Council to Consider Liquor Change

The Bolivar City Council is expected to consider revising the Bolivar Municipal Code in regards to package stores in the city at the regularly scheduled meeting on November 13 at 6:30 p.m. in the Bolivar Municipal Courtroom.

The change expected to be considered is to remove any reference to the DEVCO Zone from the liquor ordinance, which established guidelines for liquor stores in Bolivar in June of 2015.

The legality of package stores in Bolivar was passed by a referendum of the voters (71%-29%) in May of 2015, and the subsequent ordinance limited the area in which a store could be located to the Bolivar Downtown Develop-

ment Zone (DEVCO).

The passing of the ordinance was also a matter of controversy. The first reading of the ordinance was passed 5-0 on June 9, 2015, but the second reading was passed after only four council members attended the June 22, 2015 meeting. While some felt only four members did not constitute a quorum and a legal meeting, it was concluded that a majority was present because Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens could be added to the total number of council members.

Of the current council members, only Todd Lowe and Suzanne Rhea voted for the ordinance on the second reading, and Ms. Rhea

was one of the focal points of a lawsuit brought against the city by Mrs. Maria Howell in early 2016, alleging a conflict of interest on her part.

Voting for the measure on the first reading, but not present for the second was councilman Larry McKinnie and then councilman, now mayor, Julian McTizic. The only other councilperson who was involved that is still on the council is Tracy Byrum, who failed to attend either meeting in June of 2015.

Any change to the ordinance would need to be passed at two separate meetings, with the public allowed comment on the night of the second reading.

Walley Considers Run at Congress County to Honor Veterans on Nov. 3

Dr. Page Walley, former State Representative and current Vice Mayor of Bolivar, is considering a run for the 7th U.S. Congressional District. Since Rep. Marsha Blackburn announced she will not be seeking reelection, voters from across the district have expressed to Walley their desire to see him run.

Walley served five terms in the Tennessee House of Representatives and six years in executive branch leadership under Republican governors as Commissioner of the Tennessee Department of Children's Services and the Alabama Departments of Children's Affairs and Human Services. Under his leadership, Alabama became the first state to fundamentally reform its child and family protection system and exceed federal court expectations.

Walley, a clinical psychologist and licensed minister-works as a managing director at Casey Family Programs, the nation's largest operating foundation focused on strengthening communities and families. In this role, Walley works with local, state, and federal officials to address these needs.

"Working with communities and families locally, nationally, and internationally, I see the insecurities and struggles that our



people face in order to provide for their families. I have been a part of collaborating with folks of all persuasions to find common sense solutions to these challenges. In working with communities to develop economically, nothing is more foundational than the safety and well-being of our most vital resource, our children and families. Without educated, healthy, technologically-equipped communities, we cannot have the workforce and future we hope for."

"This 19-county district is both blessed and challenged to achieve the hopes of our people. The vast majority of our counties are considered 'economically distressed,' while a few have benefited from remarkable regional growth and development. We need someone

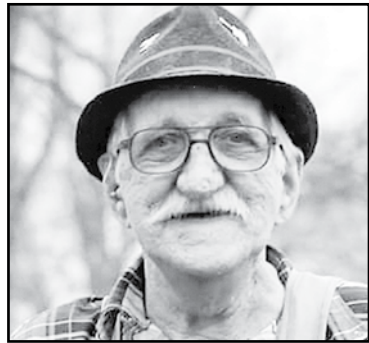

Pains and Gains

I don't always understand trouble or pain. Why God allows these two forces in our lives is beyond me. I understand that we have subjected ourselves to a natural tendency toward disorder when sin entered humanity. Still, we all wonder at times why God allows certain challenges to inflict us. Beyond the deep personal pains, there are also the practical pains of living in a physical world. As I write this, I have a mosquito that keeps just out of reach, but keeps biting me. At least I'm not standing on a mound of fire ants, another pain those in the south understand well.

