From the Other Side of the Desk Here we go again.

With the opening of the 2018 Hardeman County Elections in a couple of weeks, we're again talking about 1. who should run, 2. who might have a chance to win, and 3. what letter, if any, they should have next to their name to identify them with a national party.

As far as the first two go, it's fairly interesting. But the third thing?

Bah, humbug.

We don't need partisan elections in county government. Let's just go vote for who we want to lead us, without the complications of an umbrella organization.

And as we are seeing in the national news, both political parties are a disaster, although I agree they are useful for national politics. How? Well, for me, it saves time. You just look at the letter next to their name, and you don't even need to listen to what they are saying. Or just look at the logo at the top of the TV screen. That'll tell you what they are about to say as well, be it pro, con, or hysterical to the subject at hand.

Here in Hardeman County, our elected leaders and the candidates that will vie for the elected offices are our friends and neighbors. We don't need national political parties, or national partisan media propaganda machines to tell us their opinion on things, we can just go and ASK them.

And if you really care about issues in Hardeman County, I'm guessing the first question you ask won't be which national party they plan to "represent."

One Dollar vsterious Hatch it that way," he said.

The issue of teachers in Hardeman County running as partisan candidates has become the subject of a disagreement between Hardeman County Attorney Charles M. Cary, the Hardeman County Democratic Party, and the Tennessee State Democratic Party.

Cary stated during the October 17 meeting of the Hardeman County Commission that all state employees, including teachers, would be in violation of the Little Hatch Act if they were to run as Democrats or Republicans in elections and should run as Independents to stay within the provisions of the act.

Cary based his statement on an amendment

to the Little Hatch Act of Tennessee in 2015 that prohibited that action, defining a "teacher" as "any person employed in a public school system as a teacher, helping teacher, teacher's aide, librarian, principal, supervisor, director of schools, or a member of the administrative staff.

Disagreeing with Cary's statement is the Hardeman County Democratic Party and party member Randall Rice, who says teachers in the county can run as partisans and said that the county party has made phone calls to the state, asking the state to correct the misconception in Hardeman County.

"Hardeman County is the only county to see

Rice said that both Hardeman County Administrator of Elections Amber Moore and Attorney Cary have been contacted by the Tennessee State Democratic Party.

Violation of the Little Hatch Act is a Class C Misdemeanor, which could be a \$50 fine and 30 days in jail. According to Cary, the two agencies that could bring charges that could include an ouster from office are the District Attorney or the County Attorney.

Regardless, Hardeman County Administrator of Elections Amber Moore said her job is to continued on A2

Jobless Rates Improve Across '17 Unemployment rates in Hardeman County dropped to 4.2% in Septem-

ber as jobless claims in Tennessee dropped in each of the 95 counties. The raw data shows 390 unemployed out of a possible workforce of 9,310. A year ago, Hardeman County posted a 6.9% unemployment rate.

Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam and Department of Labor and Workforce Development Commissioner Burns Phillips announced October 26, that in September 2017, for the first time ever, unemployment dipped below five percent in every county across the state.

September also marked the fourth consecutive month Tennessee experienced a historic low statewide unemployment rate. At three percent, Tennessee has the lowest unemployment in the southeast and the eighth lowest rate in the nation.

"With every county seeing unemployment rates below five percent and with a record statewide unemployment rate, Tennessee's fiscal strength is clear and the investment in our workforce is paying off," Haslam said.





Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

The morning after Halloween usually found us kids skipping along the cross-ties to the town of Pocahontas to view the aftermath of the Halloween pranksters tricks. The store owners would be out cleaning their windows and removing the cross-tie blockades from the north and south entrances to the town. Groups of kids would be standing around with hidden possum persimmon-eating grins watching the cleanup. At this time of the year, my mind and body were totally absorbed with Christmas adrenaline, hoping that somehow, someway, by some miracle, I would finally get the pearl handle cap pistols in the Sears Christmas catalog. The Christmas hypers usually fell upon us kids the day after Halloween and lasted until Christmas dav.

