She called me twenty-five years later and asked me what I was doing.

"Something else," I replied.

James Perry Found

For the second time in two weeks, game cameras positioned in Hardeman County helped find missing persons.

This time, however, the news was not good.

A call from hunters checking game cameras led to the discovery of the body of James Perry, 83, of Bolivar, on October 1, ending the search for him that began on September 12 when he is thought to have walked away from his home at 110 Hollywood Acres Lane in Bolivar. At press time, arrangements for Mr. Perry had not yet been released.

According to Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen, Perry was found within 1.5 miles of his home

in a small creek behind the Old Granville Howell Sawmill near Highway 125 South. "At the time of his discovery, the creek had about a foot of water in it," said Doolen. "But we think it was about four feet deep on September 12."

"Hunters checking their game cameras saw Mr. Perry walking around," said Doolen, adding that the date stamp was September 12.

An autopsy is being performed by the Medical Examiner from Memphis, but Doolen said they feel like they already know the results.

"We don't expect it to be anything other than drowning."

Doolen said an untold number of man hours and numerous agencies

from outside Hardeman County lent labor and resources to the search, which lasted from September 12 to September 22, when the department began to investigate other leads.

It was the second time in two weeks a game camera helped law enforcement. A week prior, a hunter checking his remote game camera saw trespassers that turned out to be escaped fugitives from Western Mental Health Institute in Bolivar and his call to law enforcement in Bolivar helped nab the escapees.

His decorations and badges include the Distinguished Service Medal (with two Oak Leaf Clusters), the Bronze Star and more than a half dozen others.

Shaw noted Robertson was due what the county did to honor him. "A man's rewards are no greater than the man that received them."

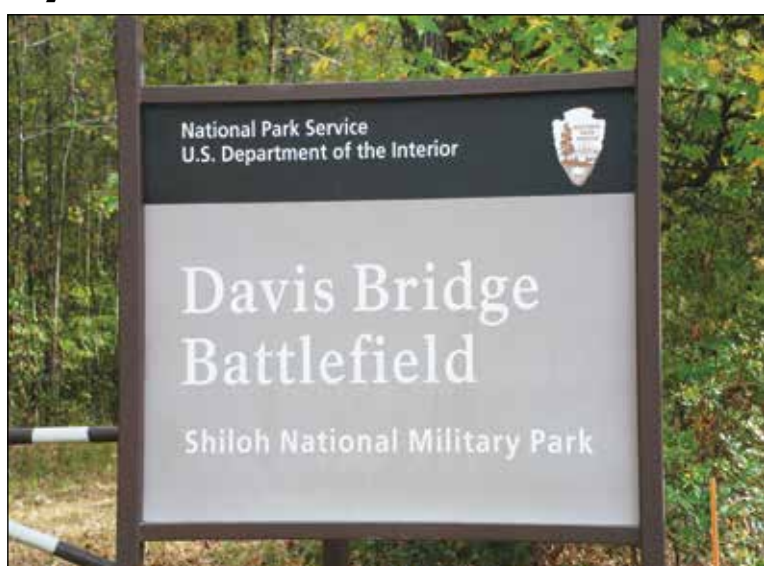

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

October 5 is an historic date in our county's history. On October 5, 1862, 155 years ago, the Battle of Davis Bridge (sometimes referred to as Hatchie Bridge or Hatchie River Bridge) occurred in southern part of the county near the Mississippi State line. On that date, there were thousands of men from the two armies who met up at that spot in the woods near the Hatchie River. That one-day battle would become the second bloodiest battle in Tennessee history (the Battle of Shiloh saw the greatest number of casualties and injuries); many of the wounded were brought to houses in Bolivar that were serving as Union hospitals.

Today that battlefield is our own national park, and it is referred to by preservation groups all over the country as one of the most pristine battlefields remaining today. If you haven't been to our national park yet, make plans to go soon. The park is part of the Shiloh National Battlefield Park system and they have all sorts of special programs this week; check them out at www.nps.gov/shiloh. We have a national park in our county because of the perseverance and work done by Mr. Herbert Wood and Mr. Rex Brotherton.

Part of their work was researching the battle that happened there on that October day. One of the many stories that they found was that of Sgt. William Clark Newlon, Company G, Third Iowa Infantry that engaged during the Battle of Davis Bridge. His journal excerpt of that day describes



what happened, "The attack was made by the 2nd Brigade, driving in the enemy's advance. Soon the fighting commenced in earnest, we presented a wall of fire and steel to our daring foe. Position after Position was swept and held the serious advance of Hurlburt's Command. The Confederate Army gradually fell back until it came to Davis Bridge across the Hatchie River. Here the fighting commenced in earnest. Men and horses were falling thick and fast until it seemed as though we were all to be slaughtered.