Joan Murray, of Charlotte, NC has a most remarkable story. She was bitten over 200 hundred times by fire ants. If you are familiar with these little beasts, you can imagine how dreadful that might be. Why would God allow someone to suffer at the hands of His created beings? Why would He subject her to this excruciating pain? It may have been that He uses pain and hardship as tools to save us, direct us or warn us. In Joan's case, it was actually to save her life. You see, before Joan landed in the pile of fire ants, she had been skydiving. She jumped from 14,500 feet. Her main parachute failed to open and her backup parachute collapsed. She hit the ground at an estimated 80 miles per hour.

Joan was, as you could imagine, very much hurt and damaged in the accident. Miraculously, she survived. She was in a coma for two weeks and required a significant number of surgeries and rehabilitation. The doctors believe that she is alive, in part, because of the numerous bites from the fire ants. Joan's body released a massive adrenaline surge to deal with the stings, and that reaction kept her heart beating. Truly, one of the most direct cases I know of that explains how pain can sometimes save us.

If you watched the movie "Signs", you will remember the final scene with the young boy inhaling poisons. Most people in the movie that were exposed to the chemicals died, but because he had asthma, the poison never reached his blood stream. The point is very direct, that things happen for a reason, some of which we never understand. Occasionally though, we do get to see the why. I often thank God when I am redirected or stalled on a trip. I figure there is a reason beyond my ability to see.

Joseph had many difficulties to contend with. Jealous brothers who beat him and wanted to leave him for dead. They "graciously" decided instead to sell him into slavery. He was then wrongfully accused and thrown into prison. Joseph didn't give in to the struggles, he trusted God was somehow still at work. "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives" (Genesis 50:20, NIV). Indeed, countless lives were saved when years of drought and famine hit the land. Joseph's family was brought to safety where they grew into a great nation.

There is a lot of pain, struggle, annoyance and trouble that seems meaningless. I can't exactly tell you why you have to deal with it in your life and I don't know that I can simply blame God for all of it. I do know, however, that He uses pain and suffering for some pretty miraculous reasons.

