Schools Offered Officers

The State of Tennessee is lending a hand in efforts to keep schools safe in Hardeman County and around the state.

Hardeman County Schools were awarded a \$245,000 School Resource Officers Grant from the State Department of Education to assist the district in providing all schools in Hardeman County with a full-time Student Resource Officer (SRO) for the upcoming school year.

In previous years Hardeman County Schools coordinated with the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department to provide two fulltime and one part-time SRO in the district that were funded through a grant and school district funds. Hardeman County Schools representatives are currently meeting throughout the county with city mayors, police chiefs, city councils, city administrators and the sheriff's department to secure an officer at each school.

"Hardeman County Schools are very appreciative to Governor Lee and the General Assembly for providing the SRO grant that will enhance our efforts to provide a safe learning environment for our students and staff," said Deputy

The offer comes as Bill Lee is near to completing his first year as Governor of Tennessee.

"The safety of our children and teachers is a top priority for my administration and this investwill have the resources they need to better protect our schools," said

Safe Schools grants to assist LEAs in funding programs that address school safety, including, but not limited to, innovative violence prevention programs, conflict resolution, disruptive or assaultive behavior management, improved school security, school resource officers, school safety officers, peer mediation and training for employees on the identification of possible perpetrators of

school-related violence. According to Superintendent Warner Ross, the proposal by Lee was for two years, but Ross is hopeful the funds will continue.

Already accepting the offer was the City of Whiteville, who approved the stipulations of the grant at their August 5 meeting. An advertisement for the position is located on A5.

Details on SROs for the LEAs

Grants awarded under this category will not exceed \$ 35,000 per officer per year and are subject to a 25% local match adjusted for the Local Education Agency's (LEA) fiscal capacity. Student Resource Officers (SRO) funded under this grant program must be duly sworn and authorized law enforcement officers in compliance with training standards established under TCA 49-6-4217. A total of \$20 million statewide has been reserved under this category. In order to be eligible to receive an SRO grant the LEA must submit the following: • A letter of commitment from the appropriate law enforcement ex-

- ecutive (sheriff or chief of police).
- A school resource officer assignment report that identifies each school and changes in SRO assignment that will result from grant funding.
- Assurance from the director of schools that the application for grant funds is for schools that did not have a full-time school resource officer during the 2018-19 school year and that the LEA will provide a mid-year SRO assignment report.


Perennial favorite, the Wolf River Band, will come to the stage on August 16 for Music on the Square.

Lemon Lava Cake

Ingredients

1 box lemon cake mix

(ingredients listed on back of box; eggs, oil and water)

2 (3.4 oz) boxes instant lemon pudding

1/3 cup sugar optional

2 cups cold milk

1 1/4 cup water powdered sugar for dusting

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350F degrees.

Spray a 9 x 13 baking dish with nonstick cooking spray.

Prepare cake mix according to package directions.

Pour batter into baking dish.

In a separate bowl, combine dry pudding mixes with sugar, milk and water.

Whisk briskly for 2 minutes until it begins to thicken.

Spoon pudding mixture over cake mix batter. Once it is on there, it is hard to spread out since it kind just ends up sinking into the batter.

Put a large baking sheet underneath your baking dish before sliding it in the oven.

Bake for about 55 minutes to one hour.

It's a bit tricky to tell when it is done because the pudding layer in it always stays a bit jiggly. So, what you want to do is take a toothpick and insert it into the middle of the cake. If it only comes out with pudding - you are good. If you still see gooey cake batter on it, then you need to bake it for a bit longer. When it's finished baking, allow it to cool for about 20 minutes. This will allow that pudding layer to thicken up a bit more.

Then serve with a bit of sprinkled powdered sugar on top.



On election years, he gave out his signature emery boards and matches. One year, after purchasing the merchandise from a store closing, his gifts to voters included Easter baskets and ladies pajamas! (This was a different time; and politically-correct was not a part of the vernacular!)

Curtis was colorful! He liked fast cars, especially Cadillacs, ballroom dancing at the Peabody, silk ties and the color red! Marjorie dressed to please him, usually in her signature blue; and she never wore a garment Curtis didn't like. Curtis and Marjorie cut quite a figure on the dance floor! They loved the big band music of their youth. Curtis was very quotable and his unintentional humor gave his family quotes which endure!

Curtis was proud of his family - Marjorie, Beth, Frank, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He also loved his nieces and nephews - Hines and Lake alike! Many wonderful memories were made when the cousins came to visit in the summer.

In their later years, Frank likened his parents' relationship to "two decaying fence posts leaning against each other." When one caves in, so will the other. That is what happened; but what amazing lives they lived!

