A local boy will get a shot at the King as USA Championship Wrestling comes to Bolivar.

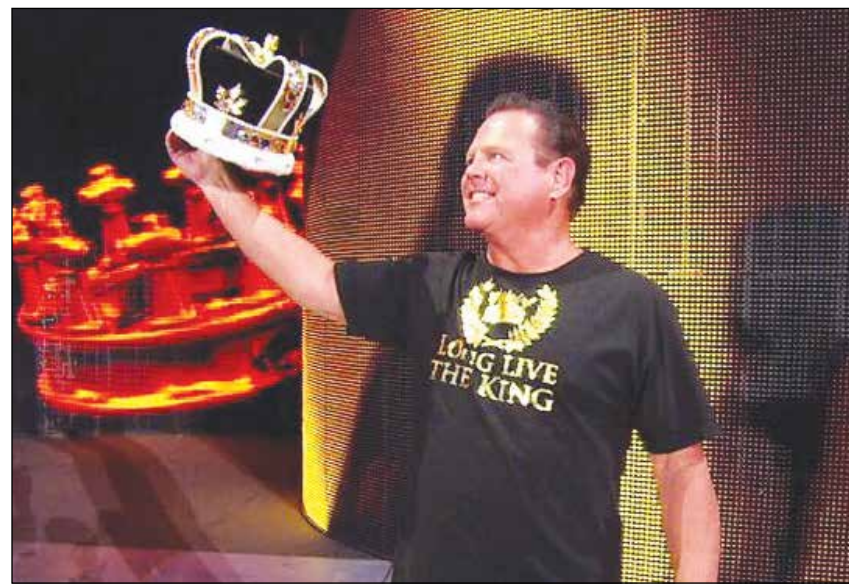

Piggy Bank Contest Announces Local Winners

How do plastic bottles, bits of string, paint, glue and ribbon help Tennessee kids learn about money? These are all materials that hundreds of kids across Tennessee use annually to craft handmade piggy banks to enter in UT Extension's annual Piggy Bank Pageants. The contests, which begin locally, culminate in a statewide contest in April each year. The yearly contest attracts more than 2,500 handmade banks from students ranging in age pre-K through 12th grade statewide.

Along with encouraging kids to enter hand crafted Piggy Banks in local competitions, UT Extension agents deliver lessons about the importance of making savings a habit. "We just can't underestimate the importance of teaching young people the necessity of saving money," says Dr. Dena Wise, Professor and Consumer Economics Specialist with UT Extension and coordinator of the statewide contest. "Young people who make saving a regular habit early in their lives have a real head start on achieving financial security as adults."

In Hardeman County, 40 young people entered local Piggy Bank Pageants. Entries were judged in late March. Thanks to those who visited the office to judge as well



as the online experts who assisted via the Hardeman County Extension Facebook page. The following Piggy Bank Pageant Winners will represent Hardeman County in the state online contest: Colton Watkins-"Batman"; Hannah Callahan-"Moolah"; Chasney Vue-"Flowers and Butterflies" and Madison Barnes-"Oreo Piggy". The state contest will feature people's choice voting scheduled

Hardeman County Remembered

This is the story of genealogy searches that took me across a couple of states, a few family lines, and landed me and some of my people right here in Hardeman County. I have participated in many, many home tours, cemetery tours, and private group tours of places around our county for many years. I knew from doing research that there were Coleman families who were some of the early settlers in the county, but I could not connect my life to theirs. One year, for a tour at Polk Cemetery, I learned a lot about the Neely, Polk, and Coleman families for a character portrayal I did there, but still no connection. (insert dramatic music) But then, one day... I was doing some genealogy research when I came across a family line that intersected with mine and lo and behold, there was my connection to the Hardeman County Colemans, specifically to Dr. Archer Allen Coleman. Dr. Coleman married Louisa Neely, whose mother I had portrayed at the cemetery. I had literally stood right there by Dr. & Mrs. Coleman at the cemetery and had no idea we were related. It was an exciting, red-letter, hallelujah genealogy day for me. I went over to Polk Cemetery and made "our" picture together and of course told them all about it. Dr. and Mrs. Coleman moved into the house that we know as The Columns in early 1861, just a few months before the start of the Civil War and lived in the house throughout the war years. The house served as a hospital during the war, and although a steadfast Confederate sympathizer, Dr. Coleman took care of Union soldiers injured in the war along with those who had contracted smallpox. His service spared his family and his home from injury and destruction when the Union army left Bolivar after years of occupation. The story is told that he felt he could best help "the Cause" by staying in his own home and "allowing" all of those Union officers access to his home. Dr. Coleman continued his practice in Hardeman County after the war years; he died during the yellow fever epidemic in 1878. The family's grief during that epidemic was double as the yellow fever claimed his life and the life of one of his teen-aged daughters less than a day apart. I also had the great privilege of knowing the last occupant of The Columns, Miss Elizabeth Ingram. She and I had discussed that there were Colemans who lived in the house during the war, but it was many years after her passing that I made the connection. Miss Elizabeth was a Southern lady and it was a delight to have known her; I can still hear her saying "my de-ah" whenever I am at the house. What an interesting life she led, and because of her interests in family and history, that beautiful home remains in our community today. Y'all, I just love it when stories and cousins and genealogy all work out this way.

