Minutes before each game, he wouldn't be there, but ALWAYS at the last minute, he would show up from four-wheeling, or hunting, or something...and do amazing things. He could pitch, hit, and field. Our team had amazing chemistry. When I read his obituary, I realized why: three of his pallbearers were on the last team we played on. Somehow, I'd picked his friends to play. Or maybe he just made friends with everyone. Both were probably true. With Jacob, it's hard to feel like he wasn't cheated out of life. But as far as I saw, he lived as much life into the time he had as anyone I've ever seen. The other young man, I never met. He was taken from us, with no warning. JoJo Robertson lived way too short a life and will be greatly missed. Their stories were different. But the sadness is very much the same. We send our prayers and our hopes for peace and understanding for both.

Huge Election Turnout So Far

The election commission has been a hopping place for the last week. Through Wednesday, October 26, 2,786 voters have voted at the Hardeman County Election Commission. After six days of early voting, the turnout is on pace to beat 2012 numbers, where 5,866 voted over the 15 days. Hardeman County Federal, State of Tennessee, the City of Bolivar Wine in Grocery Stores referendum, Town of Hornsby, City of Middleton, Town of Saulsbury, Town of Silerton, and Town of Toone Municipal Elections will be contested this cycle. Early voting continues through November 3. On November 3, the election commission offices will have extended hours, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Election Day is November 8. WMOD Radio will broadcast county results on November 8 beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Arrests Made in Toone Homicides

Arrests were made on October 26 in the October 21 murders of a Toone man and his son. Joe Robertson, 38, and his son Javarrie "JoJo" Robertson, 13, were discovered the morning of October 21. A 5-year-old child and a newborn also were in the home at the time, but they were not injured, according to statement by Tennessee Bureau of Investigations spokesman Josh DeVine. JoJo was an eighth grade student at Toone Elementary School. A large law enforcement presence on the evening of October 21 at the Walmart in Bolivar was thought to be related to the crime, but turned out not to be so. Arrested and charged with First Degree Murder are Andrian M. Bullock, 22, of Ripley, MS; Jeremy Hamer, 29, of Michigan City, MS; and Damein K. Hamer, 25, also of Michigan City. Additional charges may be forthcoming as well. "We appreciate the thoughts and prayers of everyone," said Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen. "Our officers worked hard on this and we hope this can begin the healing process for our community. We appreciate the assistance of all law enforcement who made this a priority." Sheriff Doolen is urging anyone with information that could help further shed light on these killings to call 1-800-TBI-FIND.

Bridge Name to Memorialize Wood



The Hatchie River Bridge in Pocahontas that crosses Highway 57 will be dedicated to the memory of Herbert Wood as the Herbert Wood Memorial Bridge on November 5, at 10:00 a.m. The resolution details Wood's accomplishments and contributions, of which some are: He was a native of Shiloh, Tennessee, and married the former Marilyn Rinks of Bolivar, Tennessee. He retired from Merchants and Planters Bank, and was a 30-year Veteran of the Tennessee Army National Guard. An ardent historian, he began working on the Davis Bridge Project in 1983, and was instrumental in the preservation of the Davis Bridge Battlefield in Hardeman County, which was the site of the second largest battle in West Tennessee. He received the Robert A. "Bob" Ragland Award in 2006 by the Tennessee Civil War Preservation Association for his substantial contribution to the preservation of historical sites associated with the Civil War in Tennessee. *Photo by Heather Pulse.*

Yarbrough Makes Her Mark on History

Hattye Mae Thomas Yarbrough grew up near Grand Junction in Hardeman County. The daughter of sharecroppers, her father lost everything during the Great Depression.

She couldn't imagine many of the things she's seen in her 95 years.

For instance, never in a million years is when she thought she'd see America's first African American president.

And never in a million years did she ever think she, the star basketball player from Paris, Tennessee, would ever have artifacts on display in a Smithsonian museum.

But, just like Barack Obama, it's happened.

The kids in school used to avoid her, saying, "Here comes Hattye Mae with all her mess," she said, laughing at the memory.

And it is Yarbrough who has actually had the last laugh.

The contents from one of her scrapbooks packed full of memorabilia from African American soldiers who served during World War II, are now on display at the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture, which held its grand opening Saturday, Sept. 24.

When she arrived on the third level and saw some of the things she donated — rocks sent to her from Master Sergeant Wallace B. Jackson from the beaches of Normandy on D-Day, the flag that covered her late husband Ordrell's casket, a booklet titled "Negroes in the War" — she was proud.

"I stood there and I looked around at all of the things there and I went back to ..."