Curtis missed Marjorie desperately after her passing in December 2017. He took wonderful care of her after her stroke in 2003 and willingly performed domestic chores in his unorthodox fashion. Their 74year marriage was exemplary.

Curtis loved his church, founded by his ancestors. He was a lifelong Cumberland Presbyterian. He was also a proud Democrat and he passed this virtue to his children. How ironic that he died on Election

FAITH

Grace, Part 3 by Jeff Capshaw

The first column of this series defined grace as a unique gift from God, given freely out of his abundance of love, kindness, and goodness toward us. In everyday speech, we say it is "the unmerited favor God shows toward us." Thus, grace is a way in which God deals with his children. It isn't a mere abstraction; Grace is actionable, and it has objective, practical value for all of creation.

In the second week's column, I described grace as it relates to 3 kinds of calling: (1) as a summons for a special work, (2) as the internal work of the Holy Spirit, and (3) as being efficacious or bringing about a favorable result in the person called.

That brings us to another but less familiar category of grace. Theologians call it "common grace." Because common grace relates to all of God's created order, it is an important theological concept. Understanding common grace may also provide answers to some "why" questions.

What is common grace? According to Millard Erickson's theological dictionary, it is "grace extended to all persons through God's general providence." The distinction between common grace and other categories of grace is this; "It is extended to all persons." Thus, it is different from the internal work of the Holy Spirit or from an efficacious calling to repentance from sin and belief in the Gospel.

What are common grace's practical implications? From a Reformational perspective, "common grace curbs the destructive power of sin, maintains in a measure the moral order of the universe, thus making an orderly life possible, distributes in varying degrees gifts and talents among men, promotes the development of science and art, and showers untold blessings upon the children of men" (Louis Berkhof, Systematic Theology, p. 434).

Think of it this way. On a Christian Worldview, if common grace were not a reality, then the world would not exist as we know it, and most assuredly evil would be much worse. Without God's gracious and providential control over all things, the world would unravel at the seams.

Consider a biblical example of common grace. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus commanded his

disciples to "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." Why? His answer is "so that you may be sons of your Father who is in heaven. For he [the Father] makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust" (Matthew 5:44-45, ESV). That is God's common grace. It is God's extending this unique gift freely to all creation out of his abundant love, kindness, and goodness toward it: not just toward Christians.

So, the next time you witness or experience an unbeliever-perhaps an especially depraved onebehaving morally, inconsistent with his character, now you know why. It's common grace. When you see beauty in a fallen world, or when you benefit from the marvels of modern science and technology, then thank God for his common grace. It's the real reason.

I was reminded of a fact that is not flattering to our society and culture. As it stands there are other circumstances and events in life that will cause grief. Remember, grief is pain of mind and many different things can cause pain of mind, sorrow and regret. I recently was invited to speak at a class on the subject of grief. As you might expect there is a great deal that can be said about that topic. There are some facts that I did not give, even though they relate to the many cultural problems including but limited to the rise in teen suicide.

Just a few decades ago, as early as the sixties our absentee list of homes without fathers was dramatically different from what it is today. According to sources, out-of-wedlock births increased in the black community from 25 percent in 1965 to 73 percent in 2015, while also increasing among whites from five percent to 25 percent across the same time period. Overall, the percentage of American children who grew up without fathers increased from five percent in 1960 to 41 percent in 1995.

The reason for the increasing absence of fathers is due to the expansion of the welfare state during President Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty programs in 1965. "And this makes it all too easy for men to abandon their traditional moral and financial responsibilities. Psychologists call such dependency 'learned helplessness." According to the journal of Research, "Children who grow up without a father are five times more likely to live in poverty and commit crime; nine times more likely to drop out of school and 20 times more likely to end up in prison." This also contributes to the increase in teen suicide. Good grief?!

Mr. Hines had an idyllic childhood in rural Benton County. He went to grammar school at Hopewell and Chalybeate, and attended Grand Junction High School.

As a charismatic young man, Curtis sought the attention of Marjorie Lake of Hickory Valley, whom he wooed with persistence with his Hollywood looks and Queen Anne's lace. Their story was compared to "The Notebook". In fact, Curtis was convinced the book was written about him and Marjorie! Their seventy-four year marriage was legendary. With his charisma and her charm, they may have been the original "power couple". They were certainly wonderful examples of the Greatest Generation.

Curtis and Marjorie married on May 3, 1943, right before Curtis left for the South Pacific. He served in the Army for three years and Marjorie wrote to him every day.

