Building the City Brick by Brick

If the Big, Bad, Wolf comes to town to blow some buildings down, Bolivar wants to be ready.

The Bolivar City Council will vote at their scheduled meeting on October 18 on the passage of an ordinance to amend the zoning ordinance by adoption of new design review guidelines. It was passed on the first reading by the council on September 13.

The ordinance will put design standards in place for multi-family developments, neighborhood businesses, central businesses, planned businesses, office spaces, and structures along the Hospital-Medical District. None of these standards will affect current structures already in place.

"The State Planner brought it before the city council," explained City Manager Shelia Dellinger. "There are so many buildings in

the historical district that people have tried to do things to."

Shelden Merrell, Regional Planner for the Southwest Tennessee Development District said that his recommendation came upon by request from the city.

"This is due to complaints and concerns about materials used for building," he said. "This ordinance is not a final draft, it is nothing we are recommending but something they can consider if they want to control materials used in building. This is an avenue they can use to solve future problems. But this is not mandated by the state."

The ordinance which will be voted on after a public hearing reads: *Only quality materials which are durable and attractive shall be used on all future construction. The publicly visible*

Shiloh National Military Park to Remember Battle of Corinth

Shiloh National Military Park will commemorate the 154th anniversary of the battle of Corinth by offering interpretive programs over a three day period from Monday, October 3, through Wednesday, October 5. "We invite everyone to visit the Corinth Battlefield as we remember the events that took place in Corinth 154 years ago," said Superintendent Dale Wilkerson. "The programs will provide visitors with a unique opportunity to engage park resources that are normally challenging to access on a daily basis." Visitors will also have the opportunity to discover unique stories about the battle such as the story of an eagle named "Old Abe," the mascot of the 8th Wisconsin Infantry, who became one of the casualties of the battle. Rangers will offer battlefield hikes, multimedia presentations, and car caravan tours over the three days.



In addition, a Junior Ranger table will be set up especially for the younger visitors. The Junior Ranger table will be available Sunday, October 2, through Wednesday, October 5. State Jobless Rate Drops from 2015

Tennessee Labor & Workforce Development Commissioner Burns Phillips announced the Tennessee preliminary unemployment rate for August was 4.4 percent, up one-tenth of a percentage point from the July revised rate of 4.3 percent. The U.S. preliminary rate for August was 4.9 percent, unchanged from the previous month.

Over the past year, Tennessee's unemployment rate decreased from 5.6 percent to 4.4 percent while the national rate declined from 5.1 percent to 4.9 percent.

Total nonfarm employment increased 7,300 jobs from July to August. The largest increases occurred in administrative/support/waste services, mining/logging/construction & real estate/rental/leasing.

Over the year, seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment increased 64,000 jobs. The largest increases occurred in education/health services, professional/business services & trade/transportation/utilities.

