# **Council OKs Beer During Meeting**

Well, not exactly. What the Bolivar City Council did do at their meeting on August 13 was vote yes on the first reading to drop the 500foot from "churches or schools" restriction to allow potential future Bolivar restaurants to serve beer without geographical troubles.

After explaining that restaurants did not have the 500-foot restriction for liquor and wine in Bolivar, Mayor Julian McTizic said it was illogical to keep the restriction on beer only.

"Having this not change will prevent businesses from opening," said Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic. "No restaurant is going to have a bar without beer."

#### **ORDINANCE 18-006**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF BOLIVAR AND REVISE TITLE 8, CHAPTER 2 TO ELIMINATE THE DISTANCE REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SALE OF BEER FOR ON-PREMISE CONSUMPTION ONLY

Councilman Melvin Golden said the state law should be a guide for the city.

"We need to see business come in. If we have fences up already, they won't come. If the state doesn't have a problem with it, I don't," he said.

Councilman Tommy Woods asked why there was a 500-foot restriction in the first place, and while some council members had

A second vote will be required to pass the ordinance, and a public hearing will be allowed prior to the vote. The next meeting of the Bolivar City Council is scheduled for September 10 at 6:00 p.m. at the Bolivar Municipal Center.

If passed, restaurants would still be required to have more than 50% of their business come from food, not alcohol.



Even so, as Ecclesiastes says, "What has been is what will be, and what has been done is what will be done, and there is nothing new under the sun" (1:9).

Last week I briefly discussed the Classical Apologetic method, its prominent arguments and most popular proponents. It was first adopted by early Christian thinkers who applied reason to the defense of Christianity (N. Geisler, ed. The Baker Encyclopedia of Christian Apologetics, p. 154). This week I briefly discuss the Evidential method also kin to Classical Apologetics.

Evidential Apologetics or "Evidentialism" emphasizes the use of evidence to demonstrate, for example, that God exits, that the New Testament is extraordinarily reliable, that Jesus performed miracles, and so on. Important to this method are arguments substantiating the New Testament's claim that God raised Jesus of Nazareth from the dead. The most prominent, modern proponent of evidence for the resurrection is Gary Habermas of Liberty University.

Habermas, J.P. Morland and William Lane Craig use a method called "inference to the best explanation." The argument runs as follows:

- The tomb in which Jesus was buried was discovered empty by a group of women on the Sunday 1. following the crucifixion.
- 2. Jesus' disciples had real experiences with one whom they believed was the risen Christ.
- 3. As a result of the preaching of these disciples, which had the resurrection at its center, the Christian church was established and grew.

Other popular examples of evidential apologetics include books by Josh McDowell: Evidence that Demands a Verdict (1972, 1979), New Evidence that Demands a Verdict (1999) and Lee Strobel's book, Case for Christ. The latter was also made into one of the better Christian films recently produced.

Other clear examples of Evidentialism are the numerous archaeological discoveries confirming the existence of people, places and events mentioned in the Old Testament. One of the most significant examples, the Tel Dan inscription, or "House of David" inscription, was discovered in 1993 at the site of Tel Dan in northern Israel: the first extra-biblical, historical evidence for David.

If readers want a concrete representation of this type of apologetic method, they could not better than to watch the Strobel movie mentioned above. While none of the above arguments will be unquestioned by many, yet they may prove helpful to some.

#### **Time to Put Excess Cash to Work?**

You'll always want to base your investment decisions on your own needs and goals. But there may be times when you might consider adjusting your portfolio because of risks and opportunities. Now may be one of those times.

Here's some background: In recent months, the Federal Reserve has raised short-term interest rates several times, and given its generally favorable outlook on the economy, it has indicated it may continue bumping up interest rates gradually over the next year or so. Some people hold too much in cash, waiting for interest rates to rise, or as protection against the risk of a market decline. But holding excess cash involves its own risk – the risk of not investing. So, if you have your cash needs covered, you may want to consider investing any excess cash.

