Bolivar Gets Home Improvement Grant

Homeowners in East Bolivar will get a chance to improve their housing through a grant from the Tennessee Housing Development Agency (THDA).

The \$321,000 allotted to the city for repair of existing dwellings will be doled based on needs for those homeowners who qualify and file an application by the deadline of October 14.

Informational meetings, conducted by THDA, are scheduled for September 8 at 6:00 p.m. and at September 13 at 5:30 p.m. at Bolivar City Hall.

The targeted area is East Bolivar, from Margin Street to Water Street.

"This is extremely important, particularly

to help East Bolivar. We are taking back our town," said Bolivar Mayor Barrett Stevens, who added the city will have a neighborhood clean up day on October 1.

Homeowners in the target area have been mailed, and in many cases, hand delivered notices of the September meetings. For those renting in the area, both the residents and the homeowners/landlords were contacted.

"I'm happy that we are going to be able to help some property owners in that area," said Councilman Julian McTizic, who serves that area. "Hopefully, it is one more step in making a better Bolivar."



THDA was created to promote the production of more affordable new housing units for very low, low and moderate income individuals and families in the state, to promote the preservation and rehabilitation of existing housing units for such persons, and to bring greater stability to the residential construction industry and related industries so as to assure a steady flow of production of new housing units.

Ticket prices are \$10 per person and can be purchased at the door, space permitting.

