Ross Facing Tough Decisions

Even with Governor Bill Lee's focus on education early in his administration, Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross says the county is still doing a lot to take care of basic needs for the school system.

School resources are approximately 64% from the State of Tennessee, 15% from the federal government, and 18 to 21% are from local taxes. Ross explained that the federal and state funding is very targeted toward specific programs and some programs are offering less each year.

"For example, at Grand Junction Elementary, the 'Save the Children' program, at one point,

paid 60% of the salary for the teacher and other expenses, such as travel. But now, even though the grant still pays the salary, it pays less of the other expenses. But we keep funding it, because it is a valuable program."

Ross says local money is critical.

"When enrollment drops, the federal and state money automatically drops. We can't even have a conversation about it. Locally, we have a chance. We have many opportunities. We just need to, as a community, figure out how we want to invest."

State and federal also fail to supply the funds for extras, such

as school nurses, assistant principals, library media specialists, and school resource officers.

"We are supplied money for school nurses, at the ratio of 4,000 students to one nurse. This funds one and a half school nurses for the entire county. Obviously, we pay for more than that, because we need them."

"We spend about \$100,000 each year on school safety, in a form of school resource officers and other things, but only \$20,000 of that comes from outside sources."

GEAR UP, a federally funded college access program that aims to expand the college-going culture in Tennessee and empower

students to succeed, is in its last year of funding.

"We will have to decide whether to continue the programs they made possible by the GEAR UP grants."

"We are funding a STEM director at Lone Oaks. Lone Oaks served close to 3,000 students last year from all over the county and beyond."

But Ross says there is good news to report from local sources.

"The Tennessee College of Applied Technology Center in Whiteville will add two more courses this year in our high schools, supplying an adjunct professor and

The Toone Fire Department tried on new equipment on April 1, as 18 sets of new gear arrived. The cost of \$37,000 for the equipment was financed for five years according to Fire Chief Jack Santos, but there was other help coming to pay for it.

The Toone Fire Department, covering 88.8 square miles, has the second largest fire district in Hardeman county. Their responsibilities include most of Chickasaw State Park.

Toone Mayor Joe Jones is thrilled with the addition of new equipment, which cover the firefighters from head to toe, as a way to give those in the fire district more safety.

"This new turnout gear is not only for the firefighters protection, but also the protection of our citizens. I feel this has been money well spent to protect our volunteers and citizens," he said.

The Whiteville Police Department will become the second municipal law enforcement agency in the county to employ body cams as officers will begin wearing them on April 11.

"We will train on upgraded body worn cameras and the new cameras will be deployed that evening," said Whiteville Police Chief Steven Stanley. "Body worn cameras act as a silent, non-biased witness that aids prosecution, officer training and ensuring the public's trust in law enforcement. I'm proud to be part of giving our officers tools that help them in their professions and protect their lively hood."

Whiteville joins Bolivar in using the technology that records an officer's movements and interactions during their shift, and archives it for viewing at a later date.

Vernon Spencer recalled the long, three miles he had to walk to get to Antioch Baptist Church when he was just a child. The Hardeman County native has been a member of the historic, Whiteville-based church for more than 80 years.

"Times were different then," 90-year-old, Spencer said. "We didn't have cars. We just had our feet and wagons; but we had to go to church."

Spencer and seven other seniors, ages 90 and older, were honored during Antioch's first "90 Years Blessed" ceremony, Sun-

day. Frances Spencer, Nicy Herron, Dannie Mae Jarrett, Walter Lake, Marie Taylor, Christine Rivers, and Spencer's wife, Ruby were the others recognized in Sunday's formal celebration, followed by a fellowship brunch.



"I want to thank all of y'all for being like you are to me," Herron said to the crowd during the ceremony. "I never walk in this church without getting hugs. Y'all meet me at my car to prop me in and help me get into the house of the Lord."

The witty 91-year-old paused before adding, "What did I do? I guess being me. I appreciate y'all for appreciating me. God's been good to me."

Affectionately known as Antioch's "gems," the seniors recalled how times have changed since they were younger, growing up in the rural South, while attending church in less than ideal conditions.

"Sometimes we didn't have electricity," Spencer said. "We would have to drink water from the spring; and we all had to use the same dipper to drink the water."

Honoree, Dannie Mae Jarrett reflected on what she called the, "expectation of obedience" that was required when she was a child, sitting on a bench with her peers listening attentively to the pastor.

"The children would sit up and be quiet and listen to the preacher. We had to or we would get in trouble," she said. "Now children have their phones out and they're not listening. We were taught to be respectful."

The "gems" have not only witnessed some of Antioch's most notable highlights, but pivotal moments in history as well. Many vividly recalled their dismal interactions with segregation and unfair treatment in both schools and the polls.

