The Trashman Cometh

If you wouldn't mind taking out the trash on your way out to pay your property taxes, the county would sure appreciate it.

At least that's how it might seem to Hardeman Countians.

The passage of the private act by the county commission earlier this year that adds the cost of maintaining the county landfill was put into action this past week when Hardeman County Trustee Mary Powell and her staff began mailing bills to citizens with the landfill fees included.

A line item on the tax bill entitled "solid waste" (for residential properties it is normally \$108) included in the total tax bill.

"Normally, I can explain the reason for any amount on the tax notice," said Hardeman County Assessor of Property Josh Pulse. "But as far as the rules for which

properties are assessed a landfill fee, my office is not responsible. We are the assessor of property, not garbage fees."

But that hasn't stopped the questions coming to the Assessor of Property's Office.

"We are fielding dozens of complaints and concerns from taxpayers," added Pulse. "We are referring all solid waste questions to the Solid Waste Department or the County Mayor's Office."

County Mayor Jimmy Sain explained what benefits the county could have from the change.

"The landfill tax being on the tax bill will increase the percentage of collections, which will assure our citizens of no landfill tax increase for the near future. It is important to know that the landfill is an enterprise fund, which means we can't use property tax-

es to fund it. The revenues from the landfill tax has to fund the expenses of the landfill that is highly regulated by the State and Federal Government.

"I sincerely believe that our citizens will like the fee being billed annually rather than monthly. Many of our customers already pay annually. I appreciate Hardeman County Trustee Mary Powell and her staff agreeing to help with this billing change."

Sain further stated that any questions should be directed to the Hardeman County Solid Waste Department at 731-658-2884 or to the County Mayor's office at 731-658-3266.

"We are all working together to save our taxpayers money," he added.

Council Denies Howell Again

An hour of testimony, an executive session, and questions of conflict of interest ended with a 4-3 vote against allowing Bolivar businesswoman Maria Howell the right to open a package store in the City of Bolivar.

Howell's request was to set aside the current Bolivar liquor ordinance, passed in 2015, which states all packages stores must be located in the Bolivar Downtown Development Zone

Voting against Howell were Randy Hill, Willie McKinnie, Todd Lowe and Suzanne Rhea. Voting for the store to be given a license were Julian McTizic, Larry McKinnie and Tracy Byrum. Present at the beginning of the meeting, but not for the vote, was Quantissia Hamer.

The vote came after the city council held a 27 minute executive session with their attorney and after Howell's attorney, Danielle Elks of Nashville, asked if anyone on the council had a relationship with the owners of the current liquor store that would present a conflict of interest in their vote. Councilman Larry McKinnie said yes there was, but neither he nor any other member of the council elaborated further.

Oven-Fried Chicken

- Ingredients**
- 1/3 cup low-fat buttermilk
 - 1/4 cup finely chopped fresh chives
 - 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
 - 1/4 teaspoon hot sauce
 - 4 bone-in chicken breasts
 - 1/2 cup dried breadcrumbs
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper

Directions

In a medium bowl, whisk together the buttermilk, chives, mustard, and hot sauce. Remove the skin from the chicken breasts, add the chicken to the bowl, and let it soak for at least 30 minutes or overnight. Preheat the oven to 425°F. Spray a rimmed baking sheet with cooking spray. Place the breadcrumbs in a wide, shallow bowl. Remove the chicken from the marinade, and season it with salt and pepper. Dip the chicken into the breadcrumbs, and toss well to coat. Place the chicken on the prepared baking sheet. Spray the chicken generously with cooking spray, and bake until it is just cooked through, 25 to 30 minutes.

I wondered at the time what I had done, but figured it had to be more related to my car. I knew I was up to date on my tags and sticker, so I just wondered and waited for the walk to the window. Turns out, my brake light was out. The officer was nice and asked me a few questions of follow up. I call this the fishing expedition. They take the opportunity of a pulled vehicle to make sure they don't have something else they could have caught on the stop. I was then handed a warning and kindly sent on my way. Looking down at the warning, I found some of the words very interesting. "The constable's office of Montgomery County is giving you this friendly warning for the stated traffic violation because we believe good citizens will follow the laws when given a reminder."

I am certainly glad I got a warning, and thought the printed section on the warning notice was nice and insightful. I was being reminded to follow the rules in hopes that I would get in line with them. The

The Bomb and Arson team was on hand with their smart Labrador Retriever, performing presentations on how he catches an arsonist after a fire. All the children loved seeing him sit perfectly still allowing them to love all over him. A giant Smokey the Bear replica drew kids to the BurnSafeTN and TN Forestry Commission tent where there were Frisbees, book marks, bracelets, activity & coloring books, pencils, pencil sharpeners, and the story of Smokey all being handed out for free. The Tennessee State Fire Marshall and Fire Prevention team was on hand to draw attention to how smoke alarm safety and training within your home can save lives.

