## Christmas in August

### County Commission Approves over 200K for Projects, with More Dollars Available for Later

It may have been Christmas in August for needed funds for county projects, but it didn't feel like it in the air conditioningless county courthouse on August 18.

The good news, though, was the State of Tennessee grant related to recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic will be used for many efforts, the biggest being air conditioning in the Hardeman County Courthouse.

"Y'all just take your time," joked County Clerk Jerry Armstrong at the meeting of the county commission, alluding to the fact the courthouse hasn't had air conditioning all year. The commission eventually 14-2 voted to have a consultant look at and possibly produce plans to fix the circa 1858 courthouse that is still being run on a boiler system, although commissioners Elvis White and Justin Howell objected to the \$20,000 fee for the consultant, asking if plans

from a potential contractor of the project couldn't be found for no cost.

The other projects (see inset above) will get help due to the \$1,293,286 grant from the state, but only \$218,000 was earmarked at the meeting due to the uncertainty of

the cost of the HVAC in the courthouse. The estimates for the HVAC start at about \$400,000 according to Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain's report.

The amounts set aside are estimates and any project over \$10,000 will be put out to bid upon, with Sain saying if bids were more than earmarked, he would return to the commission for guidance.

The county commission also heard a report on the landfill, as Mayor Sain outlined the difficulties that have hampered efforts at the site since before 2010.

Mayor Sain also said the Lake Project is waiting on results of surveys and that there were many unknowns.

"We have no site for a dam site. Right now, nobody knows these things," he said saying the area being targeted

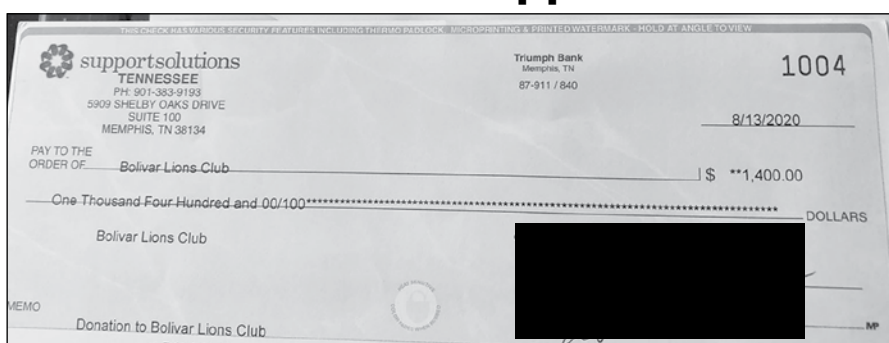

## Lions Club Gets a Check from Support Solutions

Support Solutions, a group home in Bolivar linked to the vandalism and burglaries over the past few weeks in Bolivar, presented Lions Club President Casey Swift with a check, but there's more work to do to reimburse all those affected by the small crime spree that occurred early in the month.



The Support Solutions in Bolivar reported a pair of residents missing to the Bolivar Police Department on July 26. They were found and returned to the Pecan Drive address on July 30, at which time, according to the police narrative, both Vaughn and Souder admitted their involvement as in breaking into the Lions Club ballfield on two occasions and also throwing a wrench through the window of a small construction building located at 10160 W. Market Street.

Over the next week, the pair were caught attempting to break into the National Guard Armory after burglarizing the Optimist Field in Bolivar, the Lions Club field and Brooks Auto Service. Damages to and thefts from the Lions Club concession stand were estimated at \$983, while damages to the Optimist Field in Bolivar were estimated at \$1,370.

At press time, Curtis Stack of the Bolivar Parks and Recreation Department, who oversees the Optimist Field, had not heard from Support Solutions. Nor had Brooks Auto Service.

## Governor Lee Offers Help to Small Businesses

Tennessee Governor Bill Lee and the Financial Stimulus Accountability Group announced new and expanded financial relief programs for small businesses, agribusinesses, displaced workers, and the tourism industry through the federal Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF). The Tennessee Small Business Relief Program will expand to include additional industries adversely impacted by reductions in commercial activity in April, with \$83.5 million added to the program's initial \$200 million allotment.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has placed enormous strain on businesses and industries of all types," said Gov. Lee. "We'll continue to distribute federal resources prudently to address the pressing needs of Tennessee businesses to get our economy back on track."

