The Future of the Bank of Bolivar Building?

With the 10-year anniversary of the fire in downtown Bolivar that changed East Market Street, the landmark building damaged by the blaze is still in limbo.

Known as the Bank of Bolivar building and recognized as a National Historic Landmark since 1979, it has remained empty for almost 10 years.

Built in 1910, the Neo-Federal style structure has four Corinthian crowned pilasters and gingerbread metal molding. It was remodeled in 1950 and in 1961, the McAnulty building next to the bank was purchased for the expansion of the main office. In May of 1979 the Bank of Bolivar relocated to West Market Street in Bolivar, which now houses CB&S Bank.

The building eventually became the property of Haley Smith who operated WMOD-Radio

from the building until selling the business to WMOD, Inc. in 1997. Smith eventually sold the building and surrounding property to current owner Jac Belet in 2006.

With the five-year lease between Belet and the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation (DEVCO) ending in December, the question of what use the building could have is at hand once again.

The lease, signed on December 9, 2011, gave DEVCO the use of the property, which includes the building, an area of land east of the building, the two buildings behind and connected to the building and a portion of the parking lot behind the building as well.

Bolivar Reschedules October Meeting

The City of Bolivar, citing a conflict with the Hardeman County Schools fall break, rescheduled their October meeting for October 18, at 5:30 p.m. in the Bolivar Municipal Center.

Normally held the second Tuesday of each month, the conflict with school fall break was brought to the attention of the council.

"Several council members wanted to move it since it was fall break and a lot of teachers had already made plans," explained City Manager Shelia Dellinger, citing conflict for both Todd Lowe and Suzanne Rhea. "Everyone was in favor of it," she added. Fall Break for the Hardeman County Schools is scheduled for October 10-14.

Moving the meeting will postpone the hearing that was to have taken place on October 11 regarding a certificate of compliance for a retail liquor license for a store named Top Shelf that Maria Howell hopes to locate at 1363 West Market Street in Bolivar. To stay in step with the meeting change, public notice of the hearing was changed to October 18 as well. (see A7)

Howell brought her plans to both the March and April meetings of the council, but neither time was given a response by the council.

Voter Registration Drive Continues

The Hardeman County Election Commission began their voter registration drive in Middleton on September 19 and will continue until October 11 when they visit Toone.

The drive is to register new voters and clean up any active registrants files due to name changes, a change of address, or other reasons.

Other dates are Whiteville and Grand Junction on October 3, Hickory Valley and Hornsby on October 4, and Toone on October 11.

The deadline to be registered to vote in the November elections is



October 11. Early voting in Tennessee begins on October 19.

