## Airport Gets 450K+ for Repairs

The Tennessee Department of Transportation Commissioner John Schrorer and Aeronautical Director William Orellana announced the completed contract with Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain for \$478,000.00. The grant will fund a runway/apron rehabilitation project required by Hardeman County to maintain the FAA standards for asphalt. The project is funded by a Federal Airport Improvement Grant and a State Transportation Equity Fund Grant. Hardeman County will participate with a 5%, or a \$23,900.00 share.

Mayor Jimmy Sain stated, "I am very proud of our airport and staff. The airport must maintain the FAA standards and without these available funds, it would be a struggle to comply. We have cut the airport budget and it is operating very efficiently. It is a well groomed and very clean facility, but the terminal building is in need of replacement. We are seeking grant funding for a new terminal building and looking forward to replacing the existing terminal, which is an attachment off of the main hangar building. All

## Hornsby Gets Water Project Grant



The City of Hornsby has been approved for a grant by Governor Bill Haslam for its water main replacement project. The \$249,760 grant will be used to dig up old water lines on Hornsby Loop, Walnut Grove, and Forrest Hill and replace them with new ones.

Mayor Mack Carter is hoping these new water lines will fix the 40% leakage problem that has gotten progressively worse over the years. Casey Smith of Southwest TN Development District has been appointed the administrator for this project with Ken King of King Engineering providing the engineering services.

## Maria Howell's Attorney Cries Foul

Citing a violation of law, Shari Danielle Elks of Elks Law Firm in Burns, Tennessee has filed a Motion for Reconsideration in behalf of Maria Howell of Bolivar pertaining to the October 18th rejection of Howell's request to approve her application to open a retail package store in Bolivar.

On the night in question, the city council voted 4-3 to deny the request by Howell. Voting against Howell were Randy Hill, Willie McKinnie, Todd Lowe and Suzanne Rhea.

In an eight-page document delivered to the City of Bolivar on October 28, Elks asks that the issue be placed on the November 8, 2016 Agenda of the Bolivar City Council meeting.

Among her reasons to ask for a reconsideration is an accusation of violation of Municipal Code Title 1, Chapters 602 and 603, by stating:

"It has come to the Applicant's attention that one councilperson did not disclose a "personal interest" as is required by Municipal Code Title 1, Chapters 602 and 603."

She continues by citing 1-603: "An official with the responsibility to vote on a measure shall disclose during the meeting at which the vote takes place, before the vote and so it appears in the minutes, any

The Hardeman County Arts Council will bring their annual Christmas spirit to the stage by presenting the Broadway-style musical "One Bethlehem Night," December 2-4.

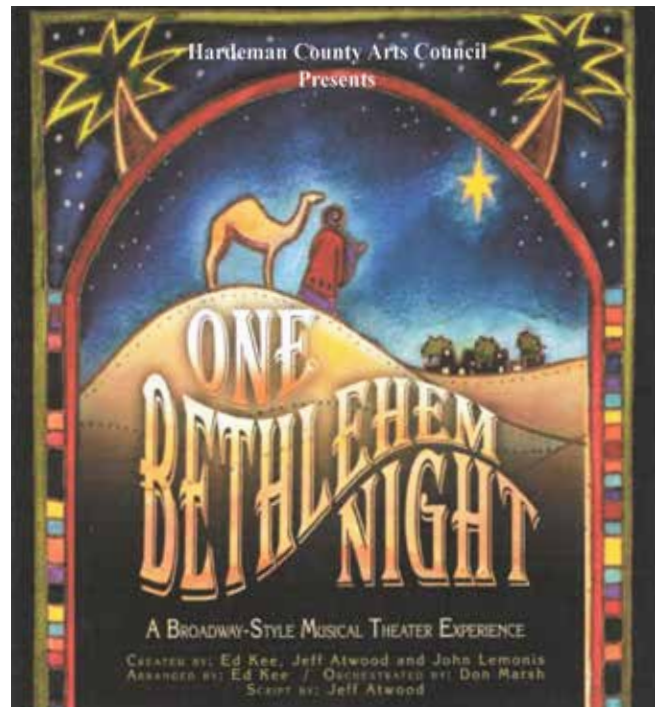
Performances will be at 7:00 p.m. Friday and Saturday, with a matinee showing at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday.

