CareerCast, an online research firm, has released their worst 10 jobs annual research study. Putting the "Speed" in Speeding Ticket

Bolivar Police Department has added a new recruit to their fleet; on board computers. The new E-ticket system, set to roll out once all officers are certified on the program, should cut traffic citation times and reduce time spent completing administrative tasks at the end of shifts providing officers more time on patrol and increasing presence in our community. While BPD has always used dispatch to run drivers licenses, tag numbers, insurance information, stolen checks, wanted persons, etc., to validate credibility to drive and other issues, that will no longer be the case. Traffic stops are implausibly dangerous for an officer, and can be for a citizen parked on a highway as well. A typical traffic stop to make initial contact, wait while dispatch runs all the numbers, gets back to the officers with results, write multiple tickets-if that's the case, and return with tickets can take 15-20 minutes or longer. With the new E-ticket system, an average traffic stop should only take 4-5 minutes, increasing officer safety. This new program will also allow BPD to do all their reports from their patrol vehicle, instead of coming back to the station and spending hours processing paper-

work, he or she can remain out in the field intensifying police existence which diminishes crime rates dramatically. "We're always looking for ways to move forward, lower crime, and stand out with a positive presence on the streets. We currently have 22 officers on staff which is a great number for us. When we're full like we are now, we're able to stay in a neighborhood for a set number of hours and rotate; so, we just went through and assigned four zones for the city. Typically, when we have a full shift, we'll have one officer in that zone and a fifth officer who's a roamer. The roamer is back up so no one else should have to leave their zone to go back up another officer. When we're working like that, that's when we're really getting somewhere. This new E-ticket system can only improve upon those ideals and in keeping our officers safe," said Chief Pat Baker. As always, all new systems are being paid for by the Bolivar Police Department. In the six years since Pat Baker has been Police Chief, the Bolivar Police Department has been completely self-sufficient using no tax payer dollars to fund any need, no matter how big or small, that has been purchased.

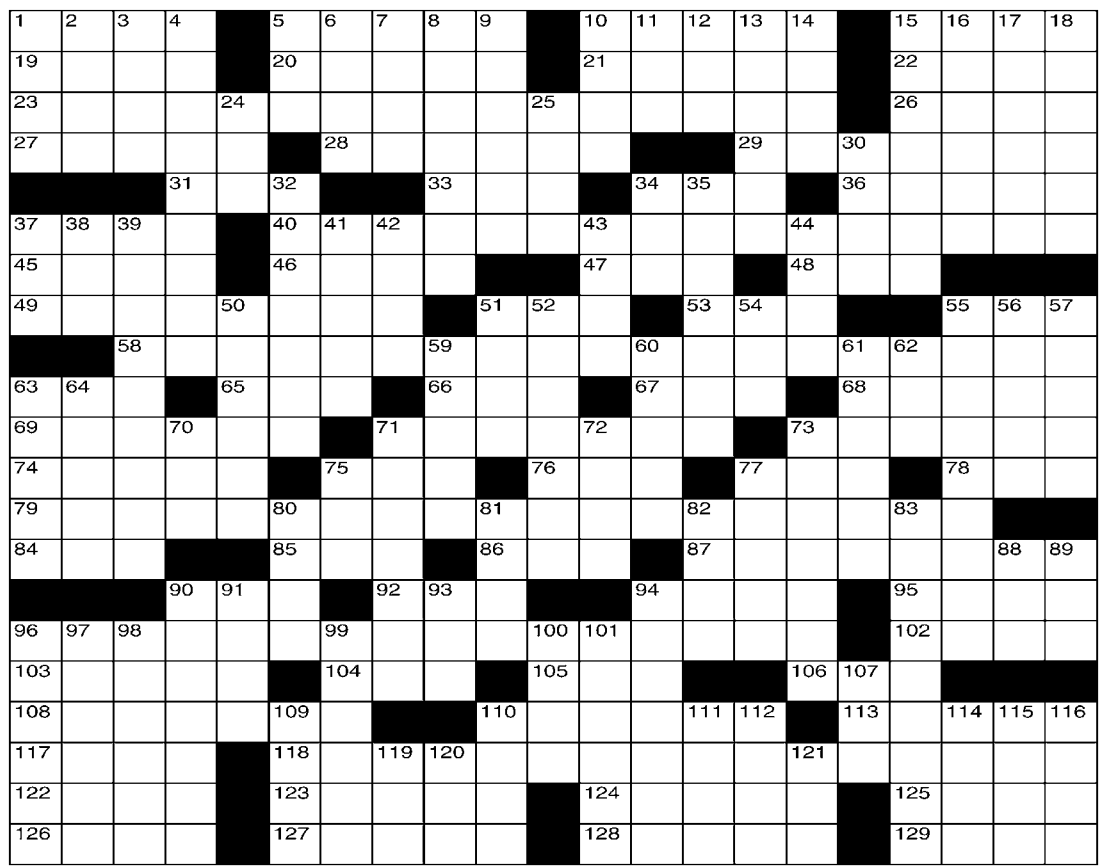

Cinco De Mayo Churros

- Ingredients**
- 1 cup water
 - 1/3 cup butter
 - 2 tablespoons packed brown sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon anise seeds, crushed
 - 1 egg
 - 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
 - 1/2 teaspoon anise extract
 - Vegetable oil for deep-fat frying

Directions

In a medium saucepan combine the water, butter, brown sugar, and salt. Bring to boiling over medium heat. Add flour and anise seeds all at once, stirring vigorously with a wooden spoon. Cook and stir until mixture forms a ball and pulls away from the sides of the pan. Remove from heat and cool for 10 minutes. Add egg, almond extract, and anise extract, beating mixture well with a wooden spoon.