Expansion of Tennessee Small Business Relief Program - \$83,517,500

The Tennessee Small Business Relief Program will expand to include additional businesses provided they have less than \$10 million in annual gross sales and fall within an industry impacted by executive order limitations on activities, gatherings, and other non-essential businesses and activities; or a retail industry that experienced a 25% reduction in taxable sales in the month of April due to the public health emergency.

In addition to the original list of eligible businesses, below are the categories of small businesses that will be eligible under this expansion:

- Caterers, Mobile Food Services, and Food Service Contractors
- Wedding and Event Planners
- Convention and Trade Show Organizers
- Wedding and Banquet Hall and Similar Property Rental
- Linen Supply Services
- Photography Studios
- Travel Agencies and Travel Arrangement Services
- Car, Truck, Trailer, and RV Rental
- Sightseeing and Tour Operators
- Taxi, Limousine, Bus, and Other Transportation Services
- Recreational Vehicle and Vacation Camps
- Sports and Recreation Instruction
- Fine Arts Instruction, Exam Prep, Driving Schools, and Other Similar Instruction
- Motion Picture and Video Production and Distribution Services
- Music Production, Distribution, and Publishing Services
- Sound Recording Studios

The expansion list will also include, among others, the following businesses that are now eligible if their sales were reduced by at least 25%, as shown on their April sales tax returns (filed in May):

- Florists
- Party and Banquet Equipment and Other Supply Rental
- Formal Wear and Costume Rental
- Consumer Electronics and Appliances Rental
- General Rental Centers and Other Consumer Goods Rental
- Gasoline Stations and Convenience Stores
- Warehouse Clubs and General Merchandise Stores
- Home Centers, Hardware Stores, and Paint Stores
- Household Appliance and Electronics Stores
- Nurseries, Garden Centers, and Outdoor Power Equipment Stores
- Pharmacies and Drug Stores
- Optical Goods Stores
- Cosmetics, Beauty Supply, and Perfume Stores
- Supermarkets and Other Grocery Stores
- Baked Goods and Other Specialty Food Stores
- Beer, Wine, and Liquor Stores
- Food Supplement Stores
- Vending Machine Operators
- New and Used Car Dealers
- Recreational Vehicle, Boat, and Other Vehicle Dealers
- Automotive Parts and Accessories Stores
- Tire Dealers
- Online Stores (selling from a Tennessee location)
- Other Direct Selling Establishments

A full list of and instructions for eligible businesses will be available from the Tennessee Department of Revenue.

### Agriculture and Forestry Economic Relief - \$50 million

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture will establish an economic support program for agricultural businesses and forestry businesses to help ensure stability of the food supply chain and agribusiness economy. The department will accept applications for funding between August 17 through August 31 to make grant awards the week of September 14.

### Tourism Industry Recovery Support - \$25 million

The Tennessee Department of Tourist Development will utilize \$25,000,000 from the CRF to remarket and support the State's tourism industry recovery from the public health emergency. Of the total funding, \$15,000,000 will be directly designated for destination marketing organizations (DMOs) in all 95 counties.

### Workforce Development - \$9.5 million

Tennessee will allocate \$7.5 million to two established workforce development programs: Reemployment Service and Eligibility Assessment (RESEA) Program Expansion and Career and Training Services, and \$2 million to the Department of Labor and Workforce Development's Virtual American Jobs Center. These funds will provide reemployment services to a proposed 17,000 participants to return them to gainful, sustainable employment.

### Master Gardener Classes

UT/TSU Extension is offering a unique opportunity for gardeners—young and old, new or experience to engage in both classroom and practical learning of a wide variety of gardening and home horticultural topics. The Hardeman County Extension Office is now accepting applications for the fall Master Gardener Course. All classes will be held via zoom on Tuesday night from 6:00—9:00. Classes will start August 25 and end November 17.