The fattening hog was getting more obese day by day as Dad had him or her on a regular food regimen of corn, waiting for that perfect cold snap when the animal would be soused into the scalding barrel. The garden was a deep shade of green, the green being turnip greens with purple top turnips peeking from the ground. All of our family loved the greens. Mom would pack the stew-pot full of them, lay a big hunk of fat-back on top and let them simmer all day. Couple this with a big slab of cornbread and a generous splash of hot pickled pepper sauce and that was larrapin. Don't think this word is



in Websters, but I heard a lot of country people use it when referring to food. Mom would always make what she called gruel when she cooked greens. After the greens were cooked, she would remove them from the potlicker, bring it to a boil and then slowly add cornmeal and cook it until it thickened. This was a tasty side dish to accompany the greens. Usually this greens meal was served with fried side-meat and pinto beans or peas. That's some good eating. I remember that sometimes Mom would make a biscuit pudding. It was delicious. I don't know how she made it.

I do know that she crumbled up cold home-made biscuits, and used eggs, milk, and vanilla extract. This was a finger-licking, lip-smacking dessert. I've gotten myself hungry talking about food. Think I'll go to the garden and pick a mess of turnip greens.

serve the public. "If someone otherwise qualified [registered voter in the district, etc] asks for a petition or turns one in, my office will act without comment as to the Little Hatch Act," she said. "What happens after that won't be up to us."

Petitions will be available at the Hardeman County Election Commission for twenty-six elected offices in Hardeman County on November 17. A candidate does not have to declare a party affiliation (or Independent) at that time and can take petitions for all three choices, but can only submit one petition. Once the petition is turned in and qualified by the election commission, it is final and cannot be taken back or changed.

In 2016, the Hardeman County Commission passed and sent a private act to the Tennessee State Legislature that would have done away with partisan elections for Hardeman County government, but it failed to come to a vote of the full legislature at the state level in 2017. While it is possible the legislature could pass it in 2018, it is extremely doubtful, according to sources, that the act could take effect before the 2020 Hardeman County Election.





How to Make Fried Green Tomatoes

This recipe serves six as a side dish or appetizer.

1. Prep the Tomatoes: Cut three medium unpeeled firm green tomatoes into 1/2-inch-thick slices. Sprinkle the slices with 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon black pepper, and 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper. Let the tomatoes stand for 15 minutes.

2. Prep the Coating: Using four separate shallow dishes, place 1/2 cup all-purpose flour (or gluten baking mix), 1/4 cup milk, 2 lightly beaten eggs, and 2/3 cup fine dry bread crumbs each in its own dish (or gluten free bread). Dip the tomato slices in the milk, then the flour, then the eggs, then the bread crumbs.

3. Cook the Tomatoes: Heat 1/4 cup cooking oil in a skillet over medium heat until it shimmers. Fry the coated tomato slices, half at a time, in the hot oil for 4 to 6 minutes on each side or until browned. (If the tomatoes begin to brown too quickly, reduce the heat to medium-low. If necessary, add additional oil). Transfer the fried tomatoes to paper towels to drain. If desired, season to taste with additional salt and black pepper, and cayenne pepper. Serve warm.

Tip: To serve fried green tomatoes as an appetizer, present them with a dipping sauce made from 1/2 cup sour cream; 3 cloves garlic, minced; and salt to taste.





Pains and Gains by Jimmy Sadler

Last night, I conversed with a friend of many years. Although most of our friendship has developed in the years since first meeting, FaceBook has afforded us a lot of catching up. This was the first time I had seen him in twenty years. We spoke of prayer, authentic faith and courage to stand up to injustice. We have shared many prayers for each other over the years, and no doubt some of his prayers for me this past year have been more than welcome. Although I knew a little of his story, I was encouraged by the rest of it last night.

Charles had grown up without the realization that he had Asperger's syndrome. Looking back over the course of his life, he began to realize just how much of his life he struggled in certain areas. Beyond that, he has an issue with deciphering mathematical equations. This, combined with the fact that he is a brilliant human being, made for a very confusing childhood. He was fantastic in English and history, scoring consistently well above average. In math and science, he struggled. He also struggled with the normal class routine and with social interactions. This made him an unlikely candidate for the job he now has that is highly technical and involves a lot of interaction. He told me it was managers that helped him out of his cocoon.

He then relayed how his mother had exercised a meticulous level of control over his life, well into adulthood. She tried to manipulate everything in his life to revolve around her, to the point of contacting his friends and employers in order to burn bridges he had to other people. Those people were his lifeline to getting to a better place in life, and she wanted to make sure he stayed dependent on her. Although he has achieved some peace, it has involved distancing and insulating himself from her need to interfere in his life. This type of influence combined with his other challenges and you would think he would be beyond trusting people. He beat those odds to develop a deep, authentic relationship with his precious wife.