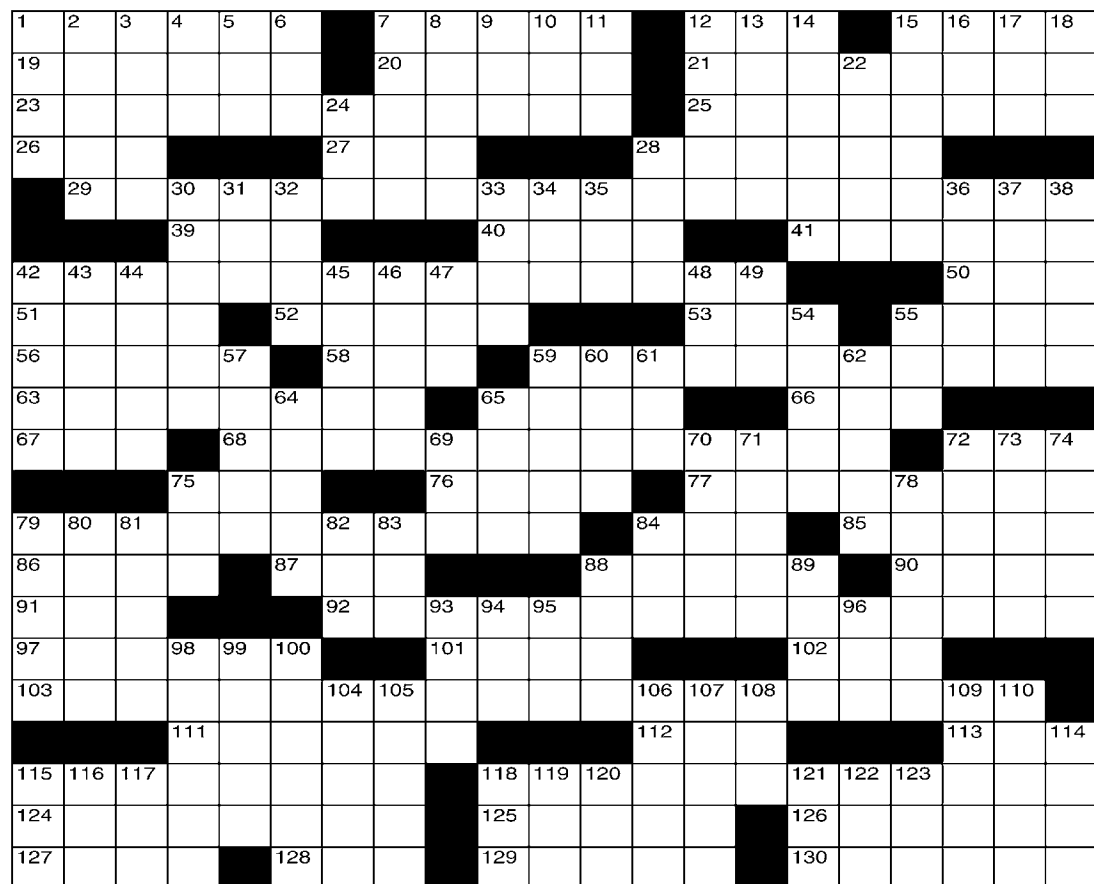

Pork Chops with Pears and Cider

Ingredients

- 2 to 3 medium Yukon gold potatoes, sliced 1/2-inch thick
- 1 medium onion, root intact, cut in eighths
- 5 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 6 cloves garlic
- 5 large rosemary sprigs
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 4 bone-in pork chops, 3/4- to 1-inch thick, or 6 to 8 ounces each
- 2 large USA Pears, cored and cut in eighths
- 3/4 cup pear or apple cider
- 1/2 cup vegetable stock
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter

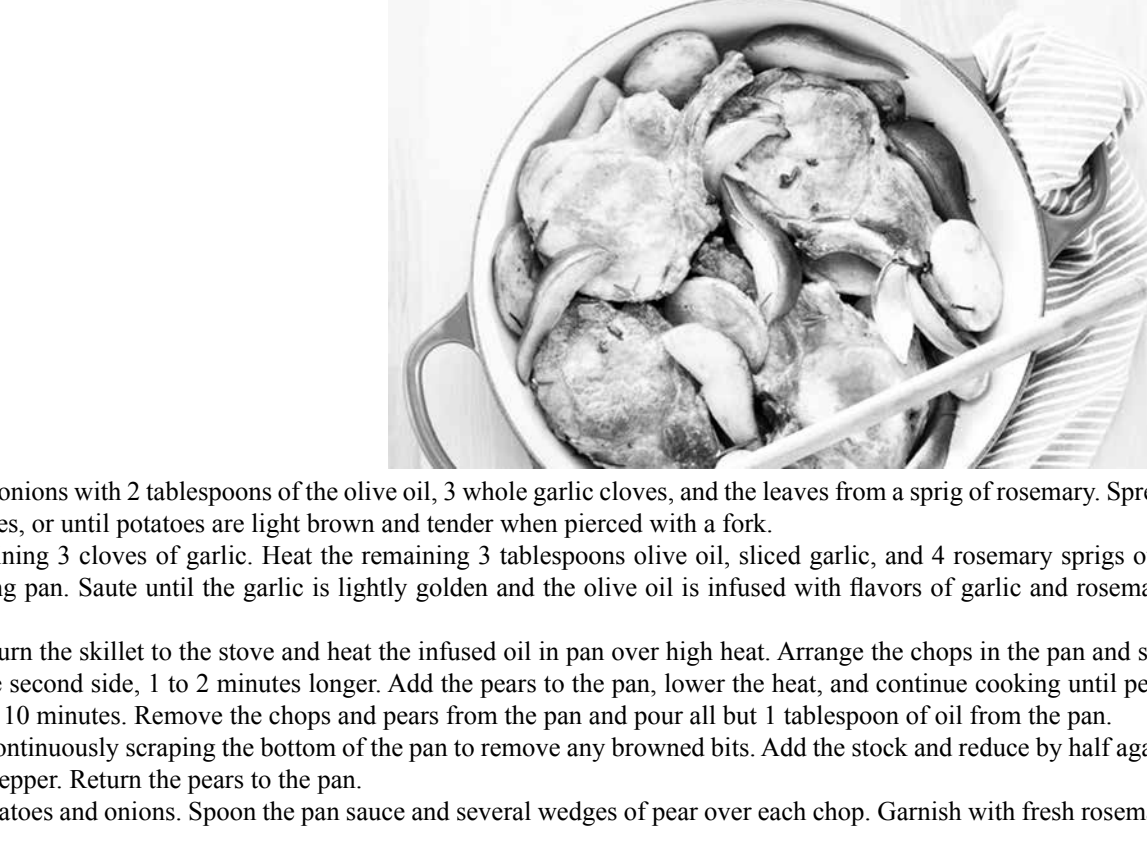
Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. In a large bowl, toss the potatoes and onions with 2 tablespoons of the olive oil, 3 whole garlic cloves, and the leaves from a sprig of rosemary. Spread the vegetables in a single layer on a baking sheet. Bake 20 to 30 minutes, or until potatoes are light brown and tender when pierced with a fork.