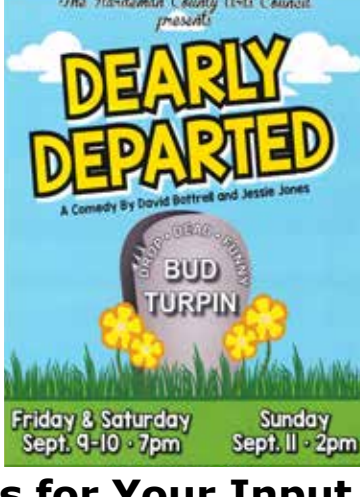

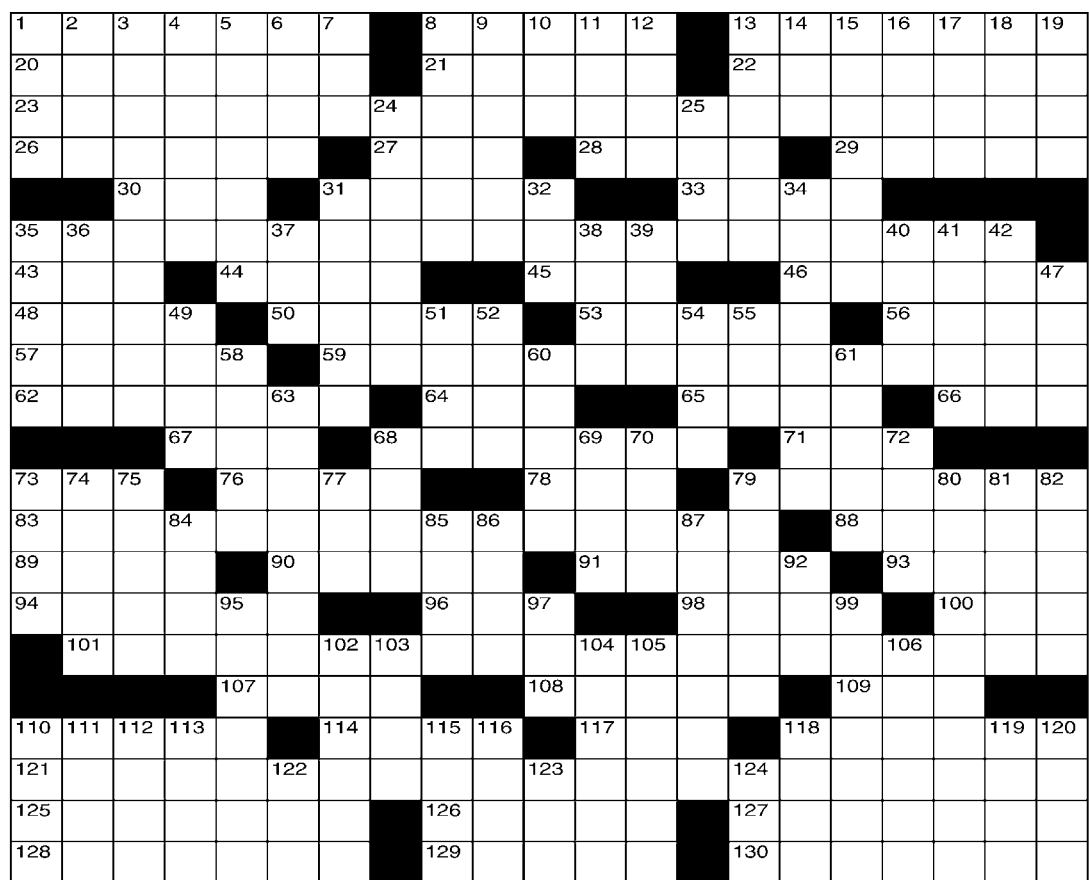

Lasagna Cupcakes

- Ingredients:**
- 12 oz. raw extra-lean ground beef (4% fat or less)
 - 1/8 tsp. black pepper
 - 1/4 tsp. salt
 - 1 cup chopped onion
 - 1/2 cup chopped mushrooms
 - One 14.5-oz. can crushed tomatoes
 - 1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning
 - 1 1/2 tsp. chopped garlic
 - One 10-oz. package frozen chopped spinach, thawed and squeezed dry
 - 1 1/2 cups light/low-fat ricotta cheese
 - 1/4 cup (about 2 large) egg whites or fat-free liquid egg substitute
 - 1/8 tsp. ground nutmeg
 - Cooked and drained lasagna noodles
 - 1 1/2 cups shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

Directions: Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Spray a 12-cup muffin pan with nonstick spray. Bring a large skillet sprayed with nonstick spray to medium-high heat. Add beef, pepper, and 1/8 tsp. salt. Cook and crumble until browned, about 3 minutes. Add onion and mushrooms. Cook, stir, and crumble until beef is fully cooked and veggies are soft, about 4 minutes. Add crushed tomatoes, Italian seasoning, and 1 tsp. garlic. Cook and stir until well mixed, about 1 minute. In a medium bowl, combine spinach, ricotta cheese, egg whites/substitute, nutmeg, remaining 1/8 tsp. salt, and remaining 1/2 tsp. garlic. Mix well. Press a lasagna noodle into the bottom and up along the sides of each cup of the pan. Evenly distribute half of the spinach-ricotta mixture among the cups (about 1 1/2 tbsp. each), and smooth out the surfaces. Top with half of the beef mixture (about 2 tbsp. each), and smooth out the surfaces. Top with half of the mozzarella cheese (1 tbsp. each). Place another lasagna noodle into each cup, lightly pressing it down and along the sides, letting the edges fall over the pan. Repeat layering with remaining spinach-ricotta mixture, beef mixture, and mozzarella cheese. Bake until spinach-ricotta mixture is hot, mozzarella has melted, and wrapper edges have browned, 10 - 12 minutes. MAKES 12 SERVINGS

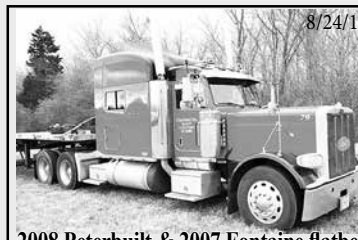

Horse Powered Logging, Part III by Calley Overton

After unloading his wagon of logs, Jeff Ferge and his horses return into the woods. Once in the woods, the trucks far behind and the chainsaw far ahead, it is like something out of another era: A man, his team of horses, and a wagon. The horses plod along quietly surrounded by the near silence of the woods. To the left is a nearly unnoticeable treetop. Surrounding it are towering unscathed hardwoods that are not yet ready to be harvested.

