Warrants Signed on Two County Residents

County Mayor Jimmy Sain's war on illegal dumping continued this past week as warrants were signed on two Hardeman County residents.

The Illegal Dumping Enforcement Action initiative – a joint effort by Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, Sheriff John Doolen and Hardeman County Solid Waste – uses photos, videos and other evidence from the dump sites and members of the public to track down illegal dumpers and make them pay for disrespecting Hardeman County's residents, businesses and taxpayers.

"Dumping old mattresses, furniture, construction debris, household garbage and other items in the ditches is not only a major

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

Occasionally, on a hot lazy summer day at the Yellow House, if Mom could scrape up 35 cents from our continually strained budget, she would send me and brother Don down the railroad tracks to Mr. Emmett Shea's store. Our trip was to purchase seven delicious RC Colas at five cents each. One for each member of our family. The reason that we bought the RC's was that they were somewhat larger than the other colas.



This was a treat that we did not get too often. The bottles were cold when we left the store, but were luke warm by the time we got back home. I was very careful in opening mine, fearing that it would spew out and I would lose a precious drop of the soda. I would sip my RC slowly in order to make it last as long as I could.

At Mr. Shea's store, you could buy anything from a horse collar to a stick of Cuttyhunk Blueing (used to whiten clothes in rinsing water). When you entered the confines of the store, you were bombarded with a potpourri of smells, a mixture of medicine, candy, fertilizer and such. Some odors made you hungry, some made you sneeze, and some made you wonder just where they came from. Mr. Shea would trade groceries and items from his store for chickens and eggs. He had several chicken coops outside in the back of his store where he kept the chickens. Most of the stores in Poca-hontas would sell wares on credit to their customers. I would spend a lot of time in front of the candy and cookie section. Just looking of course. Most of the time,

I was so broke that I could not buy enough cloth to make a flea a tuxedo. During cotton hoeing and picking season, I could spare a nickel or dime out of my earnings for a treat. There were big lemon cookies, two for a penny. That was one of my purchases when I had a few cents. Another one was little individually wrapped blocks of candy that we called kisses. They cost one penny and were six to a pack. A rare treat was an RC cola into which you dumped a package of Planters peanuts. Now, that was a feast. I still like to do this, but I cannot find an RC anywhere. There were little round cardboard tubes of peanuts, some of them would have a penny, nickel or dime inside. And Fleers Double Bubble was penny a chew. That was one of my favorites because it would last such a long time, plus each block would contain a comic strip, and with Fleers, you could blow a bubble that when it burst, it would cover your whole face. Also you could stretch it a couple of feet from your mouth. That brings me to the time Larry Brinkley and myself wrote a song called Double Bubble which Lar-

ry recorded on the Magic Record label. The Fleer Double Bubble Company flew Larry and me to Philadelphia to do a show at their company picnic where we performed the song. While visiting their facilities, they showed us a block of bubble gum that weighed one ton. A lot of chews there. They also shipped us boxes and boxes of bubble gum to help promote the song. My jaws were worn out for about a year from chewing bubble gum. While at the company, they took us into New York City where we performed at the Golden Key Gaslight Club on Fifth Avenue. Every time I chew a piece of gum, memories come calling; starting from the Yellow House to New York City and points in between. What would we do without memories?

Fourth Graders Hit the Jackpot by Heather Henderson

The program gives fourth grade students, and those accompanying them, free access to more than 2,000 federally managed lands and waters. "These grants are planting the seeds for lifelong relationships with national parks and their programs," said Will Shafrath, president of the National Park Foundation. "By providing access to transformative experiences like listening to the sound of birds chirping, walking the halls of a school that tell a civil rights story, looking up at a dark night sky, or pitching a tent with a friend for the first time, these children are forever impacted. We appreciate the power of national parks and, through our support, the National Park Foundation hopes to share them with as many kids as possible."

The Every Kid in a Park pass – which features a new design for this year's students – is valid for a full calendar year starting September 1. The pass grants free entry for fourth graders and up to three accompanying adults (or an entire car for drive-in parks) to most federally managed lands and waters, including national parks, forests, wildlife refuges and marine sanctuaries.

