Search for Missing Man Continues

Law Enforcement and other agencies continued this past week to search for James Perry, 83, of Hardeman County.

Last seen on Tuesday, September 12 at 11:00 a.m. near his residence at 110 Hollywood Acres Lane in Bolivar, Perry is described as a 5'8", 140-pound, African-American man who suffers from Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia.

Since his disappearance, hundreds of volunteers and professionals from six different counties have searched daily for the Hardeman County native, who the family says does not drive and probably set out on foot from his residence.

A family spokesman said they just want him home.

"No questions asked. If you have taken Mr. Perry, please come forward. If you have Mr. Perry, take him to the nearest hospital, police department, or sheriff's department.



Please check your security cameras if you have them, as well as checking any abandoned buildings and cars on your properties."

He was last seen wearing a white polo shirt, blue jeans, and red, white and blue Adidas tennis shoes. He may or may not have his glasses.

Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen says the number of man hours invested to find him is in



the thousands and the search has included scanning the area with a helicopter provided by the Tennessee Highway Patrol.

Drug Fund Pays Dividends

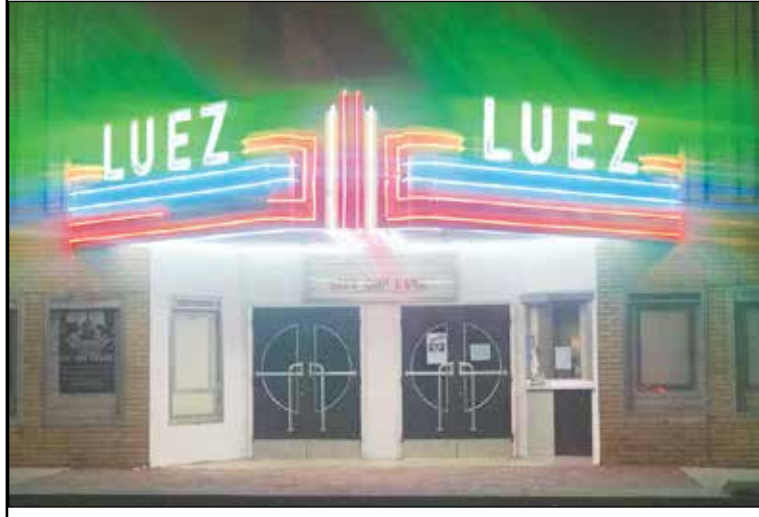

Remembering The Luez Theatre

The following was written for the program the night "Gone with the Wind" ran at the Luez, December 14, 2014.

The Luez Theatre in Bolivar has been a part of my life for all of my life. I don't remember the first movie I saw there, but it was some children's movie that was popular probably around 1968 or 1969 (maybe even a little earlier). The first movie I do remember going there to see was "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang" when I was probably about 7 or 8 years old. I do remember the wonderful feeling of letting the people on the big (and I mean it is really big when you are 7 or 8 years old) screen take me away on their adventures. The yellow-ish brick building that houses the Luez today is the one that I remember, with its marvelous neon marquee out front spelling out L-U-E-Z. I always remember the marvelous smell of the popcorn (which is always so, so good at the movies) being around that building.

The first incarnation of The Luez came to town in 1936 when Miss Louise Mask announced that she would be opening a new "picture show" in Bolivar in one of the buildings on the square. The building opened on a Wednesday in February with its first showing of "Stars Over Broadway", and tickets were 10 cents for children and 25 cents for adults. Miss Louise held a contest during the theater's first month of operation to give the theater a name, not to exceed four letters (she thought four letters would look the best on the marquee, I've been told). There were 467 entries submitted in the contest and the winning name of "Luez" (for Louise) was submitted by Carolyn and Lillian Prewitt, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Alan Prewitt. The young ladies won free movie tickets for two months - what a treat! For you local trivia buffs, the first movie shown under the new "Luez Theatre" name was Anna Karenina starring Greta Garbo and Fredric March (prior to the selection of the name it was just called the "New Theatre").