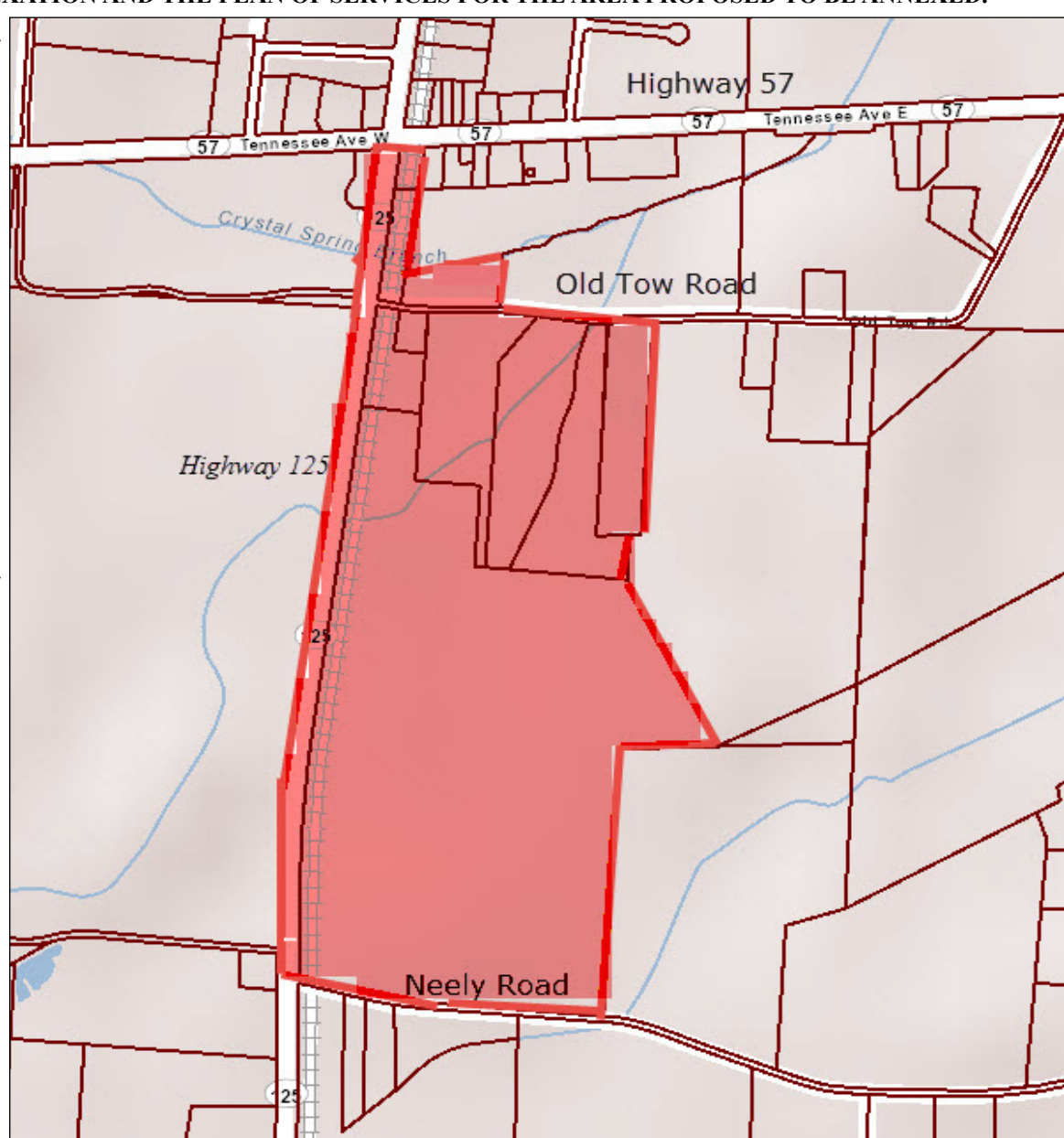

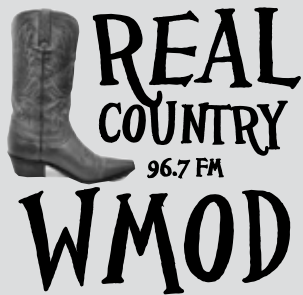

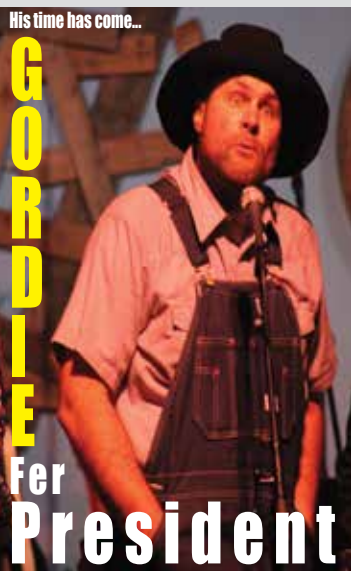

sides of the structure are advised to have a minimum of 100% of the exterior facades covered in brick, cast stone, cultured stone, or an alternative masonry substance acceptable to the planning commission/design review commission. This excludes windows, trim, and doors. Concrete panels, prefabricated metal panels, fluted concrete cinder block, cement sheathing materials, and similar imitation stonework materials shall be avoided as the main exterior of the construction.

Furthermore, a resolution will be considered that would form a design review committee that would oversee all buildings built in the city, according to the mayor's office, adding that the jurisdiction within the Bolivar Historic District would still remain under the control of the Historical Planning Commission.

"Several demolitions have taken place along the Bolivar Business District, just to be replaced with run of the mill metal buildings that won't last as long as our current historical structures. In order to keep our historic look going, this resolution will put limitations and restrictions on exterior materials and details to keep all structures aesthetically more attractive by retaining the same visual effect," said Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens.

The vote on the ordinance will be preceded by a public hearing.

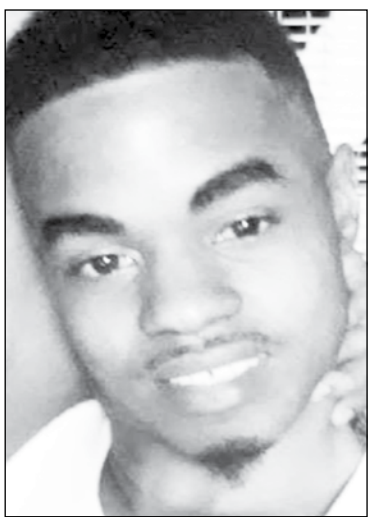

State Credits TN Promise for Education Surge

Department of Education Commissioner Candice McQueen announced that nearly 7,500 more postsecondary credits were awarded to Tennessee public school students in 2016 when compared to 2014. Additionally, more students than ever before in Tennessee are taking Advanced Placement (AP) exams, with 27,699 students taking one or more exam in 2016—up 8.8 percent from last year.

The new data show that not only are more Tennessee students taking AP tests, but also 3,700 more exams were scored a three or higher, making those students eligible to receive college credit for their high school work. AP classes offer students the ability to take college-level course work and earn college credit based on their performance on the national AP exam.

“Through Tennessee Promise, our students have an unprecedented opportunity to continue their education beyond high school, and we must ensure they are ready to be successful from day one,” McQueen said. “To ensure their

success in college and their future careers, all students in Tennessee need to have access to rigorous and relevant early postsecondary opportunities, and AP course expansion is a key component to this work.”

The trends in Tennessee were mirrored in the national data that is out today. Across the country, participation was up by 5.3 percent with a similar percentage increase in the number of exams that were scored as a three or higher.

Research has shown that students who participate in early postsecondary courses are more likely to enroll and persist in postsecondary education. One of the department’s three goals, as detailed in the department’s strategic plan, Tennessee Succeeds, is for the majority of high school graduates from the class of 2020 to earn a postsecondary certificate, diploma, or degree. This achievement will equip our students to meet the demands of the workforce as at least 55 percent of all jobs in Tennessee will require some postsecondary education by 2025.

Currently, there are several types of early postsecondary opportunities available in Tennessee and offerings vary widely by school district. To support this effort, and to ensure that all students are given the opportunity to earn early postsecondary credit, the department supports the following early postsecondary opportunities and programs:

- Dual enrollment
- Local dual credit
- Statewide dual credit
- Advanced Placement
- Cambridge International Examinations
- International Baccalaureate
- College Level Examination Program
- Student Industry Certification
