Will Face Democratic Nominee Civil Miller-Watkins in November for Senate Seat

Republican Page Walley defeated former Tennessee Commissioner of Agriculture Jai Templeton to earn the Republican nomination for the District 26 Senatorial Election in November.

The 26th district serves all of Chester, Decatur, Fayette, Hardeman, Hardin, Haywood, Henderson, and McNairy Counties.

Walley defeated Templeton 13,076-11,543, beating him in Hardeman County with 69% of the votes, and carrying Chester, Haywood, Henderson, and Fayette County. His margin in Fayette County was a whopping 74%, which was somewhat of a surprise as outgoing Senator Dolores Gresham of Somerville had endorsed Templeton in the final weeks of the campaign.

"It was a real honor to have earned support from people in this district, especially here in Hardeman County," he said. "We look forward to taking our hopes and aspirations to the legislature."

Walley served as a State Representative from 1990 to 2000 and is currently serving as a Bolivar City Councilman and Vice Mayor of the city. Walley said he would like to serve

out his term on the city council, which expires next year.

Walley will face Civil Miller-Watkins, who resides in Fayette County, but has roots in Hardeman County. Miller is the daughter of Jerry and Lois Bernice Marshall Miller and the brother of former Bolivar City Councilman Mike Miller. Miller-Watkins ran unopposed in her primary for the Democratic nomination.

If Wallev were to win, he would be the first State Senator to call Hardeman County home since A.O. Sipes, who served as the Democratic State Senator from 1956-1960. See All.



Bowden Wins Whiteville 8, 24, 32, 60? Subpoenas and Counting

A few pounds lost in a 100-degree courtroom is all anyone can claim as a result so far as Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen's Attorney Roy Herron withdrew his objection to Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain's Motion to Set Aside the October 2019 agreement that appeared to settle the lawsuit that was brought by Doolen in July of 2019.

But hang on, this isn't over yet. Brought by Attorney Amber Shaw in February, the Motion to Set Aside the Settlement Agreement saw two day-long courtroom arguments over the validity and legality of the October settlement itself, one in February and another in a air-conditionless courtroom on June 30.

While both sides left the courtroom on June 30 without a favorable result, Herron made it easy in early August, agreeing to give up on arguing the settlement terms voted on by the Hardeman Coun-

Ok, Where were we? In July of 2019, following the passing of the 2019-2020 budget, Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen sued for more support.

The issue was seemingly settled in October 2019 after Cary and Herron came to an agreement and Cary presented it to the county commission in a special called meeting as the sheriff's department, who originally sought and sued for approximately \$1.4 million dollars, settled for \$102,000.

At the October 8 meeting, the vote went 13-1 in favor of ending the lawsuit with the settlement.

While both sides claimed lack of adherence to the settlement terms, Attorney Amber Griffin Shaw filed a Motion to Set Aside the Consent Order on behalf of Sain on February 10,

the docket, Herron made plans to use the date to begin his discovery for the lawsuit filed this past July by issuing subpoenas to Hardeman County Clerk Jerry Armstrong, Hardeman County Register of Deeds Lily Barnes, six employees or former employees of the Hardeman County Mayor's Office, and approximately two dozen county commissioners and former commissioners. They have been asked to give depositions on the 31st and September 1.

Mayor Sain is scheduled to be disposed on August 13.

On August 11, more than thirty more subpoenas were issued, some in Hardeman County and more outside the county at various law enforcement agencies in West Tennessee; with some requiring depositions and others requiring financial records or attendance at the trial later that week.

A court date for the 2019 and 2020 salary disputes is now set for September 3-4.

The City of Whiteville will have a new mayor as Pastor Gene Bowden defeated incumbent Aubrey Phillips on August 6.


"I would like to take the opportunity to say thank you to the citizens of Whiteville for giving me the opportunity to serve as your mayor," he wrote on his Facebook page. "It is a responsibility that I do not take lightly. I look forward to working for the betterment of our town."

Bowden's 148 to 134 victory over Phillips got him 46% of the vote, with third place finisher Leon Crisp getting 39 votes.




This week, Mary Lynn Lambert shared news, condolences, and also a prayer request. She also included a charming antidote from her childhood which is included below:



The Weak and Strong by Jeff Capshaw

The intelligence of dolphins is one of their most outstanding features. Among the thousands of members that the animal kingdom has, dolphins take one of the top places regarding intelligence. Moreover, according to one source, pods of dolphins work together to defend one another and will circle weaker pod members to protect them when potential predators are present.

That is remarkable for a nonhuman creature. Others suggest that even some pack animals will use their collective strength to protect an injured pack member. Humans in general and Christians, in particular, could learn a lesson from these animal anecdotes. This is precisely the teaching of the New Testament.