Such a sight I never before witnessed. The sky was darkened with shot and shell. The Earth trembled with the roar of musketry and the booming of cannon. The branches of trees were severed from the body by cannon balls. The wounded, dead, and dying covered the ground, yet not a murmur was heard. It was not until we were charging upon

the enemy's last battery that I received by fatal shot. The man by my side was instantly killed a second before me, and I fell upon him."

Sgt. Newlon goes on to write that the battle ended around 3:00 p.m.; he lay on the field with a severe leg wound. In the evening, along with so many others, he was loaded in an ambulance wagon and brought to Bolivar. St. Newlon's right leg was amputated from the wound he received. He was discharged from the Union Army on April 6, 1863. He went home to Iowa, married and raised a family; he died on June 25, 1902 at the age of 65.

Take a moment and remember the men of Davis Bridge this week and remember what happened in our own backyard 155 years ago. And, y'all, remember that we have a national park right here in Hardeman County because of the work of Herbert and Rex.

I didn't have the nerve to go in but my friends told me they were told they would be married at 18 and have five kids, but it was ok as they'd strike oil and would be rich. One year I decided to dunk for apples. The apple I picked had its stem on top of the water, so I got a prize and never got my face wet. I remember James Dillard was dunking for people. They'd pay and he'd dunk. He would go way under the water and pin an apple next to the edge and bring it back up. Those who asked him to dunk for them not only got a prize, they got an apple with his teeth marks on it. There were tacky contests. Tacky, back then, meant sloppy or dirty. Maurice Lambert won one year dressed in an old floppy shirt, large khaki pants and boots and a fake beard. She was my sister-in-law and I hardly recognized her. She never said a word, just wandered onto the stage when her made-up name was called and it was her time to compete. She was a hit just standing there chewing tobacco and looking at the audience as if to say what are you looking at?

As I pass the fields where cotton pickers and combines are at work, about all I can see is a massive cloud of dust, and I think back to the days when I was a kid growing up in Toone. I can only imagine how dusty and nasty it was for the equipment operators back when the tractors and combines had no cabs with stereos and air-conditioning. I can remember being in "Mr Eddie's" general store during harvest season and seeing the farmers come in covered in dust from head to toe. Then my memories go back even further to the days when the fields were spotted with people dragging those "9-ft." cotton sacks wearing big straw hats and gloves with the finger coverings cut off. Each year when the schools closed in the fall for the "cotton picking" break" I spent many days picking for our neighbor, Mr. Stat Young, and his family. More than anything, the lesson I learned from that experience is that I did not want to pick cotton for a living! I recall picking a near-full sack and believing I had at least 80-90 lbs, only to weigh-in and find I had only 45-50 lbs. Yes, there was nothing at all easy about that type of work, and I have nothing but respect for those who made their living that way, but being in the field with the other kids was a fond memory, and we always managed to have some fun with green cotton-boll fights and "chunking" dirt clods at one another (and believe me, a dry, hard dirt clod can really sting when it hits you "upside the head!")

Consider Multiple Factors When Creating Retirement Plans

When you create your financial and investment strategies for retirement, what will you need to know? In other words, what factors should you consider, and how will these factors affect your investment-related decisions, before and during your retirement?

Consider the following:

Age at retirement – Not surprisingly, your retirement date likely will be heavily influenced by your financial situation – so, if you have to keep working, that's what you'll do. Clearly, the lifestyle you choose will affect how much you need to accumulate before you retire and how much you will need to withdraw from your various investment accounts once you do.

Second career – Some people retire from one career only to begin another. If you think you'd like to have a "second act" in your working life, you might need some additional training, or you might just put your existing expertise to work as a consultant. If you do launch a new career, it could clearly affect your financial picture. For one thing, if you add a new source of earned income, you might be able to withdraw less from your retirement accounts each year. (Keep in mind, though, that once you reach 70 1/2, you will have to take at least some withdrawals from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.) On the other hand, if you keep earning income, you can continue putting money into a traditional IRA (until you're

70 1/2) or a Roth IRA (indefinitely) and possibly contribute to a retirement plan for the self-employed, such as a SEP-IRA or an "owner-only" 401(k).

