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County Responds, Round Hardeman County Sheriff's Department The answer, filed by W. Carl Spining and

employees were given answers this past week to a lawsuit filed in 2019 against Hardeman County. The suit, filed May 29, was filed against the Hardeman County Government, includ-

ing the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department, the Hardeman County Commission, and Mayor Jimmy Sain, saying overtime pay was due employees Patrick D. Perry, Justin Bryant, Thomas Cody Naylor, Cheri Baker, Chris Wilkerson, Michael Hatch, and Ethan Vasquez for work performed for the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department.

The suit was filed by William C. Sessions of Heaton and Moore, P.C. of Memphis.

Michael T. Schmitt of Ortale Kelley Law Firm in Nashville, contends no county agency has reason to answer the suit, stating that the only defendant that can legally be sued is Sheriff John Doolen, as an individual.

"Defendants affirmatively assert that they are not Plaintiffs' "employer," as that term is defined under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), 29 U.S.C. § 203(d). Defendants affirmatively assert that John Doolen is Plaintiffs' employer and he is individually liable for any alleged violations of the FLSA. Doolen had the sole power to hire and fire, discipline, control work schedules, approve overtime for his employees, including Plaintiffs, and other issues

concerning personnel decisions and had the power to instruct his employees on the proper procedures for submitting overtime and claiming compensatory time. Furthermore, Doolen actively instructed his employees to withhold information or not respond to requests for information from the county, which was necessary to confirm the amount of overtime/ compensatory time being claimed. Therefore, Doolen is individually and solely liable for any alleged violations of the FLSA."

The document contends that since Sheriff Doolen as an individual is not named as a defendant in the suit, it should be dismissed.

County Commission Gets Lake Report

The Hardeman County Commission heard an update and posed questions on the lake project proposed by Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain as part of the agenda for their regularly scheduled meeting on August 20.

Providing the report was Laura W. Benz of Benz Environmental Consulting, LLC, who has been contracted by the county to investigate all concerns that would allow the county to construct a 3,500 acre recreational lake.

Ms. Benz, in the letter dated August 19, 2019, said of the meeting with the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) on April 11:

"The purpose of the meeting was to introduce the USACE to the project, obtain initial thoughts on the scope of the analysis under the Clean Water Act, coordination with cooperating state and federal agencies, and determination of the process under the National Environmental Policy Act ("NEPA"): Environmental

Assessment or Environmental Impact Statement. The meeting discussed dam sites, dam attributes, watershed volume, water storage of each alternative, the criteria to determine the fishing trips and quality of fishing resource, as well as whether the project site was located within an opportunity zone or proximate to major thoroughfare ways or other draws in Hardeman County. The analysis and decision matrix determined that the Pleasant Run alternative was deemed the preferred alternative as the least environmentally damaging practicable alternative capable of meeting the project purpose," the memo read.

The letter also said a site has been picked for the purpose of moving forward with continued on A11

Hardeman Healthy Outreach Announces Public Programs

As Hardeman Healthy Outreach approaches the end of year one, University of Tennessee Extension invites local worksite and faith leaders to learn ideas for helping residents avoid chronic disease.

"These events are a step toward 'moving the needle' for better health," said Amy Elizer, Ed.D., UT Extension Specialist. "People spend a great deal of time at work. While some people have active jobs, others sit at a desk most of the time. This everyday environment can impact a person's health for the good or for the not so good. We know that employers are interested in holding down healthcare and insurance costs. We hope that best practices for healthy worksites, as well as ideas for low- and no-cost activities, will benefit employers in the county. These ideas can be useful locally even if the business has a health program. Making it local, makes it personal."

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

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

Bacon Wrapped Meatloaf

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 onion, grated on large holes of a box grater 1 garlic clove, finely chopped

³/₄ cup ketchup 1/4 cup apple cider vinegar

3 tablespoons dark brown sugar 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper

3/4 cup low-sodium chicken broth

½ cup chopped fresh parsley

2 large eggs ²/₃ cup fine breadcrumbs

½ cup finely grated Parmesan

1 tablespoon kosher salt 1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

2 pounds ground beef chuck (15% fat)

6 thin strips bacon

Directions

Preheat oven to 350°. Line a rimmed baking sheet with foil, then parchment paper. Heat oil over medium in a small skillet. Cook onion and garlic, stirring occasionally, until very soft, about 4 minutes. Transfer to a large bowl. Meanwhile, bring ketchup, vinegar, brown sugar, and cayenne to a boil in a small saucepan, reduce heat, and simmer, stirring occasionally, until slightly reduced and syrupy, about 5

minutes. Transfer 2 tablespoons ketchup mixture to a blender; add broth and parsley and blend until smooth. Set remaining ketchup mixture aside.

