The oldest girls, Theresa and Cathy, were the baby sitters. When I fell off the slide and landed on my head, Cathy was the one that hugged me and dusted me off, that is, after she had finished the dishes, vacuumed the floor, and changed the oil in the car.

A dollar an hour got you quite a lot in a babysitter back then, apparently.

The oldest boys, nocturnal drummers Bob and Rich, used me for comedy relief by asking me questions I still hear in my head.

The parents, Lyle and Peggy, didn't seem to notice they had an eighth kid. I ate with them, went to mass occasionally (we weren't Catholic, they were) and I was just part of the gang.

Joey was the youngest boy. I learned all kinds of things from him. And one thing in particular that haunted me for years.

It seems one day Joey had a really bad bike accident. At least that's what I was told. It affected my bike riding for the rest of my life. I may tell the rest of that story one day, but I'm still in shock as to what actually happened. To be fair, it's not exactly a happy memory for him either; I don't think.

The youngest, Mary, and I were inseparable, best friends. We played, it seemed like everyday from dawn to dark, in the dirt in the world's largest backyard, which turned out to be only about twenty feet deep when I returned last week to see my more than 40-year long-lost "family."

Obviously, things had changed since we shared time all those years ago, but for one day, I was eight years old again, playing with and hanging out with people I will always love and cherish.

Council OKs Beer During Meeting

Well, not exactly. What the Bolivar City Council did do at their meeting on August 13 was vote yes on the first reading to drop the 500-foot from "churches or schools" restriction to allow potential future Bolivar restaurants to serve beer without geographical troubles.

After explaining that restaurants did not have the 500-foot restriction for liquor and wine in Bolivar, Mayor Julian McTizic said it was illogical to keep the restriction on beer only.

"Having this not change will prevent businesses from opening," said Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic. "No restaurant is going to have a bar without beer."

ORDINANCE 18-006
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF BOLIVAR AND REVISE TITLE 8, CHAPTER 2 TO ELIMINATE THE DISTANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SALE OF BEER FOR ON-PREMISE CONSUMPTION ONLY

Councilman Melvin Golden said the state law should be a guide for the city.

"We need to see business come in. If we have fences up already, they won't come. If the state doesn't have a problem with it, I don't," he said.

Councilman Tommy Woods asked why there was a 500-foot restriction in the first place, and while some council members had

guesses, Mayor McTizic said he had no idea.

"The original ordinance is from the 1960's," he said. "I was born in '86."

After much discussion and clarifications of options, councilwoman Suzanne Rhea made a motion to approve the ordinance. After a second by Melvin Golden, the council passed the measure by a 4-3 margin.

Voting for the measure were Golden, Rhea, Tracy Byrum, and Page Walley. Against it were Jonathan Joy, Larry McKinnie, and Tommy Woods. Councilman Todd Lowe was not present at the meeting due to a Meet the Teachers event at Bolivar Middle School.

A second vote will be required to pass the ordinance, and a public hearing will be allowed prior to the vote. The next meeting of the Bolivar City Council is scheduled for September 10 at 6:00 p.m. at the Bolivar Municipal Center.

If passed, restaurants would still be required to have more than 50% of their business come from food, not alcohol.

Time to Put Excess Cash to Work?

You'll always want to base your investment decisions on your own needs and goals. But there may be times when you might consider adjusting your portfolio because of risks and opportunities. Now may be one of those times.

Here's some background: In recent months, the Federal Reserve has raised short-term interest rates several times, and given its generally favorable outlook on the economy, it has indicated it may continue bumping up interest rates gradually over the next year or so. The Fed doesn't control long-term interest rates, but these rates often follow the lead of short-term movements. However, longer-term rates haven't yet risen as much as shorter-term ones, which means the difference between short- and long-term rates is relatively small, historically speaking.

This doesn't mean you should make drastic changes to your portfolio. You still need to stick with the asset allocation that's suitable for your situation, which typically involves owning a certain percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks, and a certain percentage of fixed-income securities, such as bonds. However, if you do have space in the fixed-income part of your portfolio, you may find the higher interest rates offered by short-term bonds and certificates of deposit (CDs) to be attractive. To take advantage of this opportunity, though, you will need to have the cash available to invest.

Some people hold too much in cash, waiting for interest rates to rise, or as protection against the risk of a market decline. But holding excess cash involves its own risk – the risk of not investing. So, if you have your cash needs covered, you may want to consider investing any excess cash.