Philanthropy – During your working years, you may have consistently donated money to charitable organizations. And once you retire, you may want to do even more. For one thing, of course, you can volunteer more of your time. But you also might want to set up some more permanent method of financial support. Consequently, you might want to work with your legal advisor and financial professional to incorporate elements of your investment portfolio into your estate plans to provide more support for charitable groups.

As you can see, your retirement goals can affect your investment strategy – and vice versa. So, think carefully about what you want to accomplish, plan ahead and get the help you need. It takes time and effort to achieve a successful retirement, but it's worth it.





I think we all understand that. The irony is we are all harder to love when we are truly known by someone. Some people are just easier to love from a distance. There are also those who I can act lovingly toward even though I don't know them. Truly, to be both known and loved is an incredible experience.

In August, a terrorist began to launch an attack on a train car. Three American friends foiled the attack. One man ran toward the gunman and sustained serious injuries in the process. These guys have been praised as heroes, and deserve that distinction for caring about and saving the lives of people they did not know. We have every reason to be proud of their heroic efforts and selfless act. It is possible to love people you have never spoken to. Those people on the train will sense a lifelong love or affection toward those they didn't previously know because their lives were spared.

I speculate a reason many of us

have a difficult time growing closer to God is that we don't know Him. How can we love someone we have never met face to face? How can we trust someone we can't see? There is a built in element of hardship to this walk. We must endure some of the unknown as we take hold of the invisible hand of God. The Bible tells us, "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known (1 Corinthians 13:12, KJV)." We are limited from what we can know of God, but not to a degree that we can't trust.

God has shown himself throughout the ages in different ways. Initially, He walked and spoke with humans. Man spoiled that relationship by rejecting God. God then spoke to prophets and showed up in veiled appearances throughout the ages. Then in a miraculous twist, God sent his Son, in the flesh, to walk among us. He came to die in our place and restore our relationship to God. When Christ died for us, it was somewhat like the guys on the train. They risked their lives for someone they didn't know and saved them. (Though Christ followed through to the death.)

The Old-Line District is the area between Bolivar, Hickory Valley, and Grand Junction, a roughly 20-mile stretch where stage coaches and the old railroad used to run.

Today it is celebrated in part, along with other items in the museum on the top floor at the Bank of Fayette County on Highways 18 and 57 near Grand Junction. Museum Curator, Rex Brotherton has a few new items to exhibit that were presented by Peggy Weaver, the Hickory Valley representative of the Old-Line District. Among the relics presented to Brotherton are trophies and a shotgun. These items have one thing in common.

“Jim Avent was one of the most important field trial experts and no one could equal the number of trophies that he won during his lifetime at the National Field Trials.” Said Weaver, who then pointed to the smaller trophy, “This trophy was given by his nephew who was named for him, James Avent



and the larger one was also given by someone who was also named for him, Jim Avent McSpadden of Memphis. And it may have been McSpadden’s nephew or a very close relative who told me a story which I will tell you,” Weaver continued. “When he (McSpadden) was very ill with pneumonia, the

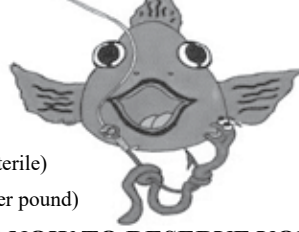

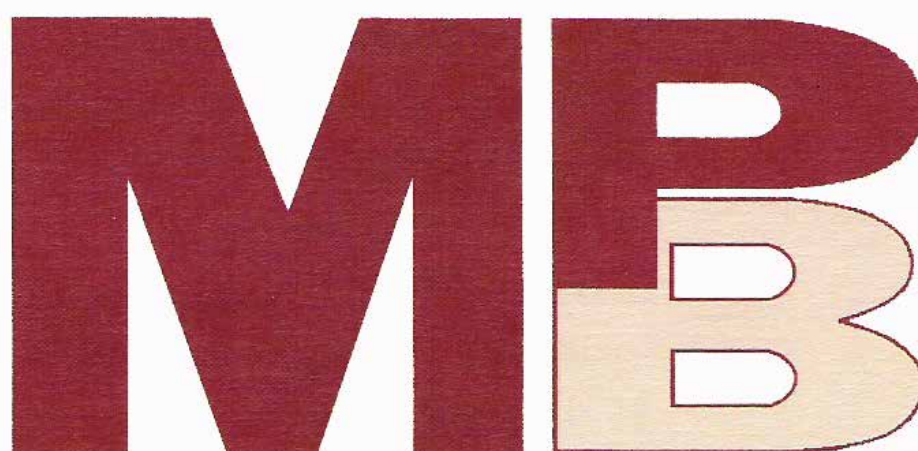
For people who haven't visited the burger joint yet, Morris says they are missing out.