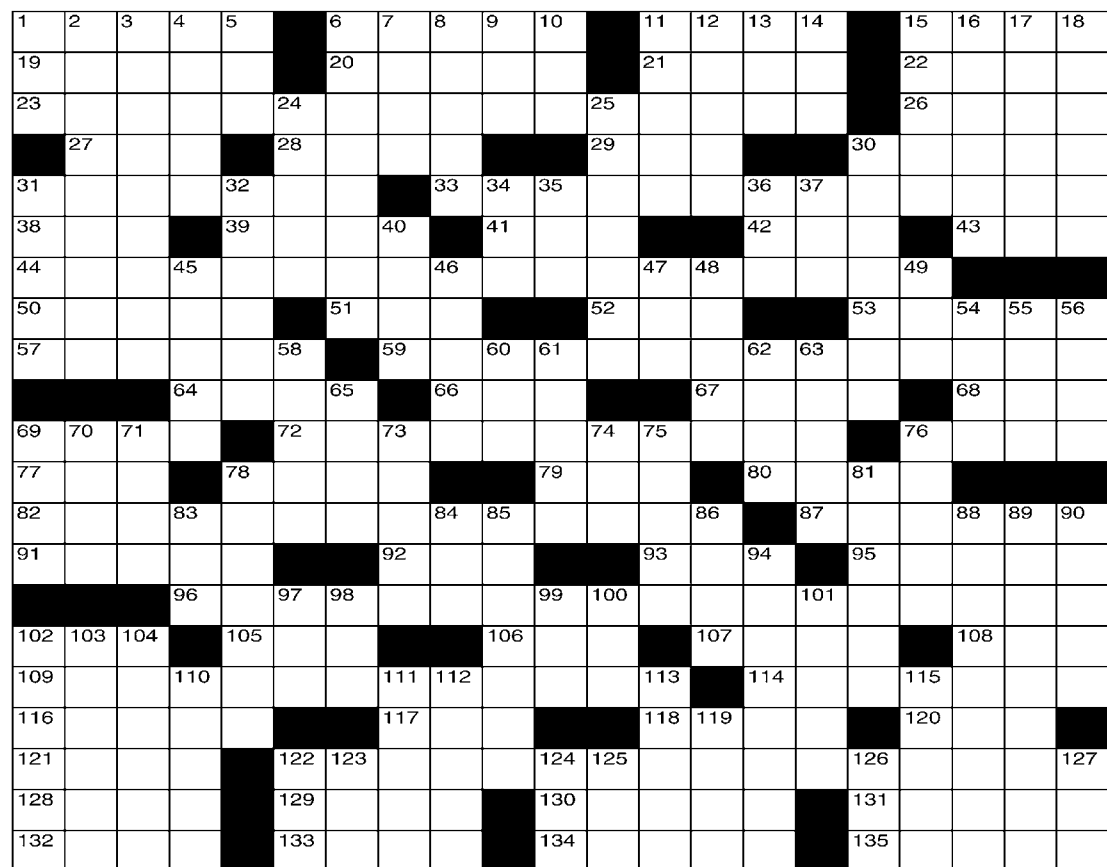

Does Market Volatility Scare You?

Halloween is almost upon us. Of course, on Halloween night, you may see a parade of monsters, demons, Transformers and other frightening individuals stopping by your house, exercising their right to demand candy. Fortunately, their appearance will be unlikely to cause you unpleasant dreams. But some people seem to have real fears about other things – such as what may happen in the financial markets. One way to keep those fears at bay is to avoid certain impulsive moves, such as the following:

Avoid ducking out of the market – Consider this: In March 2007, the Dow Jones Industrial Average stood at about 12,275 points. Exactly two years later, in the immediate aftermath of the financial crisis, the Dow had fallen to about 6,500 – a drop of 47% and the Dow's lowest point in 12 years. By that time, a lot of people had gone to the investment sidelines. So, what did they miss? Depending on how long they stayed out of the market, they may have missed some, or perhaps most, of one of the longest and strongest bull markets in history, because, just eight years later, the Dow had soared to almost 21,000, a gain of 223%. Of course, investing does involve the risk of losing principal, and there is no guarantee the market will perform as it has in the past. However, it's fair to say that if you duck out of the market during its lower points, you might not benefit from the gains that may follow.

Avoid chasing "hot" stocks – By the time you hear about a supposedly "hot" stock, it may already be cooling off. Also, how trustworthy is the source? Does this tip come from an unbiased, knowledgeable individual? If not, you have reason to question its value. Even more important, though, you need to ask if the hot stock is appropriate for your needs, goals and risk tolerance. If not, it's not so hot.

Avoid taking on too much – or too little – risk. If you feel the need to push your portfolio toward the maximum possible returns, you might invest too aggressively and take on too much risk.

Conversely, if you are determined to avoid any amount of loss, at any time, you might invest so conservatively that your portfolio won't grow enough to help you achieve your long-term goals. You need to strike a balance between risk and reward that is appropriate for you, and you need to make investment choices suitable for your individual risk tolerance.

Avoid owning too many of the same investments – If you own a lot of one particular financial asset and a market downturn affects that asset class strongly, your portfolio could suffer. But if you spread your investment dollars among domestic and international stocks, bonds, U.S. Treasury securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on, you may not be as susceptible to a downturn, because different types of investments often perform differently at any given time. (Keep in mind, though, that while diversification can help reduce the effects of market volatility, it can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.)

No matter what you do, you can't take all the uncertainty out of investing. But by understanding market volatility and the composition of your portfolio, you can invest with more confidence.

Bolivar Fire Department Visits the Library by Jessica Simmons



The City of Bolivar Fire Department arrived in a fire truck for Story Time at the library on October 18. Engineers Dylan Henderson and Steven McKeen talked to the children about a day in the life of a firefighter before heading outside to tour the fire truck.

Henderson explained all the workings of the truck, what each piece of equipment was and how it operated, and what they used each piece of equipment for. McKeen showed the children how he and his colleagues must dress out in their turn-out gear in under a minute in order to get to an emergency quickly. After hearing the sirens and air horn, all the kids received a goody bag and fire helmet to complete the day.