Most logging operations employ diesel-powered skidders that wreak havoc on the land and trees that are not yet ready for harvest. The skidders knock trees down and drag them out of the woods, crushing small trees and rutting the land. Other more mature trees are damaged by the machinery, causing them to lose their value. That is not the case with Ferge and his crew. The method they use with their draft animals is how logging has been done for hundreds of years with only a few modern concessions. Venturing into the woods down to the logging site, all is quiet. Above



the sound of birds is the distant buzz of a chainsaw. The trail is the width of the small wagon and if it was not for the few tree tops scattered along the way, one could not even tell it was being logged. Trees are not lying helter skelter, scars do not mar the timber that is under the 18' mark, small trees remain standing, and there are no ruts to be found, only hoofprints and the tracks of small wheels. The beauty of the land itself is preserved.

If you are interested in preserving your ecosystem and the beauty of your property, horse-powered logging is for you. This method largely preserves the habitat of the wildlife living in it and allows for the timber to be reworked in ten to fifteen years. That may seem long, but it is short when you remember that hardwoods take decades to reach financial maturity. The process is fundamentally slower, but it is worth it in the long term management of your timber.

Brokeness vs. Breakingness

I watched a man step out of a situation where he was being hammered daily. His walk with Christ had become a ritualized routine. His life resembled life in the matrix, where one has to turn off expectations and find a place in the world created by someone else. In the matrix, it's usually at least a normal life. This was darker, more suffocating. He was broken. In his brokenness he left and found simple freedom. I'm not talking about someone leaving a family on a whim or just flipping a switch and doing a 180 away from a job without reason. He was betrayed and lonely, and reminded daily how little he deserved grace. In his broken state, he breathed deep and has started coming back to life. Like a person turned blue from a choking hazard, it was then removed. His color is returning and he has responded in gratitude and grace. I admire the guy, as I know firsthand how difficult that scene is. I know another who has always felt betrayed, but whose broken condition became a staging ground for breaking others. It seems he wants to share the "wealth" he has acquired, a pile of anger, resentment and hate. He is experiencing what I call "breakingness". I know it isn't a real word, but I promise you it's a real condition.

There are really only two basic responses to suffering: relinquishment or retaliation. Relinquish-

ment means giving up your desire to be in the right, to gain a foothold in controlling another, to forgive even when you can't forget. It is not easy, but it will change your life. Relinquishment means you place your worth in Christ, not what someone else thinks of you. Truly giving up the desire for harm to come to another. It is not easy or passive, but an active, daily exercise. Our hearts and minds eventually change. Though God sometimes removes the hurt of offenses, he often allows us to work through those emotions. The first man I mentioned left a place where he was reminded daily of the person he was imagined to be. He is going to a place of gentle reliance and assurance of God's view of him.

Relinquishment is not giving up your rights to be human and allowing someone to abuse you. Relinquishment is not staying in or walking back to a situation where you are unsafe, battered or constantly abused. Relinquishment means you trust God to do what you are unable to do. There may be some situations you relinquish to God for hopes of resolution. It is an attitude of human inability in the face of great duress, acknowledging that you are powerless to bring good from the bad. God, on the other hand, can and does do that. It is not without great pain and endurance, it is, however, with great and lasting reward.

Sunrise: Oppose

In Therese Rando's book *Grief, Dying, And Death* (1984), she proposes that all societies have three general patterns of response to death: death-accepting, death-defying, or death-denying. She said that ancient Egypt was death-defying and the United States today is an example of a death-denying culture. She attempted to show that this is evident in the way we as a society have impersonalized and distanced our approach to death. I have long agreed with this hypothesis as I have used my family's own real life as an illustration. There is one other example that I wish to put forth. Elizabeth Kubler-Ross painted a classic picture in her book *On Death and Dying* (1969), where she gave the illustration of a farmer who was dying after a fall and asked to die at home and this was granted without question. He also called all his children to his side individually to discuss the situation. This contrasts what is so common today, the fact that children are allowed to stay at home where a fatality has stricken (even small children) and are included in the talk, discussions etc. She goes on to say that this gives them the feeling that they are not alone in this journey with grief, and gives them the comfort of shared responsibility. It also prepares them gradually and helps them view death as a part of life. (pp. 5-6)