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F. Transfer mixture to a decorating bag fitted with a large open star tip. Line a large baking sheet with waxed paper. Pipe 4x1-inch logs onto the prepared baking sheet.

In a deep saucepan heat 2 inches of oil to 375 degrees F. Fry logs, a few at a time, in hot oil about 2 minutes or until golden brown on both sides, turning once. Drain on paper towels. Keep warm in oven while frying the remaining churros.



Smart Investing Can Help You Keep Moving Toward Your Goals

It's Kentucky Derby time again. Even if you're not much of a horse racing fan, you might appreciate all the Derby's pageantry – the mint juleps, the women's beautiful hats, the singing of "My Old Kentucky Home," and so on. But if you look beyond the hoopla, you'll realize just how much work it takes to put on such an event. And the efforts of one group in particular – the jockeys – may be able to provide you with some lessons in life – and in investing.

Here's another trait shown by Kentucky Derby jockeys: vision. Jockeys must be able to spot the spaces they need to go through to gain the position they want. In other words, they see where they want to go. As an investor, you need this same ability. To illustrate: What do you want your retirement to look like? Will you stay close to home and volunteer? Will you travel the world? Will you even open a small business? You need to envision your goals if you're going to achieve them.

Strategy is also important to jockeys. They all want to win the race, but they employ different methods. For example, three-time Kentucky Derby winner Calvin Borel's strategy usually involves riding his horse on the rail at the inside of the track – so much so that his nickname is "Bo'rail." As an investor, you need a strategy that's appropriate for your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. Such a strategy will involve choosing a suitable mix of investments, reviewing your portfolio's progress at regular intervals, and making changes as necessary.

Finally, jockeys need knowledge. Is the track in good shape? How has the horse been behaving lately? What's the weather going to be at post time? To be a good investor, you also need plenty of knowledge. You'll need to pose some questions about individual investments you're considering: How will this investment perform under different market environments? Will this investment fit well into my portfolio, or do I already have others similar to it? Is this an investment I can hold for the long term? And you'll also need to learn about yourself as an investor: What is my tolerance for risk? Am I fully considering all my goals, such as college for my kids, my own retirement and the type of legacy I'd like to leave? There's no shortage of questions for active investors to ask – and the best investors never stop learning.

You can learn a lot from Kentucky Derby jockeys. By applying some of their skills and habits to your investment activities, you can keep moving toward your goals – and you won't even have to run in circles.

A Thank You for a Ballpark

This past season, the Hornsby Elementary School hosted the Hardeman County Middle School baseball tournament for the first time.

The field, the dream of Bill McDaniel of Hornsby, began in 2010. He tells the story:

In 2010, the idea of an HES baseball team became a reality. My grandson, Kaleb McKinnie, indicated that he and his friends at HES would like to form a Middle School baseball team. I presented this idea to the HES principal, Mr. Ted Kessler, and he was in total agreement. With the assistance of the HES parents and grandparents, a team was organized. We also invited the Toone Middle School students who were interested to join us. Mrs. Watson, Toone's principal, agreed to our invitation.

Getting access to fields for practice and games was very difficult. Therefore, HES thought it would be logical and convenient to have our own field. When I presented the idea to Mr. Kessler, he said, "Go for it!"

The Board took the proposal under consideration, and I was invited back for a second meeting. I thanked the Board for their approval and the process of constructing an HES ballfield began. I would like to recognize all who assisted with this major task.

The major monetary donors (power hitters) were: Lynn and Lisa Hodge; Tony Hooper Sawmill; Timmy Hooper Sawmill; Hornsby Baptist Church, and the Hornsby PTO.

Actual construction of the field was done by the following: Hornsby Fire Department - burning grass on the vacant lot in preparation for the field construction; City of Bolivar - with the unanimous approval of the Council and Mayor, all materials became