Hospital Wing Covers Hardeman County by Jessica Simmons

In order to stress the necessity of Hospital Wing ambulatory services and the free service available to all Hardeman County residents, Mayor Jimmy Sain along with citizens who have needed the life-saving helicopter, came together to talk about their experiences.

Hospital wing covers six states in their 250-mile flight radius of Memphis. For over 30 years, Hospital Wing has been committed to the highest level of care and calls themselves, "Your connection to critical care transport."

Cindy Plunk recounts needing Hospital Wing transport after her heart attack followed by quadruple bypass surgery at Jackson General Hospital. "Without Hospital Wing, I know without a doubt I wouldn't be standing here today."

Corey Madden recalls when his son Bryce fell and hit his neck on a wooden rocker, restricting his air way so badly he couldn't breathe. He and his wife Megan rushed Bryce to Bolivar General Hospital where they put him on oxygen but they were so concerned with his breathing, the hospital called Hospital Wing to get him to Lebonheur as quickly as possible. "Bryce at this time is



five years old and he was without his Mom and I with all this scary stuff going on. The good thing about it was they had my wife's cell number and texted us pictures of Bryce along the way to show he was okay, which helped give us some relief." Corey continued to say, "In the moment, you aren't concerned with the cost, you don't care how it gets paid for. You're just consumed with your son's safety and you want to save your son no matter what. But when it's all said and done and the dust settles, you realize that there's a very significant expense for these services. But thanks to Hardeman County, they foot the bill. It is such a relief that our county provides this service and takes care of it for you so your family doesn't

have to worry about it. It takes a lot of load off, especially when you've been through what you've been through."

Hospital Wing (Memphis Medical Center Air Ambulance Service, Inc.) is a non-profit air ambulance company that supplies emergency air lift services to an average of 250 patients a month with 60% of these being trauma related and 35% being scene flights. The Memphis Medical Center Air Ambulance Service owns seven helicopters that are equipped to transport critically ill and injured patients. Six helicopters are staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week and one helicopter is available for PediFlite, the transport team of Lebonheur Children's Medical Center.

Chamber Holds Coffee Talk in Middleton by Jessica Simmons

Tennessee State Senator DeLores Gresham and State Representative Ron Gant were the hosts of this month's Coffee Talk held at Southwind Restaurant in Middleton.

Coffee Talk is held monthly at sites around the county, most often at the Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce in Bolivar.

Different topics are featured at each coffee talk and the public is invited to attend.



Bolivar Hosts Emergency Services Festival

The Bolivar Fire Department hosted the Fire & Emergency Services Festival at Walmart on October 14. A helicopter landing from Hospital Wing and Air Evac along with multiple fire trucks, police cars, and other emergency vehicles were just part of the excitement provided for adults and children.

Free concessions were provided while attendees moved through the multiple booths teaching about FireWise, Fire Prevention, Smokey the Bear, and even a tour of a Fire Safety Education Trailer.



County Provides Commodities by Jessica Simmons

The Hardeman County Community Service Center along with Southwest Human Resource Agency held a Commodities Distribution at the National Guard Armory on October 5. The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) works to improve the health of low-income elderly persons at least 60 years of age by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA Foods. This month's Food packages included a variety of foods, such as nonfat dry and ultra-high-temperature fluid milk, a mixture of juices, canned chicken, ready-to-eat cereal, rice, pasta, peanut butter, dry beans, canned meat, poultry, or fish, and canned fruits and vegetables.

For FY 2016, Congress appropriated \$222.198 million for CSFP. Annual appropriations may be supplemented by unspent funds carried over from the previous fiscal year, if available. But if unused, these appropriations may disappear from our county. If you know someone in need of these free food items, please be sure they are signed up to receive them. Qualifying recipients are those who receive government benefits, mothers whose children receive TennCare, and other low-income families. Madison County has over 2,000 sign-ups for each Commodities Day, with Hardeman County coming no-where near our poverty rate.