Yarbrough pauses to collect herself and gather her thoughts on what was among the most important moments of her life.

Her journey to the Smithsonian began when her father sent her to Paris live with her Uncle William Robert Jarrett and "Aunt Sybil" the principal and a third grade teacher, respectively, at Henry County Training School — to attend high school there.

Her brother cousins, as she calls them, Dunbar and Vernon Jarrett, had moved away and she inherited their room. Inside that room was a bookshelf that changed her life,

she said.

On that bookshelf were books, magazines and other publications detailing African American contributions to history, none of which were in her textbooks.

She started reading them and one day asked her aunt, "Is this true? Did colored folks really do this?"

During the war, Yarbrough, then a student at Lane College, collected letters, cards, telegrams, photos, unit patches, liberty cards and other memorabilia sent to her by African American soldiers she befriended while working at Camp Tyson, near Paris, and Waynesville Junction USO near Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

The scrapbook also contained photos from Africa, India and Europe; patches from almost every branch of the military and many different units; newspaper clippings; programs from plays performed at the USO; ticket stubs and more.

The war ended more than 70 years ago, and many of the soldiers she once knew, soldiers who served in once-segregated units, have died, but she doesn't want their service to the country to be forgotten.

This is just her collection, she said, but it shows participation and that is why it's important to African American history.

She has dedicated her life to documenting as much as she could ever since her talk with Aunt Sybil around the table that day.

Eighty years later, she hopes she's done her aunt proud.

"... I went back to how I felt, I got that feeling the same night that

I asked Aunt Sybil questions and she explained to me how we were who we were.

"And I thought about where I had come from as a little barefoot girl over in Hardeman County, slipping and pulling off my shoes when I got out of the house so my folks would not know I pulled my shoes off.

"And I thought about in my wildest dreams would I ever have imagined having something in the world's museum. I had come a long ways and I was thankful God had brought me through all of this. I never would have made it if He hadn't been directing my path. That's exactly how I felt."

"I went back to where I came from in Hardeman County and how Papa Johnny and Moma, Aunt Sybil, Dunny, Ordrell and Vernon, among others, would feel if they knew this and could see it. Aunt Sybil would not believe this."

A few weekends ago, Yarbrough traveled to Washington, D.C. to attend the museum's grand opening, an event for which she's been waiting for five years.

Also attending with her were her sister, Alma LaMar, Ted Kerr and J.J. Moore of Detroit, Mich.; Marjorie Embry of Jackson; Mattie Pearl Carter and Joan Patterson of Memphis; and Marsha Edwards, Diane Galloway and Laura Moore of Washington, D.C.

The event featured speakers like President Obama and entertainment by Patti LaBelle, Oprah Winfrey and Will Smith, to name a few. After several hours, the museum officially opened its doors and guests were invited to browse its three levels of collected history.

State Asks You to Take Steps to Prevent Financial Fraud

October is Fraud and Financial Exploitation Awareness Month, and while everyone is susceptible to the risk, the Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS) Adult Protective Services program has a special message to the elderly, their families and communities: know the signs of abuse and take action to prevent it.

The National Adult Protective Services Association reports that 1 in 20 older adults have indicated some form of perceived financial mistreatment in the recent past.

"As gatekeepers for our communities, we all have a role in protecting people who may be isolated or targeted from the risks of abuse including fraud and finan-

cial exploitation," said Tennessee Department of Human Services Commissioner Dr. Raquel Hatter. "We must be vigilant in recognizing the potential signs of abuse and taking action to ensure our communities remain vibrant places to live for everyone."

A key step to reducing the risk of fraud and financial exploitation is to identify the signs early. Common signs of fraud and financial exploitation of adults include, but are not limited to:

- Sudden changes in the persons financial condition
- Financial activity the person couldn't have done, such as an ATM withdrawal when the account holder is bedridden

- Large withdrawals from the person's bank account
 - No food in the home, the utilities are cut off, and the home is not maintained
 - The person is unaware of their finances
 - Unpaid bills
 - A drastic change in the person's quality of life
 - There are also steps that can be taken to prevent fraud and financial exploitation:
 - Add your phone number to the Do Not Call list and remove your address from mailing lists.
 - Be aware of common scams.
- Listings are commonly available through consumer report resources.

Bolivar Energy Authority, your local publicly-owned electric utility, says if you use your air conditioning less, you'll spend less on your cooling bill. These simple steps will help:

- Use a dehumidifier to decrease moisture from summer air.
- Plant shrubs or trees to shade your central air conditioning unit.
- Set your thermostat at 78 degrees fahrenheit.