While the potatoes and onions are in the oven, thinly slice the remaining 3 cloves of garlic. Heat the remaining 3 tablespoons olive oil, sliced garlic, and 4 rosemary sprigs over medium heat in a large cast iron skillet or other heavy-bottomed frying pan. Saute until the garlic is lightly golden and the olive oil is infused with flavors of garlic and rosemary. Remove the garlic slices and set aside. Discard the rosemary.

Season the pork chops with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Return the skillet to the stove and heat the infused oil in pan over high heat. Arrange the chops in the pan and sear until nicely browned, 1 to 2 minutes. Turn the chops and brown on the second side, 1 to 2 minutes longer. Add the pears to the pan, lower the heat, and continue cooking until pears become tender and lightly brown and the chops cooked through, about 10 minutes. Remove the chops and pears from the pan and pour all but 1 tablespoon of oil from the pan.

Pour the cider in the pan and reduce by half over medium high heat, continuously scraping the bottom of the pan to remove any browned bits. Add the stock and reduce by half again. Add the butter, stirring until melted, and season to taste with salt and pepper. Return the pears to the pan.

To serve, place a chop on each of four plates, next to some roasted potatoes and onions. Spoon the pan sauce and several wedges of pear over each chop. Garnish with fresh rosemary leaves if desired.

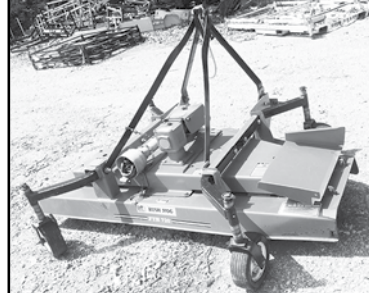

Want to Retire Early? Start Planning Now

The average American retires at about age 63, according to data from the U.S. Census Bureau. If you enjoy your work, of course, you may want to go well beyond that age. But what if you don't want to wait until 63 or so? Can you afford to retire early?

Possibly – if you follow these suggestions:

Research the costs involved. What will you do during your retirement years? Will you travel the world or stay close to home, pursuing your hobbies? Will you downsize from your current home? How will you pay for health care until you're old enough for Medicare? You will need to answer these and other questions to determine how much you will need to sustain a comfortable lifestyle as an early retiree.

Invest more – and invest for growth. One big advantage in retiring at the usual age, or even later, is that it gives you more time to invest. But if you're determined to retire early, you will almost certainly need to accelerate your investment rate – which, in practical terms, means you'll likely have to contribute more each year to your IRA and 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan than if you were going to retire later on. Plus, you may have to "ratchet up" the growth potential of your investment portfolio. However, because growth-oriented investments typically are more volatile than other investments, you will be taking on more risk than you might otherwise. If you are truly uncomfortable with this risk level, you may need to re-evaluate your plans for retiring early.

Cut down your debt load. It's always a good idea to enter retirement with as few debts as possible – but if you want to retire early, you may need to be even more diligent in controlling your debt load.

Know the rules governing retirement plan withdrawals. If you want to retire before age 59½ and begin taking distributions from your IRA or 401(k) plan, you will generally be subject to a 10% early distribution penalty, plus normal income taxes. (To withdraw your earnings from a Roth IRA tax and penalty free, you generally must have owned the account for at least five years and have reached age 59½. You can withdraw your contributions at any time tax and penalty free.) However, you may be able to avoid the 10% penalty if you take "substantially equal periodic payments," which are calculated based upon your age and other factors. Once these distributions begin, they must continue for five years or until you reach age 59½, whichever is longer. Other rules apply to these distributions, so before taking any, you will want to consult with your tax and financial professionals. And keep in mind that if your withdrawal rate is too high, you risk seriously depleting your retirement accounts, especially if your investments decline in value during the years you're taking these payments.