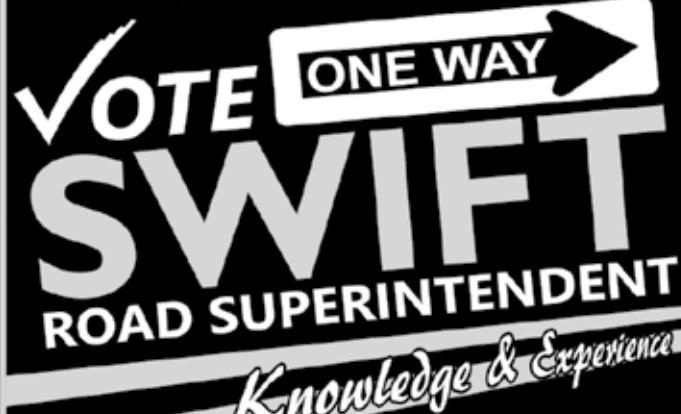

Jean (Harris) Cox shared a few of her memories of Silerton recently when Frankie and I visited with her mother, Bessie Harris. Jean said that she always felt like an only child even though she had an older brother and sister. Roger and Pat were several years older than she. She loved going to Silerton because there were kids there. When she was old enough to stay by herself, her mother went to work in Jackson. She said, "I would get so lonely staying by myself that I would ride my bicycle to Silerton just to be around people. I always loved Silerton and the people there. I thought Silerton was the happiest place to be. I thought it would be great to live there. I always considered the people to be 'high-quality' people. Sometimes my granddaddy King would pick me up and drive me to Fitts Store. He always bought me a moon pie and a RC Cola. I enjoyed going to revival services at the Baptist church. I especially enjoyed the activities the school sponsored. My daddy drove the school bus to Henderson. I hated the long drive each morning and afternoon. We were on the bus for over an hour. My daddy usually left the discipline to my mother. One day on the bus I was standing in the aisle and he put on the brakes to make a stop to let children off and I almost fell. I will always remember that reprimand. During harvest season, Archie Knipper substituted for my daddy, so he could harvest the crop. Archie had just returned from his service in the Army. When I was getting off the bus, Archie said something to me and I stuck my tongue out at him. He told my daddy and once again I was reprimanded. He told me I had to apologize to him. That is one apology I will always remember."

While visiting with Buddy Richardson recently, he shared his memories of his in-laws, Nick and Beatrice (Bea) Fry. Buddy recalled some of the facts he knew about the two of them. When Nick came home from the war, he went with a friend, Joseph Murley, to Chapel Hill, TN. While there, he met Beatrice Hargrove. They were later married, and she moved to Silerton. Dr. Siler, our town doctor, encouraged her to go into nursing. Buddy thinks she spent over 40 years in the nursing profession. After working for several doctors, she went to work as the plant nurse at Harman International in Bolivar and then retired from Western Mental Health Institute. Bea would make house calls to the sick in Silerton and was always willing to help her neighbors when they needed medical help. Sometimes that involved bad cuts or even snake bites. Nick served in Guadalcanal in the Pacific. The only thing Buddy remembers hearing Nick say about his military service was "I was mighty glad to get home."

