## Highway Committee Offers Plan

The Hardeman County Commission is expected to vote on sending a private act to the State of Tennessee to establish how the Hardeman County Highway Department is administered in the coming years.

After a difficult few months in 2016-2017, the county commission this past March 21 voted to add an advisory committee to the county highway board for the remainder of 2017.

Non-voting county commission members added to the committee were Chris Bell, Elmer Cobb, Jim Daniel, and Vincen Morrow.

The four members joined current supervisors Kenny Pulse, John Mitchell, Jr., and Matt Knight at

meetings that are also attended by Highway Superintendent David Sipes.

Charged with bringing a permanent solution to the table, the committee will ask the commission on October 17 to approve making the seven member board the official governing body. A two-thirds approval by the commission is necessary to pass it on to the state.

"Hardeman County has a highway administrative system of electing three officials to administer another elected official," explained Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain back in March. "It has worked in the past, but it's not working now. It has caused

disruption, employee issues and a poor working environment. Both sides have recommended changing or eliminating each other. I chose to appoint four commissioners to serve on the board of supervisors with the elected supervisors to mend the fences and report back to me and the commission with recommendations, if any, to settle the issues. These are all friends of mine and we all want to serve with the best of our abilities."

In November of 2016, the three supervisors floated then withdrew a plan that would have sent a private act to the State of Tennessee that would have eliminated the Supervisor of Highways as an elect-

ed official, giving the supervisors power to hire and oversee the position.

The resulting debate and disagreement were the catalyst for the expansion that was approved by 100% of the commission, Sipes, and the three supervisors on March 21. Sipes' term will expire August 31, 2018, as do the terms of the three highway supervisors.

The private act, if passed, would be in the hands of the Tennessee State Legislature when they reconvene in January. If the legislature passes the act, it would come back to the commission for another two-thirds approval to become law in Hardeman County.

## Bolivar Brings Hundreds to Job Fair



The City of Bolivar hosted a job fair on October 5, attracting hundreds of job seekers and more than 30 businesses to the Bolivar Municipal Center.

"We can talk about the numbers but if we can get one person to come today and get a job, this will be a success," said Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic. "And with that as a goal, we can certainly say this has been a success."

McTizic said the city wants to expand the job fair in 2018 and plans to use both the conference room and the Bolivar Municipal Gymnasium as well.

Go ahead and clear your calendar for the next couple of weekends – it's festival time in West Tennessee! This weekend's festival is the 20th annual Heritage Festival presented by the Ames Plantation and the University of Tennessee AgResearch. It's Saturday, October 14, from 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.; admission is \$5 for adults, \$2 for ages 4-16, and the wee ones get in for free.

The Ames Plantation is a unique festival that covers everything from the Civil War to quilts to Native American folklore to good music and good food and everything in between. Over 175 folk artists, demonstrators, musicians, and re-enactors will be on the grounds of the lovely Ames Plantation to share information, skills, stories, music, and oh so much more. I have gone to the festival for several years and learn something new every year from the talented people who share their knowledge and skills with all of us. In no particular order, here are some of the things I have learned and done at the Heritage Festival in the past.

-Watched ladies make beautiful embroidery, crochet, and bobbin lace (that's what the lady is doing. I watched her demonstration twice; it was so amazing to see how she manipulated all those strands of thread into such a beautiful and delicate piece of lace.)

- Learned how a blacksmith shop works
- Learned how tobacco is grown, gathered, and smoked
- Learned how handmade bricks are created
- Picked cotton (they have a patch where you can do some pickin')
- Learned about some pretty fancy chickens (who do NOT like people near their cages)
- Learned the history of the Stencil House which was saved by the Ames Foundation
- Eaten marvelous food including kettle corn made in an honest-to-goodness kettle
- Learned about local Civil War history from re-enactors, writers, and even General Grant himself
- Learned how bird dog athletes are trained
- Milked a goat
- Learned to give the alpacas a wide berth as they are spitters (who knew?)

I have seen all ages of folks at the festival and folks from all walks of life. Past festivals have had thousands of attendees from all over Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas, several other states, and a few foreign countries. Several years ago I met a guy who was hiking across the U.S. and he picked up a brochure about the festival and decided to check it out – he was from Germany. He said everybody in West Tennessee had been friendly, and asked me to please inform him as to how best to eat grits and bar-b-que (I did and made sure he understood not to eat them together), and we practiced correct pronunciation of "y'all".

