Bolivar Effort Named Project of the Year


The Southwest Tennessee Development District named the Hatchie River Park as the district's project of the year.
"The project of the year award is going to Bolivar because it is dedicated to enhancing and developing the phenomenal assets that the city has to offer residents and visitors," stated the press release.
"Through this project, The City of Bolivar is committed to restoring, preserving and enhancing the utilization of the Hatchie River -- and to creating an outdoor tourist destination in Southwest Tennessee. This project seeks to develop the Hatchie River Park & Nature Center to be a recreational destination for tourists and the general public. It will be a place for camping, boating, canoeing, fishing,

picnicking, boardwalks and several other outdoor recreational and educational activities.
"The Hatchie River is an environmental treasure -- it is the only remaining un-channelized and un-impounded major tributary of the Lower Mississippi River Basin and West Tennessee. The Hatchie River is home to more than 100 species of fish, 50 species of mammals, 35 species of mussels, 250 species of birds (including migratory fowl) and, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, an "amazing number" of species of amphibians, reptiles and invertebrates. Recently, Bald Eagles have been regularly spotted and photographed on the Hatchie River near Bolivar.
"The Hatchie will soon become a destination for outdoor and wild-



life enthusiasts -- as well as a living, environmental classroom site to provide hands-on education for schools and students at all levels. Truly, the City of Bolivar is doing its best to preserve this environmental treasure as they develop it into a public park that will provide recreational and educational enjoyment for years to come."

Health Scare at the Post Office



Chris Cox of Bolivar spent time in the hospital after fumes inside the truck he was using to run a mail route caused a shutdown of downtown Bolivar on Market Street for more than two hours on Thursday, September 29.
Cox, who delivers mail for the Bolivar Post Office, was found unconscious in the back of the truck after his run that morning.
County first responders and the Jackson Haz-Mat unit were on hand until the post office reopened later that morning.
Bolivar Fire Chief Lynn Price explained what happened.
"The truck owner (Rachel Trucking Company) was going to clean the truck. He was cleaning it with diesel fuel. And when he couldn't get the diesel smell out of the truck, he thought he would use cat litter and coffee grounds to kill the smell. And when that wouldn't work, he decided



One of my favorite things about fall is all of the festivals that we have in this part of the world. (Side note – I was in Middle Tennessee recently and learned that Centerville is home of the National Banana Pudding Festival-who knew? Also, I found Grinder's Switch, but that's a story for another day.) One of my favorite festivals happens this weekend here in our own backyard – the Heritage Festival at the Ames Plantation. The festival is from 9:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 8 and costs a mere \$5 for adults, \$2 for ages 4-16, and wee ones (3 & under) get in free, and the parking and shuttle ride are both free.

(I would be remiss here if I did not include in a column with an autumn theme my great joy over Tennessee's marvelous victory over Georgia last weekend. I do not need any sort of tests run on my heart – the last 19 seconds of that game assured me that my heart is in fine working order. It Was. Awesome.)

The Heritage Festival draws thousands of folks each year from all over the Southeast and the world – I've met lovely people from Scotland, England, Australia, and Germany. As my family is fond of noting, I inherited my Papaw Coleman's ability to strike up a conversation with folks and his inquisitiveness; any similarity to my Papaw is ok by me. I've met lots of interesting folks and learned about a lot of different things. Here are just a few of the things I've learned at the Heritage Festivals over the years.

-Watched ladies make beautiful embroidery, crochet, and bobbin lace

-Learned how a blacksmith shop works and learned from a young visitor "that stuff is super hot!"

-Learned how handmade bricks are created

-Learned the history of the Stencil House which was saved



by the Ames Foundation

-Eaten marvelous food including kettle corn, cooked in a large kettle the way God intends for it to be cooked. It is delicious.

-I milked a goat. It's true, I did. Nobody thought to take a photo of it, but it really happened.

-I learned how those marvelous athletes, bird dogs, start their early training. (My dachshund girl Elsie says that type of training does not apply to dachshunds.)

-Learned about many beautiful kinds of chickens (and remem-

bered what my Granny Kiestler used to tell us: "don't put your fingers near the chicken coop".) Seems like the fancier the feathers the more attitude the chicken has.

-Learned about Civil War history from great living historians.

