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Allegations against a Hardeman County law enforcement member were dropped after an investiga-

tion by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI). On February 23, the Office of the District Attorney General requested that the Tennessee Bureau

of Investigation (TBI) initiate and

conduct an independent investiga-

tion into allegations made against Hardeman County Chief Deputy Sheriff Billy Davis by former HCSD employee Katherine Ware by the filing of a civil Verified Complaint for damages signed under oath and filed on February 17, 2017, in the Hardeman County Circuit Court.

The complaint was served upon

the defendant, and the Hardeman County Attorney, Charles Cary, made a formal request that an independent criminal investigation be conducted. According to the civil complaint, Ms. Ware alleged that sometime during last June, 2016, and while employed at the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department, Chief Davis committed offenses

which included official oppression and a sexual offense.

Davis was immediately placed on administrative desk duty and had no arrest powers, according to Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen.

Bolivar FD Has Clean-Up Day

The Bolivar Fire Department held its Spring Firewise Clean-up

March 16-17. Due to the recent fires in Gatlinburg, they wanted their main areas of focus to be residential with heavily wooded yards where disaster could strike and spread quickly.

Co. Highway Board Expanded

The county commission on Tuesday night voted to add an advisory committee to the county highway board for the remainder of 2017.

Non-voting county commission members added to the committee were Chris Bell, Elmer Cobb, Jim Daniel, and Vincen Morrow.

The four members will join current superviors Kenny Pulse, John Mitchell, Jr., and Matt Knight at meetings that are also attended by Highway Superintendent David Sipes.

"Hardeman County has a highway administrative system of electing three officials to administer another elected official," explained Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain. "It has worked in the past, but it's not working now. It has caused disruption, employee issues and a poor working environment. Both sides have recommended changing or eliminating each other. I chose to appoint four commissioners to serve on the board of supervisors with the elected supervisors to mend the fences and report back to me and the commission with recommendations, if any, to settle the issues. These are all friends of mine and we all want to serve with the best of our abilities."

In November of 2016, the three supervisors floated then withdrew a plan that would have sent a private act to the State of Tennessee that would have eliminated the Supervisor of Highways as an elected official, giving the supervisors power to fire and hire for the position.

The resulting debate and disagreement were the catalyst for the expansion that was approved by 100% of the commission, Sipes, and the three supervisors on March 21.

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Sipes' term will expire August 31, 2018.

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

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


JAMES ANTWINE



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
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ELIZABETH "LIZ" MCKINNIE MARCH 22, 1939 ~ MARCH 2, 2017



tive file in this matter, which includes the alleged victim, witness, and subject statements, as well as other documentary and video evidence related to Ms. Ware's employment at the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department, her termination from employment, and related county audit information. After a complete review and consideration of the above referenced investigative report, District Attorney

General Mike Dunavant has made a decision not to charge Mr. Davis or any other person with any criminal responsibility for the alleged offenses in June, 2016. The investigation reveals that there is not sufficient or credible proof of Mr. Davis' criminal intent to engage in

sexual contact with the alleged victim without her consent. Therefore, there is insufficient evidence to establish the essential elements of the alleged criminal offenses or to proceed with any prosecution in this matter. Further, there is not a strong likelihood of conviction in this case if charged.

Accordingly, the Office of the District Attorney General is closing its file in this matter, and is requesting that the TBI do the same with regard to the criminal investigation into the allegations against Mr. Davis.

However, the District Attorney General has requested that Special Agents with the TBI continue to make their investigative file available, pursuant to proper and lawful subpoena or court order, to the parties in the pending civil proceeding. If new information or evidence is revealed during that civil proceeding which indicates criminal activity was committed by any person in the 25th Judicial District related to these matters, the District Attorney General will request that the TBI reopen the investigation.

Failed, Overlooked or Called?

One odd reality is that we often find it harder to see someone else go through that pain. We question God more often when it is someone we love going through the valley.