To determine if you are holding excess cash, you'll need to review your entire cash situation. For example, do you have enough cash, or cash equivalents, to create an emergency fund of three to six months' worth of living expenses? This fund can be vital in helping you pay for things like a major car repair or an unexpected medical bill without dipping in to your long-term investments. And, of course, you need enough liquidity to provide for your lifestyle, including your regular spending needs – your mortgage, utilities, groceries and so on. Also, you may want to set aside enough cash for a goal you want to reach in the next year or so, such as a vacation.

But if you have taken care of all these needs and you still have excess cash, you may want to consider putting this cash to work, possibly by investing in short-term fixed-income vehicles now being issued at higher interest rates.

And keep in mind that regardless of where interest rates are going, bonds and other fixed-income investments can offer some key benefits to investors. In addition to providing a source of regular income, these types of investments can help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio. While bonds can, and will, fluctuate in value, they typically can provide more stability to your portfolio and tend to behave differently than stocks over time.

After years of historical lows, shorter-term rates now have risen to levels that are more attractive to investors. Take the time to review your situation, perhaps with the help of a financial professional, to determine if taking advantage of these rates may be appropriate for you.

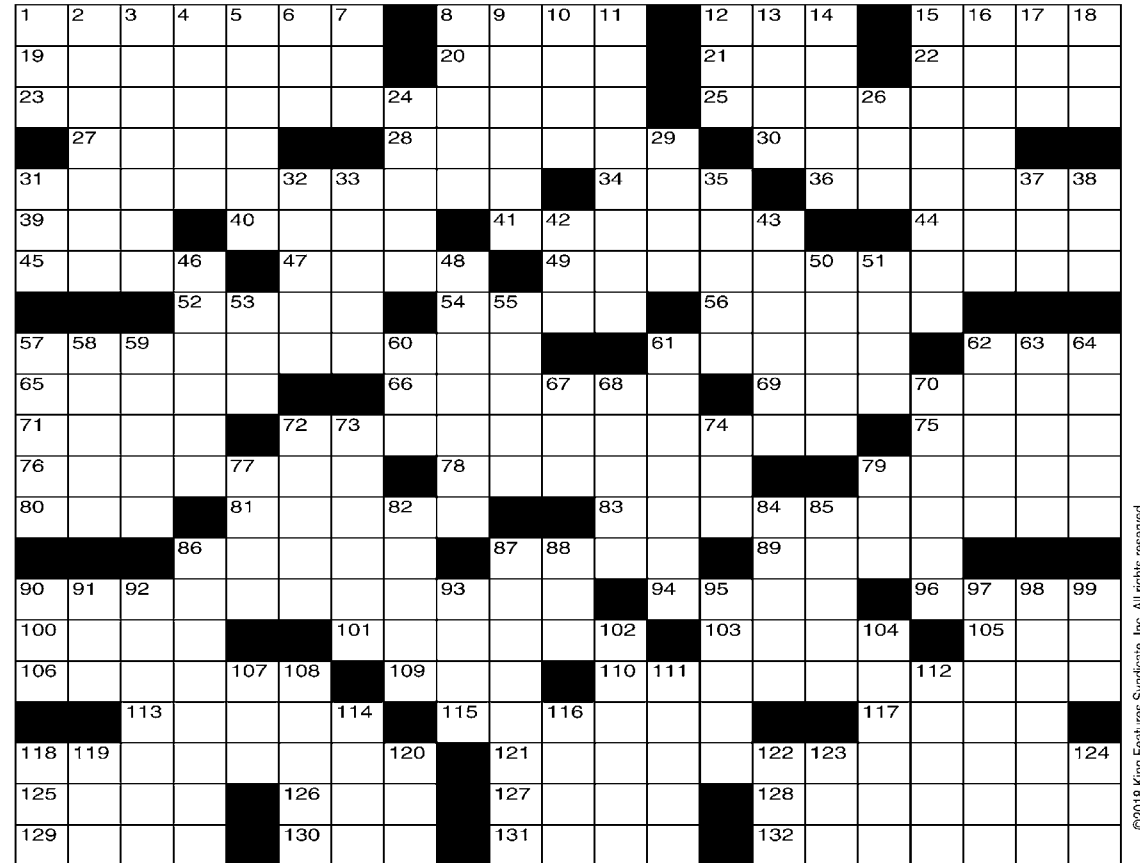