Upon Curtis's return from World War II, he and Marjorie settled in the Hopewell Community where Curtis farmed with his father and brother, Dan. With their children, Beth and Frank, the Hineses portrayed an all-American family. Their charming country home was always open to family, friends and strangers.

Curtis Hines became Benton County's Chancery Clerk in 1964. He loved his job; and his campaign was enthusiastic and unorthodox! He went down every dirt road and knocked at every door, sometimes porch sitting, shelling peas, hoeing the garden or being a dinner guest. On election years, he gave out his signature emery boards and matches. One year, after purchasing the merchandise from a store closing, his gifts to voters included Easter baskets and ladies pajamas! (This was a different time; and politically-correct was not a part of the vernacular!)

Curtis was colorful! He liked fast cars, especially Cadillacs, ballroom dancing at the Peabody, silk ties and the color red! Marjorie dressed to please him, usually in her signature blue; and she never wore a garment Curtis didn't like. Curtis and Marjorie cut quite a figure on the dance floor! They loved the big band music of their youth. Curtis was very quotable and his unintentional humor gave his family quotes which endure!

Curtis was proud of his family - Marjorie, Beth, Frank, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He also loved his nieces and nephews - Hines and Lake alike! Many wonderful memories were made when the cousins came to visit in the summer.

In their later years, Frank likened his parents' relationship to "two decaying fence posts leaning against each other." When one caves in, so will the other. That is what happened; but what amazing lives they lived!

Curtis missed Marjorie desperately after her passing in December 2017. He took wonderful care of her after her stroke in 2003 and willingly performed domestic chores in his unorthodox fashion. Their 74-year marriage

Curtis loved his church, founded by his ancestors. He was a lifelong Cumberland Presbyterian. He was also a proud Democrat and he passed this virtue to his children. How ironic that he died on Election Day!



Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

There was never a dull moment at the Yellow House. There were so many funny things happening all the time. As I've mentioned before, the Southern Railway tracks ran at the edge of our yard, so close that you could not carry on a conversation when a train was passing. They would literally rattle the windows in the old house and move the picture frames on the wall. Out of town friends would come for a visit and and ask us how we could sleep with that noise going on. We were so used to it that we really didn't hear them. The conductors on the cabooses would sometimes throw us kids off a bunch of comic books. We were always out by the tracks smiling and waving when the trains came by. I guess they felt sorry for us, but we always looked forward everytime a roll of comic books came rolling across our yard. We would return the favor in the spring as there was a work train and crew that would come by the house, and some of the workers would be sitting on a flat car.

We would go to the apple tree and pull a bunch of green apples and toss them up to the men on the slow moving train. One day Dad was plowing in the cotton field which ran up to the side of the tracks. The train would stop up above the house to take on coal and water and move slowly

by our house and usually stop in Pocahontas. Dad had hitched a ride several times and jumped off when the train stopped in town. This particular day, Dad was out of chewing tobacco. He left the old mule hitched to the plow in a shade at the end of the row, hopped on the train to ride down town to get him a plug of Days Work chewing tobacco.

The problem that day was that the train didn't slow down or stop at Pocahontas, but picked up speed and going too fast for him to jump off. It's next stop was at Cypress Tank, which is about six miles east of Pocahontas. Dad had to walk all the way back. He did stop at Sheas store in town to get his tobacco, walked back to the house and the old mule was still standing where he left it.

There were three train engineers who lived in Pocahontas who worked for Southern Railway. Mr. John King, Mr. Nile Wright, Mr. Andrew Mohundro. Each of them had certain whistle patterns they would use when entering the town.


I've written a lot about outhouses in my articles. You hardly ever see one of the little houses anymore. A few years ago they were seen behind most houses in the rural areas of the country. This particular incident didn't happen at the Yellow House, but at another house we lived at shortly after

moving. Brother Don started training as a depot agent for Southern Railway as soon as he finished high school. He purchased a 23jeweled Waltham Railroad watch which was required for his work. This watch cost \$45.00. On one of his visits to the outhouse, his new pocket watch fell through the hole into the pit. He was going to leave it be, but dear old Dad, being the brave soul that he was, and not wanting to lose that precious watch, layed down on his stomach, rolled up the sleeve on his right arm, and searched the pit until he found it. Jacques Costeau didn't have a thing on Dad.

Don carried the watch to a repairman in Corinth to be cleaned. It ran perfectly after that, but brother Don didn't tell the repairman where the watch had been.

Football Season Comes to Hardeman County

"Whenever we get an opportunity, we want our guys to make a play. We need them to be smart, but we don't want them to be robots. But they know if they gamble, they need to win."

Craft said he is enjoying the team atmosphere that has been created.


"It's more of a family bond than just teammates. That's what will be the difference this year."