## The Dancing Bee Alpacas by Jessica Simmons

The biggest foreboding danger facing humans today is the loss of the global honeybee population. The consequence of a dying bee population impacts man at the highest levels on our food chain, posing an enormously grave threat to human survival. No other single animal species plays a more significant role in producing the fruits and vegetables that we humans commonly take for granted yet require near daily to stay alive. Meaning more than 130 fruits and vegetables that make up a nutritious diet are cross pollinated by honeybees. For every third bite of food we eat, bees and other pollinators were responsible for that nutrition to our bodies. It is estimated that those crops account for one trillion dollars in annual sales of agriculture products around the globe. Examples of common crops depending on bee pollination include broccoli, blueberry, cherry, apple, and cucumber. Scientist Albert Einstein once prophetically remarked, "Mankind will not survive the honeybees' disappearance for more than five years."

Bolivar resident Aaron Tupis decided to face this challenge as a hobby, but learned very quickly what a unique species we stand to lose if people only look at honey bees as an annoyance. Before moving from Georgia, Aaron had around 70 double Nuc hive structures at his previous home. Starting over in Hardeman County, he began with 4 double Nuc structures due to the size and capacity of moving them from Georgia. Now with 9 structures on his own property, he's distributed an additional 15 more throughout the county.

Wanting to sustain the life of bees as much as possible, and hoping to boost Hardeman County's need for agri-tourism, Aaron commenced a plan of looking towards other species that would be a benefactor to the insects as well as an environmentally sound investment. This plan led him to the domesticated camelid species, the Alpaca.

Alpacas are considerably smaller than llamas, and unlike llamas, they were not bred to be beasts of burden, but were bred specifically for their fiber. Alpaca fiber is used for making knitted and woven items, similar to wool. These items include blankets, sweaters, hats, gloves, scarves, socks, a wide variety of textiles and ponchos, and bedding in other parts

## Sharing the Road for the Harvest by Calley Overton

It's fall, so that means it is harvest time. Farmers across Hardeman County have been getting their crops in or are in the process of doing so for weeks. While this is a sign that fall is finally here and Thanksgiving is around the corner, it also means that cars have to share the road with tractors, combines, and other slow-moving harvest vehicles.

First off, to any new driver who may be unacquainted with sharing the road with slow-moving vehicles, yes, it is legal for farm machinery to be on the road. However, they do have safety guidelines they have to go by to make their transit more safely. Just like any other vehicle, slow-moving ag vehicles must have headlights, turn signals (or at least be able to clearly hand signal), and breaks along with a slow-moving vehicle emblem mounted on the back of the machinery. You might be saying, what about when they take up both sides of the road? That is still legal. Typically, if a vehicle is wide enough that it takes up both sides of the road, it will have an escort vehicle.

Rural roads can be just as dangerous as city roads. You never know what can be lurking around the corner. There might be a cow that escaped, a scared deer darting across the road because of hunting season, or a large, sturdy, slow-moving vehicle. The advice given to motorists this time of year is simply caution and alertness. No one wants to rush around a curve at 50 mph to encounter a hunk of metal, much sturdier than today's automobile, going 20 mph. If you can pass, do so safely and don't recklessly rush around the ag equipment because you are in a hurry. Being ten minutes late is not worth life, injury, or a vehicle. Farmers, if you are able to temporarily pull over to allow traffic to pass, please do so. Motorists, if you happen to be stuck behind a vehicle you cannot pass, think about all of the agricultural products you enjoy daily because of the hard work of the man or woman in front of you. Without them, there would not be cotton, corn, soy, and other products we use daily. This is the season for patience: patience for Thanksgiving, patience for Christmas, and patience for harvest vehicles.

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# The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

## Sunday Beef Rib Roast

### Ingredients

- 1 recipe Herb-Bacon Topper, recipe below
- 14 pound beef rib roast (chine bone removed)
- 1 teaspoon cracked black peppercorns
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 pound baby carrots with tops, trimmed
- 1 pound small red potatoes (halve any large potatoes)
- 3 - 4 cups baby spinach
- 1-15 ounce can butter beans, rinsed and drained

### Directions

Prepare Herb-Bacon Topper. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Sprinkle beef roast with cracked pepper, salt, and half of the Herb-Bacon Topper (refrigerate remaining topper and reserved bacon pieces until ready to use). Place meat, bone side down, in a shallow roasting pan. Insert an oven-safe meat thermometer into center of roast. Roast, uncovered, for 45 minutes. Arrange carrots and potatoes around roast and toss to gently coat. Roast 1 to 1-1/4 hours more or until meat thermometer registers 135 degrees F for medium-rare. Sprinkle meat with remaining Herb-Bacon Topper; cover and let stand for 15 minutes. Temperature of meat after standing should be 145 degrees F. Push meat and carrots to one side of pan. Stir spinach and beans into drippings in other side of pan; sprinkle with reserved bacon pieces. Makes 10 servings.