"We had to stand out in the hot sun to vote. We would be out there for hours," Christine Rivers, another honoree, recalled. "But we stayed out there because we wanted to vote."

Spencer echoed similar sentiments.

"They would let one or two of us vote every hour and then they would go take a break. We were left out in the hot sun. They would turn off the water fountain, just so we couldn't drink any water. We went through all of this, so young people don't have to."

Despite living through some of the country's most grim moments, the fervent group of seniors also noted victories, including the election of the first African American president.

"I never thought I'd see it," Honoree, Marie Taylor said, her voice filled with excitement. "I'm so proud of him. All I knew was chopping cotton and picking cotton...but then we see him as president. I'm still so proud."

Pride was an overlying theme during Sunday's tribute, as dozens of family, friends, and community supporters expressed gratification for being able to glean from their elders' wisdom, insight, and even humor.

"I'm not old. I've just been here a long time," Spencer said jokingly to the crowd, who erupted in laughter. After chuckling himself, his tone then turned serious.

"I just want thank God for all of this. I've had a good time; and I just hope to God we can live to be here another year."

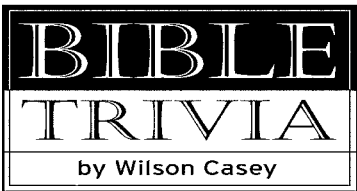

Lemon-Orange Chiffon Cake

Ingredients

- 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
- 1 1/3 cups sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 5 large eggs, separated
- 3/4 cup fresh orange juice
- 3 tablespoons orange zest
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar
- Lemon-Orange Buttercream Frosting
- Garnishes: edible flowers, kumquat slices

Directions

- Step 1: Preheat oven to 350°. Combine first 4 ingredients in bowl of a heavy-duty electric stand mixer. Make a well in center of flour mixture; add oil, egg yolks, and orange juice. Beat at medium-high speed 3 to 4 minutes or until smooth. Stir in zest.
- Step 2: Beat egg whites and cream of tartar at medium-high speed until stiff peaks form. Gently fold into flour mixture. Spoon batter into 3 greased and floured 9-inch round cake pans.
- Step 3: Bake at 350° for 17 to 20 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans on wire racks 10 minutes; remove from pans to wire racks, and cool completely (about 1 hour).
- Step 4: Spread Lemon-Orange Buttercream Frosting between layers and on top and sides of cake.

equipment."

Governor Lee has given him hope for help from the state as well, with his rollout of a yet unapproved GIVE program.

The GIVE initiative is a two-pronged approach that utilizes regional partnerships to develop work-based learning and apprenticeship opportunities. Communities will now have the funding and flexibility to build programs that best reflect local needs and work directly with private industry to structure programming.

GIVE also provides funding for high school juniors and seniors to utilize four, fully-funded dual enrollment credits for trade and technical programs. Previously, high school students only had access to two fully-funded dual enrollment credits. With access to four credits, students will now be better prepared for entry into the workforce within two years of graduation.

"I'm encouraged, for the most part, by things coming from the governor's office," commented Ross. "We are headed in the same direction with Lone Oaks STEM courses."

But its not just up to him, or even him and the school board.

"We have a strategic plan, and we are spending resources on those plans. But we need engagement from the community."

Anxious?

Sermon on the Mount: Part 11

by Jeff Capshaw

In this week's lesson, Jesus commands his followers to not worry about their lives. This isn't merely a suggestion. Instead, it is a powerful secret that many, who suffer from anxiety, may find helpful. According to the Anxiety and Depression Association of America (adaa.org), "anxiety disorders are the most common mental illness in the U.S., affecting 40 million adults in the United States age 18 and older, or 18.1% of the population every year."

Speaking from personal experience, few things are more disconcerting to us than our not being able to control our thoughts or emotions. Uncontrollable uneasiness and apprehension are terrible, especially when accompanied by panic attacks.

I don't intend to suggest that there aren't underlying psychological, physical or even chemical causes for anxiety, but I do think that correlating anxiety with psycho-chemical imbalances necessarily means these are always the root cause. Sometimes the root cause may simply be spiritual or attitudinal. If so, what did Jesus say?

First, don't worry about things you should not worry about, such as food and clothing. This

was more of a concern in Jesus' time than ours, especially here in America. But the point is that we must learn to trust God for the simplest necessities. God provides food for birds and clothes for flowers (6:26-30). And Jesus says that our lives are much more valuable than these" (v. 26).

Secondly, don't worry about the things you cannot control. "And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life" (v. 27). Being revved-up about little things or the things beyond our control is futility. When we find this true of ourselves, then we immediately know the source of the problem; we have "little faith" (v. 30). We are acting like unbelievers (the Gentiles) who trust in their own abilities or blind fate instead of trusting God. Rather than worrying, try to "seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you (v. 33). That is a promise from God.