I have met and talked with craftpeople, historians, and musicians who love to share their stories with you. Hope to see you on the grounds of the historic Ames Plantation this weekend- I'll be the one eating kettle corn and asking lots of questions.



Chicken Chili

- 1 package chicken sausage, cut into bite-size chunks
- 6 skinless chicken thighs (1 1/2 lb)
- 1 large onion, chopped (1 cup)
- 2 tsp minced garlic
- 1 3/4 cups chicken broth
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano leaves
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon Frank's Red Hot -add more to taste
- 2 cans (15 to 16 oz each) great northern beans, drained, rinsed
- 1 can (11 oz) white shoepeg corn, drained

Sunrise: Attention

His thoughts were slow; his words were few and never formed to glisten. But he was a joy to all his friends; you should have heard him listen. (Author unknown) When people are in the beginning journey with grief, they are usually in shock immediately after their traumatic loss. They need a listener, not a talker. Zeno, a Greek philosopher is credited with a phrase, the reason that we have two ears and only one mouth is that we may listen the more and talk the less. In the state of shock, the mourner may be confused, and perhaps their mind will wander when they are talking, moving from topic to topic.

A couple of weeks ago we began a series on how to talk to people who are mourning. I should have said how to engage with a person who is mourning. One of the most beneficial blessings we can give them is our attention. Giving our open attention with compassion and without judging the speaker with the use of multiple techniques (ask, paraphrase, non-verbal language, etc.) to increase comprehension. One of these techniques is our posture. The way we sit or stand in their presence speaks volumes toward our interest or lack thereof in what they are saying. While different cultures will place different meanings on some of these expressions, generally they do possess the meaning here emphasized.

Direct and consistent eye contact shows sincerity and a desire to connect with another person. Smiling with the eyes and the mouth denotes genuine reception. Leaning forward shows eagerness and attentiveness. When a person who is listening to a mourner shares their heartache, uses the above body language along with open hands, in a natural conveyance, they tend to put the speaker at ease in the presence of the listener. This, in turn, will make them more relaxed and willing to share their life experiences. Further, mirroring the speaker's posture may also lend to place them at ease and relaxed in the current visitation and may invite more visits in the future. Emphasizing listening over speaking will minimize if not eliminate interrupting the speaker and make us better listeners and more inviting toward others. This is Sunrise Aftercare, sunrise@sfdc.org

to try moth balls on top of the diesel fuel and the cat litter and the coffee grounds," he said.

Price explained that the combination of chemicals caused a reaction that gave off noxious gasses. The driver, aware of the smell, but unaware of the level of danger involved, drove his route to Memphis, stopping off at various places along the way.

"The driver (Cox) was in the truck for a while. When he reached Bolivar, he had to unload the truck, going back and forth" he said. "After not seeing him for a while, someone went to look for him, finding him passed out in the back of the truck."

Cox was taken to the hospital, treated and released, but long-term effects to his health and lungs are still unknown and will require more evaluation and treatment, according to the family.

Chief Price said it was fortunate that Cox was found as quickly as he was.

"It could have been worse," he said. "You have to be careful when mixing chemicals."

Bobby Grantham passed away Thursday night, September 29, 2016, Henderson Health and Rehab Center in Henderson, TN.





Guard Against Identity Theft - and Protect Your Finances

In 2015 alone, more than 13 million Americans were victimized by identity theft, according to the U.S. Department of Justice. What can you do to guard your identity and protect yourself from potential financial losses?

Here are some ideas to consider:

Review your statements. Closely review the monthly statements from your checking and other financial accounts. If you find any unfamiliar charges, contact your bank or other financial services provider immediately.

Order your credit reports. The three credit reporting agencies – TransUnion, Equifax and Experian – are each required by law to provide you one free credit report a year. Make sure your name, address and other information are correct on your credit report, and if you find old or inaccurate information, have it removed.

Place a fraud alert. If you suspect you have become a victim of Identity theft, place a "fraud alert" on your credit reports by contacting any of the three credit reporting agencies. You can choose a short-term or long-term alert. And if you're an active member of the military, you can request a special, one-year alert.

Feed your shredder. Shred all old bank and investment statements, applications for new credit cards and any other documents that contain personal information.