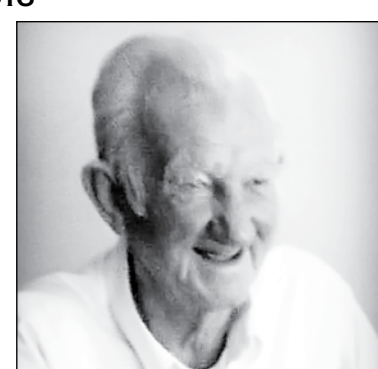
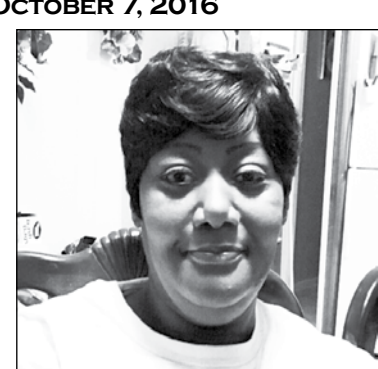

Last night, I conversed with a friend of many years. Although most of our friendship has developed in the years since first meeting, FaceBook has afforded us a lot of catching up. This was the first time I had seen him in twenty years. We spoke of prayer, authentic faith and courage to stand up to injustice. Charles had grown up without the realization that he had Asperger's syndrome. Looking back over the course of his life, he began to realize just how much of his life he struggled in certain areas. Beyond that, he has an issue with deciphering mathematical equations. This, combined with the fact that he is a brilliant human being, made for a very confusing childhood. He was fantastic in English and history, scoring consistently well above average. In math and science, he struggled. He also struggled with the normal class routine and with social interactions. This made him an unlikely candidate for the job he now has that is highly technical and

involves a lot of interaction. He told me it was managers that helped him out of his cocoon.

He then relayed how his mother had exercised a meticulous level of control over his life, well into adulthood. She tried to manipulate everything in his life to revolve around her, to the point of contacting his friends and employers in order to burn bridges he had to other people. Those people were his lifeline to getting to a better place in life, and she wanted to make sure he stayed dependent on her. Although he has achieved some peace, it has involved distancing and insulating himself from her need to interfere in his life. This type of influence combined with his other challenges and you would think he would be beyond trusting people. He beat those odds to develop a deep, authentic relationship with his precious wife.

I met Charles at the Bible College where I studied and worked. His acceptance there was remarkable and in his own words, "miraculous". He hadn't known Christ as a young man. He dabbled in the occult and found strength in unhealthy places. It became hollow to him. Through a friendship with a Christian, he visited and was warmly greeted by the Christian community at the college.

al interest that affects or that would lead a reasonable person to infer that it affects the official's vote on the measure. In addition, the official may recuse himself from voting on the measure."  
Following the vote on October 18, Elks asked if anyone on the council had any direct or indirect interest with anyone that holds an existing retail license.  
Councilman Larry McKinnie said yes there was, but neither he nor any other member of the council elaborated further, or as described by Elks, "Under advice of by the City Attorney, No specific answer was provided to the question."  
Later Elks says in her brief that, "Councilperson Suzanne Rhea should have disclosed a conflict of personal interest on the issue."  
Elks also says that "it is probable that Applicant will appeal to Chancery Court the October 18, 2016 Council decision to deny her application for a Certificate of Compliance."