Southwest and the Hardeman County Community Service Center can make bulk deliveries to churches or community centers, as these serve to help a larger group of people who may not be able to make it all the way to Bolivar to be able to pick up the goods they need.

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

Halloween at the Yellow House wasn't all that spooky. We usually had a jack-o-lantern, put up on Halloween Day so it could still be used by Mom to make a pumpkin pie or just cooked pumpkin. We did not truly believe in ghosts, ghouls, goblins and such, but we still were a little bit wary on halloween night just in case a stack of rattle-bones jumped from behind a tree or bush to pounce upon us, or a witch on a broom decided to get out from in front of the moon and swoop down upon us. Sometimes we would dress up in some outlandish costume and a bunch of us would go out walking. We were not allowed to do any tricks that would cause harm to anyone. Sometimes they would have a tacky party at the Pocahontas School. All contestants dressed as tacky as possible. My Mom won it a time or two and her prize was a bar of soap and a jar of sour pickles. Even though us youngsters weren't allowed to participate, the ultimate goal for every young boy was to slip Mr. Lee Rowland's buggy out of the barn and roll it downtown Pocahontas. This was accomplished a few times.



Another trick in the community was to turn over an outdoor toilet or two. There was a tie-yard in town and the morning after Halloween usually found the north and south entrances to the town blocked with crossties. There was the usual soaping of the store windows. A lot of the store owners would coat their windows with vaseline to make the cleanup easier. Toilet tissue wasn't used at all. I doubt if there was enough toilet paper in the community to really decorate a twelve foot hackberry tree. One trick that was done on Halloween was to tie a fishhook on a long piece of nylon fishing cord, hook the fishhook to a loose board on a house, pull the cord taut and rub it with your fingers. This would cause a vibration all through the house and sound similar to what I imagine a bull would sound like if his tail was caught in a sausage grinder.

Another thing was to make a small hole in the bottom of a Quaker oatmeal box, push the string through and tie a big knot. By holding the string tight and rubbing your fingers on the string, it would create a loud moaning sound. This brought a lot of people to their front porches to check it out. I heard of one boy who wrapped cow excrement in a newspaper, put it on the ground in front of a persons house and set it afire, knocked on the front door and then ran and hid. The owner came out and started stomping the fire out, and you can imagine the rest. Kids, do not try this one. It is very dangerous and is a no no.

Some people made popcorn balls to give away on Halloween. They melted butter with sorghum molasses and poured it over the popcorn and rolled it into round balls. Some would also add roasted peanuts. This definitely was a treat. The kid in me still likes Halloween. who understands how to build on the strengths that we have while making sure we don't leave others behind."

As a popular state legislator who served on the Agriculture, Finance, and Health and Human Services committees, Walley was known as a problem-solving consensus builder who held more than 800 "Listening Meetings" throughout his district to hear from citizens so he could work better for them and address their individual and collective concerns.

Walley is a sought-after speaker both here and abroad on issues of faith, family, and community well-being. Recently, former Congressman, Homeland Security Undersecretary, and current Governor Asa Hutchinson (R-Arkansas) asked Walley to keynote his "Restoring Hope Summit" to equip business and faith leaders to meet the needs of citizens reentering society after prison or aging out of foster care.

