Don't Ask Them, It's Just Their Business

Residents of a local group home were charged for their alleged involvement in vandalism and theft in Bolivar.

Kevin Vaughn and Hunter Souder, both listed as having a Support Solutions address of 518 Pecan Drive in Bolivar in the Bolivar Police Report, were charged with 17 counts each, according to the Hardeman County General Sessions Clerk.

According to their website, Support Solutions "provides a wide range of services designed to help individuals with intellectual or developmental disabilities live a full life in their own community." They have homes in Tennessee and North Carolina and are based in Memphis.

Support Solutions in Bolivar reported the pair missing to the Bolivar Police Department on July 26. They were found and returned to the Pecan Drive address on July 30, at which time, according to the police narrative, both Vaughn and Souder admitted their involvement as in breaking into the Lions Club ballfield (see photo) on two occasions and also throwing a wrench though the window of a small construction building located at 10160 W. Market Street.

The next day, Support Solutions reported the two had again run from the group home and both were given a NIC number. On August 2, the pair were caught attempting to break into the National Guard Armory after burglarizing the Optimist Field in Bolivar and the Lions Club field. At the time, the two were in possession of an axe, and a pickaxe and wearing football pad gear and welding helmets. They were returned to Support Solutions and removed from the NCIC.

The two appear to be on video obtained from Brooks Auto Service in Bolivar, breaking and/or looking into storage units and abandoned cars on August 2, but taking nothing, according to the report.

On August 3, after a call from the Bolivar Support Solutions home in Bolivar, the pair confessed their involvement and expressed remorse for their actions. They also led police to the site of their stolen items, including baseball catcher's equipment, after which they were taken into custody.

Damages to and thefts from the Lions Club concession stand were estimated at \$983, while damages to the Optimist Field in Bolivar were estimated at \$1,370.

Calls to the Bolivar Support Solutions office were referred to the Memphis Support Solutions office. (see *We Said, They Said...* to the right)

On their website, Support Solutions had



this statement in regards to an incident in Chattanooga in January.

The Support Solutions family is shocked and deeply saddened by the events that took place over the weekend. While we legally cannot disclose details of the situation during the investigation, we can assure you that we are working closely with authorities to determine the answers to all of our questions as quickly as possible. In contacting Support Solutions, we were informed they would only respond to media in writing. So we wrote:

This is a media request for comment. Clients of yours have been arrested for theft and damage to baseball field areas in Bolivar. Please answer these questions.

Is Support Solutions aware of these charges?

Are these clients left unsupervised to roam around Bolivar/Hardeman County? and Please comment on what Support Solutions plans to do to make the victims whole.

They answered:

Support Solutions was recently notified about the situation that occurred at the baseball fields. While we legally cannot disclose details surrounding this case, we can assure you that we are working closely with local authorities to have all of our questions answered. We respectfully ask that you direct all inquiries to the Bolivar Police Department.

When asked, neither Bolivar Police continued on A5

Y'all Gonna to Have to Slow Down

The City of Bolivar will be reducing the speed limit on residential streets to 25 MPH effective immediately according to Mayor Julian McTizic. "I have consistently been receiving telephone calls and complaints regarding speeding in our residential neighborhoods. In addition, many have requested the installation of speed bumps throughout these residential neighborhoods," said Mayor McTizic.

According to McTizic, the installation of speed bumps in neighborhoods, while a deterrent, presents its own safety issue especially when emergency services personnel are responding to an emergency. The speed bumps slow critical response times for emergency agencies and can damage their vehicles. There was also a concern expressed by the city's insurer regarding the installation of speed bumps. The reduction of the speed limit to 25 MPH will be coupled with enhanced patrols of our residential



enticed to try new foods they helped prepare.

Eat Right. Sit down together as a family to enjoy a wonderful meal and the opportunity to share the day's experiences with one another. Family meals encourage healthy family relationships and good eating habits.

Healthful Habits. You can help kids form great, healthy habits by setting a good example. Fill half your plate with fruits and vegetables, choose lower-sodium options, and make at least half the grains your family eats whole grains. For beverages, choose water over drinks with added sugars, and opt for fat-free or low-fat milk.

Get Moving. Aside from being a great way to spend time together, regular physical activity is vital to strengthen muscle and bones, promote a healthy body weight, support learning, develop social skills and build self-esteem. Pre-school aged kids are encouraged to be active throughout the day, and older children and adolescents need at least 60 minutes of moderate-to-vigorous activity daily, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans, 2nd Edition.

Getting kids to eat right can sometimes be a challenge, particularly if they are picky eaters. But experts say that a conversation can help.

"Talk to your children. Learn the foods they like. Teach them about the foods they need for their growing bodies. Together, find ways to make sure they have the knowledge and ability to eat healthful and tasty foods at every meal," says Kristi King, registered dietitian nutritionist and Academy spokesperson. Dr. Kristen Johnson, Assistant Professor and University of Tennessee Extension Specialist, adds that "Small, positive changes to your eating habits add up to big results for the health of children and families. Parents and caregivers are important role models for children. Involving children in the process of choosing and preparing meals and snacks is a fantastic way to teach children healthy habits and to encourage children to try new foods."