The newly expanded Every Kid in a Park website has links to educational activities, trip planning, field trip options, the downloadable pass, and additional information in both English and Spanish. After completing a fun educational activity, the child can download and print a pass. The paper pass can be traded for a more durable pass at participating federal sites nationwide.

The Every Kid in a Park program is an Administration-wide effort between the Department of the Interior, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of the Army, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The program continues each year with the then-current group of fourth graders. After 12 years, every school-age child in America will have had an opportunity to visit their public land and waters for free, inspiring the next generation to be stewards of our nation's shared natural and cultural heritage.

 This morning, I spent several hours sitting with and interviewing a man in Houston, Texas. The man has been on a year and a half mission to bring his wife home from China. The man's wife, Sandy, was traveling with an American delegation to China to promote trade between our two countries. She was held in detention at customs and questioned by the secret police. She was then taken to a holding facility and restricted from contacting anyone except to relay a made-up story explaining her delay. The party she was traveling with had no clue what had happened to her. Her husband was also given a fabricated story. She was allowed to make one phone call only to say she would be there for an extended time. She was not allowed to say she was being held as a spy. Her husband, after finding her cell phone had not been used in over a week, filed a missing person's report. The US consulate was then able to determine that she was being held by the secret police.

than a normal Chinese public trial. It could be likened to a court tribunal behind closed doors with the Chinese version of the CIA handling the trial. Secrecy has been the key to keeping this issue from blowing up more than it has. Since so much has been clouded by her captors, the truth has been squelched from public news. It is a travesty of justice and I urge you to pray for Sandy and her husband Jeff.

Secrecy is the key to misinformation. If you can muzzle the prophet, you can mislead the people. Some of the same tactics were used to crucify Jesus. The process soon became very open to the public, however. The treatment of Jesus, from his humiliating public scourging to his being nailed to a cross in front of a crowd, was open to the public. He was charged by the elite religious leaders and condemned by the masses. God could have kept His Son from being a public spectacle, instead he lifted Him up for the world to see. God, was in essence, making the trial of history to be clearly played out. Our condemnation was laid on Christ. By extension, we were basically held to a public trial and condemned to death. While they are present weeping with them that weep, they will also be in the perfect position to lift a burden in some practical fashion. When we are deluged with emotion, our head may be in a fog and help with housework, shopping, yard work, etc. Will be just what we need to take some of the stress off of our life.  - 1 tablespoon cornstarch
 - 1/4 cup water
 - 1 egg
 - 1/4 cup milk
 - Vanilla ice cream (optional)



- Step 1: Make the Topping-** Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. In a medium bowl stir together flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon. Using a blender, cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs; set aside.