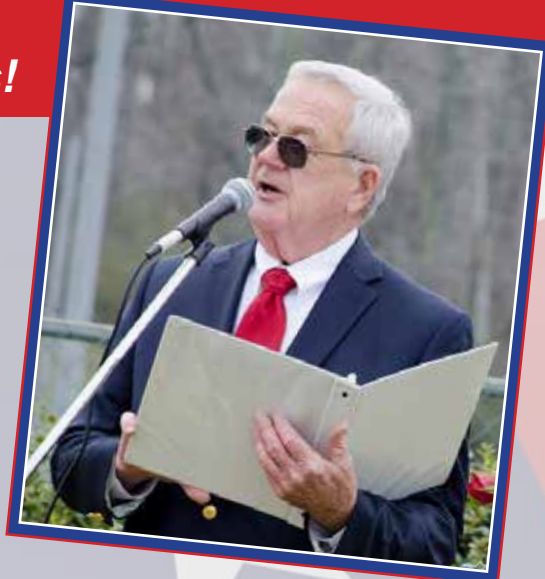

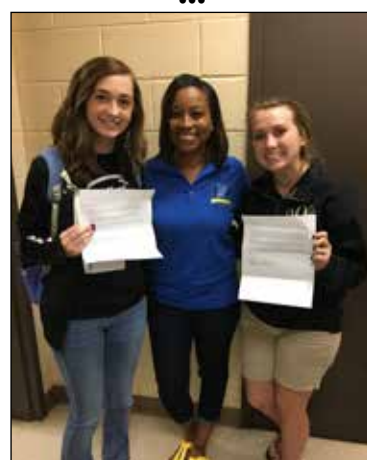
able to achieve his goal, my family and I are hoping to help other children attend college by opening a scholarship in remembrance of JaVarrie "Jojo" Robertson.

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

With all of the spring planting and plowing going on it always makes me think about how cotton was and still is part of our county's agricultural history. At one time every town in the county had at least one cotton gin and harvesting and picking the cotton was everyone's job. Schools would "turn out" for 4-6 weeks every autumn so children could help during cotton pickin', a practice that many of you in our county remember as you worked those long rows, picking boll after boll of cotton.



One of the busiest cotton gins in the county in the years following the Civil War is the one shown in this week's photo. The little community was first known as Berlin, but when the railroad tracks for the Memphis and Charleston Railroad came through the area the tracks were laid just north of the Berlin townsite on land that belonged to Mr. Burrell Sauls and his son-in-law, Berry Futrell. The men donated 15 acres of their land to the railroad so that a railroad station could be built, and the town on Saulsburry came into existence, while the little town of Berlin began its slow decline.

Railroad traffic in the town was busy shipping produce, animals, and products to Memphis and other areas across the South. Saulsburry became one of the leading cotton markets in West Tennessee and North Mississippi. Wagon trains with anywhere from 15 - 30 wagons would make the journey to Saulsburry from as far away as Tupelo, Mississippi (about a 3-day trip at the time). At one time there were so many wagons and farmers and folks with the railroad coming into town that Mr. Roger S. Clark operated a very profitable livery to house wagons and horses, and I'm guessing an occasional person, during their trip to market in Saulsburry. I can almost

hear the hiss and the clang of the steam engine and the voices of the men as they made their deals and loaded up the trains to carry Hardeman County cotton and other goods to what seemed like far-away places.

As with a few other places around our county the train still comes through Saulsburry, carrying with it the memories of the long-ago busy days in the little town, reminding us of all the folks who passed through as well as the ones who stayed and called that part of our county their home. Remember them all next time you see the train pass through Saulsburry.

Lone Oaks Hosts Bio Blitz

Look at this!
 It was a phrase commonly heard at the recent BioBlitz at Lone Oaks Farm. During this three-day event, scientists and conservationists from across the state surveyed the University of Tennessee's 1200-acre farm, documenting as many different plant and animal species as possible. With each new find, be it a salamander or a sumac, the excitement was evident.



"We assembled some of the top scientists and researchers in their fields to come in and quickly assess the flora and fauna of the farm," said Ben West, director, Lone Oaks Farm. "What they found will now be used to inform the design process for the Lone Oaks master plan. Ultimately, we want to create a place where we can showcase working agriculture while at the same time increasing the biodiversity of the land."


Lone Oaks Farm is being developed by the UT Institute of Agriculture to serve as a 4-H Center as well as a venue for youth development and STEM education and as an outdoor laboratory for sustainable agricultural practices. The university has hired Nelson Byrd Woltz, a Virginia-based landscape architecture firm, to design the layout. Thomas Woltz, principal, says findings from the recent BioBlitz will serve as a baseline for setting ecological goals for the property.

"We want to transform this farm into an experimental landscape looking at the most sustainable implementation of agriculture, but also sustaining wildlife connectivity and biodiversity," says Woltz. "The BioBlitz will help us make a master plan of the productive landscape, but we're redefining that to be both ecologically productive for biodiversity and productive for agriculture."

BioBlitz participants included scientists, conservationists and students from UTIA, UT Martin, Austin Peay University, the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and the Tennessee Aquarium. Areas of focus included ichthyology, herpetology, ornithology, botany and forest ecology.

"It was our goal to inventory what is here now, and also perhaps note what should be here that's not," said Carol Reese, ornamental horticulture specialist with UT Extension, who served on the botany team. "As we move forward, we want to maintain a good balance of agriculture and wildlife."

Following three days of fieldwork, teams from each of the focus areas presented their findings to the architects and UT employees, who are working together to create the master plan. The master plan is scheduled to be completed in July, but an initial unveiling will occur on May 22nd at 2:00 p.m. Everyone is invited to join the presentation of the master plan via webinar. Local Libraries Receive Grants