Miss Louise moved the theatre to its current location in 1948. She built a new theatre that was billed as being "as modern as any show houses in Memphis or Jackson", and even featured air-conditioning for the hot-Southern-summer days in Hardeman County. Miss Louise kept the "Luez" name for the new location and said that she would continue to

"operate under the same policy I have always had. That is, I will have a quiet theatre and good behavior." Several generations of Hardeman Countians can attest to Miss Louise's policies. My Mom, Freddie Coleman, remembers that, "Miss Louise showed new and clean movies the whole family could go to for a night out. If Mom and Dad just wanted to drop the kids off and pick them up later, they could feel good about the movie they would see, but most important, they knew their kids would behave while in the theater or Miss Louise would personally escort any misbehaving child to the front lobby and would call the parents to pick them up." Miss Louise always patrolled the aisles with her trusty flashlight to make sure no mischief was going on at her theatre.

Miss Louise continued to operate the theater until late 1967 when she sold it to the Joe Wheeler family. The Wheeler family kept the "Luez" name and continued to operate the theater until it closed in 2012 when the decline in traditional 35mm film and the use of digital equipment (and its cost) closed the little theater down. The theater was purchased by the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation in 2013 and efforts began to "Save the Luez".

USDA Elections Deadline Approaches

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Mary Van Barkley in Hardeman County today announced that FSA will begin mailing ballots to eligible voters for the 2017 FSA county committee elections on Monday, November 6, 2017. Producers must return ballots to the Hardeman County FSA office by December 4, 2017, to ensure that their vote is counted.

“County committee members play an important role in their communities and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA,” said Barkley.

This year, local administrative area #2 is up for election and the candidates in this year’s election are:

Gerald Andrew Shelton is nominated for Hardeman County, to serve as a committee member. Shelton has produced Wheat, corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, and cotton for 25 years.

Patsy Forrest is nominated for Hardeman County, to serve as a committee member. Forrest has produced soybeans for 15 years.

Nearly 7,800 FSA county committee members serve FSA offices nationwide. Each committee has three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of office. One-third of county committee seats are up for election each year. County committee members apply their knowledge and judgment to help FSA make important decisions on its commodity support programs, conservation programs, indemnity and disaster programs, emergency programs and eligibility.

Producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program to be eligible to vote in the county committee election. Approximately 1.9 million producers are currently eligible to vote. Farmers and ranchers who supervise and conduct the farming operations of an entire farm, but are not of legal voting age, also may be eligible to vote.

Farmers and ranchers will begin receiving their ballots the week of November 6, 2017. Ballots include the names of candidates running for the local committee election. FSA has modified the ballot, making it more easily identifiable and less likely to be overlooked. Voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can pick one up at the Hardeman County FSA office. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than December 4, 2017. Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office January 1, 2018.

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Ames Plantation Offers a Look at Yesteryear

More than 150 historical interpreters, artists and crafters will recreate life in the 1800s through music, folk art and special skill demonstrations at the Ames Plantation Heritage Festival on Saturday, October 14, at Ames Plantation near Grand Junction. Have you ever seen anyone build a log cabin? You can see it at the Heritage Festival. Watch a meal be prepared over an open hearth? They have that, too, along with dozens of other old-fashioned skills like brickmaking, tobacco curing, blacksmithing and more.

The Heritage Festival runs from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$2 for ages 4-16 and free for ages 3 and under.

Many of the historical demonstrations include hands-on activities. Young visitors especially enjoy cotton picking, goat milking and creating vintage crafts. The interpreters are happy to share a story and answer questions.

Bands from across the Mid-South will perform string band, gospel, and blues music all day on two outdoor stages. Heritage Festival goers can also shop handmade goods created by local folk artists. Soaps, quilts, brooms, jewelry and home décor items will be available. Visitors will also be able to purchase pumpkins from a local farmer.

