Democratic Primary Announced

The Hardeman County Democratic Party announced plans to hold a county primary on May 1, 2018, ending months of speculation that a primary board would select candidates for elected office within the county. The Republican Party, as expected, allowed the deadline for a primary announcement to pass.
Up for election are twenty-six offices in Hardeman County.
A list of open positions is on A5.
In a letter to the editor on April 20, 2017, Meryl Rice, District 26, TNDP Executive Committeewoman wrote that, "We found seven current commissioners who ran as Democrats in the past, that now, would not qualify as Democrats."
Rice's letter said a "bona fide" Democrat is someone who has "voted Democrat three of the last five state/national primaries."
The primary a citizen votes in is a matter of public record.
The deadline of Thursday, February 15, 2018 is the filing deadline for all candidates, including Republicans and Independents.
Petitions can be picked up beginning November 17. A candidate does not have to declare a party affiliation (or Independent) at that time and can take petitions for all three choices, but can only turn in one petition. Once the petition is turned in and qualified by the election commission, it is final and cannot be taken back or changed.
The fear of rejection could make for difficult decisions for candidates who might be amongst the seven mentioned by Rice, in that any candidate turning in petitions to run as a Democrat would be qualified by the Hardeman County Election Commission, but could, in turn, be rejected by the Democratic Party.
A rejection by the Democratic Party would remove the potential candidate from the election. Once qualified by the Election Commission, there would be no opportunity to refile under a different affiliation.
In 2016, the Hardeman County Commission passed and sent a private act to the Tennessee State Legislature that would have done away with partisan elections for Hardeman County government, but it failed to come to a vote of the full legislature at the state level.
One law change that could effect candidates choosing party affiliations is the Little Hatch Act, which states that an employee of the state, including teachers, cannot run as a partisan candidate for public office. The inclusion of teachers in the act was passed this past year.

Highway Committee Roadblocked

The Hardeman County Commission voted 12 to 4 to table a proposal by four members of the commission to increase the voting members of the Hardeman County Highway Committee from three to seven, adding the four appointed commission voting members to the three elected officials.
"They go before the county," said Mac Vaughan, speaking of the three elected officials. "And now their votes might not count against the four commissioners."
Discussion ensued where all agreed three was too few, but few agreed with the plan put forth by Commissioners Chris Bell, Elmer Cobb, Jim Daniel and Vincen Morrow.
"We need to have them all elected," offered Elvis White.
After discussion, a motion to table the issue was put forth by Mike Madden and seconded by Johnny Lanier. The only commissioners voting against tabling the vote were Bell, Cobb, Daniel, and Morrow.
In November of 2016, Hardeman County Road Supervisors Kenny Pulse, John Mitchell, Jr., and Matt Knight floated, then withdrew a plan that would have sent a private act to the State of Tennessee that would have eliminated the Supervisor of Highways as an elected official, giving the supervisors power to hire and oversee the position.
In response to the growing conflict within the department, the county commission this past March 21 voted to add Bell, Cobb, Daniel, and Morrow to the county highway committee for the remainder of 2017. The four joined Pulse, Mitchell, and Knight at meetings that are also attended by Highway Superintendent David Sipes.
The non-vote from the commission leaves things as they were, a seven member committee with only three voting members.
Sipes said the addition of the four commissioners has made things better in the short term, but a long term solution was needed.
"It's been saner, I'll put it that way," he said. "But if you leave it like it is, you're going to regret it."

Courthouse Renovations Continue

You may have noticed in passing, the many renovations happening on Bolivar's square. Two projects in particular, The Hardeman County Courthouse restoration and the Luez Theatre project have garnered much attention due to the historical ties dating back 193 years.
In the City of Bolivar's history, three courthouses have stood on the court square, with two of these buildings still in existence today. The first courthouse was a two-story log courthouse erected on the court square in 1824. It only served four years and in 1827, was sold to Levi Joy, a settler from Boston, and he had it moved to its present location on East Market Street/Highway 64 East. Now owned and maintained by the Hardeman County APTA, The Little Courthouse Museum is the oldest log building in West Tennessee, and is one of five log courthouses that are still standing in the United States.
From 1862 until May 1864 Bolivar was under military law. During this occupation, the Union Generals: Ulysses S. Grant, William T. Sherman, J.B. McPherson and Lew Wallace made visits. In May 1864 General Sturgis came with his 12,000 soldiers. He decided to make the town useless to any army and especially the Confederates who had defeated him in battle. Pitzer Miller was a local merchant in Bolivar at the time and he had a good relationship with one of the Union Generals. The General, a Mason just like Miller, informed him that the army was going to burn the courthouse the next morning. Miller begged to be