I met Charles at the bible college where I studied and worked. His acceptance there was remarkable and in his own words, "miraculous". He hadn't known Christ as a young man. He dabbled in the occult and found strength in unhealthy places. It became hollow to him. Through a friendship with a Christian, he visited and was warmly greeted by the Christian community at the college.

He then experienced his first corporate worship service, and again felt a sense of awe and belonging. Back home, after a night of drinking with friends, he felt the isolation of his current life. He said he woke up first and looked over the sea of sleeping bodies and he felt very alone. It was in that unlikely moment that he decided to go to bible college.

He describes his path as one of God bringing him kicking and screaming into the fold. We both marveled at how God instantly changes some people and others over time and sequence. I remind you that perhaps there is someone vou have labeled "unlikely". Unlikely to become a Christian, unable to return to the faith, unfit for service in the kingdom. Those are all too human. God asks us to trust the fairytale of faith that enlists the least likely of the world. He can use you and the person you may be tempted to give up on. Don't give up, God loves both of you.

National Geographic had an article in one of its issues, which to those who read enlightened them that in most countries other than the U.S. widows have an extremely difficult time. Their difficulty lies beyond the normative we would expect in this country. In India for example, widows vanish from mainstream society because of tradition. They are ostracized by society, usually have worn white and have corralled in one particular city to live out the rest of their life. Frequently they are forgotten by family, forbidden to attend family related events, forbidden to remarry and not allowed to participate in the Hindu festival of Holi. Further challenge exists for single, separated and divorced women. They also are stigmatized by society regardless of the circumstances of their separation or if they choose to remain single rather than marry.

In other countries, such as Uganda for example widows do not automatically in every circumstance have a right to the property, belongings, or children and in-laws frequently will demand the contents of the house, take and sell any livestock and even sell the house in which the widow has lived. Many may become the victim of assault, sexual abuse, in addition to confiscation or theft of property. Where equal inheritance rights do exist it may also exist that religious and cultural traditions override inheritance rights. In some countries, Inheritance rights are not equally guaranteed under the law and in some places they may not have any rights in this area. In the cases of war widows and or mothers who are living with the unknown, unanswered questions as to what happened to their loved ones who are either dead or missing. 



Find someone with the proper credentials. Make sure a prospective financial professional has the appropriate securities registrations.


Find someone who has worked with people like you. Plus, you will have changes in your life - new children, new jobs, new activities - that will affect your financial picture and that need to be communicated to your financial professional. Consequently, you need to be sure that whomever you work with is easy to reach and will be in regular contact with you. Many financial professionals meet with their clients at least once a year to discuss the clients' portfolios and recommend changes, as needed, and also make themselves available, through phone calls and email, for any questions or concerns their clients may have.

Find someone who will honor your preferences. Some financial professionals follow certain philosophies. For example, you might find one advisor who tends to favor aggressive investing, while another one might be more conservative. There's nothing wrong with either approach, but you'll want to be sure that your preferences take precedence in all recommendations and guidance you receive from a financial professional. And many professionals won't express any of their own preferences at all, but will instead follow a course of action based on your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

Find someone connected to other professionals. Your investment plans don't exist in a vacuum. Over time, you will likely need to integrate elements of your investment strategy with your tax and estate planning strategies. When this happens, you may find it advantageous to have a financial professional who can work with tax and legal professionals to help you meet all your needs in these areas.

Find someone whose compensation structure is acceptable to you. Financial professionals get paid in different ways - through fees, commissions or a combination of both. Which method is best for you, as an investor? There's no one "right" answer - but you will certainly want to understand exactly how your financial professional will get paid and how this pay structure will affect your interactions with him or her.





The final game at Woody Woods Stadium in Bolivar was a lot shorter than expected as Bolivar and Covington played a rain-shortened game that saw the Chargers beat the Tigers 47-20.

The game, which had no bearing on the playoff seedings for either team, was shortened to eight minute quarters in the second half as rain made playing conditions treacherous.

"No regrets," said Bolivar Head Coach Woodrow Lowe. "We wanted both teams to get out without any injuries and we accomplished that."

