached seven teams to the TSSAA State Tournament; Bolivar girls' finished runner-up in 1976 and were state champions in 1977 (Class AA), and in 1978 (Class AAA); nominated for National Coach of the Year in 1978; coached on collegiate level at Jackson State Community College and Austin Peay State University; retired in 1990.

Marvin Williams began his athletic career at Whiteville High School where he averaged 25 points per game. He was educated at Freed-Hardeman College, Bethel College and Murray State University.





# **Hidden Clover Cupcakes**

# Ingredients

- 1 box white cake mix Green gel food coloring
- 1 box chocolate cake mix
- 3 cups white frosting 3 cups green frosting
- Assorted sprinkles

# Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Prepare white cake mix according to package directions. Tint prepared white cake batter with green gel food coloring until desired color. Line a 15x10x1-inch rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper, lightly coat paper with cooking spray. Spread green cake batter evenly on baking sheet. Bake for 20 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool completely in pan on wire rack. Use a 1- to 1 1/2-inch clover-shape cookie cutter to cut 24 clovers from the cake. Prepare chocolate cake mix according to package directions. Line twenty-four 2 1/2-inch muffin cups with

paper bake cups. Place 1 tablespoon batter in each cup. Carefully stand a clover in each cup. (Face them all the same direction in the pan so you can remember which way they face after they're baked). Top with 1 to 2 more tablespoons of batter, covering the clover completely. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool completely. In a piping bag fitted with desired tip, alternate filling the bag with white and green frosting to create a

marbled effect. Frost and decorate cupcakes as desired.





# Hearts for Eternity by Jimmy Sadler

"Yet God has made everything beautiful for its own time. He has planted eternity in the human heart, but even so, people cannot see the whole scope of God's work from beginning to end" (Ecclesiastes 3:11, NLT)

There is a wonderful song about a man living out his last few breaths. He has lived a life on the streets and is looking forward to death. "We were built for glory. We were made to last.

God formed our feet to walk golden streets when this hard life is passed. It's time to make your peace with God cause this life's over fast" (Built for Glory, Made to Last by Terry Taylor).

Some men claim to embrace the notion of our lives being temporary, that we live, die and exist no more. Although I respect the fact that these people are hoping to align their world views, I think there is something of eternity intrinsically planted within us. We react to the deaths of people with a sense of lives being cut short, of going "before their time." If we are temporary beings of chance, then there really is no concept of being granted any time, whether brief or extended.

It saddens me that many in the scientific community consider our mortality to be absolute, an end to a closed system. The studies of life after death take on a skeptical tone, attempting to discredit the notion instead of understanding it. I won't say all, because there are many in the medical community who see evidence of a transition from one life to the next. There are a good number in the field of astronomy who marvel at what they consider to be God's design. Still I wonder about this concept of eternity being planted in our hearts. If this is true, which I believe it is, then any defiance toward a concept of life after death is simply a sinful repression of what is within us.





# Star PT Hardeman County Sports Notes

Rick Barnes, head coach of the University of Tennessee men's basketball team, will speak at Freed-Hardeman University Thursday, April 27. FHU's Sports Advisory Council will host the dinner and speech to raise funds for the university's intercollegiate athletic programs.



# First Responders Hear Cautionary Tale

Six months after speaking to the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department and Bolivar Police Department, Kimberly Schlau of Lebanon, Illinois returned Thursday, March 9, to speak in a Public Safety Seminar presented by the Bolivar Fire Department. This was Kimberly's first time to speak on behalf of a fire department and the seminar was open to all first responder agencies and officers, fire departments, volunteer firefighters, rescue squad members, ambulance department, emergency management agency members,

and elected officials. Kimberly Schlau began her speaking career after her daughters, Jessica and Kelli Uhl, were killed by a speeding Illinois State Trooper. He was driving at a reported speed of 126 miles per hour to respond to an accident scene which was already secured by first responders. He was also talking on his personal cell phone, and sending out email instant messages from his patrol computer 2.5 seconds before he lost con-



trol of the vehicle and crossed the median, driving through the top of Kimberly's daughter's car; killing both girls instantly.

Her presentation covered the timeline of events leading to that day and throughout, the investigation, and the emotional toll this horrendous tragedy has taken on her and her family. She shares her story in hopes that she can impact officers on a personal level and remind them of the tragic yet avoidable consequences of unnecessary high speeds during pursuits and responses.

There was not a dry eye in the building as the path Schlau has chosen forces her to constantly relive the immense tragedy. But the mother said she finds strength by turning her anguish into advocacy. "It's helping me introduce my daughters to people who otherwise would never know them, and I will always be very proud to carry their legacy for them." Story and photo by Jessica Simmons.

### **Veteran Preference in Hiring Bill Moves to State Senate**

in the House for their support of this legislation to help the business community hire veterans and family members of veterans. This was indeed a group effort beginning with the Montgomery County Veterans Coalition and the hundreds of veterans who descended on Nashville last month to push for passage. That support made the difference."

It now moves on to the Senate for a vote.



Continuing with our articles on how farming/gardening have changed through the years, Frankie and I dropped in for a short visit with Mr. Clyde Beshires. He was more than happy to compare farming in his younger days to today's methods. He remembers the horse and buggy days. His mother and father married when they were age 13 and 16 respectively. Because finances were slim, his family lived with his grandparents for a few years. He remembers helping his grandfather hooking traces on the mules at 4 years of age. He stated that they rode to church in a wagon and when his grandfather let him hold the reins, he felt like he was flying a plane. After high school, he served in the Army in World War II. At the age of 24, he married the prettiest girl he had ever seen. He began his life of farming. He remembers farming with 4 mules. He would take the mules and wagon and ride to the Silerton depot to pick up fertilizer that came in railroad boxcars. In 1949 he bought his first tractor, a B Farmall. Everyone told him that one couldn't plow crops with a tractor. Later the local Co-op or the cotton gin would deliver fertilizer and seed to your farm. Even though he had a tractor, he used a two-row planter pulled by mules. All the harvesting of the cotton and corn was done by hand. Mr. Clyde said he loved farming and he believes that most farmers have the love of the land in their blood. Even though farming is a gamble, he always trusted God for a good harvest. A bale of cotton per acre was considered good then as compared to three bales an acre today. Cotton sold for five cents a pound for a 500-pound bale. He has now turned his farm and equipment over to two of his sons. He has lots of good memories of his life of farming. They always had a big garden and had plenty to eat.

Spring is in the air, even if it's not quite there on the calendar. This year, as you shake off the cobwebs from winter and start tidying up around your home and yard, why not also do some financial spring cleaning?

Actually, you can apply several traditional spring cleaning techniques to your financial situation. Here are a few ideas:

Look for damage. Damage to your home's siding, shingles and foundation can eventually degrade the structure of your home. Your investment portfolio is also a structure of a sort, and it, too, can be damaged. Specifically, you may have deliberately constructed your portfolio with an investment mix - stocks, fixed-income vehicles, cash instruments, etc. – that's appropriate for your goals and risk tolerance. But over time, your portfolio can evolve in unexpected ways. For example, your stocks may have grown so much in value that they now take up a larger percentage of your holdings than you had intended, possibly subjecting you to a higher degree of risk. If this happens, you may need to rebalance your portfolio.

Get rid of "clutter." As you look around your home, do you see three mops or four nonfunctional televisions or a stack of magazines from the 1990s? If these items no longer have value, you could get rid of them and clear up some living space. As an investor, you also might have "clutter" - in the form of investments that no longer meet your needs. If you sold these investments, you could use the proceeds to fill gaps in your portfolio.