The Master Gardener program is a volunteer service program for the University of Tennessee Extension. The Tennessee Extension Master Gardener Volunteer Program offers many opportunities to make new friends and enhance your horticulture expertise while being provided an excellent opportunity to impact your community through service.

Extension professionals train local members of the community as volunteers to help provide sound practical researched-based information to educate the public about home horticulture.

The volunteer hours and responsibilities will be reviewed on orientation night to clarify any questions. Topics covered during the course include: botany, soils, water, vegetables, fruits, turf grass, safe use of pesticides, insect and disease control, herbs, equipment, herbaceous plants,

woody ornamentals and landscaping.

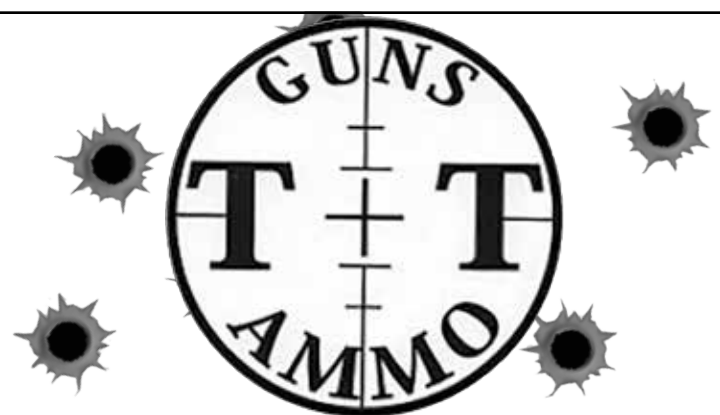

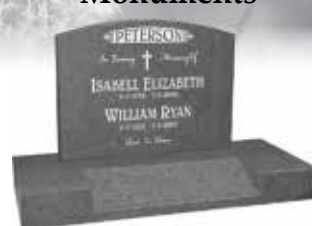

## FAITH

### Wisdom for Trials

by Jeff Capshaw

The book of James has several distinctive characteristics that set it apart. One source enumerates them as follows: (1) its unmistakably Jewish nature; (2) its emphasis on vital Christianity, characterized by good deeds and a faith that works (genuine faith must and will be accompanied by a consistent lifestyle); (3) its simple organization; (4) its familiarity with Jesus' teachings preserved in the Sermon on the Mount; (5) its similarity to OT wisdom writings such as Proverbs.

James is full of practical wisdom. For example, after a simple greeting in 1:1, it opens with this passage. "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing" (James 1:2-4).

The ability to consider all kinds of trials as something joyous is counter intuitive. This isn't just a "bite-the-bullet" or "suck-it-up" mentality. It is more than that. James says that positive outcomes are possible, even during difficult times. In the same way that

enduring a grueling workout at the gym benefits the body physically, enduring the struggles of life with the right attitude benefits the inner person spiritually.

Thus, suffering is faith strengthening. Overcoming the difficulty of suffering builds spiritual "steadfastness." It suggests a willingness to endure because of a hope in something that has been promised. James promises spiritual completeness, wholeness, or spiritual maturity. Therefore, the more a believer matures, then the better he or she can endure life's difficulties. It works just like physical training. The more one trains the stronger the body's muscles get. That is the first lesson.

The second lesson is found in verse 5. "If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask God, who gives generously to all without reproach, and it will be given him." The interesting point about this statement is the context. Numerous occasions in life require wisdom, usually during major life decisions. However, this lesson is about asking God for wisdom during particularly difficult times. How does one ask God for wisdom during trials of all kinds?

James says, "but let him ask in faith, with no doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea that is driven and tossed by the wind. For that person must not suppose that he will receive anything from the Lord; he is a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways" (1:6-8). The exhortation to "ask in faith" is expressed positively but it is explained negatively. It looks like not being "double-minded."

Therefore, believers can't be "two-souled" about seeking God's wisdom in their struggles. Either one resolutely lays hold of this promise during trials or tries to endure them through the "bite-the-bullet" or "suck-it-up" alone method. Thriving during hard times is possible, but believers must adhere to James' practical wisdom. If believers ask God in faith for the skill to navigate life's difficulties, then it will build spiritual muscle and produce joy.