Apples: A Food for All Seasons by Carolyn Tomlin

Johnny "Appleseed" Chapman (1775?-1845), an American pioneer, was legendary for planting apple seeds in the Ohio River Valley. Today we're learning what Chapman knew all the time: that apples are important to our health. Perhaps it's true: An apple a day keeps the doctor away. Look at the following statistics:

- There are approximately 7,500 apple varieties grown worldwide.
- A medium apple has 80 calories and 5 grams of fiber.
- The average American eats 20 lbs. of fresh apples per year (about 65 apples)

The fall season is a great time to enjoy this delicious fruit Try them fresh with the peeling for extra fiber and nutrition. Or bake, shred for cakes, use in salads or a multitude of recipes. Anyway you use this delicious fruit, you'll give your body a healthy boost. Include apples in your daily diet by using some of the following recipes.

Apple Whole-Wheat Muffins (Makes 12 muffins)

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 cup whole wheat flour
- 1/3 cup brown sugar or honey
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup shredded apple
- 1/2 cup English walnuts, chopped

Preheat oven to 400° F. Spray cooking oil on muffin pans. Combine flours, sugar, baking power and salt in mixing bowl. Add apple and walnuts and toss gently. Set aside. In another bowl beat egg; add milk and oil. Add to dry ingredients. Stir just until flour is moistened. Fill muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake about 15 minutes or until golden brown.

Apple-Cabbage-Raisin Salad (Makes 4 servings)

- 2 cups shredded cabbage (Savoy is best)
- 1 red apple (do not peel)
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup sliced almonds
- 1/3 cup light mayonnaise

Shred cabbage in a food chopper or use a sharp knife on a cutting board. Chop apple. Toss cabbage, apple, raisins and almonds in a clear glass-serving bowl. Stir in mayonnaise. Serve chilled.

Spicy Applesauce Dip (Yields 2 cups)

- 1 cup low fat, low sodium ricotta cheese
- 1 cup unsweetened applesauce
- 1 teaspoons curry powder
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Combine all ingredients and place in a blender until smooth. Store covered in the refrigerator until ready to serve. Serve with slices of fresh apples, cantaloupe or other fruit.

Morning Sunshine Breakfast (Yields 2 servings)

Try this simple breakfast with skim milk, heated in the microwave or use as a spread for toast.

- 1 grated apple (or 1 cup unsweetened applesauce)
- 3/4 cup apple juice
- 1 tablespoon dry milk
- 1/2 cup quick oats
- 2 tablespoons raisins
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.

Mix apple and juice for 30 seconds in a blender. Add remaining ingredients and refrigerate until ready to serve.

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Put Lessons from "Retirement Week" to Work

To raise public awareness about the importance of saving for retirement, Congress has designated the third week of October as National Save for Retirement Week. What lessons can you learn from this event?

First of all, save early – and save often. Too many people put off saving for retirement until they are in their late 40s – and even their 50s. At a minimum, put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

Apart from saving and investing early and contributing to your tax-advantaged retirement accounts, how else can you honor the spirit of National Save for Retirement Week? A key step you can take is to reduce the barriers to building your retirement savings. One such obstacle is debt. The larger your monthly debt payments, the less you will be able to invest each month. It's not easy, of course, to keep your debt under control, but do the best you can.

One other barrier to accumulating retirement resources is the occasional large expense resulting from a major car repair, sizable medical bills or other things of that nature. If you constantly have to dip into your long-term investments to meet these costs, you'll slow your progress toward your retirement goals. To help prevent this from happening, try to build an emergency fund big enough to cover three to six months' worth of living expenses. Since you'll need instant access to this money, you'll want to keep it in a liquid, low-risk account.