Add broth mixture, eggs, breadcrumbs, Parmesan, salt, and pepper to onion and garlic; mix to combine. Add beef and mix well with your hands to combine. Transfer meatloaf mixture to prepared pan and form into a long log (about 12"x5"), smoothing surface. Spread reserved ketchup mixture over top and drape bacon in a crisscross pattern over loaf, tucking underneath. Bake until an instant-read thermometer inserted into the center registers 165° and bacon is crisp, 70–80 minutes. Let rest 10 minutes before slicing.



Grace, Part 4 by Jeff Capshaw

The first two articles in this you." Then, in the last section series centered-upon grace and the individual. In last week's column, the focus was upon the less familiar topic of "common grace." That is a grace which is extended to all of God's creation and mediated to that creation (especially humans and their institutions) by God's general providence.

I cited Louis Berkhof's Systematic Theology and noted the practical results of common grace. Those include the restraining of evil in the world, maintaining a semblance of moral order, enabling various talents and gifts in mankind, providing for developments in the Arts and Sciences and so on. The past lessons then provide a summary for a basic understanding of grace. Moving forward, in this and the coming weeks' columns, I will selectively choose and comment on biblical texts related to grace.

There is no better place to begin than with the book of Romans. Before Romans 3, Paul mentions grace three times. In 1:5, he said that through Jesus, "we have received grace." In 1:7, he offers the familiar greeting to the Roman Church "grace to

of chapter 3, he discusses the familiar but controversial phrase "righteousness of God" (3:21-31).

A quick check of Google Scholar turns-up almost 200 hits on this passage just since 2015. A legion of monographs and scholarly articles have been published on this passage and its key phrase, "righteousness of God." This is especially true within the last couple of decades. All that to say that space limitations prohibit much more than a cursory glance at grace in this paragraph. What then does Paul say about grace here?

In chapters 1-3 of Romans, Paul asserts that both non-religious and religious people are all equally sinful. Since true, they all fall under the Law's condemnation. He writes, "now we know that whatever the law says it speaks to those who are under the law, so that every mouth may be stopped, and the whole world may be held accountable to God" (3:19). In verse 20, he goes on to argue that no human can be made right in God's eyes by keeping the Law. That never was the intent of it; the purpose of the Law is to bring

about a "knowledge of sin" and not a remedy for it.

So, what do people sinful people need, those who are guilty and, consequently, stand in condemnation before God? They need to be put into right standing with God. They need a righteousness that is "apart from the Law." According to Paul, that righteousness comes from God himself "through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe" (3:22). The biblical word for that righteous and right standing before God is "to be justified" (v.

How then are sinners justified, declared righteous in the sight of God? According to Paul, it is "by his [God's] grace as a gift through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (3:24). There it is again: grace as a real, actionable, practical deed given to sinners by

The Editor's Inbox...Letters to the Editor





"Annuities cost too much." Many annuities are actually low in cost. Be sure to compare the cost against the value of each additional guarantee, feature, and benefit—and only pay for what you need.

"A deferred annuity isn't worth the wait." If you set up a deferred annuity, it's true that you won't immediately start receiving income. You will, however, be able to factor future expected payments into your retirement plan.

"When I die, the insurance company keeps my money." If your payout plan includes a beneficiary agreement, your beneficiaries will receive the remaining amount of money in the contract. Read the terms and conditions listed with an annuity, as they will spell out where the remaining money will go after you pass away.

Of course, even if the above concerns are simply misconceptions, it doesn't mean there are no issues about which you must be aware when considering fixed annuities. For one thing, the safety of your lifetime income stream and guarantees will depend on the claimspaying ability of the insurer that issued the annuity, so you'll want to choose a company that has demonstrated financial strength and stability. One other concern about fixed annuities: They typically don't carry a cost of living adjustment, such as that found in Social Security. You can find annuities that do offer some inflation protection, but this feature can reduce early payments significantly.

If it's appropriate for your situation, a fixed annuity can be a valuable addition to your retirement income. Before purchasing one, though, you'll need to weigh all the potential benefits and issues. But don't be swayed by misconceptions - you'll want to base your decision on facts, rather than fears.

low coordination with the Tennessee State Historic Preservation Office and investigate aspects of the project that could affect cultural, archeological, and architectural factors under the National Register of Historic Places Act.

The letter detailed other concerns that are being addressed.

"To address anticipated comments from non-governmental organizations given the proximity of any alternative to the Hatchie River, we recommended that a downstream flow analysis incorporating the state prescribed minimum flow so as to protect downstream water quality and quantity and illustrate the pre and post construction conditions at various points downstream of the project and determine a negligible impact on the River. A proposal was provided to the County for its consideration on May 2, 2019 to determine the anticipated evapotranspiration rate and whether supplemental water will be required from another source to maintain the reservoir at full pool at times throughout the year. Another analysis will be required after the initial determination as to whether supplemental pumping is necessary, then assessing the downstream impacts of the project comparing pre- and post- construction, including determining where the impacts of the project are negligible," it said.