I have seen the opposite in a family system where the parent is traveling a journey with grief and the child is refusing to accept the parent's holistic approach to life, including the eventual death of the physical body. What if the parent and the child believe in the Christian world view which includes the fact that life does not end here in this earthly sojourn? What if a conflict arises when the child also a different generation than the parent possesses a view that is sharply in conflict with the approach of the parent as to how to deal with the subject of death when it hits home? What do you do when a child does not and will not respect the parent's instruction and view on death and dying? I have been involved with children who wished to change the memorial service after the death of a parent because they as 'adults' did not agree with the parent's beliefs. It's a broken person who stores hurt in a container for quick access. When someone slights this person, they open up the container enough to obliterate the threat. It may be real or perceived offenses, there is no difference in the mind of the retaliative party.

If God re-paid us for our offenses toward Him and those he calls His children, we would never stand. Not a single one of us would be left. Even God chose to relinquish his rightful repayment to us. Instead, he dealt the emotion an eternal blow to his own Son. May we reach for that level of relinquishment in our own lives.

"For since our friendship with God was restored by the death of his Son while we were still his enemies, we will certainly be saved through the life of his Son" (Romans 5:10, NLT).

Bolivar Takes Region Lead

Bolivar Central grabbed the lead in Region 8AAA on September 2, dealing defending champion Covington at 34-7 loss in Covington.

The Tigers got off to a quick start with an 87 yard kickoff return to give them a 7-0 lead.

"We wanted to come out quick and establish our game," said Coach Woodrow Lowe. "And we did it. We proved we can take this program to the next level."

Covington responded with a long drive, but fumbled inside the Tiger 20-yard line. The teams traded punt before Covington again fumbled, this time inside the Bolivar five.

After a Correy Brown 62-yard run to the 2-yard line, quarterback Trey Lowe ran it in to make it 14-0 with 10:56 left in the second quarter of play.

Covington did manage to get on the board late in the first half to cut it to 14-7, the Chargers were held on two fourth down tries deep in Bolivar's end in the second half while the Tigers scored three times to make the final 34-7.

Drek Lewis gained 164 yards in 19 carries and a touchdown, while Lowe threw for 89 yards and a touchdown on 7 for 15 passing. Lowe rushed for two touchdowns as well.



Place kicking, which was a problem coming into the game, went well against Covington as the Tigers converted 4 of 5 extra points.

With the win, Bolivar is now 2-0 in region play, good enough for first place in the seven-team

league. Senior wide-receiver Demarkus Murrell was named the Vaughan Oil Player of the Game, while Kevin Reed, a sophomore line-backer, was named the Lineman of the Game. Reed had 10 tackles (8 solo, 2 assist), 1 sack, 1 hurry in the victory.

"While we live in some of the safest times in history, these fires, storms, flash-floods, heatwaves, tornadoes, accidents, and active shooter tragedies serve as reminders of the importance of being aware of the potential threats around us and to prepare ourselves and our loved ones."

For National Preparedness Month, TEMA asks that you make sure you

are ready for the next disaster.

Authorized alerting authorities can use WEA to send emergency text messages through mobile carriers. WEA messages include a special tone and vibration, repeated twice, to alert callers. The message also will display the type and time of the alert. More information on WEA is available at www.fema.gov/frequently-asked-questions-wireless-emergency-alerts

Prepare for Emergencies

National Preparedness Month is designed to raise awareness and encourage Americans to take steps to prepare for emergencies in their homes, schools, organizations, businesses, and places of worship.