So, there you have them: some suggestions on taking the lessons of National Save for Retirement Week to heart. By following these steps, you can go a long way toward turning your retirement dreams into reality.

Cider-Baked Stuffed Apples with Salted Caramel Sauce

- Ingredients**
- 4 baking apples, such as Pink Lady, Honeycrisp or Braeburn, about 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 inches in diameter
 - 1/3 cup dried cranberries, chopped
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped walnuts
 - 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
 - 1 cup apple cider or apple juice
 - 1 teaspoon lemon zest
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 3 inches stick cinnamon
 - 1 tablespoon butter, cut into four pieces
 - 1/3 cup packed brown sugar
 - 1/4 cup whipping cream
 - 1/4 cup butter
 - 1 tablespoon light-color corn syrup
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1/2 teaspoon coarse sea salt
 - Vanilla or cinnamon ice cream (optional)
- Directions**
- Core apples; peel a strip from the top of each apple. Place apples, top sides up, in a 3 1/2- or 4-quart slow cooker. (If necessary, trim apples so they will sit on the bottom of the cooker.)
- In a small bowl, combine cranberries, walnuts and brown sugar. Spoon mixture into centers of apples, patting in with a knife or narrow metal spatula. Combine apple cider, lemon zest and lemon juice and pour around apples in cooker. Add stick cinnamon to liquid. Top each apple with a piece of butter. Cover and cook on low-heat setting for 5 hours or on high-heat setting for 2 1/2 hours.
- For sauce: In a heavy small saucepan, bring the 1/3 cup brown sugar, whipping cream, butter and corn syrup to boiling over medium-high heat, whisking occasionally; reduce heat to medium. Boil gently, uncovered, for 2 minutes more. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla and sea salt. Cool to room temperature before serving, or chill for up to 24 hours and rewarm in the microwave on 50 percent power (medium) for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes before serving, stirring twice.
- To serve, transfer warm apples to dessert dishes. Spoon some of the cooking liquid from cooker over apples. Serve with Sea Salt-Caramel Sauce and, if you like, ice cream.

Burn Permits Needed in Hardeman County

The official start of wildfire season in Tennessee was October 15.

"It's important, and required by law from October 15, 2017 to May 15, 2018, that citizens call for a burning permit and follow outdoor burning safety recommendations," State Forester Jere Jeter said. "Tennessee experienced a historic fall fire season last year due to exceptional drought conditions. Fortunately, that underlying condition does not exist this year, but we're not going to let our guard down. The permit system helps us communicate to the public when and where it is safe to burn and focuses attention on safety. We need all Tennesseans to volunteer to prevent wildfire."

The online burn permit system is free, fast and simple. If you are burning a leaf or brush pile that is smaller than 8 feet by 8 feet in size, log on to www.BurnSafeTN.org for approval. More than 300,000 permits are issued each year, and the online system provides a quick and efficient way to apply.

Burn permits are only issued when conditions are conducive to safe burning. If you live inside city limits, there may be additional restrictions. Check with your municipality before you burn.

Burning without a permit is a Class C misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail and/or a fine. Wildfires caused by arson are a class C felony punishable by 3 to 15 years in prison and up to \$10,000 in fines. Anyone with information about suspected arson activity should call the state Fire Marshal's Arson Hotline at 1-800-762-3017. The hotline is answered 24 hours a day, and you may remain anonymous when providing information.

So naturally, when Kevin discovered the incredible rates for Iceland through Wow Air, the trip seemed almost serendipitous. We spent most of our time in Ireland in Cork and Dublin. From Cork, we took a day trip to the rugged Cliffs of Moher, and the Ring of Kerry where we saw beautiful rolling hillsides, dotted with sheep and cows as far as one can see.