Go and enjoy a fun-filled festival right in our own backyard; but, y'all, be careful around the alpacas and those fancy chickens

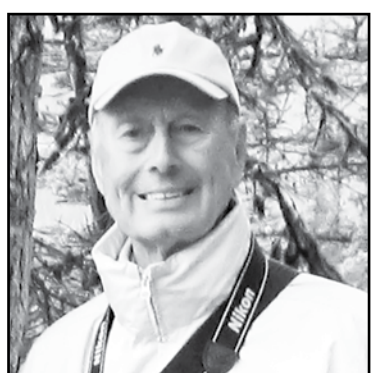

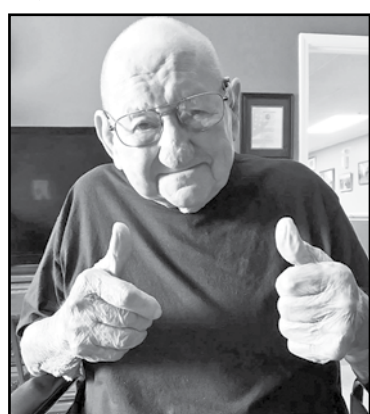

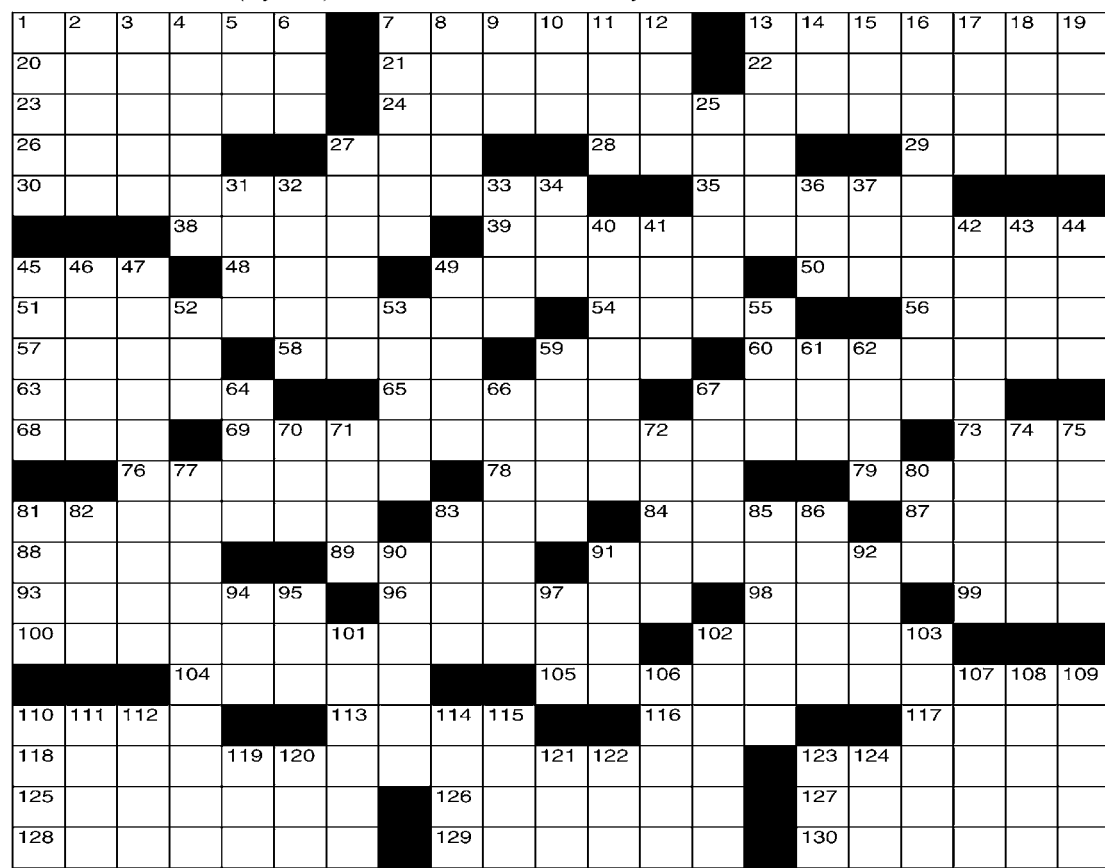

## International Investing: Still a Journey to Consider

Columbus Day is observed on October 9. And while it may be true that Leif Erikson and the Vikings beat Columbus to the New World, Columbus Day nonetheless remains important in the public eye, signifying themes such as exploration and discovery. As an investor, you don't have to "cross the ocean blue," as Columbus did, to find opportunities - but it may be a good idea to put some of your money to work outside the United States.