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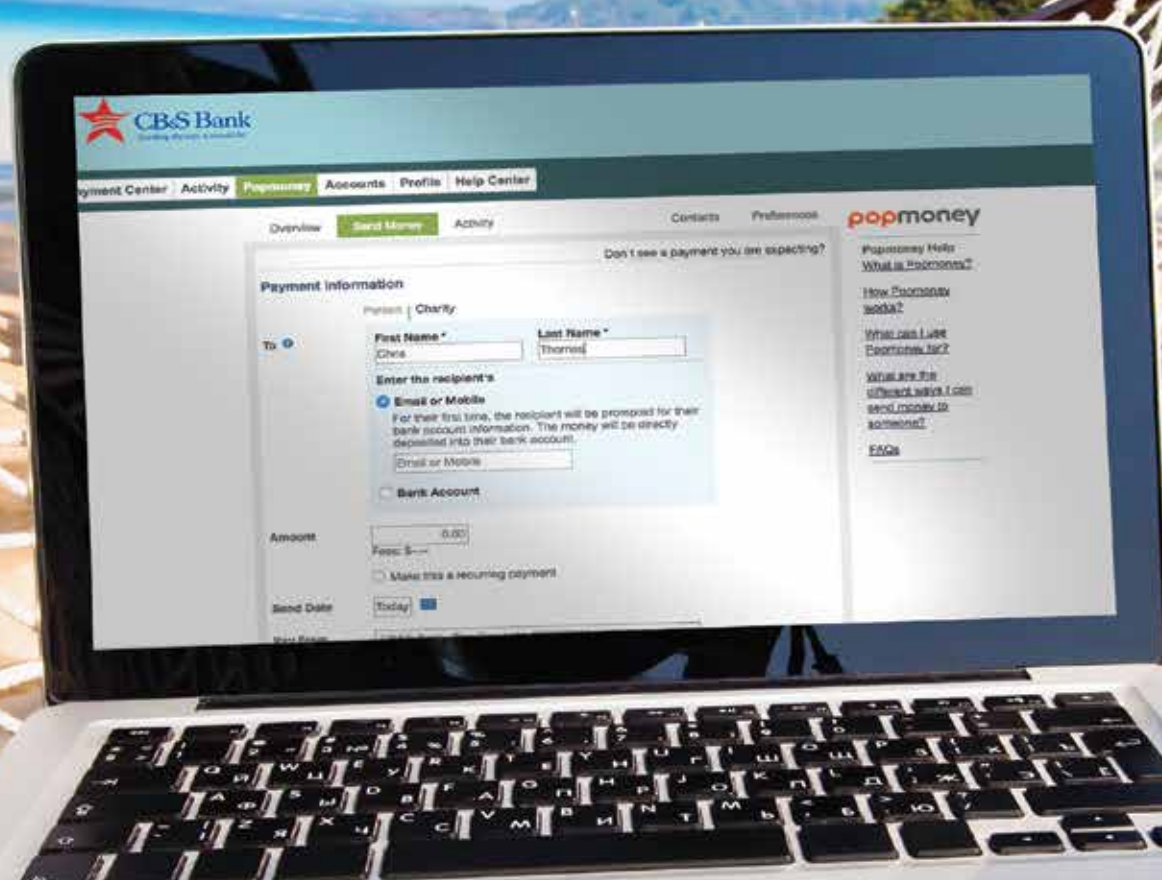

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Tigers Get First 4-0 Start Since 1981

Bolivar Central made a fourth-quarter comeback to become the first Tiger team since 1981 to make it to 4-0, beating Jackson Southside 41-39.

The last Tiger team to go 3-0 was the 2008 squad, but Coach Keith Perry's team followed that start with 12 straight losses that stretched in to 2009.

Against the Hawks, Bolivar got off to a quick 21-0 start, but found themselves down 39-35 with 7:39 remaining in the game.

"You want to be in tough situations," said Coach Woodrow Lowe who raised his career record with Bolivar to 13-12. "We fought back and won the game."

With the exception of the final drive of the game for the Hawks, which ended in a fumble, Bolivar allowed touchdowns on five straight possessions.

"They ran something we didn't practice against and we couldn't stop it," said Lowe. "But we didn't turn the ball over and when you do that, you can win. But it was an ugly win."

Drek Lewis was named the Vaughan Oil Player of the Game, while his brother Jar was named the Lineman of the Game. Jar Lewis had a season-high 18 tackles, including 14 solo stops.

Much affection was had for John and Tina Schroder, the owners of Clover Creek Aerodrome who made it the world-class flying facility it is today. Spirits were high among competitors, not only for flying on the world-class facility, but because of the community. One of the youngest competitors at thirteen, Evan Turner of Maryville, TN, said, "Everyone in the sport's really nice. If you have an issue with an airplane, they'll let you use theirs or they're always willing to help you if you're having a problem or wanting to get better. Everyone's willing to help each other."

It was definitely a family atmosphere with most people knowing each other from other competitions. The family atmosphere makes sense too since many of the competitors got into the sport from father-son time and

the young pilots have even been in competitions against their dads.