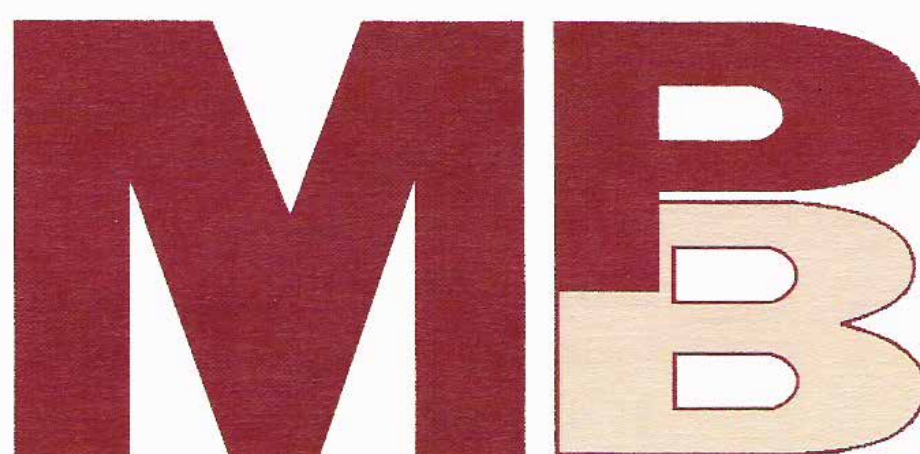

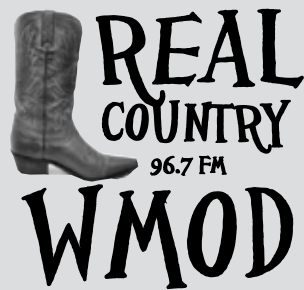

One Last Game at Woody Woods Stadium

Bolivar Central Football will say goodbye to Woody Woods Stadium on October 27, as the final home game of the 2017 season will be the last game played at the stadium which was first used in 1953.

"The last couple of years the Board of Education has been investigating new facilities for both high schools," said Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "We've had to do a lot of belt-tightening, but we can now go forward without having to do any financing."

In addition to new home side seating, a new fieldhouse will be built to house the football facilities. The field itself, named after R.A. Butler, will remain in the same place.

"The old stadium has a lot of character, but a lot of flaws. We've repaired it over the years many times," said Ross, adding that the locker rooms will be in the field house that will be situated near the south end of the field.

In the spring, Hardeman County Schools plan to build a new gymnasium at Middleton High School, replacing Bailey Howell Gymnasium.

"With seventh through twelfth grades at Middleton, there are a lot of teams competing for floor time in addition to the P.E. classes," said Ross. "We plan to build a spectator gym for Middleton High School."

Ross, who said architectural drawings of the projects should be available in the next couple of weeks, hopes the Bolivar Central Stadium will be done in time for spring graduation ceremonies, the fieldhouse in time for summer, and the gym at Middleton ready in the fall of 2018.



Bolivar Clinches Playoff Spot



Bolivar Central clinched a TSSAA Playoff spot by beating Martin-Westview 47-20 at UT Martin on October 20.

Bolivar trailed in the first half by a 13-12 score, but tallied the next 35 points to put the game away.

Senior quarterback Trey Lowe completed 14 of 19 passes for 350 yards and four touchdowns. Two Bolivar receivers, Josh Sturgis (four catches, 131 yards) and K.J. Murden (five catches, 109 yards) tallied more than 100 yards for the second time this season.

Running back Correy Brown ran 14 times for 115 yards and three touchdowns. Brown also caught a touchdown pass in the win.

Lowe was named the Vaughan Oil Player of the Game and Christian Matthews, who had 11 tackles, was named the Defensive Player of the Game.

Bolivar's win clinched their third consecutive year they qualified for the playoffs, something no Bolivar team had done since 2001. Coach Woodrow Lowe's career record at Bolivar now stands at 23-18. Lowe is the first coach with more than three years of experience with a winning record since Errol Hook, who coached from 1975-1983, according to the Tennessee Prep database.