To determine if you are holding excess cash, you'll need to review your entire cash situation. For example, do you have enough cash, or cash equivalents, to create an emergency fund of three to six months' worth of living expenses? This fund can be vital in helping you pay for things like a major car repair or an unexpected medical bill without dipping in to your longterm investments. And, of course, you need enough liquidity to provide for your lifestyle, including your regular spending needs – your mortgage, utilities, groceries and so on. Also, you may want to set aside enough cash for a goal you want to reach in the next year or so, such as a vacation.

But if you have taken care of all these needs and you still have excess cash, you may want to consider putting this cash to work, possibly by investing in short-term fixed-income vehicles now being issued at higher interest rates.

And keep in mind that regardless of where interest rates are going, bonds and other fixed-income investments can offer some key benefits to investors. In addition to providing a source of regular income, these types of investments can help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio. After years of historical lows, shorter-term rates now have risen to levels that are more attractive to investors. 

## Tales from the Yellow House by Lee McAlpin

There was never a dull moment at the Yellow House. There were so many funny things happening all the time. As I've mentioned before, the Southern Railway tracks ran at the edge of our yard, so close that you could not carry on a conversation when a train was passing. They would literally rattle the windows in the old house and move the picture frames on the wall. Out of town friends would come for a visit and ask us how we could sleep with that noise going on. We were so used to it that we really didn't hear them. The conductors on the cabooses would sometimes throw us kids off a bunch of comic books. We were always out by the tracks smiling and waving when the trains came by. I guess they felt sorry for us, but we always looked forward everytime a roll of comic books came rolling across our yard. We would return the favor in the spring as there was a work train and crew that would come by the house, and some of the workers would be sitting on a flat car. We would go to the apple tree and pull a bunch of green apples and toss them up to the men on the slow moving train. One day Dad was plowing in the cotton field which ran up to the side of the tracks. The train would stop up above the house to take on coal and water and move slowly by our house and usually stop in Pocahontas. Dad had hitched a ride several times and jumped off when the train stopped in town. This particular day, Dad was out of chewing tobacco. He left the old mule hitched to the plow in a shade at the end of the row, hopped on the train to ride down town to get him a plug of Days Work chewing tobacco. The problem that day was that the train didn't slow down or stop at Pocahontas, but picked up speed and going too fast for him to jump off. It's next stop was at Cypress Tank, which is about six miles east of Pocahontas. Dad had to walk all the way back. He did stop at Sheas store in town to get his tobacco, walked back to the house and the old mule was still standing where he left it.

There were three train engineers who lived in Pocahontas who worked for Southern Railway. Mr. John King, Mr. Nile Wright, Mr. Andrew Mohundro. Each of them had certain whistle patterns they would use when entering the town.

I've written a lot about outhouses in my articles. You hardly ever see one of the little houses anymore. A few years ago they were seen behind most houses in the rural areas of the country. This particular incident didn't happen at the Yellow House, but at another house we lived at shortly after moving. Brother Don started training as a depot agent for Southern Railway as soon as he finished high school. He purchased a 23- jeweled

Waltham Railroad watch which was required for his work. This watch cost \$45.00. On one of his visits to the outhouse, his new pocket watch fell through the hole into the pit. He was going to leave it be, but dear old Dad, being the brave soul that he was, and not wanting to lose that precious watch, laid down on his stomach, rolled up the sleeve on his right arm, and searched the pit until he found it. Jacques Costeau didn't have a thing on Dad. Don carried the watch to a repairman in Corinth to be cleaned. It ran perfectly after that, but brother Don didn't tell the repairman where the watch had been.

A few weeks ago, Marjorie Pritchard of the *Boston Globe* asked newspapers around the country to write editorials regarding President Trump's "attacks" on the media and statements using the words "fake news" to describe the media. She asked they publish them on August 16.

It suggested editorial boards take a common stand against Trump's words regardless of their politics.

"Our words will differ. But at least we can agree that such attacks are alarming," the appeal stated, acknowledging that newspapers were likely to take different approaches.

#### Well, here's our approach. Who do they think they are?

We hate to break it to them, but a verbal attack they don't like is free speech too. The President thinks the media at times is irresponsible, so he says it. Whether his opinion is right or wrong, it's what the country was founded upon. Free speech. It's no different than the Boston Globe having an opinion.