So, why should you consider investing internationally? The chief reason is diversification. If you only invest in U.S. companies, you might do well when the U.S. markets are soaring, as has happened in recent years. But when the inevitable downturn happens, and you're totally concentrated in U.S. stocks, your portfolio will probably take a hit. At the same time, however, other regions of the world might be doing considerably better than the U.S. markets - and if you had put some of your investment holdings in these regions, you might at least blunt some of the effects of the down market here.

Of course, it's also a good idea to diversify among different asset classes, so, in addition to investing in U.S. and international stocks, you'll want to own bonds, government securities and other investment vehicles. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can help reduce the effects of volatility, it can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss.)

International investments, like all investments, will fluctuate in value. But they also have other characteristics and risks to consider, such as these:

**Currency fluctuations** - The U.S. dollar rises and falls in relation to the currencies of other countries. Sometimes, these movements can work in your favor, but sometimes not. A strengthening dollar typically lowers returns from international investments because companies based overseas do business in a foreign currency, and the higher value of the U.S. dollar reduces the prices, measured in dollars, of individual shares of these companies' stocks. The opposite has happened in 2017, when the weaker dollar has helped increase returns from international investments.

**Political risks** - When you invest internationally, you're not just investing in foreign companies - you're also essentially investing in the legal and economic systems of countries in which those companies do business. Political instability or changes in laws and regulations can create additional risks - but may also provide potentially positive returns for investors.

**Social and economic risks** - It is not always easy for investors to understand all the economic and social factors that influence markets in the U.S. - and it's even more challenging with foreign markets.

U.S. markets are now worth less than half of the total world markets, and growth in the rest of the world is likely to keep expanding the number of global opportunities. You can take advantage of that global growth by putting part of your portfolio into international investments, including developed and emerging markets.

In any case, given the more complex nature of international investing, you'll want to consult with a financial professional before taking action. If it turns out that international investments are appropriate for your needs, you should certainly consider going global.

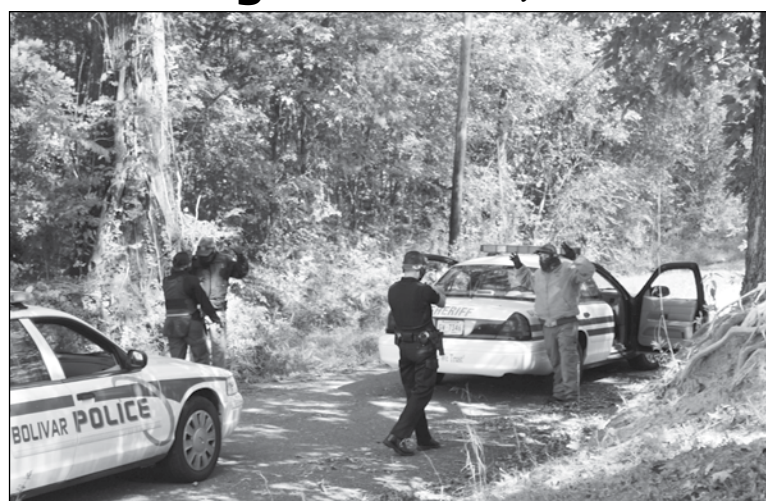

## Shiloh Offers Native American Festival

Shiloh National Military Park will host the Chickasaw Heritage Festival at the Shiloh Indian Mounds National Historic Landmark, located on Shiloh battlefield on October 28.

The one day festival will bring together traditional Native American music, demonstrations, storytelling, and scholarly talks. Tribe members from the Chickasaw Nation will return to their ancestral homeland for a day of cultural demonstrations that include stickball, the Chickasaw Nation dance troupe, archeology, and storytelling. National Park rangers will also be demonstrating pre-historic weapons of the Native Americans.