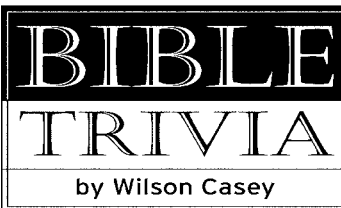

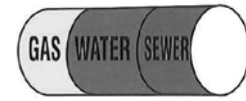

is the seven miles from Middleburg to near the Western Mental Health campus.

The commission also got a report from County Attorney Justin Reynolds on the subpoenas they received and the depositions that are scheduled for August 31 and September 1 in reference to the salary dispute case from the Hardeman County Sheriff's Office.

Reynolds told the commission that he is prohibited from representing them due to a ruling from the State Board of Professional Responsibility, but an attorney has agreed to represent them in the depositions and asked for their approval to spend county funds for it. Commissioner Howell and Commissioner Bobby Wright voted no, but the measure passed 14-2. It is unknown if Howell and Wright plan to get their own representation or if they will represent themselves in light of their vote.

While face masks were required for entry into the courthouse, only six commissioners wore them during the meeting and very few in the audience did as well.

## Girley Arrested on Weapons Charge

An investigation by Special Agents with the Criminal Investigation Division of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation and the Hardeman County Sheriff's Office has resulted in the arrest of a Hardeman County man on a weapon charge.

In March of 2019, at the request of 25th District Attorney General Mark Davidson, Agents joined the Hardeman County Sheriff's Office in investigating the homicide of Deon Turner. During the course of the investigation, authorities developed information that Trdarius Girley (DOB: 6/4/96) of Saulsbury was responsible for selling the weapon used in the homicide. In June 2020, an arrest warrant was issued for Girley for a count of Felon in Possession of a Firearm.

Today, Girley turned himself into the Hardeman County Sheriff's Office and was booked into the Hardeman County Jail. His bond will be set during his first court appearance. The U.S. Marshals Service assisted in this investigation.

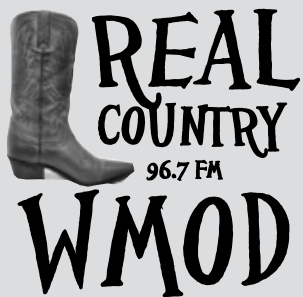

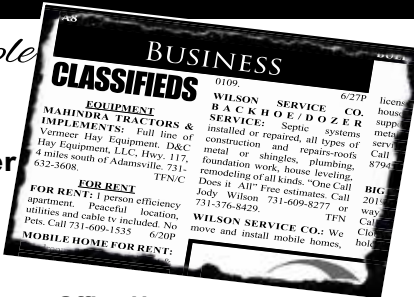

## Get the Most from Your 401(k)

You won't see any greeting cards celebrating it, and it's not likely to be on your calendar, but in just a few weeks, National 401(k) Day will be observed. And this type of recognition may be warranted, too, because 401(k) plans have become key building blocks for a big part of people's lives – a comfortable retirement. Are you making the most of your 401(k)?

Of course, during the past few months, you may have had mixed feelings about your 401(k). After all, at the beginning of the coronavirus, when the financial markets tumbled, the value of your account probably fell significantly, although it has likely regained some ground since the initial drop.

Nonetheless, the recent market volatility and its short-term effects on your 401(k) should not unduly influence your decisions about this important retirement account. After all, a 401(k) is truly a long-term vehicle, in every sense – you contribute to it for decades while you're working, and you can draw on it, along with other sources of income, for decades during your retirement. Consequently, you'll want to consistently review your account to ensure it is working hard for you. Here are a few suggestions:

Get the match. At a minimum, put enough into your 401(k) to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered. While employers can set their own rules, a typical match is 50% of what you put in, up to 6% of your salary. So, if you don't contribute the amount needed to earn the match, you are essentially "leaving money on the table." (Be aware, though, that some employers have temporarily suspended matching contributions in response to the economic slowdown during the pandemic.)