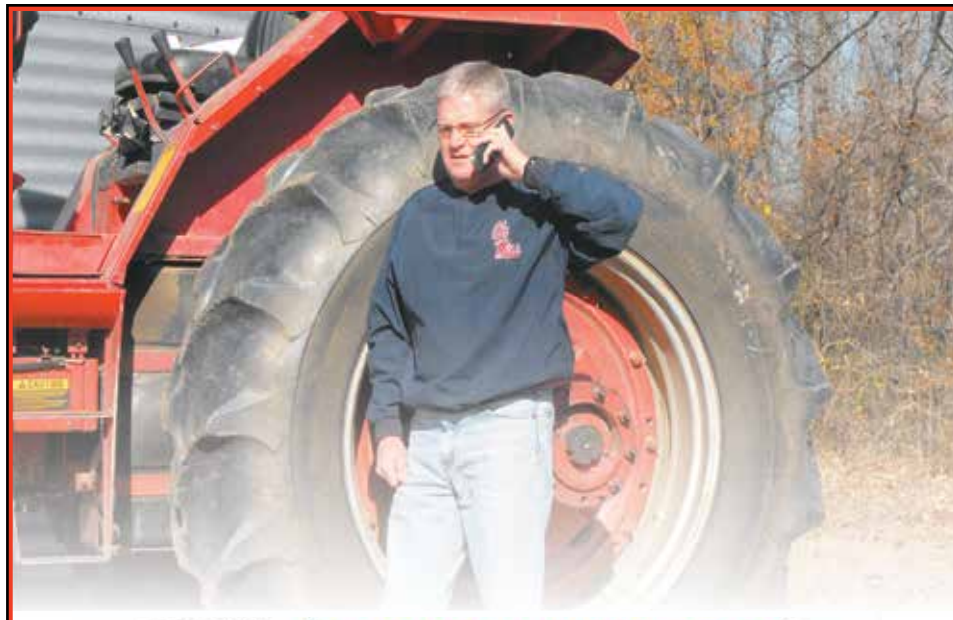
Middleton Falls to Huntingdon

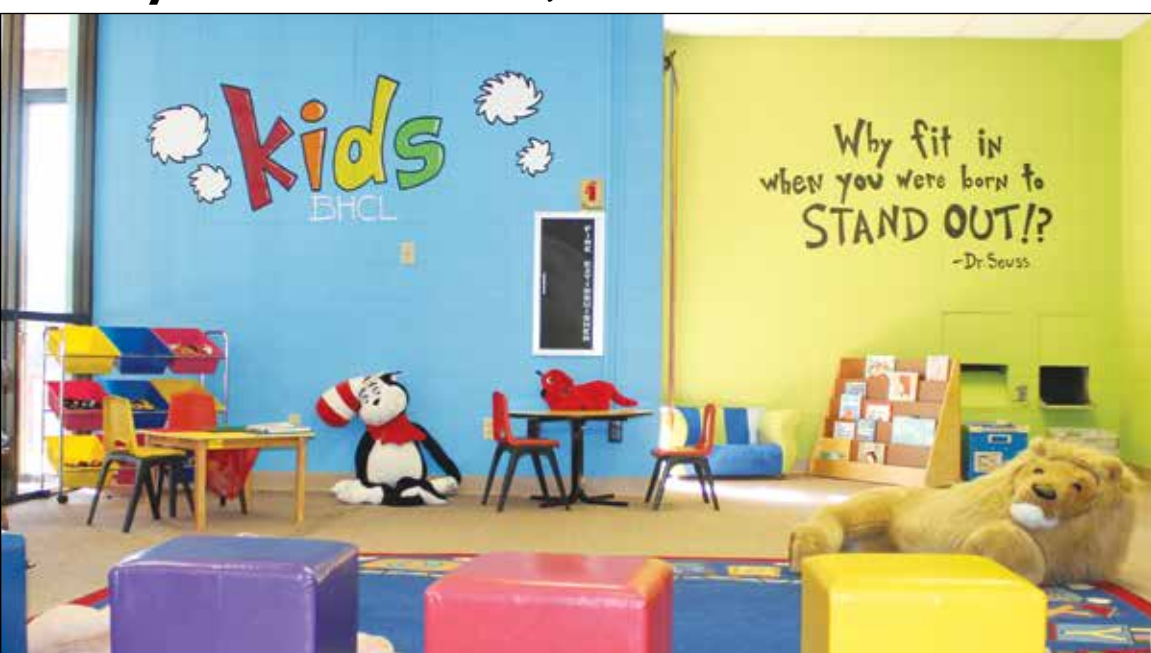