In Killarney, we took a horse and buggy ride through an enchanting forest with a local guide who regaled us with stories and made sure that we hated Oliver Cromwell by the end of our tour. We thoroughly enjoyed walking up the narrow winding steps of the Blarney Castle where Kevin and Linda kissed the Blarney stone, giving them the gift of gab. For those who are not familiar with the gift of gab, it is the ability to speak with eloquence or skill at flattery. Winston Churchill, WB Yeats, and Pierce Brosnan are a few of the famous people who have kissed this stone. In Dublin, we walked through the famous Temple Bar pub district, visited St. Patrick's Cathedral, and gazed at the statue of Molly Malone. We also took a day trip to the Wicklow Mountains to see the land of two lakes, the bridge from the movie "P.S. I Love You", and an overlook of a valley where the television show "The Vikings" is filmed. allowed to remove all the records and furniture from the building. Given a full 24 hours, they were able to remove all the documents and store them in Pitzer Miller's basement. After that 24 hours, General Sturgis ordered the business section including the Baptist and Methodist Churches along with the second courthouse to be burned. During the year 1865 progress was made rebuilding the business section. Due to Miller's quick thinking, the City of Bolivar still has all those documents as well as the original design drawing by Jimmy Stevens of the second courthouse.

The third and present courthouse was built in 1868 by the firm Willis, Sloan, and Trigg with Legislative Authority for the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$25,000. Originally built as a two-story brick structure with a pediment portico above the main façade, an arcaded, rusticated ground story, brick piasters with three defined bays and a cupola that has four clock faces that surrounds the building; the building had two, three-story wings added in 1955 by architects Arch-Eason, Anthony, McKinnie, and Cox.

Cathy Mayfield, Grant Administrator for the City of Bolivar, applied for a Historic Preservation Grant from the Tennessee Historical Commission/National Park Service on behalf of Hardeman County and Mayor Jimmy Sain. Mayfield says the original reason in applying for the grant was due to, "The pediment and acanthus leaves were completely falling apart. That's when we decided that something had to be done and I started looking to apply for this grant. This is the most valuable building in the entire county, we've got to take care of it."



house was in dire need of more repairs than were initially thought. Originally there were 16 feet of soffit and fascia board along the southwest front entrance and approximately eight feet of soffit and fascia board on the northwest front entrance that had deteriorated due to a water leak along the roof line edge. With over 15 years experience working in historic property restoration, Hardeman County resident Brad Grantham (Brad Grantham Construction (also completing the restorations on the Luez), is the contractor in charge of the project. Along the front west entrance, there were nine double eave brackets and three larger corbels that needed to be replicated and replaced. Grantham had to have a knife maker make particular knives so that new eave brackets and corbels could match identically to the historic originals. The newly carved cedar will be painted to match the existing structure. Mayfield says, "He had to re-create all that wood. You can't buy that anymore. The artistic designs like the Greek key and all the ornamental elements of the building, had to be completely replicated. Brad had

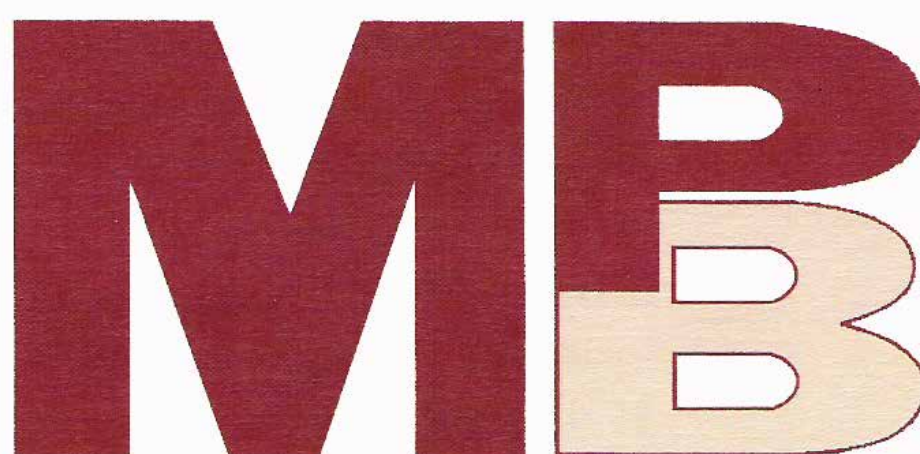