On Friday, twenty-one different pilots competed in the crowd favorite-freestyle. Planes danced through the sky in complicated maneuvers to a variety of different songs from slow and dramatic to fast and upbeat. All stops were pulled. Planes soared, dipped, and hovered mere feet above the ground in intricate choreography. Most planes used smoke to add to their routine and a few of the planes even had sparklers fly from the planes during the routine. Saturday September 3rd, the competition transferred to the IMAC portion with some more freestyle competition in the afternoon. IMAC stands for International Model Aircraft Club. During this portion of the contest, pilots all have the same sequences to fly where it only varies by level. The higher the level, the more difficult the sequence. There were five different levels competing in IMAC: Seniors, Sportsman, Intermediate,

Advanced, and Unlimited. Sunday September 4th was the Unknown IMAC sequence, which pilots received only the night before the competition, and the exciting freestyle finals where the final seven gave it all they had.

Judging was also a community affair. There were around forty different judges, many of who were competitors judging different classes. The top seven freestyle pilots won cash prizes from a pot of around \$8,000. The top three in each IMAC division won a plaque. The first place winner for freestyle was Jase Dussia, also known as Jace the "Ace", from Michigan. The Clover Creek Aerodrome IMAC Grand Champion was 12-year-old Kal Reifsnnyder from Florida. He also placed fourth in the freestyle competition. 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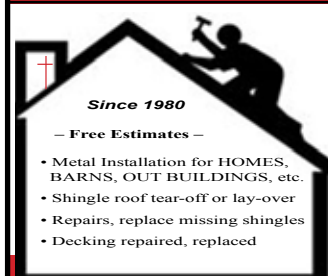

State Agencies Partner to Preserve Wetlands

Representatives from the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the West Tennessee River Basin Authority (WTRBA) recently put pen to paper by signing two partnership agreements aimed to address priority natural resource concerns on private lands in Tennessee. The signing ceremony was held in Jackson, Tennessee.

"These project agreements are connecting public and private partnerships by bringing together new conservation partners, resources, and ideas," said Kevin Brown, Tennessee NRCS State Conservationist and signatory on the agreements. "We've made a significant investment in our conservation and partner-

ship efforts to benefit the quality of Tennessee's soil, water, air, plants, and animals."

A \$3.73 million investment in this project will focus on addressing actively degrading streams and channels and restoring natural stream and floodplain functions, which will result in flood risk reduction and significant improvement in water quality.

"What a great day," David Salyers, Executive Director of the WTRBA-Tennessee, said of the signing ceremony. "We are very excited about this partnership with the NRCS and about these two agreements that will address critical resource concerns in the targeted project areas."

Hardeman County School Board Hosts District Meeting

The Tennessee School Boards Association (TSBA) hosted the Southwest Fall District Meeting on September 8 at Bolivar Elementary School in Hardeman County. "TSBA Fall District Meetings gives state level staff the opportunity to connect with school board members from every part of the state so that we not only hear their concerns but also provide them with the support they need to help them make the best decisions for the children and schools in their communities," said TSBA Executive Director Tammy Grissom.

Members of nine neighboring school district boards of education and superintendents attended the meeting. They participated in a discussions and surveys expressing positions on issues such as charter authorizer fees, BEP funding formula including a component for RTI2, using funds without seeking the approval of the local funding body and allowing board members to electronically participate in board meetings more than two times per year. 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Vote for Smart Investment Moves

The presidential election is little more than a month away. Like all elections, this one has generated considerable interest, and, as a citizen, you may well be following it closely. But as an investor, how much should you be concerned about the outcome?

Probably not as much as you might think. Historically, the financial markets have done well – and done poorly – under both Democratic and Republican administrations. Also, many factors affecting investment performance have little or nothing to do with the occupant of the White House. Consequently, no one can claim, with any certainty, that one candidate is going to be “better for the markets” than another one.

But in evaluating a president's potential effect on your investments, you also need to consider something else: Our political system does not readily accommodate radical restructuring of any kind. So it's difficult for any president to implement huge policy shifts – and that's actually good for the financial markets, which, by their nature, dislike uncertainty, chaos and big changes.