Finally, think about it this way. Worrying about the future is, as a friend of mine puts it, "pre-suffering." Try honestly trusting in the Lord and His promises for today; then one day at a time. "Therefore, do not be anxious

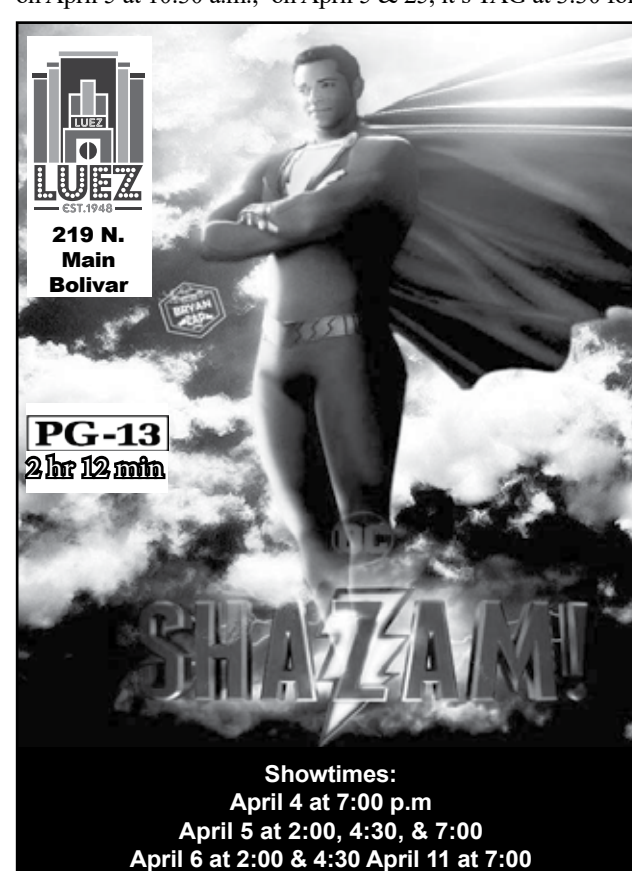

Try to Avoid "Titanic" Investment Mistakes

It's been 107 years this month since the tragedy of the Titanic. Of course, this disaster has fascinated the world ever since, leading to books, movies, musicals and, ultimately, a successful search for the big ship's remains. On the positive side, commercial shipping lines learned a great deal from the Titanic, resulting in safer travel across the oceans. And as an investor, you, too, may be able to draw some important lessons from what happened on that cold April night more than a century ago.

So, to avoid some "titanic" investment mistakes, consider the following:

Create a financial strategy with a solid foundation. Although considered a technological marvel, the Titanic had some real structural, foundational flaws – such as compartments that weren't fully water-tight. To withstand the inevitable rough seas ahead, your investment strategy needs a strong foundation, based on your needs, goals, family situation, risk tolerance and time horizon.

Be receptive to advice. The Titanic's crew had received plenty of Marconi wireless warnings from other ships about ice in the area. Yet they did not take precautions, such as slowing down. When you invest, you can benefit from advice from a financial professional – someone who can caution you when you're making dangerous moves, such as pursuing inappropriate investments, which could ultimately damage your prospects for success.

Be prepared for anything. The Titanic had far fewer lifeboats than it needed, resulting in a tragic loss of life that could have been prevented. As an investor, you need to be prepared for events that could jeopardize your financial well-being, and that of your family. So, at a minimum, you need to maintain adequate life and disability insurance. And it's also a good idea to build an emergency fund containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account.

Don't overreact to perceived threats. When the iceberg loomed directly ahead, the Titanic's crew frantically tried to steer clear of it. While this move was understandable, it inadvertently hastened the ship's demise, because it exposed a more vulnerable part of the hull to the huge ice mass. When you invest, you might also be tempted to overreact when facing perceived dangers – for example, if the financial markets plunge, you might think about selling your stocks. This is often a bad idea, especially if you're taking a big loss on your sales. If your investments are still fundamentally solid, you might well be better off by staying patient and waiting for the markets to recover.

Give yourself time to reach your goals. Edward J. Smith, the Titanic's captain, apparently wanted to break speed records on the Atlantic crossing – and this desire may have contributed to his somewhat reckless passage through fields of ice. As an investor, you could also run into problems if you rush toward a goal. To illustrate: If you wanted to retire at 65 with a certain amount of money, but you didn't start saving and investing until you reached 55, you'd likely have to put a lot more away each year, and possibly invest a lot more aggressively, than if you had started investing when you were 30.

Put to work some of the Titanic's lessons – they might help you improve your chances of smooth sailing toward all your important financial goals.

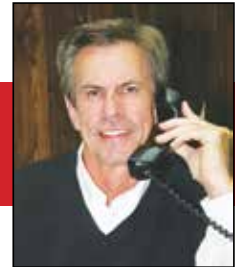