And it pointed to, in the final contract, what will happen in the immediate future.

"With the meeting with the US-ACE we received confirmation that the time and research devoted to the development and refinement of the project purpose was well spent. Based upon the direction from US-ACE, proposals for completing the jurisdictional delineation to determine the exact quantity and quality of the jurisdictional waters for the permit application were provided to the County for its consideration on April 30, 2019. Upon completion of the delineation the USACE would schedule a pre-application meeting with all cooperating state and federal agencies onsite to further refine the required project specific studies. We preliminary discussed with the USACE having this onsite meeting this summer, however we are still waiting authorization and access for the jurisdictional delineation to be completed," it finished.

After Sain read the report to the commission, commissioners made several comments and asked ques-

Justin Howell stated he was for the project, but that he failed to see a plan in place to do it.

"Help me with this one? This is the one economic project that could revive the county," answered Sain. "I challenge anyone to come up with another one."

Sain reminded the commission he isn't the only one that wants a

"Bill Dance is in 100%," he said. "And the State of Tennessee wants us to do it as bad as we want to do it."

In response to a question regarding the spending of funds, Sain said he hoped money could be gotten from grants, but that, "The permitting process is lengthy and expensive but we have to do it to get a lake. We can't do anything without a permit."

Commissioner Viscen Morrow asked if any landowners in the proposed lake area had been spoken to about doing studies on their land.

"We are contacting some now," said Sain. "No one has turned us down yet."

Elvis White asked about voting on the plan, stating he thought the commission had only approved hiring a lawyer to do the study.

"You'll get to vote on the site," Sain reminded him. "But we have to get it approved first."

Sain said that five different sites have been looked at, but the Pleasant Run option appears to be the one that might be the easiest to get approved.

"It has less environmental im-

pact than the others, according to her (Benz)," said Sain.

Sain said that there were no cost estimates at this time and that it was hoped funding would be a combination of investors, county money, and state money that would pay for the project.

Benz, an environmental attorney based in Newnan, Georgia, is being paid for by a \$150,000 grant from the State of Tennessee. Prior to the grant, the county had already spent approximately \$15,000 of an approved \$50,000 by the county commission when the state grant was eventually received.



Extending Summer Gardens by Carolyn Tomlin

Late summer is often a test of wits both for the gardener as well as for the plants. Long, hot days; too much or too little rain; an army of insects; plus disease and fungi that seem to appear overnight—all add up to late summer problems.

Experienced gardeners seem to take it all in stride. However, if you're a novice, perhaps these tips will help you extend your summer garden into one you will cherish for several more weeks.

Do your containers of annuals appear wilted during the day but seem to freshen up at night? If so, this usually is caused by too much heat. Water thoroughly, allowing the water to drain through containers two or three times.

Pot-bound plants may be another reason. Gently tap bottom of pot, lifting out the root ball. If roots have grown around and are tight, water drains out before soaking in. Clip some of the excess roots and place back in the pot with fresh soil. Water thoroughly and keep in a shaded location for several days.

Intense afternoon sun and extreme temperatures are another cause for plant fatigue. If possible, move plants to a location that receives morning sun. Filtered afternoon sun is another option.

Another method of combating wilt is using mulch. Organic mulch made from decomposed sawdust, grass clippings, weed chips of cotton seed hulls is excellent for maintaining moisture near plants.

Water thoroughly in the morning, so water doesn't evaporate quickly. Plants have several hours for leaves to dry. Evening watering may encourage mildew or other fungi. Roses should be watered near the soil level. Avoid getting water on rose leaves.

Deadheading, or removing all old blooms, is essential for new flowers. Without this simple procedure, the plant believes it is time to make seed. Thus, flowering ceases.

Clean the ground area near annuals, perennials, and roses. Remove dried leaves or foliage. Clip dead branches or stems. This helps control disease and fungi in the garden.

Avoid pulling stems of spent perennials. Instead, cut or break near ground level. This helps insure healthy plants for next spring.

If grass or weeds have invaded the plot, begin removing these unwelcome guests. These drain and take away nutrients from cherished plants. Roots come up easier after a rain.

Inspect all plants weekly for insects. This insures the pests will not invade a large area. Continue to fertilize annuals in late summer for blooms until frost. They have only one season, so push them to the limit.

Realize when it's time to say good-bye to some favorites. Instead of coaching them for another month, remove and replace them with fall mums or colorful pansies.

Remember, plants in a garden look nice for viewing. Plants in a hand look nice for giving. Brighten someone's day by sharing your flowers with a friend.