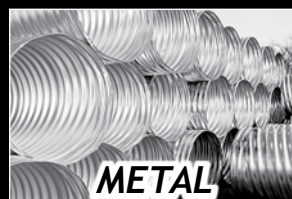

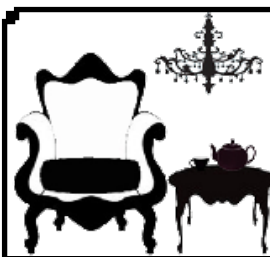

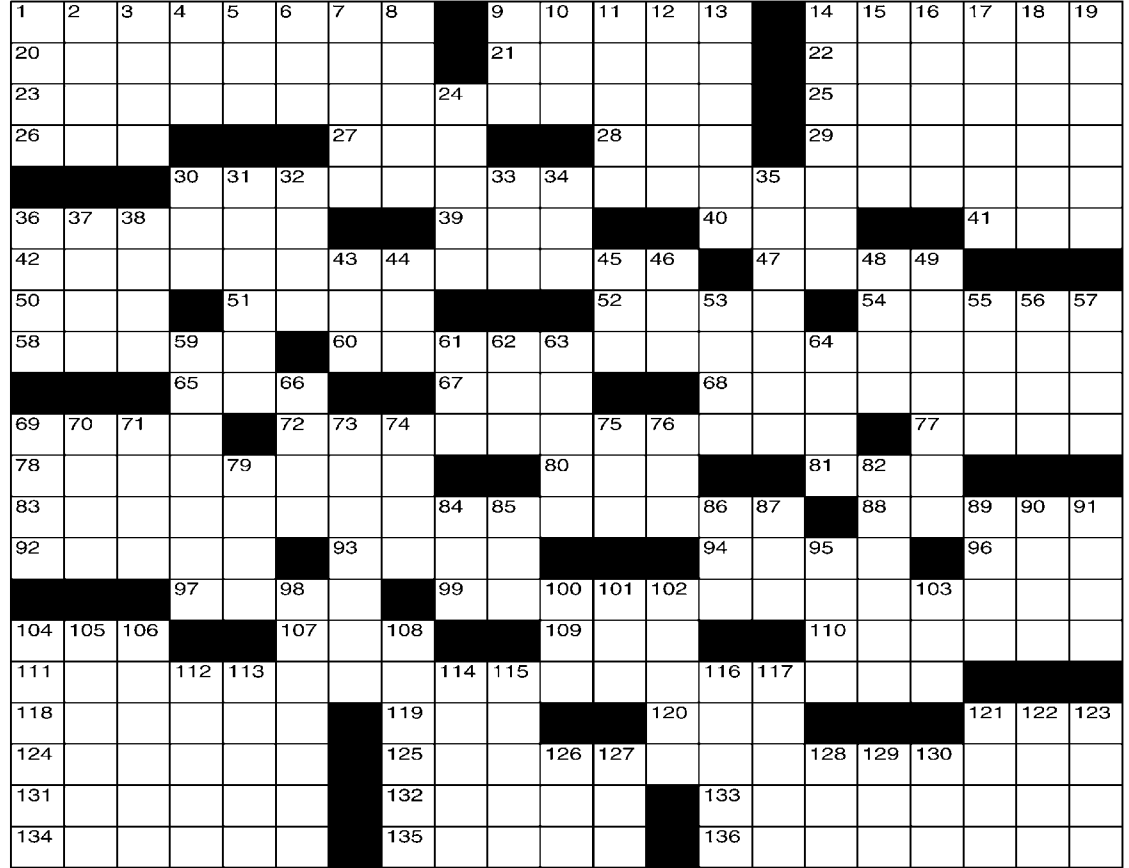

If you're a gardener, your busy season is at hand, as April has been designated National Garden Month. But could the skills you deploy at gardening be transferred to other areas of your life – such as investing?

Here are a few ideas for doing just that:
Establish a timeline. As a gardener, you typically follow a well-defined timeline. You need to get the soil ready a few months before you want to plant, and you need to plant at different times, depending on what plants you choose. You even need to set up a schedule for watering, feeding, weeding and other garden care. As an investor, you may also need to observe a timeline. For example, when picking stocks, look for companies with solid fundamentals, such as experienced management, strong earnings and the demonstrated ability to produce products and services attractive to consumers. Or, when considering bonds, consider those that independent rating agencies have awarded the highest grades, in terms of the financial strength of the issuer.

Feed your investments properly. Things like fertilizer and plant food can be valuable, but the most important element in plant nutrition is water. Under-watered plants will not survive, but overwatering your plants can certainly damage them severely. When you invest, you also need to know the right amount of "food," or "nutrients," to apply. If you don't put enough money into investments, they may not grow as much as you'd like. On the other hand, it is possible to "overwater" certain investments. For example, if you constantly put money into just one or two investments, they could end up crowding out others in your portfolio, causing you to lose the value of diversification. And if these particular investments are already growth-oriented vehicles, highly subject to market risk, they could take a big hit during a market downturn. Ultimately, seek a balance in how you distribute your investment dollars. Year after year, successful gardeners reap the rewards of their labors. And following some of their habits can help you work toward a long-lasting and fruitful investment garden, too.