Most importantly, do everything early: Plan early, invest early (and don't stop), and lower your debt load early. Getting a jump on all these activities can go a long way toward turning your early retirement dreams into reality.

Connie Cooper, the manager of the cafeteria, expressed that it feels awesome to earn another perfect score.

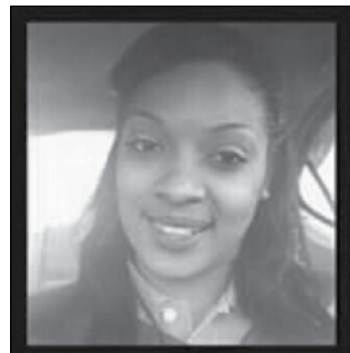

Pressure Washing by Jimmy Sadler

There was a time, not too long ago, when families were prone to drop in on other families. People were excited to see the neighbor and hear the doorbell chime. It was a chance to laugh, to share or to help. We once welcomed that opportunity. I know my parents always did. The house was kept fairly presentable because we might have a neighbor knock or a friend in the area who just wanted to say hello. Some of the knocks were people needing help. One night, that knock came at 4:00 a.m. A young family had slid off the snowy road, through our fence, and into the muddy yard. My parents welcomed the couple in and made them feel at home until a service station opened.

These days, we are much less likely to open the door with excitement over a surprise guest, if we open it at all. Since everyone is now prepared for company to come by, with fair warning, everyone seems to have their house in order. We play a social shell game where we get fancied up enough to fool our friends.

We worry a lot about our yards and home exterior because that is what everyone sees. We judge each other by the orderliness of our yards. We cut weeds to make them short and carpet-like, but rarely go out on them anymore. We have learned to pressure wash our lives, to keep the superficial shiny and bright, while managing the chaos inside. I think, sadly, the same has happened to our hearts and minds. We have learned to tidy up before talking to someone, carefully camouflaging hurts, struggles, and sins. We pressure-wash our interactions with others. Jesus called this white-washing the tombstone while the contents remained dead. We've gotten to be so professional at it.

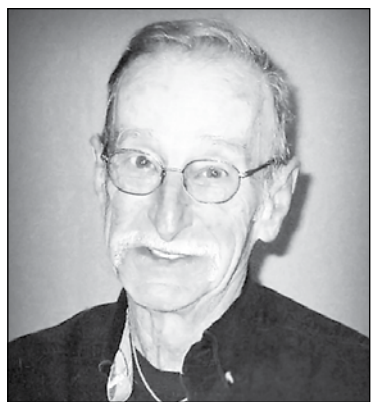

Bolivar Central went to 5-0 on the season with a 65-20 homecoming night win over Memphis Sheffield, scoring on 10 of their 11 possessions in the process.

The lone possession that did not end in a touchdown for the Tigers was the final one of the game and the clock ran out with Bolivar driving inside Sheffield's 30-yard line. "We came out and executed," said Bolivar Head Coach Woodrow Lowe. "We showed confidence and got the job done."

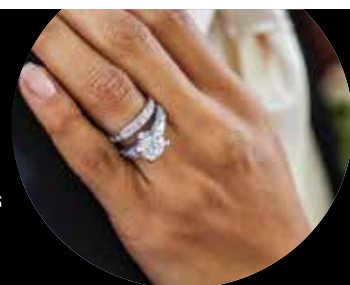

Toone Town Council Votes to Raise Water Rates

The town of Toone held their monthly meeting Tuesday, September 16 and agreed that beginning September 16, residents of Toone will notice a 6% rate increase on their water bills. The vote was unanimous on the increase.

There will be an auction September 24 to sell existing equipment owned by the town. Officials expect this to bring in enough revenue to buy a needed road grader with funds left over. The notion of speed bump installation along King St. passed across the board. The supplies to complete this street project along with a pole saw to cut limbs along several streets will come out of this year's fiscal budget. With the installation of the Med Evac Helio Pad comes another safety improvement for citizens. A 911 Dispatch Tower already has a bid set for 30 days out. It will be the property of the Town of Toone and won't interfere with the helio pad as long as a safety light is installed on top.

Land bought from the Keller Estate by Dollar General is making a store in Toone a reality. The concrete slab has been poured and walls should be going up soon. Officials expect for the store to be finished and open for business by November.