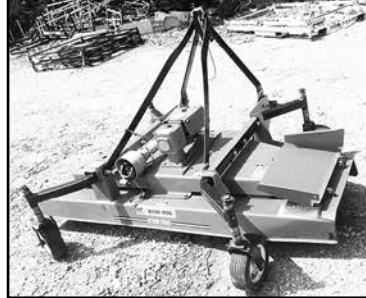

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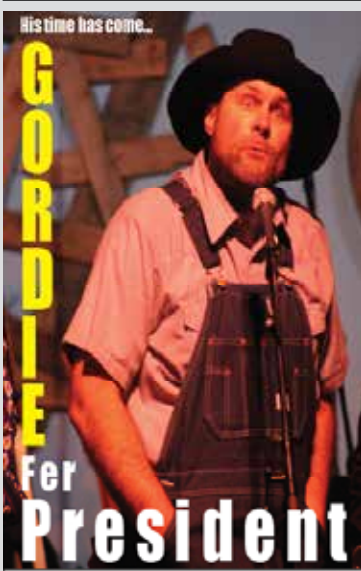

## Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

American photographer Dorothea Lange once said, "Photography takes an instant out of time, altering life by holding it still." That is one of the reasons I love photography and old photos (well, any photo, really); they capture moments and memories and preserve them forever. This week's photo does just that for me – it held a moment of time in my family, patiently waiting while it remained unseen for many, many years.

This is a photo of my maternal grandparents, Fred Hugh Kiestler and Alma Lee Smith Kiestler, in 1928 just a few weeks after they were married. The photo was made in Cloverport, probably at the home of my maternal great grandparents Ambrose and Maggie (Pirtle) Smith. Let me tell you the story of this photo's journey. When cleaning out my grandmother's house, my mom started to throw away an empty tissue box that was inside of a plastic cover, but when she started to put it in the trash she heard a rattle. After looking in the box and taking it apart, this very small photo fell out – this photo of my grandparents, her parents. None of us had ever seen the photo before – I had never seen photos of my grandparents as young adults. I had only seen photos of them as very young children and then later when they were both in their 40s, after they had lived through two World Wars and a Depression and life as a sharecropper and a housewife in the rural South.

By the time we found the photo my grandmother couldn't tell me anything about it, but fortunately one of her younger brothers could. He remembered the photo like it had been taken only a few days ago; he said he remembered it because of

## Can You Spot a Storm? by Jessica Simmons

The Municipal Center of Bolivar hosted 150+ in attendance at the Skywarn Storm Spotter's Class October 27.

Skywarn is a National Weather Service Program (NWS) developed in the 1960s that consists of trained weather spotters who provide reports of severe and hazardous weather to help meteorologists make life-saving warning decisions. Spotters are concerned citizens of any job or income capacity who volunteer their time and energy to report on threatening weather impacting their community.

Although NWS has access to data from Doppler radar, satellite, and surface weather stations, technology cannot detect every instance of threatening weather. Acting as the eyes and ears in the field, Spotters provide vital ground truths, helping to fill in the gaps by reporting hail, wind damage, flooding, heavy snow, tornadoes, and water spouts.