Pains and Gains by Jimmy Sadler

I don't always understand trouble or pain. Why God allows these two forces in our lives is beyond me. I understand that we have subjected ourselves to a natural tendency toward disorder when sin entered humanity. Still, we all wonder at times why God allows certain challenges to inflict us. Beyond the deep personal pains, there are also the practical pains of living in a physical world. As I write this, I have a mosquito that keeps just out of reach, but keeps biting me. At least I'm not standing on a mound of fire ants, another pain those in the south understand well.

Joan Murray, of Charlotte, NC has a most remarkable story. She was bitten over 200 hundred times by fire ants. If you are familiar with these little beasts, you can imagine how dreadful that might be. Why would God allow someone to suffer at the hands of His created beings? Why would He subject her to this excruciating pain? It may have been that He uses pain and hardship as tools to save us, direct us or warn us. In Joan's case, it was actually to save her life. You see, before Joan landed in the pile of fire ants, she had been skydiving. She jumped from 14,500 feet. Her main parachute failed to open and her backup parachute collapsed. She hit the ground at an estimated 80 miles per hour.

Joan was, as you could imagine, very much hurt and damaged in the accident. Miraculously, she survived. She was in a coma for two weeks and required a significant number of surgeries and rehabilitation. The doctors believe that she is alive, in part, because of the numerous bites from the fire ants. Joan's body released a massive adrenaline surge to deal with the stings, and that reaction kept her heart beating. Truly, one of the most direct cases I know of that explains how pain can sometimes save us.

If you watched the movie "Signs", you will remember the final scene with the young boy inhaling poisons. Most people in the movie that were exposed to the chemicals died, but because he had asthma, the poison never reached his blood stream. The point is very direct, that things happen for a reason, some of which we never understand. Occasionally though, we do get to see the why. I often thank God when I am redirected or stalled on a trip. I figure there is a reason beyond my ability to see.

Joseph had many difficulties to contend with. Jealous brothers who beat him and wanted to leave him for dead. They "graciously" decided instead to sell him into slavery. He was then wrongfully accused and thrown into prison. Joseph didn't give in to the struggles, he trusted God was somehow still at work. "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives" (Genesis 50:20, NIV). Indeed, countless lives were saved when years of drought and famine hit the land. Joseph's family was brought to safety where they grew into a great nation.

There is a lot of pain, struggle, annoyance and trouble that seems meaningless. I can't exactly tell you why you have to deal with it in your life and I don't know that I can simply blame God for all of it. I do know, however, that He uses pain and suffering for some pretty miraculous reasons.