On July 8, 2016, Casey Simmons ran under a Roger Henson tractor trailer in front of El Guadalajara restaurant on Highway 64 in Bolivar. The temperature that day was 108° without adding in the heat index or temperature of the asphalt. Whiteville Police Department along with Hardeman County Rescue, Fire Department, Bolivar Police Department, and other agencies were on hand for the two and half hours it would take to remove Mr. Simmons from his now unrecognizable 2012 GMC Sierra. At the HC Emergency Services Festival, an on-scene scenario of Mr. Simmons' accident was re-created with him on hand for the public to see the astonishing results the fire and rescue squad provide daily to save lives. Without all of these incredibly trained individuals, Mr. Simmons and countless other citizens would not be here today.

"There will never be enough words to accurately thank all of you enough. You provide a service that a lot of times goes un-noticed, sometimes seemingly expected. But it is not something that myself or our little boy will ever take for granted. You allowed us to keep our husband and father that day, when in fact he is astoundingly lucky to be alive. A Message from the Assessor of Property

2016 tax notices have been mailed out by the Trustee's office and I have received many calls from folks all across the county the last few days who are very concerned and upset about the increase in this year's tax bill. The majority of taxpayers who have called or come into to Assessor's office are asking what has happened to cause such an increase in their tax bill since last year. The county will not go through a state mandated reappraisal until 2018 so the property values remain relatively unchanged until that time. The county tax rate is the same as last year so why am I paying more? The answer to that question is because earlier this year the county commission voted to add the solid waste fee to the 2016 property tax bill. The solid waste fee also known as the landfill bill is administered by the solid waste office which is under the supervision and direction of the County Mayor. I have taken several people over to the solid waste office who have come by my office and asked about this new "landfill tax" and the ladies in the solid waste office have been able to assist the taxpayers and make changes if it is warranted to do so. The thing I want to make perfectly clear is that this new landfill tax is not added by the Assessor of Property. I have had more than one person come in and say to me that they just elected me to office and I have already gone up on their taxes. This is not the case. This special landfill tax was added to the tax bill by the Hardeman County Commission. Should a taxpayer have a problem with their property tax appraisal then I will make every effort to assist them in making sure their assessment is correct. But on this new solid waste "landfill tax" I have no authority. I want to assure the taxpayers that my door is always open and if I cannot assist them then I will see that they get in front of the right person who can help them. This new landfill tax has many citizens asking questions and I hope this will help answer some of those questions that people have.

Justin Raye Navarro, age 20 of Bolivar, Tennessee, passed from this life Sunday, October 9, 2016 in Bolivar.

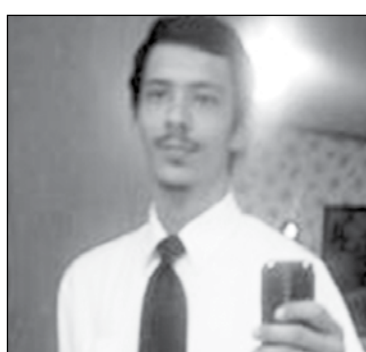

CCA Holds Commencement Ceremony by Jessica Simmons

CCA-Whiteville honored inmates who achieved an academic milestone with a graduation ceremony on Friday.

Someone may be a high school dropout who needs a structured pathway towards a High School Diploma. Others may be high academic achievers who made some mistakes, landing themselves in prison. When these individuals take advantage of CCA programs, they can pursue advanced degrees or other post-secondary study to put them on the right track when their sentence has ended.

CCA's life skills and re-entry programs are based on research that has uncovered proven ways to change thinking patterns, resulting in permanent changes in behavior. Life Skills training impacts every area of an individual's life, from coping with emotions to rearing children, and from managing money to making decisions. Cognitive behavioral classes are designed to help inmates overcome attitude



challenges and acting out in negative ways. Participants learn about logical problem solving and the development of good decision making skills.

Providing inmates with evidence based treatment is essential to eradicating the cycles of substance abuse, incarceration, and recidivism. CCA's substance use disorder program (R-DAP) utilizes state-of-the-art cognitive behavioral curriculum in conjunction with time tested therapeutic community (TC) practices to help correct the program participants' maladaptive thinking and behavior patterns that underlie their crimes and destructive use of drugs.

According to a study at the University of Loyola - Chicago Law School, it's been proven that people who participate in educational programs while in prison are much less likely to be re-arrested and find themselves incarcerated again. Earning an educational credential for inmates is about much more than a piece of paper. It represents the promise of a new, law-abiding life, one in which they can be gainfully employed, support their families and earn the respect of their communities.

Principal Virginia Crump entered the room before all the graduates and took the time to introduce herself, and shake hands with every guest in attendance and former Hardeman County Mayor, Willie Spencer gave an inspirational speech, while Principal Crump gave the commencement address.

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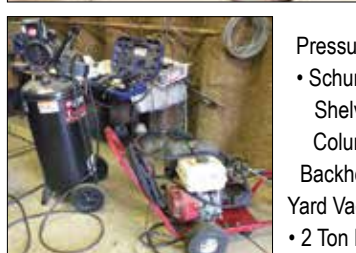
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