Destroy digital data. If you have a variety of financial accounts, you're not just creating a paper trail – you're also establishing a digital "footprint." So, when you sell or otherwise dispose of a computer system or hard drive, you may want to take steps to destroy personal data. You might think that simply deleting it would be sufficient, but tech-savvy identity thieves can "undelete" files or recover information from a formatted drive. However, products are available that allow you to completely wipe out data on hard drives.

Change passwords. It's a good idea to change your Internet passwords every so often – especially those passwords that provide access to financial accounts.

Leave your Social Security card home. Snagging someone's Social Security number is a real "catch" for identity thieves, so do everything you can to thwart them. And you can start by leaving your Social Security card safely at home – after all, there's probably never a good reason to bring it out, anyway. In fact, be wary of anyone, or any business, that asks for your Social Security number, either in person or online. Except for a few obvious exceptions, such as your tax preparer, most reputable businesses don't need to know anything about your Social Security information.

Watch for "phishers." If you've ever gotten an e-mail, supposedly from your bank, advising you that your account will be "frozen" unless you provide personal details about your account, it's a good bet that someone is "phishing" for this information – and they're using the "freezing" threat as bait. What's particularly alarming is that these "phishers" have gotten quite good at duplicating logos and using official-sounding language. However, a legitimate bank would never threaten you this way with an e-mail, so, if you get such a message, contact the bank's fraud department.

You can go a long way toward protecting yourself against identity theft by following these suggestions — so put them to work soon.

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

The cotton patch at the Yellow House only covered about two acres, but to us youngsters, pulling our six and nine foot tar-bottom cotton sacks up and down the rows of the fluffy white snow-bank landscape, it seemed like it was one thousand acres at the least. I remember that Mom put a strap on a flour sack when we were real young and we would pick along side them in the cotton patch.

Sooner than I would have wanted, we graduated to the six and nine foot sacks. Pain was ever present in the cotton fields. What with the dreaded stinging worms, and the pain from sticking a sharp cotton boll burr in a finger that had chaffed and cracked open. Then there was the threat of being hit up side of the head with a green cotton boll catapulted by my brother Don or another picker across the patch. Us kids were firm believers in the American Indians custom of rain dancing. At the appearance of the tiniest cloud in the sky, my sister Joyce would immediately go into a raindance frenzy, slinging cotton bolls, dust and chanting some unknown language not even known to herself. We were hoping that a rain would drive us from the cotton patch. Sometimes it would come up a shower, but I don't give sister Joyce's dance any credit for the shower. Sometimes we would swap



out cotton picking with a neighboring farmer. At the time, I thought that it just wasn't fair to go and pick cotton somewhere and not get paid. We had to save the money we made from picking cotton to order clothes from one of the mail order businesses, such as Sears & Roebuck, Aldens or Spiegals. This usually consisted of two pair of jeans, two flannel shirts and sometimes a pair of shoes for us boys, and yes, usually a pair or two of long handle underwear.

The cold winter walk down the railroad tracks to school called for the long handles. A pair of shoes would not last more than one season walking on railroad rocks and crossies. One highlight of cotton picking was when we occasionally found a ripe watermelon that had somehow reached maturity under the cotton stalks. The cool,

red, sweet melon was quickly devoured by a hungry bunch of cotton pickers. Sometimes we ate the ripened fruit of the apricot vines which grew in the cotton fields. Some people called them may-pops. Whatever they were, we ate them.

I can remember walking home from the field in the late afternoon just before sundown. The coolness of the fall evenings and knowing that supper was in store and another nights rest, helped ease the aching backs. I did not make too much money when I hired out to pick cotton. I wanted at least a four course lunch. That being one can of potted meat, one can of Vienna sausage, some crackers and a sweet of some kind. By the time I paid for all that coupled with my inability to pick a lot of cotton left my financial situation in the red most times.

It is getting a bit easier, the encouraging part is that I have lost 2 more pounds. Yippeee! My blood sugar has already dropped below the pre-diabetic area. Yippeee! Eating just a bit less, watching my carbohydrates (bread, potatoes, chips, desserts etc) and exercising just a bit more is working for me.

In our household we have various food challenges. David (my brother) cannot have too much protein and has to watch carbs, Allen (my husband) needs to watch his cholesterol (basically meat fats) and he is supposed to watch his sugars too. Thankfully we love all kinds of vegetables and fruit and eat mostly chicken and fish. We still just have to have a good steak or burger every now and then. David eats small portions of any kind

of protein.