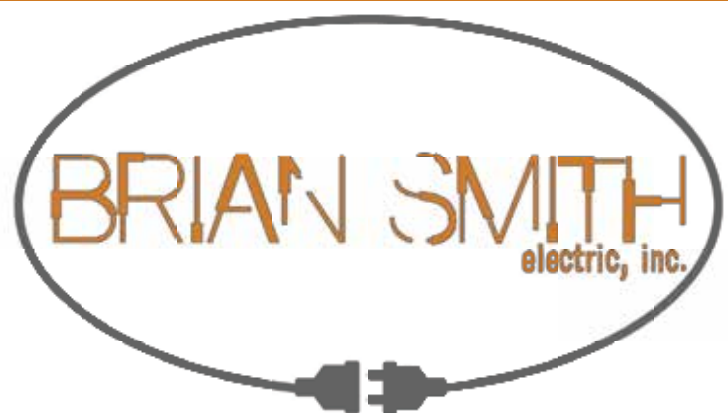

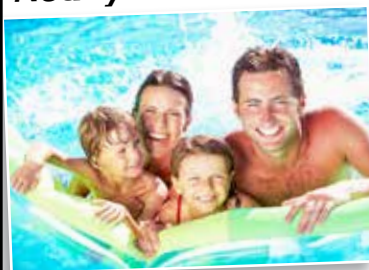

Bolivar Middle Celebrates Constitution Week

The tradition of celebrating the Constitution was started many years ago by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). In 1955, the Daughters petitioned Congress to set aside September 17-23 annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The resolution was later adopted by the U.S. Congress and signed into Public Law #915 on August 2, 1956 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The aims of the celebration are to (1) emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; (2) inform the people that the Constitution is the basis for America's great heritage and the foundation for our way of life; and (3) encourage the study of the historical events which led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

The United States of America functions as a Republic under the Constitution, which is the oldest document still in active use that outlines the self-government of a people. This landmark idea that men had the inalienable right as individuals to be free and live their lives under their own governance was the impetus of the American Revolution. Today, the Constitution stands as an icon of freedom for people around the world.

"Constitution Week is the perfect



opportunity to read and study this great document which is the safeguard of our American liberties," states DAR President General, Lynn Forney Young. "We encourage all citizens across the country to take time this week to reflect on our heritage of freedom and come together to Celebrate America!"

DAR has served America for 125 years as its foremost cheerleader. In 1928, the Daughters began work on a building as a memorial to the Constitution. John Russell Pope, architect of the Jefferson Memorial, was commissioned to design the performing arts center, known as DAR Constitution Hall. Today, DAR Constitution Hall is one of the only structures erected in tribute to the

Constitution of the United States of America.

Known as the largest women's patriotic organization in the world, DAR has over 180,000 members with approximately 3,000 chapters in all 50 states and 13 foreign countries. The DAR has long promoted patriotism through com-



memorative celebrations, memorials, scholarships and activities for children, and programs for new immigrants.

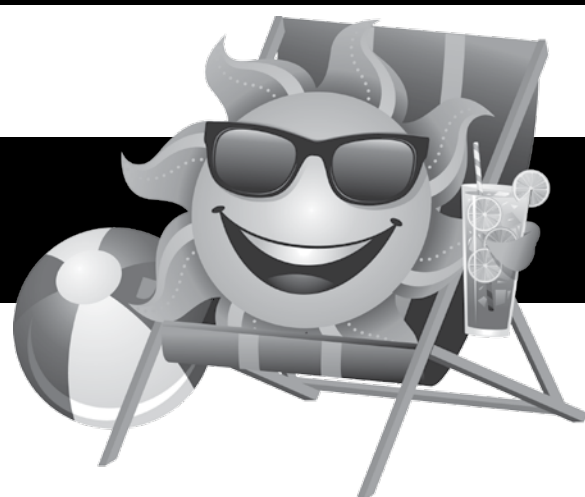

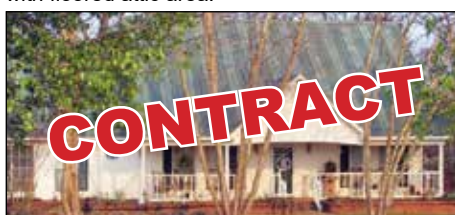