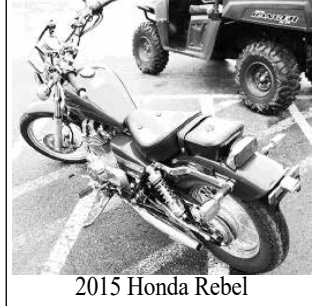

Life is never so precious as when you are told that yours is being cut short. This was the experience of a recipient of a gift of life, Wanda King. She is a wife and mother of two, who spent years as an educator in the Hardeman County Schools System. She was receiving treatment for, what she thought was a shoulder injury, when x-ray revealed an enlarged heart. Despite treatment and therapeutic life-support devices, she was delivered a blow that would bring uncertainty to her young family.

The devastating blow that would prove to be a most traumatic experience for the King family was received the day King went into anaphylactic shock and her heart rate dropped to 46/19. The year was 2009. She was 41 years old. She had suffered with heart problems since the attack of a virus, possibly an upper respiratory infection, that placed her heart under duress. The results of testing for the cause of the anaphylactic shock and sudden decrease in blood rate were inconclusive and the cause is still unknown to this day. The King family feels as though God had control of a situation that indicated that it was not His time for her to leave her family.

King owes the extension of her life to a generous donor, a giver of life. She wants the world to know that a loss of life saved her life and the giver was generous enough to join a society of people who decide to give the gift of life. Jeremy Michael Thompson was a Colum-



bia, Tennessee native who made the decision to save lives in his departure from life.

On the special day of March 24, 2015, King was interrupted from a spring day swing by an urgent phone call from her husband, alerting her of the great news of life. He urged, "Vanderbilt has been desperately trying to contact you. They have found you a heart!" She thought he was joking, that being his nature. Wanda King had only been on the donor list 6 months.

She wants to encourage others to give the gift of life and inform readers of a new family she has inherited because they believe that Jeremy continues to live for every beat of

his heart, albeit in a new life. Give the gift of life! For information of how to become a donor, contact Donate Life America.

Donate Life America is a non-profit organization that increases public awareness of the need for donated organs, eyes and tissue to save and heal lives through transplantation, creating a culture that embarks upon their approach to donations as a basic human responsibility, the right to life and the responsibility to give. 

With Bolivar Central losing two-thirds of their outfield coming into the 2018 season, head coach Mark Fulghum knew he would have some challenges. But he never expected this. Injuries to three more starters have left him playing sophomores that he figured would only see junior varsity duty. Bolivar's losses include outfielder Trey Lowe (enrolled early at West Virginia University on a football scholarship), outfielder Jar Lewis (injured during football season), pitcher Jace McKenzie, pitcher-catcher-shortstop Kyle Sipes, and pitcher-infielder Tyson Hobbs. "We've got people playing out of position and we are having trouble making even the easy plays," he explained. "We are dropping fly balls and on the offensive side, we're having trouble just making contact." 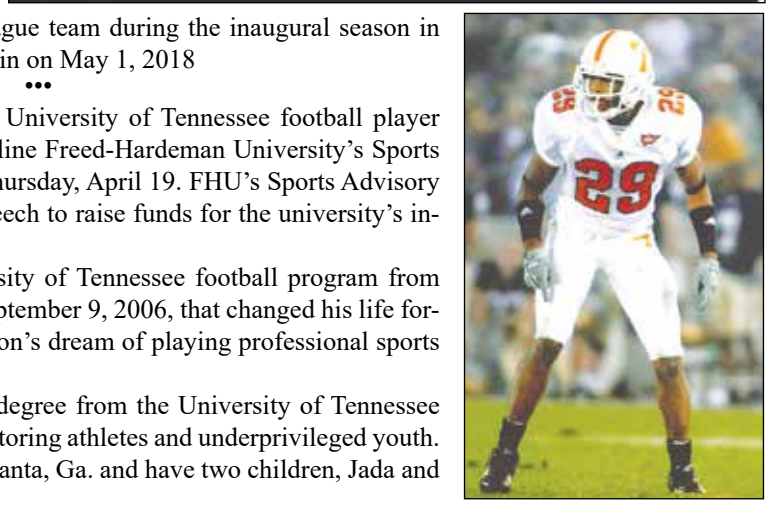


