Bolivar to Host Congressional Medal of Honor Winner From the Other Side of the Desk

About eight years ago, I got invited to play basketball with a group of adults in Bolivar.

Major General (ret) James Livingston, who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for his service as a Marine, will be the keynote speaker for Bolivar's annual Vietnam Veterans Celebration, which will be held at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, March 4, at the Bolivar Army National Guard Armory, located on Highway 64.

Livingston received the Congressional Medal of Honor for his role as an infantry company commander at Dai Do, Vietnam, during a three-day grinding battle of attrition in which the 2nd Battalion, 4th Marine Regiment, numbering only 800 men, victoriously battled 10,000 or more enemy fighters. The account is described in the book, "Noble Warrior."

The day's activities will begin with a parade honoring Vietnam Veterans at 9:00 a.m. starting at the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center and will conclude at the armory.

In addition, General Livingston will speak to students at Bolivar Middle School, joined by students from Toone, Hornsby and Whiteville on March 3. Afterward, he is scheduled to go to Middleton High School where he will speak to middle school and high school students.

"This is a rare opportunity for our area to have a man of this caliber, with this history ... a true hero for our nation, to not only speak to our students, but also to be the speaker for our city's celebration." Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens said. "You don't get these opportunities very often and our city is excited and honored to host such a great individual."



Most days I feel like I'm still wandering in the wilderness, hoping for a peek at the promised land before I'm buried in obscurity. My head leads my heart like Moses led the half-hearted nation. The cloud and flame are my only home. I am grateful for the manna. God has provided for me daily and has kept me in want and need while also supplying those needs. He has given fresh water where there should be none, showing himself true while also keeping me from a life of gluttonous plenty. Our lives arc from personal goals to hopes and dreams for our children, and that is certainly where I am.

The world can be a harsh place. I often wondered why God has me on the anvil so often for my kids to see. I finally embraced the truth that troubles require faith, an eternal gift I can pass down to my daughters. One of the most revolutionary concepts you can embrace is that God makes decisions based on His eternal perspective. He allows us to suffer that rebellious decisions we make, but He doesn't abandon us. He allows us to suffer hurt, pain and the effects of being a fallen human. Some are because of our

bad decisions while many injuries are the results of fallen humanity.

There is often not a direct correlation between our problems and our sinfulness. Jesus made that clear. He upended my understanding of cause and effect faith. We are taught that the hallmark of religion is "if... then." Although it is true that what we think, do, love becomes a good bit of our journey. But Jesus said to a man born blind that it wasn't because he or his parents sinned. Think about that. It wasn't because of his sin or even because of others that he suffered a chronic visual darkness. Instead, it was so that God could be glorified in the miracle. Read that again, Jesus said that some harsh realities that hit our lives are to bring glory to God. Faith is built on God working in the middle of and in spite of the muck.

One of the phrases in second Corinthians chapter 4 holds out this notion of being perplexed but not despairing. I love that the word perplexed was used instead of confused. Perplexed is an intricate type of worry and wonder that can lead quickly to depression. A

complex mystery without a simple resolution. I'm encouraged that God said we could be there because I have been there. Many of the emotions presented in this passage sums up that of a brother in Christ who tragically lost the love of his life last year. Perplexed is what most people of faith felt. "OK, I know somehow God can see good come of this, but seriously, how?"

It's not a token faith where if you have a problem then God fixes it. That's more of a vending machine world view. We have to think and believe on a higher plane. If God has allowed wonderful people to suffer extraordinary loss and hardship, then perhaps I am among the faithful. I may feel lost or abandoned in the wilderness, but I always keep sight of that plume of truth and fire that has led others along the journey.






Sunrise: Silent Killer 1 by David Coy

It is estimated 46 people jumped in the year 2013 and 98% do not survive from the fall. It is encouraging that the percentage of attempts has decreased thanks to some very caring people. According to the Bridge Rail Foundation, a group dedicated to stopping suicides from the golden gate bridge, estimate that more than 1600 people have jumped to their death since the bridge opened in 1937. According to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention, suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the United States and that approximately 44,000 or more people die each year from suicide. In Tennessee it is estimated that 15 for every 100,000 people committed suicide in 2015 and that number appears to be increased from previous years.

This is very alarming, especially for families who are coping with the memory that some one they love chose this very final expression of helplessness and hopelessness. One common question is why did we not see the signs if there were signs? Another question is how do we as a general public become more alert to the symptoms of someone close to us and who is seriously depressed, perhaps despondent and has feelings of helplessness and hopelessness? According to NAMI, more than 90% of people who kill themselves have a mental illness/disorder. The CDC reports that drug use, alcohol and opiates found in the system of people who killed themselves comprised one third in 2009. Thus drug abuse is a risk factor. 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

Women Must Act to Overcome Financial Challenges







TBI Begins Inquiry on Allegations

The Tennessee Bureau of Investigations collected data from the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department on February 27 to begin their criminal investigation into allegations of abuse by a Hardeman County Sheriff's Deputy.