The Tigers jumped out to an early lead as sophomore Omar Jones returned the opening kickoff 74 yards for a touchdown.

Covington, however, scored on their first seven possessions behind 429 yards rushing and the Tigers couldn't keep up the pace. Bolivar tied the score at 14-all with 6:09 left in the first half on a Trey Lowe 23-yard pass to Josh Sturgis, but Covington scored twice more in the half to lead 28-20 at the break. Bolivar only got the ball three times in the second half, and failed to score. Covington scored on every possession except the final time they had the ball, when the Chargers took a knee to run out the clock.

Correy Brown led Bolivar with 114 yards on 13 carries and added three pass receptions for 66 yards to earn the Vaughan Oil Player of the Game for the fourth time this year, while Lineman Briason Mays was named the Vaughan Oil Lineman of the Game for the fourth time as well.

Five Bolivar players will continue their football season after the playoffs, as quarterback Trey Lowe and lineman Briason Mays have been invited to the Toyota East vs. West Tennessee All-Star Classic on December 8 at Austin Peay University in Clarksville, while wide receiver Josh Sturgis, linebacker Daniel Lake, and running back Correy Brown were invited to play in the West Tennessee All-Star game in early December.





A.N.G.E.L's to Host Banquet by Daisy Harvey

The annual A.N.G.E.L.'s Banquet is scheduled for November 4, at 6:00 p.m. at the Bolivar Municipal Center.

This year the guest speaker will be: Mr. Dexter D. Murphy, Upper School Dean of Academics for Emerald Academy in Knoxville, TN. He is the son Ms. Daisy Harvey and Mr. Willie Murphy.

Dexter D. Murphy – Principal, father, husband, son, was born in Bolivar, TN. Humble beginnings inspired both a fervor for success and meekness in him that



might at first seem hard to reconcile. Nevertheless, a winning combination of ambition and giftedness led to a full scholarship award for him to join the Pride of the Southland Marching Band at the University of Tennessee. Knoxville, TN music fans might recall Murphy from his days as keyboardist and trombonist for Gran Torino. Earning a living as a composer, he arranged music licensed for the television shows "Dawson's Creek" and "The Real World" and won the John Lennon National Songwriting Contest for best pop song. From there he earned his bachelor's degree in music, with concentration in Jazz Piano, which he immediately began to utilize as the Director of Music at TRIBE One, a non-profit in Knoxville, TN where high school youth could learn skills like audio engineering through their outreach programming. The program was dedicated to using the arts to inspire and restore urban youth toward greatness, which in turn fueled Murphy's desire to return to school to reach disadvantaged youth earlier while they were still in elementary school.

"I would bring all these great audio engineering resources for the teens to use, but they couldn't read even the most basic materials. That's when it hit me I needed to do something to help affect change," Murphy said.

This lead to his earning of licensure to teach Elementary school and also a master's degree in curriculum and instruction. He was then catapulted in the classroom as a fifth grade teacher in Knoxville where he found his calling as an educational leader, bringing students from state lows in both reading and math to highly proficient in the course of one school year. He was hand-picked by the Superintendent of Knox County Schools to participate in the prestigious Leadership Academy, a joint venture between the University of Tennessee and Knox County Schools, in the fourth cohort and went on to earn his Administrative licensure and his educational specialist degree (Ed.S.). Dexter served as the Assistant Principal of both Vine Middle Magnet School and Sarah Moore Green Elementary School before taking the reigns as head Principal at Green Magnet Academy, a STEAM school, in 2014. His leadership at Green has allowed the school to rapidly flourish in test scores and behavior; drawing the attention of the TN Commissioner of Education, Candace McQueen and other State Educational leaders. Under Dexter's leadership, Green Magnet Academy went from being on the state's takeover list as a level one school to moving to a level five school within two years. He was also selected as a participant in the 2016-2017 Tennessee Department of Education Turnaround Principal Cohort and the Tennessee Innovation Leaders Institute. Because of his relentless effort in inner-city turnaround work, he was recruited to join the team of Knoxville's first charter school. His current position as Upper School Dean at Emerald Academy has him poised to change the lives of middle schoolaged scholars in inner city Knoxville.

Dexter is also a family man and has been happily married for 12 years to his wife Nicie and they have two children, Anaiah (10), and Mathias (almost 8).