Within the Memphis team of NWS, there are 57 counties in four states that need to be covered. Your help during dangerous weather situations could be the difference in getting a warning out in time for your community. 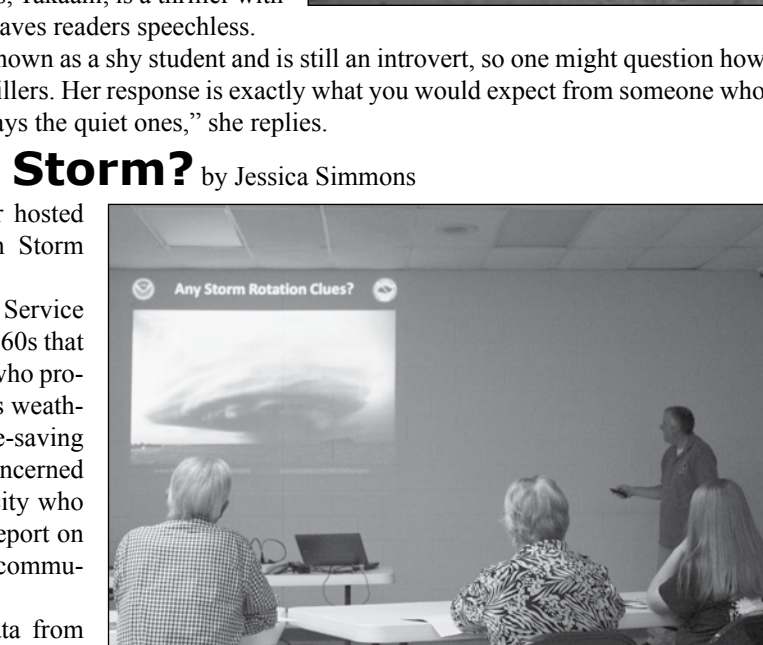
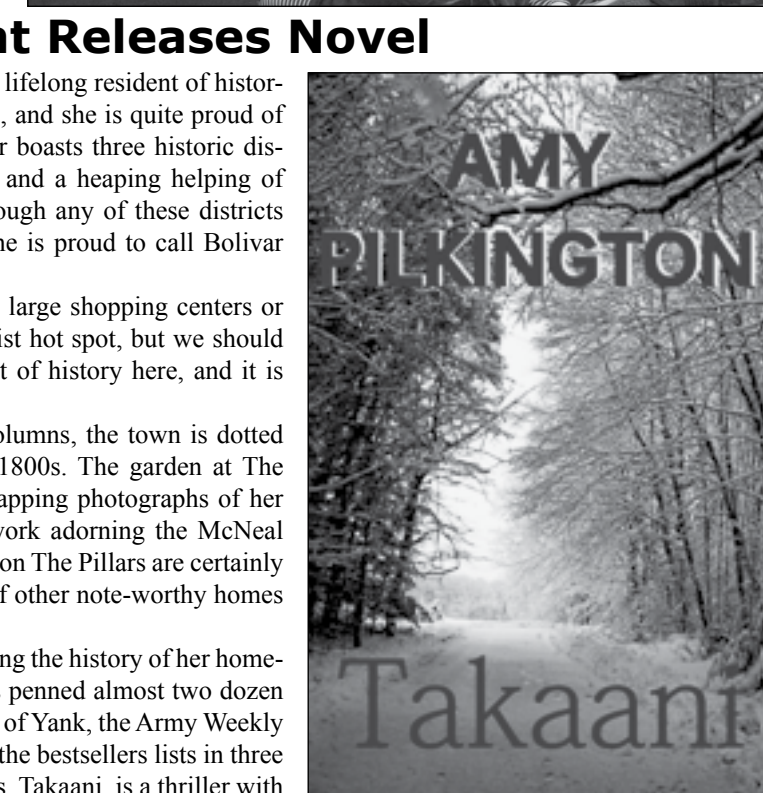
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## The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor

of the world. The fiber comes in more than 52 natural colors as classified in Peru, 12 as classified in Australia and 16 as classified in the United States. It can also be dyed an assorted variance of colors. Alpaca fleece is a lustrous and silky natural fiber. While similar to sheep's wool, it is warmer, not prickly, and bears no lanolin, which makes it hypoallergenic. Without lanolin, it does not repel water. It is also soft and luxurious. In physical structure, alpaca fiber is somewhat akin to hair, being very glossy. The preparing, carding, spinning, weaving and finishing process of alpaca is very similar to the process used for wool. Alpaca fiber is also flame-resistant, and meets the US Consumer Product Safety Commission's standards.

Using alpaca manure as fertilizer is beneficial. Even with its lower organic content, alpaca manure is considered a rich soil conditioner. Alpaca fertilizer improves the soil quality and its ability to retain water. It is also good for plants, providing a fair amount of nitrogen and potassium and about average levels of phosphorus. Since alpaca manure is mostly found in pellet form and doesn't have the same components as other livestock feeders, like cows and horses, it does not need to be aged or composted before use. You can spread it directly onto garden plants without burning them. Best of all, it is odorless and does not contain any weed seeds so there's no worry about plucking sprouts from the garden following application, as with some types of manure.

Alpacas use a communal dung pile, where they do not graze. This behavior limits the spread of internal parasites, thus proving healthier animals and life sustainment for bees. The honey bees on Aaron's farm obtain the salt and ammonia they need to survive from the Alpaca dung pile and compost heap. Everything that is grown on the farm is fertilized by the alpacas and pollinated by the honey bees. After shearing the Alpaca's, clothes are made from their wool. This all goes hand in hand in producing a continuous circle of life environment for man, insect, and, alpaca.