"The employee in question, Catherine Ware, violated purchasing policies of the county and falsified documents during her time with us, and I recommended that she be terminated six months prior to her actual termination," said Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, who declined to comment on the case itself.

Ware was let go in June of 2016 due to insubordination and poor job performance, according to Sain.

"No one has been charged with any crime or wrongdoing. At this point, it is merely allegations," added Sain. "I commend the Sheriff for contacting the District Attorney's office for a TBI Investigation of these allegations. Normally, the accuser asks for an investigation, but in this instance, the Sheriff wants the truth to come out."



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

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

When I was growing up, I remember hearing the older folks say that if you didn't like the weather around here, just wait a minute and it would change. The past couple of weeks have certainly proven that to be true – we had cold, wet, windy, warm, and sunny all in the space of only a few days. March 20 is the official first day of spring....don't tell the Bradford pear trees and the buttercups around Hardeman County... they are going to show off their beauty when they are ready.

This photo shows that the weather has long been a topic of conversation around these parts, whether it was discussed sitting around a pot belly stove at the old general store or posted on someone's Facebook page. This photo is from April 22, 1918 and shows the aftermath of a pretty big hailstorm. The photo was taken at the corner of Main and Market Streets in Bolivar. That's the old Bank of Bolivar building in the background and just down the street (far left hand side of the photo) is Nuckolls & Ingram Livery Stable.

There wasn't any Doppler rader or storm tracking apparatuses back then. There were farmers and a few others, I'm sure, who watched the storm clouds. April 22 was on a Monday that year; the streets look pretty

deserted, so I wonder if the storm was later in the day, or if everyone had just enough time to get inside before the storm blew through? We don't know if the storm did any damage or just produced a lot of rain and hail. About this time Bolivar had 10 or 11 dry goods (general) stores, two drug stores, a newspaper, the bank, the livery stable, several churches and other businesses. It's easy to see in the photo that the roads were dirt, and those dirt roads, especially in rainy weather, made travel pretty miserable. The repair and upkeep of the

county's dirt roads was a never-ending battle. Only four years earlier the county had voted to open its first public high school, and there were still many private schools and academies scattered all over the county. A public phone exchange had been in place for 17 or so years by this time and the switchboard for Bolivar was located in Mr. P. F. Wilkerson's Bolivar store, located on Warren Street behind the courthouse. Those old phone lines were probably lit up after a hailstorm like this one.

The weather, it seems, has always been a topic of conversation, and here in West Tennessee, it always gives us all plenty to talk about. If it's clear where you are, hold on a minute, it will probably change. At least this time of year we all know what to expect; we expect to keep umbrellas, sweaters, and flip flops handy... because we may need all three before the day is over. Enjoy our West Tennessee weather, y'all.

Mr. Evelyn C. Robertson Jr. is a native of Whiteville, and is a 1959 graduate of Allen-White School, as are his two brothers, wife, and aunt. He obtained his Masters Degree in Administration and Supervision and a B.S. Degree in Political Science and History from Tennessee State University, Nashville, TN. Seven of his twelve years in education

as a teacher, coach, and principal were spent at his beloved Allen-White High School. From his time at Allen-White, he went on to write the book: Education and the American Dream: The Allen-White Story 1905-1970 which coincides with the fiftieth anniversary of his graduation. The book presents a historic and inspiring chronicle that describes the struggles, challenges, sacrifices, and triumphs of one Tennessee community in search of a common vision in education and achievement. In addition, Mr. Robertson has forty years as a Psychiatric Hospital Director, Mental Health Commissioner for the State of Tennessee, Superintendent of the Nat T. Winston Development Center, and as an Economic and Community Development Executive Director for a Regional Economic Development Agency. In 1986, Mr. Robertson co-authored the book "Grains of Sand- A History of Western Mental Health Institute". Retiring in 2007, Mr. Robertson continues to give





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back as a life member of the NAACP, TN State Alumni Association, The National Education Association, Ancient Egyptian Arabic Noble Mystic Shrine Temple 169, King Solomon Consistory 132, 100 Black Men of West TN, the Deacon Board of El Canaan Baptist Church in Whiteville, and he Chairs the CMRA Board in Nashville. Mr. Robertson has been married for forty-five years to his wife Hugholene Ellison Robertson, with whom he shares two children, Jeffery and Sheila.

Local food bank Loaves and Fishes delivers hundreds of food boxes to the needy in Hardeman County each Thanksgiving and Christmas.


Supported by citizens and local businesses, the needy are identified through church leaders and other vetting procedures to make sure less people go without meals during the holidays.