The bottom line? From your viewpoint as an investor, don't worry too much about what happens in November. Instead, follow these investment strategies:

Stay invested. If you stop investing when the market is down in an effort to cut your losses, you may miss the opportunity to participate in the next rally – and the early stages of a rally are typically when the biggest gains occur.

Diversify. By spreading your dollars among an array of investments, such as stocks, bonds and other investments, you can help reduce the possibility of your portfolio taking a big hit if a market downturn primarily affected just one type of financial asset. Keep in mind though, that diversification can't guarantee profits or protect against all losses.

Stay within your risk tolerance. Investing always involves risk, but you'll probably be more successful (and less stressed out) if you don't stray beyond your individual risk tolerance. At the same time, if you invest too conservatively, you might not achieve the growth potential you need to reach your goals. So you will need to strike an appropriate balance.

Forget about chasing “hot” stocks. Many so-called “experts” encourage people to invest in today's “hot” stocks. But by the time you hear about them, these stocks – if they were ever “hot” to begin with – have probably already cooled off. More importantly, they might not have been suitable for your needs, anyway. In any case, there's really no “short cut” to investment success.

Elections – and even presidents – come and go. But when you “vote” for solid investment moves, you can help yourself make progress toward your financial goals.

•Anyone who dumps 10 pounds of garbage, or more, may be charged with aggravated criminal littering and fined \$2,500.

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

Thirty-five (that's right, 35) years and a few months ago, me and 221 other young people received our diplomas from Bolivar Central High School and were able to count ourselves among the graduates of dear old BCHS. Our class was the first (that I know of) that got to graduate outdoors at the football stadium. It was a lovely Southern-spring Thursday night.

Now here our class is, 35 years later, having a reunion and celebrating our lives since that graduation night. A lot of things have happened in 35 years. We did schoolwork on typewriters, some electric and some still manual; today kindergarten students (and younger) are more familiar with computers than we are. We made sure to have a dime (and later a quarter) so we could make a call from a pay phone if we needed to. When was the last time you saw a pay phone, by the way? Today, for better or worse, we can stay in touch all the time via smart phones. We still bought record albums and thought that cassette tapes were really cool. Now we've learned to navigate stream-

ing music; well, some of us have, anyway. Several years ago I heard an oldies station spotlight the music of 1981 – wait, what? When did our music become old?

Any event with the word “reunion” attached to it is a time to think and remember. That group of 222 left the stadium that night with brand new diplomas in hand have traveled many miles since then – some literally and some figuratively. We learned some life lessons in the fall of our senior year when two classmates, Marianne Whitehurst and Helen Langlois, died just a few weeks apart. We've lost other classmates since then, one just a couple of weeks ago. There have been weddings and babies and military careers; some have travelled; other earned advanced degrees. Some have battled illnesses of all kinds, some are still battling those today. In other words, a lot of life has happened to all of us since that long-ago graduation night.

It always seems you remember people the way you knew them “back then”, and compare that 18-year old person to the one you meet again years later. You won-



der if the labels we all gave to each other in high school still fit the person you meet again at this point in our life. It is always interesting to see where life has taken people and to see how they have changed from that classmate you saw every day. When you live in a small town, a trip to Wal Mart can be a class reunion in itself sometimes; sometimes we talk about “wonder whatever happened to” those people we've not seen since graduation night.

To the 221 other members of the Class of '81, I wish y'all all the best over the next 35 years of our lives; wait, how old will we be in 35 more years?

The 34th Annual Archeofest at Pinson Mounds State Archeological Park in Pinson is September 17-18. Pinson Mounds covers more than 1,200 acres and contains at least 15 Native American Mounds. Archaeological evidence suggests the mounds were both burial and ceremonial in purpose. Pinson Mounds is a national historic landmark and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

With a spotlight on archaeology, visitors can take in a variety of presentations and demonstrations ranging from flint knapping, pottery and basketry to wildlife programs and hayride tours of the site. Arts and Crafts, animal handler classes, hiking trails, and the 4,500 square foot mound replica museum give adults and kids each something to explore.