Most activities take place in Ames' Heritage Village – a replica of a 19th century settlement that includes several log cabins, a one-room school, and the na-



tionally renowned Stencil House, so named for the elaborate stencil designs that cover the home's interior walls.

From the village, it's a short stroll to a reproduction of a Civil War camp, where visitors can watch artillery demonstrations performed by re-enactors in period dress. Other features returning this year include storytelling in the schoolhouse, an archaeological demonstration at an antebellum site, horse shoeing, mule logging, woodcarving, Native American culture and historic cemetery interpretation. 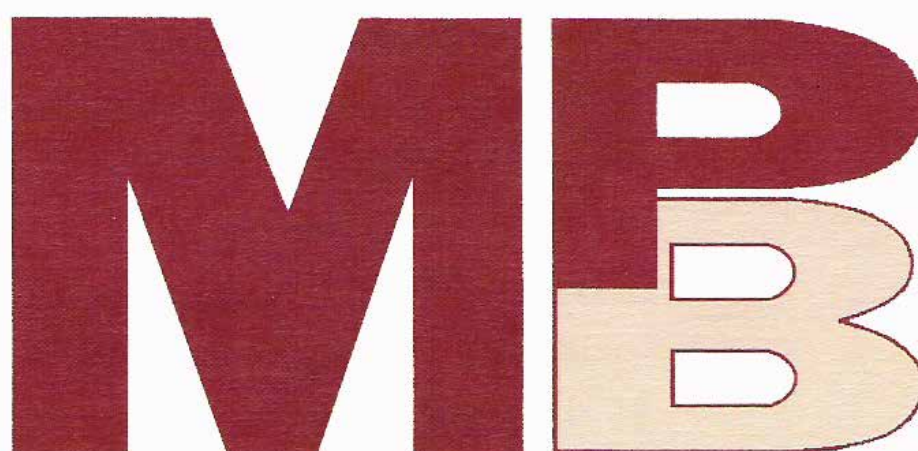

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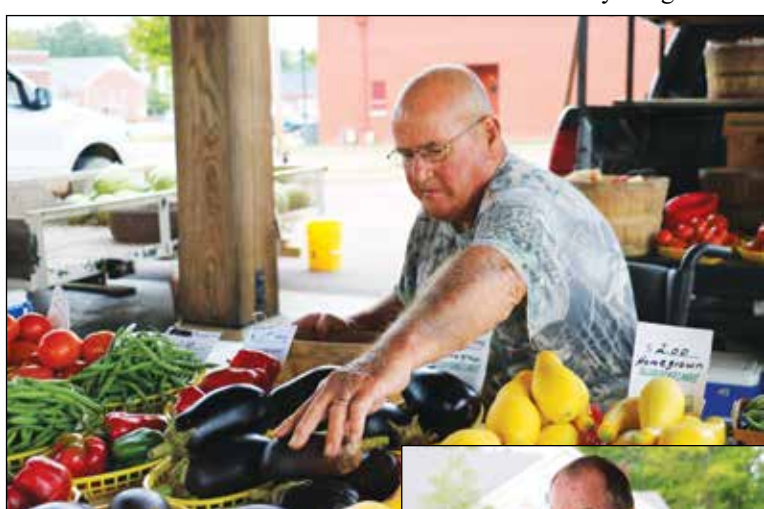
Close to Home: The Bolivar Farmers Market by Ginger Tester

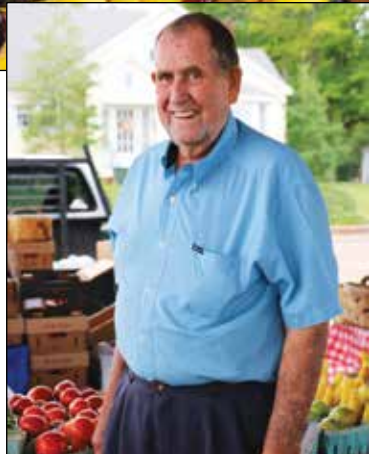
