The membership of First Baptist Church in Bolivar spoke out en masse on August 26, asking the members of the Bolivar City Council to "vote against this or any other motion that would allow the sale of beer within 500 feet of our schools and churches."

Approximately 50 people were in attendance at First Baptist Church for the business meeting following Sunday evening services on August 26, and the vote on the resolution was unanimous.

The resolution touches on issues such as "impressionable children and youth," those with "addiction problems," a "disruption to the daily ministry in God's places of worship," the condemnation in "the Word of God" against "strong drink," a correlation of "increased in response to the August 13 city

Copies of the resolution are expected to be delivered to members of the city council prior to the next meeting of the council.

ing of an ordinance (see above in yellow) that would remove the 500 foot restriction for restaurants to serve beer, assuming the restaurant in question met other guidelines. The city council voted 4-3 in favor of the ordinance. Not in question is the current

council passage on the first read-

500-foot restriction from churches, schools, and day care centers on vending beer in stores, as that issue was not brought for a vote by the council.

A second vote by the council

will be required to pass the ordinance, and a public hearing will be allowed prior to the vote. The next meeting of the Bolivar City Council is scheduled for September 10 at 6:00 p.m. at the Bolivar Municipal Center.

One Dollar

On that same night, at 5:00 p.m., the Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation is scheduled to meet and is expected to deliberate and vote on a resolution addressing the issue.

If passed by the city council, restaurants would still be required to have more than 60% of their business come from food, not alcohol.

Already legal in the city is the sale of wine and liquor in restaurants, regardless of their proximity to churches, schools, and day care centers.

Rebecca Gloyd has been a resident of Silerton for almost two years. She resides in the home that was formally the Methodist Parsonage. Everyone in Silerton agrees she is a great asset to our town. She readily agreed to write an article for the paper this week. She entitled her article "One Strange Night." She writes, "When I first moved into my

new home in Silerton, I was struck by the similarities it shared with the house in which I grew up in Kentucky. They have the same brick, an identical ceiling fixture, and the same basic floor plan; a long hallway with bedrooms on either side, with the kitchen and dining room at the end of the hallway, and a laundry room beyond that. Soon after I moved in, I was very tired. I changed my clothes and went to bed. Normally, I would have carried my dirty clothing to the laundry room, but this night, the laundry room seemed a long way off, so I left the clothes lying in a pile on the floor. They haunted me. I tried to ignore them, but I knew that I should get up, pick up the clothes and take them to the laundry room. I flipped and flopped and could not sleep. Finally, after at least an hour of this, I got up, picked up the clothes and started down the hallway. A strange and inexplicable thing happened. The hallway morphed. The color of the walls changed. Framed family pictures appeared on them. I stepped out of the hallway, not into the kitchen of my new house in Silerton, but into the dining room of my parents' home in Kentucky. I stood there amazed. Everything was the same as I remembered it. There was my mother's 1950's green dinette set, that she would never give up, her houseplants in the corner, the sewing cabinet by the wall. The kitchen was the same. Everything was in half-light, and it was eerily quiet. I peered out the window of the back door. It was still dark, I turned the knob, and stepped outside onto the carport. The backyard was the same. I walked partway down the driveway. The neighborhood looked the same. There was nothing stirring. It was still completely quiet. I went back inside. Then I heard my mother's car coming up the driveway. I rushed back outside as she pulled onto the carport. 'Mom!' I yelled. 'What is going on?" She frowned as she got out of the car. 'It's your father. He checked himself into the hospital on Tuesday.' I stared at Mother. I was thinking. 'Checked himself into the hospital?' Then I thought, 'Mom, you're dead. So is Daddy. And isn't that the same blue Buick that I totaled out in an accident in Clarksville 10 years ago?' I looked at Mother. She looked at me. Then the scene dissolved into blackness. I opened my eyes. I was lying in bed in my new house, staring at the ceiling. I got up, picked up my dirty clothes, and took them to the laundry room."



Hello from Toone, where it's hot, dry and dusty! I guess we looked at it as a community activity back then!

# **Have You Planned for** Long-term Care?

If you are fortunate, you will retain your physical and mental capacities throughout your life and can always live independently. But there are no guarantees for any of us. If you ever require some form of long-term care, will you be prepared?

So what is the risk of needing long-term care services? According to the Department of Health & Human Services, about 40% of individuals over age 65 receive some form of paid in-home care, with an average care period lasting less than one year. However, about one-third of the population receives care in a nursing home: Of those individuals, about half stay less than one year, 30% stay between one and three years, and 20% stay longer than five years.

And, unfortunately, this care can be expensive. For example, it costs \$97,500 per year, on average, for a private room in a nursing home, according to the 2017 Cost of Care Survey produced by Genworth, an insurance company. In some major metropolitan areas, the cost is much higher. Furthermore, Medicare typically pays only a small percentage of these expenses.

So, how do you protect yourself against these potentially catastrophic costs? Essentially, you have four options:

Self-insure - You can try to build enough financial assets to cover the costs of a long-term care event. However, you would need to accumulate an extremely large sum to fully protect yourself, and you'd be diverting assets that could be used to help fund your retirement.

Long-term care insurance – A traditional long-term care (LTC) insurance policy will pay for qualified long-term care costs. The younger you are when you purchase your policy, the lower your annual premiums are likely to be. Keep in mind, though, that a basic LTC policy offers no death benefit or cash value – your premiums are only paying for a nursing home stay, home health care or other type of long-term care service. (Also, even a good LTC policy will include a waiting period before the insurance kicks in and a maximum amount of coverage, such as three years.)

Hybrid/linked benefit insurance - Because of some concerns about paying for insurance but never needing care with traditional longterm care insurance, this type of insurance provides a death benefit plus long-term care coverage. You can accelerate the death benefit to help pay for long-term care costs, and you can also choose to create an additional pool for these costs after the death benefit has been exhausted., But if you don't need long-term care, you still have the life insurance death benefit. Due to the death benefit, your premiums will be higher than those of a traditional long-term care policy.

Life insurance with long-term care/chronic illness rider - By choosing a permanent life insurance policy with this rider, you can accelerate all or part of the death benefit to pay for long-term care costs. (Your death benefit will then be reduced.) This option generally provides more flexibility in paying premiums than a hybrid policy, which may require a larger dollar commitment. Similar to hybrid, you still have the life insurance benefit if you don't need care. Which option is best for you? There's no one "right" answer for everyone, but a financial professional can help you choose the method that's most appropriate for your situation. And from an economic standpoint – and possibly an emotional one, too – you may be better off by taking action sooner, rather than later. 

(2) The Social Gospel Changes the Mission of the church.

As we looked last week, the social gospel is not a God-given work for the church to do— we can say that only because the Bible is silent on other types of missions for the church to perform. We must respect the silence of the scriptures, because to fail to do so could have



us changing what God has already bound for the church to engage, as its work (Leviticus 10:1; Hebrews 7:14). The social gospel of offering people free meals and special treats provided by the treasury of a local church, is not the work that the early church of the New Testament did. What is wrong with the recreational and entertainment style evangelism is that it shifts from the spiritual nature of the church to more carnal, appetite-driven appeal and work for the church (John 6:26-27). Jesus did not ever have plays and dramatic skits just to get the young people involved in following Him. Nor did He ever hint that as being part of our work, as the church today. If our motivation to follow Him is less than spiritual, then it may be that the food, entertainment, and recreation is overshadowing the spiritual! These additions and innovations completely change the work into something you cannot read of in the scriptures. Let's get back to the Bible way of doing things without the carnal trappings of the social gospel (Galatians 1:6-10).