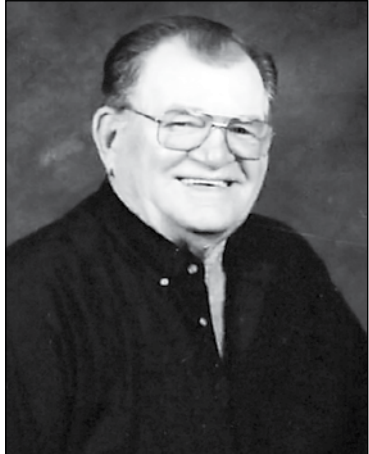

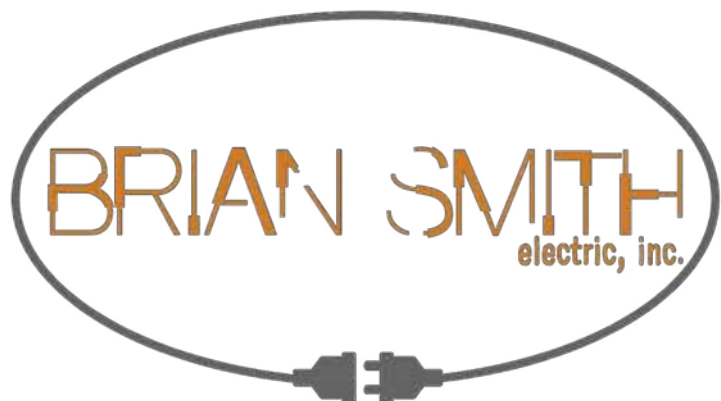

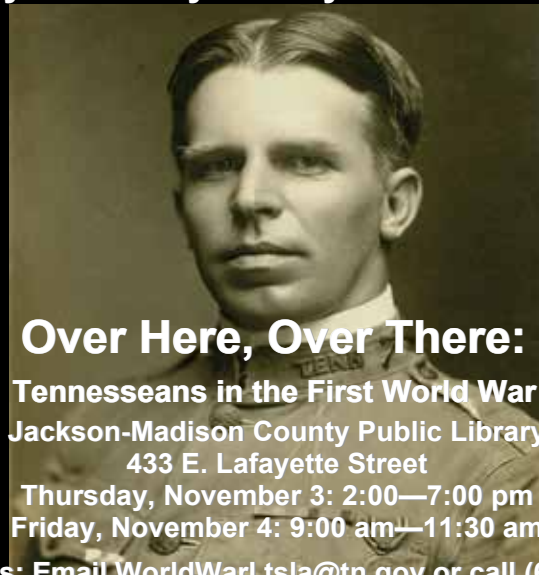

USDA NRCS Announces Nearly \$5 Million Funding Availability

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Tennessee State Conservationist Kevin Brown announced the availability of approximately \$5 million to help landowners protect and restore key farmlands, grasslands, and wetlands across Tennessee.

The funding is provided through the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)—created by the 2014 Farm Bill to protect critical water resources and wildlife habitat, and encourage private landowners to maintain land for farming and ranching. Through the voluntary sale of an easement, landowners limit future development to protect these key resources.

ACEP's agricultural land easements not only protect the long-term viability of the nation's food supply by preventing conversion of productive working lands to non-agricultural uses, they also support environmental quality, wildlife habitat, historic preserva-

tion and protection of open spaces. Native American Tribes, state and local governments, and non-governmental organizations that have farmland or grassland protection programs are eligible to partner with NRCS to purchase conservation easements.

Wetland reserve easements allow landowners to successfully restore, enhance, and protect habitat for wildlife on their lands, reduce damage from flooding, recharge groundwater, and provide outdoor recreational and educational opportunities. Eligible landowners can choose to enroll in a permanent or 30-year easement.

The deadline to sign up for ACEP is Friday, December 2, 2016. Landowners may visit their local field office to sign up for this program. County FSA Announces New Acreage Reporting Dates for 2017

Hardeman County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Mary Van Barkley announced that producers who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage can prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits. Please note the change in the reporting date for perennial forage and forage seeding for 2017 is November 15, 2016.

"In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements, all producers are encouraged to visit the Hardeman County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline," said Barkley.

The following NEW acreage reporting date is applicable for Hardeman County:

November 15, 2016: grass certification - perennial forage (including hay and pasture)

The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting dates:

• If the crop has not been planted by the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no

later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.

• If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendar days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

• If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing," or "seed" then the acreage must be reported by July 15th.

According to Barkley, Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) policy holders should note that the acreage reporting date for NAP covered crops is the earlier of the dates listed above or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.

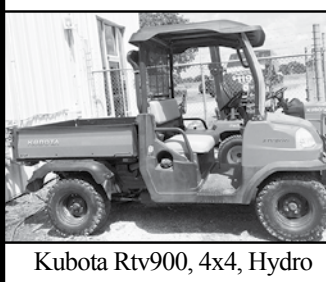

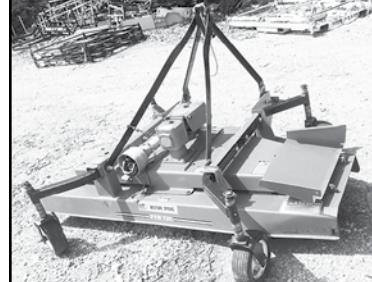

Investors Should Avoid "Great Expectations"

Apart from death and taxes, few events in our world are consistently predictable – and investment returns are definitely not one of them. What can you, as an individual investor, do to cope with the ups and downs of the financial markets and make progress toward your long-term goals?

To begin with, you should be aware that the financial markets have fluctuated greatly – daily, monthly and yearly – over the past three decades. For example, you might be tempted to pursue some "hot" stocks that you heard about through a friend, co-worker, or one of the so-called experts on the cable television shows devoted to investing. But by the time you hear about these stocks, they may not be so "hot" anymore – and they may never have been so hot for you, given your individual needs, goals and risk tolerance. So, instead of ratcheting up the aggressiveness with which you invest, look for other investment techniques to help yourself advance toward your financial objectives.

Boost your investments in your retirement plans. Contribute as much as you can afford to your 401(k), IRA and other retirement accounts. The earlier you start, the more years you'll be giving your investments to potentially grow.


Be open to working longer. If you like your job, and you're prepared to be flexible, you could gain some key benefits by working just a few more years than you had planned. Specifically, you can keep contributing to your 401(k) and IRA, and you also might be able to delay taking Social Security, thereby earning bigger monthly payments when you do start collecting your benefits.

Investing would be simple if you could always count on earning big returns. However, that's not the case. And if the markets are indeed going to be somewhat unpredictable, then you'll want to take a page out of the Boy Scouts' handbook and "be prepared."