"The Shiloh Indian Mounds National Historic Landmark preserves the remnants of a Mississippian Era Indian village that is culturally affiliated with the Chickasaw Nation," said Superintendent Dale Wilkerson. "We are very pleased to partner with our friends at the Chickasaw Nation and the Inkana Foundation to present a variety of American Indian activities to our visitors."

Shiloh is one of the very few places in the eastern United States where remains of prehis-



toric houses are still visible on the ground's surface. About 800 years ago, a town occupied the high Tennessee River bluff at the eastern edge of the Shiloh plateau. Between two steep ravines, a wooden palisade enclosed seven earthen mounds and dozens of houses. Six mounds, rectangular in shape with flat tops, probably served as platforms for the town's important buildings. These structures may have included a council house, religious buildings, and residences of the town's leaders.

The early inclusion of the mounds area within the boundary of the national military park has protected the site from any modern use. Because the Shiloh site has never been disturbed by the plow, the daub of collapsed walls still stands as low rings or mounds.

## Bolivar FD Offers Fire Safety Advice to Schools

Chief Lynn Price of the Bolivar Fire Department recently spoke to Bolivar Central and Middleton High School students on the importance of fire safety. Outlining a variety of topics, he covered every aspect of fire prevention in the home and how to survive a fire if the unimaginable may occur.

The Bolivar Fire Department installs smoke detectors to anyone's home throughout the county at no cost because working smoke detectors reduce a person's chance of death in a fire by half. While most deaths due to fire occur at night when people are sleeping, nearly 900 lives per year could be saved if every home had working smoke detectors.

In the United States, there are more homes with no working smoke detectors than there are homes with any smoke detectors at all. 73% of smoke detector failures are due to missing, disconnected, or dead batteries. Nuisance alarms are the most common reason for deliberately disconnecting batteries, but disconnecting your batteries, for any reason, is ill-advised. You can increase your chance of survival by following these tips: smoke detectors should be installed on every level of your home, change your batteries twice a year during daylight savings time, keep your detectors clean and free of dust, and replace the entire detector unit at least every ten years.

Chief Price reminded students that firefighters, police, and EMS service workers are your friends. They're all here to do a critical job and protect you from things that can cause you harm. This job requires them to drop what they're doing and rush to any emergency they're sent to encounter. Eighteen percent of firefighter deaths occur while en route to calls so it's important to never waste valuable manpower and resources on false alarms when they could be desperately needed at a real emergency.

The Tennessee State Fire Marshal's Office and the City of Bolivar Fire Department want citizens to remember three simple words, "Close the Door!". "A door is one of the best pieces of firefighting and life-saving equipment in a home," said Deputy Commissioner Gary West. "If you leave a room that is on fire, closing the door behind you can be the best decision you make." Closing the door reduces fire growth and spread, limits damage to your home, and could possibly save lives. A closed door hinders flames and smoke from spreading to other rooms and



can help deprive a fire of the oxygen it needs to grow. You should always sleep with your bedroom door closed if possible. This prohibits a fire outside your door from getting the necessary oxygen it needs to spread into your bedroom. If you can see smoke in the house, stay low to the ground as you make your way to the exit.

In a fire, smoke and poisonous air hurt more people than the actual flames do. You'll breathe less smoke if you stay close to the ground. Smoke naturally rises, so if there is smoke while you're using your escape route, staying low means you can crawl under most of it. You can drop to the floor, crawl on your hands and knees, and use your right hand to feel along walls below the smoke to get a feel of where you are. Exiting through a door that leads outside should be your first choice as an escape route, but also ask your parents about windows and if they would be possible escape routes. Even windows on a higher floor could be safe escape routes if you had help from a rope ladder, a firefighter, or another adult.

If you are unable to escape a building that is on fire, close all doors between you and the fire. If you can grab a piece of clothing or a towel, place it over your mouth to keep from breathing in the smoke. This works even better if you wet the cloth first. Use towels or sheets to seal the door cracks and cover air vents. Call the fire department to report your exact location. Even if you're scared, never hide under the bed or in a closet. Hiding puts firefighters lives in danger because they will have a hard time finding you. The sooner they find you, the sooner you both can get out.