Give yourself regular "raises." Every time your salary goes up, increase your annual contributions. Most people typically don't come anywhere near hitting the maximum annual 401(k) contribution limit (which, in 2020, is \$19,500, or \$26,000 for those 50 or older), and you might not, either, but try to put in as much as you can afford. Not only will you be building tax-deferred resources for retirement, but you'll be giving yourself a big tax break, because the more you contribute each year, the lower your taxable income (unless you have a Roth 401(k), in which case your contributions aren't deductible, but your earnings can grow tax-free).

Invest for growth. Because your 401(k) is designed to help fund your retirement, which could last 20 years or more, you'll want to build the biggest account possible. That means you'll need to include investments designed to provide growth within your 401(k), subject to your personal risk tolerance.

Be careful about loans. You can take out loans from your 401(k), but it's not always a good move. You'll have to pay yourself back, and if you leave your job, either voluntarily or involuntarily, the repayment may be due at an inconvenient time. (However, as part of the CARES economic stimulus act, many 401(k) loan repayments are being suspended for up to one year.) Furthermore, by taking out money from your account, even temporarily, you can slow its overall growth potential. So, you may want to look for other sources of income before tapping into your 401(k).

National 401(k) Day is just that – a day. But by taking the appropriate steps, you can help ensure your own 401(k) gives you many years' worth of benefits.

## A New Season, and a Whole New Ballgame



With more than 20 seniors graduating from the 2019 Bolivar Central Tigers Football team, Coach Montreal Craft could expect this might be a rebuilding year.

But no one could have imagined it would be like this.

"With all the COVID protocols, your numbers are continually changing. But, it's part of life," said Craft. "We are working on changing the mentality and work ethic here, to one of accountability and responsibility. We are starting to turn the corner. We are not where we'd like to be but we are getting there."

And Craft also has to deal with the departure of coaches, who left Bolivar to join the staff of former Bolivar Head Coach Woodrow Lowe at Fayette Ware. Lowe, who spent a year at Lausanne, took the job with the Wildcats last spring.

"We are shorthanded, but some-time subtraction is needed for growth. The more hands helps to fine tune, but I'm grateful for the staff I do have, great attitudes and great energy. Everybody is on the same page."

With Shelby County Schools sitting out August, Coach Craft had to find some games to replace the Freedom Prep (August 21) and Memphis Kirby (August 28) contests.

"We got a phone call from Brighton, saying they wanted to play. So we took it. Same with Scotts Hill."

Bolivar returns starting quarterback Tyler Rice and seniors Cordaious Stanley, Trey Ellison, Marquiron Tumlin and Kasen Morrow on the line but not many others who started games in 2019.

Guidelines for attendance for both volleyball and football will be enforced. See right and below for each.

### Football Attendance Procedures

No parents or guardians allowed on field (except in medical emergency). Field access limited to team personnel and those with credentials.

Tickets will be available by pre-sale only. Prices are as follows: \$6.00 pre-sale tickets (available on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays of game weeks from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. at basketball ticket booth). NO TICKETS WILL BE SOLD AT THE GATE.

\$42.00 season pass (One free mask in school colors per season pass holder)

Band members, cheerleaders, and football players will have an opportunity to purchase pre-sale tickets through their respective coaches on Mondays of game weeks.

During the school day, tickets will only be sold to students (one ticket only per game). The general public will NOT be allowed in to purchase tickets during school hours.

Visitor tickets will be offered to visiting team the week of the game.

Band will not sit in the bleachers with fans.

Baseball bleachers will be moved to southeast side of stadium for band member seating.

Band will be asked to wear masks anytime they are in the crowd, but not in southeast corner location where they will be seated.

No visiting band will be allowed.

Cheerleaders will practice social distancing unless performing stunts.

Masks will be worn anytime they are in the crowd, but not when they are on the field unless stunting.

Concession stands will be allowed to run with precautions.

All workers must wear masks and gloves at all times.

Hot food can be served as long as it is wrapped.

No self-serve stations will be allowed.

Student Section will be allowed in the stands.

Social distancing will be practiced.

No students will be allowed on the field at any time (with exception of team personnel and those with credentials)