Paul writes, "we who are strong have an obligation to bear with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves. Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to build him up. For Christ did not please himself, but as it is written, "The reproaches of those who reproached you fell on me." For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope" (Romans 15:1-4, ESV).

Secular statements like "only the strong survive" or slogans

world. But that is exactly what the Gospel intends to do: reverse the curse and unfortunate realities of a fallen world. By helping weaker brothers and sisters, those stronger should stop fixating on themselves and their needs by caring for the needs of others. That is the meaning of "the strong are not to please themselves." Helping the weaker isn't just a

like "survival of the fittest,"

unfortunately, are realities of a fallen

friendly suggestion. Rather, it is the Christian's obligation. Helping the weaker ones by building them up serves to strengthen the Church and to build unity. For example, Paul wrote in another place, "if one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (1 Corinthians 12:26).

Of course, Paul's exemplar behind this principle is the example of Christ. As Charles Hodge remarked, "Christ's example is constantly held up not just as a model but as a motive." This is Paul's teaching on the remarkable humility of Christ in Philippians 2. "Do nothing


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

from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others (vv. 2-3). That is what it means to have the mind or attitude of Christ.

After all, according to Paul, the purpose of Scripture is to instruct believers in day-to-day, something especially needful during these difficult days. The instruction to help a weaker brother or sister to is great therapy for believers. So, find joy in building others up. Also, to the stronger, keep on enduring the difficult days and keep finding encouragement and hope in scripture. Then you will be in an even better place to help your weaker neighbor.




LEROY SAIN AUGUST 9, 1950 - JULY 16, 2020





chart to be presented at the next City of Bolivar council meeting, which is scheduled for September 14. McTizic said any ordinance affecting the 2021 election must be done 60 days prior to the filing deadline, which will be in February of 2021.

"If we are going to change this, we need it done by December," he said.

Dellinger serves as city manager, clerk, and recorder for the city. All three positions would need to be filled, but the job description of mayor would most likely take up the duties of the city manager.

No matter the committee recommendation, any changes to the city government structure would not take place until after the 2021 election, where the mayor, and four city council members will be elected. Spots up for election are currently held by Rhea, Golden, Walley, and Joy.

It is unknown when the issue of Herron's fees will be taken up again. 

Or you might consider adding a "long-term care rider" to a life insurance policy; this rider offers financial benefits if you ever require daily care that you can't provide for yourself. And some foundations, states and drug companies offer programs that can help pay for some costs that your insurance won't cover.

Legal arrangements - If you haven't already done so, you may want to establish the legal documents most appropriate for your situation, such as a durable power of attorney for finances, which gives someone the authority to manage your financial affairs if you become temporarily incapacitated, possibly due to flare-ups of your chronic disease. Once you've recovered, you regain control of your financial decisions. You might also want to consider a health care proxy, which appoints an individual to make medical decisions for you if you can't. In creating or revising these documents, you'll need to consult with your legal professional.



Support Solutions, a group home in Bolivar linked to the vandalism and burglaries the over the past few weeks in Bolivar, has offered to help make up for it.

"They called and offered to make a donation," said Lions Club President Casey Swift. "They said they wanted to make everything right. They said they were looking for a cash register and other items. They said they had been here for 15 years without an incident."

According to Bolivar Police Chief Mike Jones, Support Solutions seems to have selective memory.

"This has been going on for years," said Jones. "This wasn't the first time, not even close."

The Support Solutions in Bolivar reported the pair missing to the Bolivar Police Department on July 26. They were found and returned to the Pecan Drive address on July 30, at which time, according to the police narrative, both Vaughn and Souder admitted their involvement as in breaking into the Lions Club ballfield (see photo) on two occasions and also throwing a wrench though the window of a small construction building located at 10160 W. Market Street.

The next day, Support Solutions reported the two had again run from the group home and both were given a NIC number.

On August 2, the pair were caught attempting to break into the National Guard Armory after burglarizing the Optimist Field in Bolivar and the Lions Club field. At the time, the two were in possession of an axe, and a pickaxe and wearing football pad gear and welding helmets. They were returned to Support Solutions and removed from the NCIC.

The two appear to be on video obtained from Brooks Auto Service in Bolivar, breaking and/or looking into storage units and abandoned cars on August 2, but taking nothing, according to the report.

On August 3, after a call from the Bolivar Support Solutions home in Bolivar, the pair confessed their involvement and expressed remorse for their actions. They also led police to the site of their stolen items, including baseball catcher's equipment, after which they were taken into custody.

Damages to and thefts from the Lions Club concession stand were estimated at \$983, while damages to the Optimist Field in Bolivar were estimated at \$1,370.

At press time, Curtis Stack of the Bolivar Parks and Recreation Department, who oversees the Optimist Field, had not heard from Support Solutions. Nor had Brooks Auto Service.