It is imperative that every family have an escape plan so that all members can get out of a burning house and to safety quickly. Smoke from a fire can make it hard to see where things are, so it's important to learn and remember the different ways out of your home. How

many exits are there? How do you get to them from your room? How do you evacuate if you're on an upper floor? Have your family draw up a map of the escape plan. This is a fun way for younger children to learn without recognizing how much they're retaining. You never know when possible ways may be blocked by fire or smoke, so knowing where the other exits are will help when seconds count most. Everyone in the home needs to know how to unlock windows, open them, and remove the screen if needed. Make sure you only do this in an emergency!

Lots of kids are injured because they fall out of windows. Your escape plan won't do any good if you don't have a meeting place for everyone in the home. A meeting spot is helpful because everyone shows up in one place and you'll know everyone is safe. Meeting at your mailbox is a good rule of thumb. Obtaining a meeting spot aids worried family members and prevents anyone from going back into the home to search for you.

Once you're out, do not go back in for anyone — even pets. You can tell the first responders about any relatives or pets that were left behind and they'll be able to help. The most important thing is that you get out safely. It's also important to know that you shouldn't stay in the house any longer than you must — not even to call 911.

Not only should you plan the escape routes, you should also practice them just as students do in school. Having a fire drill at home gives everyone a chance to see how they would react in a real emergency, plus you can see how quickly and safely everyone can get out of the house.

Twice a year when you change the batteries in your smoke alarm is a great time to run a drill with your family. Make sure your plan has everyone getting out safely and to the meeting spot using the escape routes within three minutes.

## Jackson State to Offer Robotics Classes

Jackson State Community College will receive about \$175,000 to purchase cutting-edge equipment and create a unique robotics training center for manufacturing students and workers at companies in West Tennessee.

The funding allows Jackson State to become a certified trainer for FANUC robots — the primary brand used by manufacturers throughout the region. The community college will add three vision-equipped robots to its industrial technology program and become the only certified trainer in the Mid-South. The nearest program is in North Carolina.

"If you have the proper number of robots equipped the proper way, and your instructor has the proper training, you can be a certified site," said Jack Laser, Jackson State's director of workforce development. "It gives us one more thing to attract companies to the area and help existing companies upgrade their workforce."

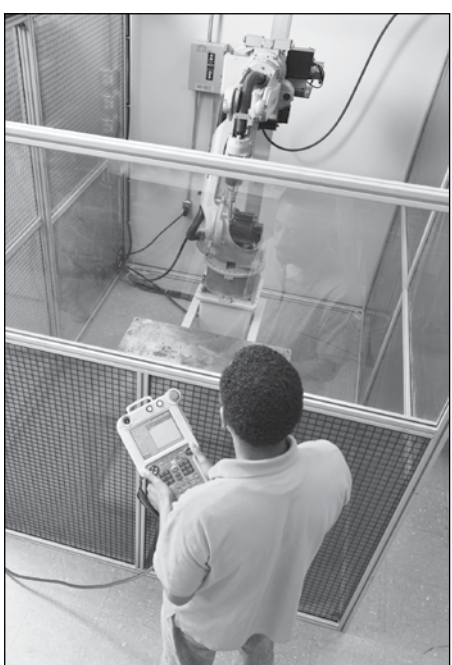
The training center will allow manufacturers in Southwest Tennessee to enhance their competitiveness and provide opportunities for current workers to increase their skills and qualify for higher-paying jobs. It will also help recruit a major manufacturer for the Memphis Regional Megasite in Haywood County, as it differentiates the region from other competitive sites.

"When companies are looking for a site, they're looking more and more at the workforce," Laser said. "The more we are able to upgrade skills, the better off we'll be."

The project is a partnership with the Southwest Tennessee Development District, which serves an eight-county region and will administer a \$200,000 grant from the Delta Regional Authority. The authority is a federal-state venture that works to create jobs, build communities, and improve lives through strategic investments in economic development. The regional authority recently announced \$2.9 million in funding for nine projects in Tennessee.

Jackson State has one certified FANUC trainer and plans to add another, Laser said. The robots will be procured in the coming months, and the robotics training program will be added next year. Classes will be offered during the day as well as the evening to accommodate students and people with full-time jobs.

"We want to be able to offer whatever is convenient for our area manufacturers," Laser said.