Calmness in the Storm by Jeff Capshaw

the storm is recorded in three of the Gospels: Matthew 8:23-27, Mark 4:35-41, and Luke 8:22-25. Whether Matthew borrowed the material from Mark or whether Luke from Matthew and/or Mark isn't the point. Instead, these stories comprise the Church's canonical Scripture and should be read, understood, and applied accordingly.

Until fairly recently, the Church traditionally understood Matthew's Gospel to be the earliest narrative. So, here is his account. "And when he got into the boat, his disciples followed him. And behold, there arose a great storm on the sea, so that the boat was being swamped by the waves; but he was asleep. And they went and woke him, saying, "Save us, Lord; we are perishing." And he said to them, "Why are you afraid, O you of little faith?" Then he rose and rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was a great calm. And the men marveled, saying, "What sort of man is this, that even winds and sea obey him?" (Matthew 8:23-27, ESV).

This story is the source of one of Rembrandt Van Rijn's most beloved paintings. It suggests that some of the disciples are in a state of panic. Some of them are working to hold

The story of Jesus' calming the boat together. One is leaning over the side of the boat, about to vomit. One of them is staring out directly at us, holding onto his cap with one hand and onto a rope with the other. Accordingly, Matthew calls it a "mega" storm.

Even so, Matthew says, "but he (Jesus) was asleep." There could hardly be a starker contrast: panic and sleep. This isn't to suggest that Jesus was apathetic to the situation. Instead, the lesson for his disciples on the boat and us is this; Jesus does "have the wheel" no matter what. Nature's ways do not trouble Him, and they should not overly trouble believers. So, why do they?

The passage is clear. It is just as Jesus said to his panicking-andabout-to-perish-disciples. are you afraid, O you of little faith?" According to R.T. France, "Matthew often warns of the danger of little faith (cf. 6:30; 14:31; 16:8; 17:20)." Although the storm in the story and the storms in this life can be scary and threatening, insufficient faith is

often more detrimental. This lesson isn't about the amount of faith. It is about the object of faith. Recall Matthew 17:20, "he said to them, 'Because of your little faith. For truly, I say to you, if you have faith like a grain of mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, "Move from here to there," and

We do not have control over many things that happen in our life, but we do have control over how we respond. In this way we are the captain of our ship. Determine to be resolute to move forward and willing to rebuild your life. On January 21, a story in the Chattanoogan.com reported Support Solutions had vacated the property where the incident occured.

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

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How Can You Help Lower Your **Longevity Risk?**

The investment world contains different types of risk. Your stocks or stock-based mutual funds could lose value during periods of market volatility. The price of your bonds or bond funds could also decline, if new bonds are issued at higher interest rates. But have you ever thought about longevity risk?

Insurance companies and pension funds view longevity risk as the risk they incur when their assumptions about life expectancies and mortality rates are incorrect, leading to higher payout levels. But for you, as an individual investor, longevity risk is less technical and more emotional: it's the risk of outliving your money.

To assess your own longevity risk, you'll first want to make an educated guess about your life span, based on your health and family history. Plus, you've got some statistics to consider: Women who turned 65 in April of this year can expect to live, on average, until age 86.5; for men, the corresponding figure is 84, according to the Social Security Administration.

Once you have a reasonable estimate of the number of years that lie ahead, you'll want to take steps to reduce your longevity risk. For starters, try to build your financial resources as much as possible, because the greater your level of assets, the lower the risk of outliving them. So, during your working years, keep contributing to your IRA and your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan.

Then, as you near retirement, you will need to do some planning. Specifically, you will need to compare your essential living expenses - mortgage/rent, utilities, food, clothing, etc. - with the amount of income you'll get from guaranteed sources, such as Social Security or pensions. You do have some flexibility with this guaranteed income pool. For example, you can file for Social Security benefits as early as 62, but your monthly checks will then be reduced by about 30 percent from what you'd receive if you waited until your full retirement age, which is likely between 66 and 67.

You might also consider other investments that can provide you with a steady income stream. A financial professional can help you choose the income-producing investments that are appropriate for your needs and that fit well with the rest of your portfolio.

After you've determined that your guaranteed income will be sufficient to meet your essential living expenses, have you eliminated longevity risk? Not necessarily - because "essential" expenses don't include unexpected costs, of which there may be many, such as costly home maintenance, auto repairs and so on. And during your retirement years, you'll always need to be aware of health care costs. If you have to dip into your guaranteed income sources to pay for these types of bills, you might increase the risk of outliving your money.

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To avoid this scenario, you may want to establish a separate fund, possibly containing at least a year's worth of living expenses, with the money held in cash or cash equivalents. This money won't grow much, if at all, but it will be there for you when you need it.

With careful planning, adequate guaranteed income, a sufficient emergency fund and enough other investments to handle nonessential costs, you'll be doing what you can to reduce your own longevity risk. And that may lead to a more enjoyable retirement.