Hopeful Homeowners Attend Home Improvement Grant Meeting

Residents of the City of Bolivar came to the municipal center to find out more information about making possible improvements to their homes. The City of Bolivar has been awarded a \$321,000 Home Rehabilitation Grant in order to perform repairs on a few homes. Casey Smith of Southwest Tennessee Development District expressed that the main emphasis in Bolivar will be Margin Street to Water Street and it is ideally for low income families. There is a maximum of \$40,000 for the cost of repairs and a minimum of \$1,000. Home inspections will take place and estimates will be sought to see what has to be done in the home. The application deadline is October 14 at city hall. The City of Bolivar's Neighborhood Cleanup Day is on Saturday, October 1 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. Those who want to participate will meet at Love and Truth Church. For more information, call Bolivar City Hall at 658-2020.

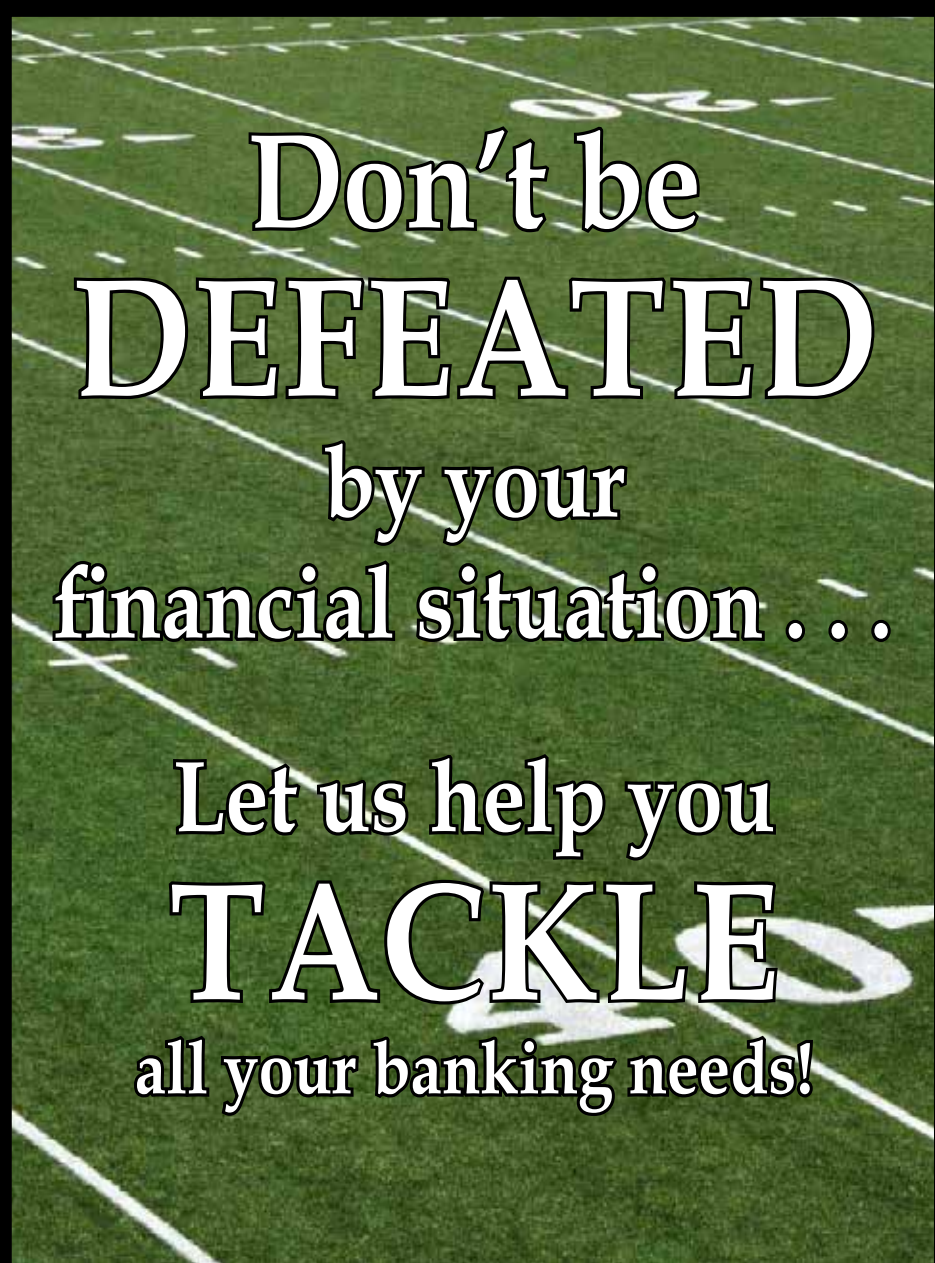