Aaron works together with a local contractor to provide bee extraction for local residents. If you have a bee "problem", a vacuum will be brought to your home to help eradicate the issue. The removal of these bees from your property will be painless and will provide more life sustainment from the bees on the farm and surrounding areas in the county. A local, licensed contractor will repair any issues within your home left after the bee elimination is complete. 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## Tennessee High School Students Fastest Improving

Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam has announced that Tennessee students are the fastest improving in the nation in science, according to the 2015 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), commonly known as the Nation's Report Card.

The last time fourth and eighth grade students both took NAEP science was 2009, and the 2015 NAEP results show Tennessee is the only state to grow faster than the nation in both grades with Tennessee students doubling the average national growth.

Tennessee also narrowed or eliminated several achievement gaps. The gap between the science performance of male and female students was completely eliminated in both grades. In both fourth and eighth grade science the gap in achievement scores between white and African-American students narrowed, and the gap tightened between white and Latino students in fourth grade.

With these scores, Tennessee now ranks 19th and 21st in the country on fourth and eighth grade science, respectively – the highest rankings the state has ever had on the Nation's Report Card.

"We couldn't be prouder of today's news. When you think of what's important to the future of Tennessee, having our students double the national average growth

in science is incredibly powerful. Not only that, but every single student group in Tennessee improved. We narrowed what we call our achievement gaps and completely eliminated the gender gap," Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam said. "We are on a long journey. We've done the hard work of raising expectations, investing more in education and letting our teachers and students show us what they can do, and again and again, our students and teachers are stepping up to the challenge."

Since 2007, Tennessee has been working to raise academic expectations and strengthen teaching across subjects, building all students' critical thinking and problem solving abilities. In addition, the state has invested in innovation and technology, encouraging more science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) for students in every grade and strengthening college and career pathways for all students.

"We've set high expectations across the board for our students in Tennessee, and our performance on the Nation's Report Card continues to reflect the hard work and progress our students and teachers are making," Tennessee Commissioner of Education Candice McQueen, said. "To me, the most encouraging part of today's science results is that all of Tennessee's students are showing what is possi-

ble. We've narrowed or eliminated gaps between groups of students, and we are continuing to make huge strides with all students."

In 2013, Tennessee became the fastest improving state in the country on the Nation's Report Card for math and reading. The state's 2015 results maintained the unprecedented growth with a new class of students, proving the gains were real. Those results also gave the state its highest ranking until today – 25th in fourth grade math. Tennessee has a goal to rank in the top half of all states on the Nation's Report Card by 2019, and these results put the state in the top 25 on three of those assessments.

The Nation's Report Card, also known as the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), is the largest nationally representative and continuing assessment of what students in the United States know and can do in various subject areas. It is known as the gold standard of large-scale student assessments. Between January and March 2015, the NAEP science assessment was given to approximately 115,400 fourth graders, 110,900 eighth graders, and 11,000 12th graders across 46 states and the Department of Defense system, representing the nation's public and private schools.

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

## Young Writers Conference to Discuss Variety of Subjects

The annual Young Writers Conference returns to the University of Tennessee at Martin on November 18. The conference will be held from 8:30 a.m.-3:00 p.m. in the Boling University Center and is open to students in grades 9-12. Registration materials and fees must be received by November 11.

Participants can choose from workshops on a variety of topics including poetry, resume-writing, songwriting, journaling, young adult novels and allegory. Each student will attend two workshops during the 9-10:30 a.m. and 10:45 a.m.-12:15 p.m. sessions with a luncheon following at 12:30 p.m. Students will also have an opportunity to share their work during an open-mic reading from 2:00-3:00 p.m.

Students must be recommended by a teacher on the basis of academic achievement and artistic promise in order to attend. Registration is limited to 200 participants on a first-come, first-served basis and costs \$12 per student. The fee includes all workshops, readings and lunch.

Teachers are encouraged, but not required, to attend with their students. The registration fee is \$25 for teachers. Attending faculty can choose workshop sessions on classroom writing strategies, writing assessment and designing effective student writing workshops. Teachers recommending students are asked to follow their school's policies in arranging for parent/guardian permissions.

Tiana Clark, winner of the 2016 Academy of American Poets Prize and author of the poetry chapbook "Equilibrium," will serve as the 2016 conference keynote speaker. Clark is currently a Master of Fine Arts candidate at Vanderbilt University, where she serves as poetry editor for the "Nashville Review." She has recently received funding from the Nashville Metropolitan Arts Commission to support her community project, "Writing as Resistance," which provides creative writing workshops for trans youth.