Did you know there are lots of different chicken and turkey products, lots with no nitrates or preservatives? You still have to watch for added sugars and salt, but use that portion control! You can buy chicken or turkey hot dogs, sausages, meatballs. There are lower salt deli meats and some with no nitrates too. Fresh is always better but sometimes convenience wins out! And cravings! We have tuna salad at least once per week, either as a sandwich or on a bed of lettuce and tomato with a few crackers.

We have to consciously think ahead and prepare. This past week I bought at our farmer's market

fresh yellow squash and fresh turnip greens. David has made his now famous squash soup (see below) and I have made fresh turnip greens with Mexican corn bread and white beans. Great food and we love it. And we love leftovers!

We like to add a bit of hot sauce to our individual servings. Cornbread or crackers are great with soup.

Have a check up, keep abreast of any health problems. Solve them as naturally as you can if you can, ask questions, read what you can find. Find health care professionals and nutritionists you trust. Ask friends and family for referrals. Enjoy this great fall weather!

David's Squash Soup

3 yellow squash cut in edible bite size pieces
3 zucchini cut in edible bite size pieces
½ Cucumber cut in edible bite size pieces (this really enhances flavor)
1 large onion, chopped
2 cups cooked chicken, roasted, baked, canned
2 cups of chicken broth, bouillon
Mrs. Dash Chicken Seasoning, 1 Tablespoon
Enough water to cover, bring to boil and simmer until tender. We occasionally add other vegetables, carrots, cabbage, tomatoes. Sometimes we may add 2 cups mixed vegetables or noodles just to make it different. It is great with just the squash. Use salt and pepper to taste.

Looking for a Few Good Mentors

tnAchieves, partnering organization for Governor Bill Haslam's TN Promise, is currently seeking volunteers to serve as mentors for the program's third class of students. TN Promise offers every high school senior the opportunity to attend one of the state's 13 community colleges or 27 colleges of applied technology tuition free with a last dollar scholarship. The program also pairs each applicant with a volunteer mentor to ease the transition from high school to college.

Tennessee's Commissioner of Economic and Community Development Randy Boyd has been

a mentor with the program since its inception in 2008. "With the idea of eliminating the barriers keeping Tennessee students from entering the post-secondary pipeline, Tennessee Promise provides a last-dollar scholarship with mentor support to our state's high school seniors," said Boyd. "It sends the message to students and families that college is within everyone's reach regardless of zip code or socio-economic background. It also communicates to business and industry that Tennessee is intensely focused on creating the workforce to meet their demands." TN Promise is

one program of the state's Drive to 55 initiative that aims to increase Tennessee's adult population with a post-secondary credential to 55 percent by 2025.

In the first two years of the program almost 120,000 students have applied. In the first year, 16,291 students began college TN Promise eligible. The state's college going rate increased 4.6 percent, more than the previous seven years combined. Enrollment at the state's community and technical colleges increased more than 20 percent and enrollment at all of the state's public higher education institutions in-

creased 10 percent. This translates into approximately 4,000 new students entering the college pipeline.

The scholarship dollars are important, and often creates excitement around going to college, but the support of the mentor can be critical to many students' success. Most of the students participating in the program are first generation college attendees and navigating the admissions and financial aid processes can seem overwhelming. Mentors spend about one hour per month reminding students of deadlines, serving as a trusted resource, and encouraging students to reach their full potential. The time commitment is small, but the impact can be life changing.

tnAchieves Director of Community Partnerships Graham

Thomas explained the importance of the role of the mentors. "Mentors provide the encouragement and support students need to be successful as they begin their college careers," Thomas said. "Mentors ensure barriers that might cause students to quit are overcome, processes that might prove to be intimidating are completed, and vocabulary that was foreign becomes everyday language."

tnAchieves needs more than 9,000 volunteers statewide to serve as mentors to meet student demand. The program operates TN Promise in 84 counties and each county has a specific mentor goal. 




Thirty participants from across the United States will interact with and learn from executives representing corporations such as General Electric and Liberty Mutual and be assigned a mentor in their field of study.


BES Goes to the Bolivar Fire Department