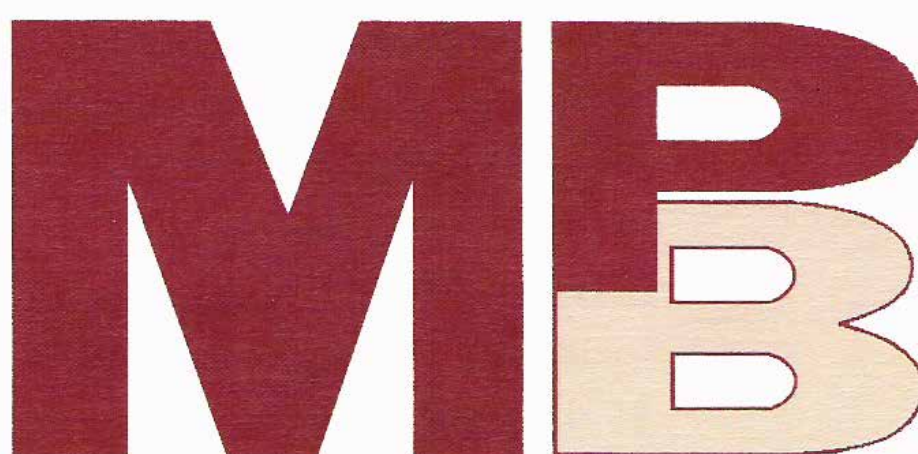

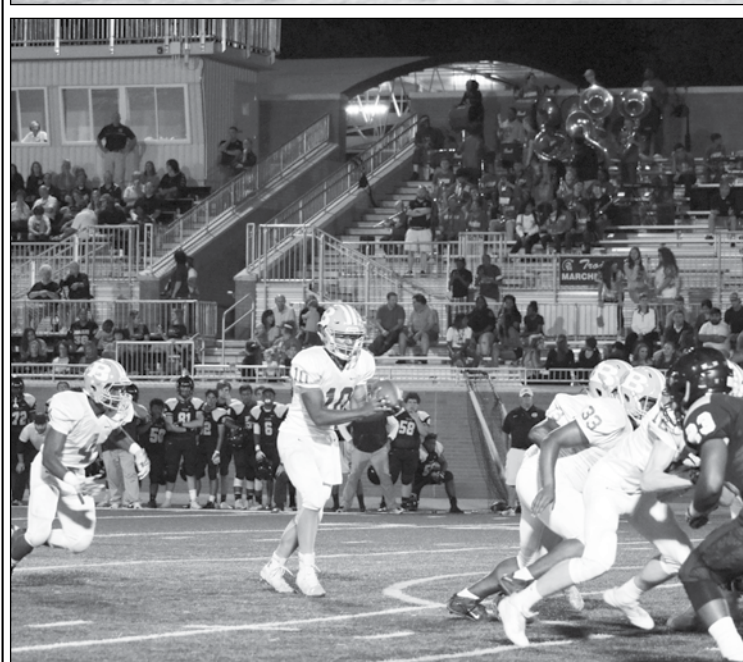

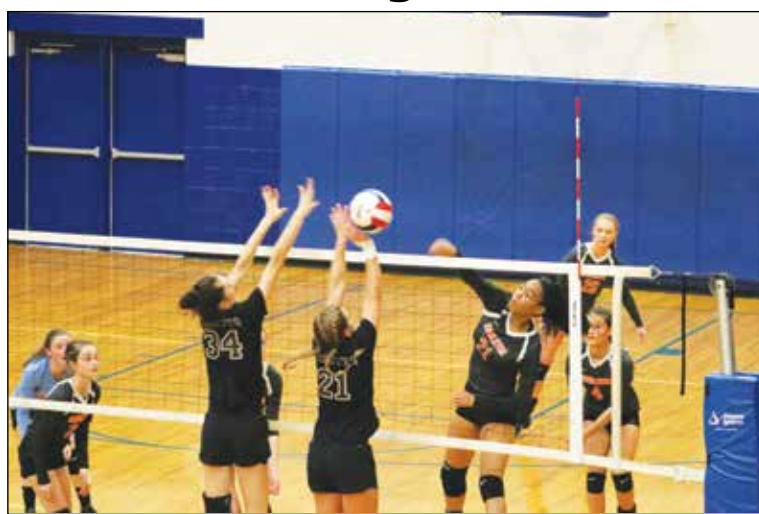