The first step in emergency preparedness is to create a written emergency plan for you and your family. Basic emergency plans include information such as:

The evacuation procedure for your home, in case of fire or flood, so everyone will know which exits to take during a home emergency;

- How family members should contact each other if they are separated in a disaster;
- Where family members should meet after evacuating their home, or if your neighborhood is being evacuated; and,
- The important contact phone numbers for work locations, med-

ical providers, and insurance carriers.

Also, check the emergency plans and preparations for places where you and your family spend time such as schools, day cares, sports facilities, and faith organizations. It is also important to have an emer-

gency kit in every automobile your family uses.

Finally, make sure you exercise your plans with your family. Practice a family fire drill or try out your communication plan on a day when you know family members will be separated.

Emergency Kit Basics

The contents of a well-stocked disaster kit vary depending on household needs. There are certain essentials for any kit:

- Water – at least a gallon per person per day, for three to five days
- Nonperishable food (such as dried fruit or peanut butter) – enough per person for three to five days
- Pet supplies
- Pet food and water
- Baby supplies (formula, diapers)
- Weather radio (battery-powered or hand-crank) and extra batteries
- First-aid kit
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Dust mask (to filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Cellphone (with charger, inverter or solar charger)
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Toothbrush, toothpaste, soap
- Paper plates, plastic cups and utensils, paper towels
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Whistle (to call for help)
- Can opener (manual)
- Local maps
- Extra batteries

Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

For the past few days I keep reading and hearing the phrase “the end of summer” which seems to always crop up around Labor Day. Thinking about summers always makes me think about the vacations we took growing up – wonderful car trips all across America. We took short trips too, sometimes a night or two or even just for the day. One place right in our own Hardeman County backyard was a popular tourist destination from days gone by, that for many years provided days and weeks of enjoyment for families. The restorative and healing power of “the waters”, especially spring waters, was a fashionable and popular destination and people came from miles around to visit Dunlap Springs to “take the waters”.

Dunlap Springs was located about three miles southeast from Bolivar, and an advertisement booklet from its heyday boasts that, “the drive from Bolivar to the springs is through forests as old as trees are anywhere, and sometimes for long distances the great boughs overlap each other, making a sylvan arcade that is a comfort in the hot days of summer, and always a delight to the traveler along the road.” The springs were located along the Illinois Central Railroad line, which brought many visitors from “all



across the South” to stay at the springs. The springs date back to the days of the Native Americans in the area, who believed they were protected when they were near the waters. Many visitors went there until the Civil War came along, destroying the cabins and buildings near the springs. It remained vacant and forgotten for many years, until Mr. H. B. Paul purchased the area in 1893 and began to make improvements to the 300 acres, creating “almost a fairy land in beauty.”

There were private cabins and cottages, a hotel, telegraph communication, a ten pin bowling alley, dining halls, billiard halls (for men and ladies) and miles of paths with wooden bridges crossing the streams. For \$7.00 per week, vis-

itors could enjoy the “health and pleasure” of the springs. The booklet notes that diseases cured or eased by a visit to the springs included “diseases of the kidneys (all kinds), dyspepsia, liver complaints, blood poison, hay fever, nervous troubles (of all kinds), stomach troubles (of various forms), breakdowns from overwork, sores, sore eyes, female troubles”, and numerous children’s diseases that will turn them from “sickly, puny little things” to “fat, rosy, and strong, and ready to go through winter”.

Pick a direction, take a drive, take a trip – far away or just in our own backyard. Enjoy the scenery and being with folks you love. Hope to see y’all out there on the open road.

Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

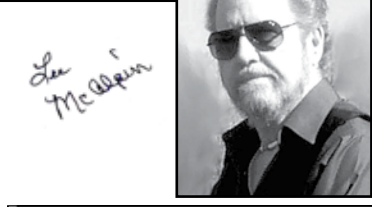


I remember the fall season in the country at the Yellow House. It was a beautiful time of the year, as it is today. The countryside comes alive with colors. It’s like the trees and foliage are putting on a final and special fashion show before shedding their leaves for the winter.