If God is not aloof, uncaring, indifferent or simply oblivious, then what option does that leave for why He allows so great a suffering to fall on some. I'm not entirely settled on this option, but it is leaning more heavily every day toward what I sense God is up to. First, I have to dispense with the unbiblical notions. If God has failed us, then the history of mankind is only a precursor for the darkness to come. What we sense as failure does not line up to God's idea. God is God, He does

what He wants, and He chooses for some odd reason to include us in His plans. He cannot be labeled a failure simply because He does not meet our expectations of how we think things should be. God made us. We flow from His imagination and are sustained by His will. It's irrational to believe the God who stretched out the heavens by a simple command "let there be" has been tripped up by any discord in his creation.

I've been driving a lot lately and a thought often comes to me. I pass by countless human beings in different cities that I never knew existed, I wonder how God could ever keep up with each of them. Is it possible, even understandable, that God could not give his undivided attention to everyone? He did give angels tasks of looking after Humans, could it be that He has someone on the job and He simply manages it all? The problem is that, once again, the created being is trying to grasp something outside the known Universe. We cannot comprehend God's ability to simultaneously hear and care for His entire creation. We are like Him, created in His image, but we are only reflections. Let's take into account what scripture tells us in regards to this question. "What is the price of two sparrows--one copper coin? But there's no quick fix to this problem, and any caller who claims otherwise is likely being deceitful. Encourage your parents to discuss their debt situation with an honest, professional debt counselor or a financial advisor.

Finally, if your parents don't already work with a trusted, qualified financial professional, introduce them to one.

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
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

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

I LOVE trains. I love the rumble and the clack of the wheels on the rails. I love old steam engines that hiss and spit and belch smoke as they go by. I love stories and songs about trains. I love to think about where the train is going and where it's been. This love of trains is in my DNA; my Great-grandfather Lanier was a telegraph operator for the railroad and my Dad's first job involved trains.

As in so many other areas of our county, the trains first came to Bolivar around 1856 by way of the Mississippi Central Railroad line, which would eventually extend to Jackson, Tennessee. The railroad was later consolidated with the Great Northern Connection which would become the Illinois Central line. This photograph shows a train in all its marvelous, steam-engined glory coming into Bolivar in the 1940s. The train's whistle, that marvelous, low whistle was a constant in the background of the town's daily activities.

I have always loved the dingding-ding sound of the guards coming down to stop the traffic going across the track. I have noticed many kinds of emotions over the years watching folks who have had their day stopped while the train passes by. I've seen excitement, indifference, irritation,



awe; my brother says I'm the only person who actually likes to get stopped for the train, and it is true. No matter the weather, I roll down the window and listen to the sounds and take them in, and of course, I wave to the engineer.

I remember when the trains came through Bolivar and I was sad when they left the town (I still am). When I learned to drive, I remember coming down Market Street just there by the Kentucky Fried Chicken where the track came across the street on its way down by the depot, and you had to just tap those brakes or you'd hit the rails too hard. For years after the tracks had been taken up, I would still tap the brakes out of habit when I drove over that spot.

I am glad there are still places in

through, where little kids and old men can stand by and wave at the train and be enthralled by its sights and sounds. I'm glad there are places where you can still hear the lonesome whistle cutting through the night sky either reminding you of why you had to leave or stay or of someone or someplace down the line you want to see. I love trains because they can carry you somewhere faster that you could go on your own, but you have to stop and be still and enjoy the ride to do that. I love the smoke and the black coal dust from the old steam engines, and the elegance of machinery that big and powerful that runs along on impossibly small rails.

I sure do love trains, y'all.

Unlike humans, fires usually travel uphill much faster than downhill. The steeper the slope, the faster the fire travels. Fires travel in the direction of the ambient wind, which usually flows uphill. Additionally, the fire is able to preheat the fuel further up the hill because the smoke and heat are rising in that direction. Conversely, once the fire has reached the top of a hill, it must struggle to come back down because it is not able to preheat the downhill fuel as well as the uphill. Keeping these residential areas out of the hazard zone by holding events like the Spring Firewise Clean-up will help to minimize damage in hopes that it is only being done as a safety precaution.

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




