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County Elections Decide Four More Years

Hardeman County Story of Mayor Jimmy Sain the Year got a second term on August 2, winning 49.9% of the vote, defeating Kandy Shackelford (35%) and Calvin Howell (15%). A total of 5,806 voted in the election, with 5,568

Sain won 12 of 13 precincts, falling only in Lacy, where Shackelford was victorious.

voting in the mayor's race.

Hardeman County Sheriff John Doolen won his third term, while other county-wide races went to Casey Swift (Highway Superintendent) and Billy Davis (Circuit Court Clerk).

The May Democratic Primary settled all other county-wide races, as Register of Deeds (Lily Barnes), County Clerk (Jerry Armstrong), and Trustee (Mary Powell) all ran unopposed in August.

While the county got continuity at the top, the county commission changed with five new members winning competitive races.

Joy filed the complaint, saying Amelia Monroe Carlson followed him for a portion of the day on January 25, photographing him and his work truck on more than one occasion. Prior to the arrest, Carlson had requested records on Joy, Bolivar City Councilman Melvin Golden and Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic from the city and also requested employment records on Sergeant Gary McTizic from the Bolivar Police Department.

A later request made by Carlson asked for employment and law enforcement related records of Sergeant Chris Burkeen, Captain Shane Swift, Captain Jimmy Fletcher, Captain Mike Jones, and Captain Eddie Henson.

The case was settled on March 16, with a "non-pros" agreement stipulating that Carlson would maintain a 1,000 foot distance from Joy.

February 1 - For the second year, the Vaughan Oil Company, in conjunction with Hardeman County, completed their 2018 Kerosene Assistance Program on January 30 by giving away 42 five-gallon buckets to assist families in Hardeman County.

The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

New Year's Day Black Eyed Peas

- **Ingredients** 1 lb. black-eyed peas
- 1 (14-oz) can petite diced tomatoes 6 slices bacon, cooked and sliced

1 (32-oz.) box chicken broth


- 1 cup diced ham ½ cup diced sweet onion
- 1 garlic clove, minced 1 tsp. oregano ½ tsp. pepper

about 1/4 tsp. salt (add to taste at the END of cooking time) Slow Cooker Size: 6-quart or larger

Instructions Start by soaking the black-eyed peas overnight in the slow cooker. Do this by adding the black-eyed peas to the slow cooker and add water to cover plus a few inches more. Let the black-eyed peas soak for at least 8 hours (don't turn on the slow cooker, just let them soak). In the morning drain the water.

pepper. Stir. Cover and cook on LOW for 10 hours. Do not open the lid during the cooking time. Add the salt to taste.

For creamier beans stir and smash some of the beans. Serve with cornbread. Note- A ham hock can be used instead of the bacon and cubed ham. The grocery store I shop at is often out of ham hocks so I used bacon and ham in this recipe. If you use a ham hock, add it in the beginning, shred the meat from the ham hock at the end of cooking time and discard the fat and bone.

YEAR IN REVIEW

March 22 - A joint investigation by special agents with the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation and the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department has resulted in the arrest of Christopher Jeremiah "CJ" Armour in connection with the 2016 double homicide in Hardeman County.

On October 21, 2016, at the request of former 25th District Attorney General Mike Dunavant, TBI began a joint investigation with the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department into the double homicide that occurred at 2560 Naylor Road in Toone.

During the course of the investigation, it was determined that Christopher Jeremiah "CJ" Armour, (DOB 12/26/1987), of Moscow, TN was involved in the double homicide of Joe Robertson, 38, and his son Javarrie "JoJo" Robertson, 13, on October 21, 2016. JoJo was an eighth grade student at Toone Elementary School at the time.



April 5 - Linda Kay Fulghum announced her retirement from 48 years of service as the Hardeman County Circuit Court Clerk in September.

Fulghum began working in the circuit court clerk's office in 1968 and was appointed as circuit court clerk in 1970. In 1972, the circuit court clerk became an elected position, which she held until this year.

Replacing Fulghum is Billy Davis, who won the August election for the position.

April 26 - The City of Bolivar's original plans for the Hatchie River Park and Nature Center on Highway 18 North appeared dead in the water on April 24 as the Bolivar City Council voted to all but shut down the project in a special called meeting.

The council debated the issue but finally voted to allow Mayor McTizic to ask the State of Tennessee to allow Bolivar to change the grant, but agreeing that if the state refused, the city would cut some of its losses and send the state \$23,378 to reimburse the grant for expenses already paid (half of \$46,757 used for signage, an engineering fee, and a payment to the Southwest Tennessee Development District).

McTizic said the project was dooomed from the start.

"We didn't have enough money in the budget. It was never going to work."

In November, the city announced they had received a grant to build a 20x30 foot pavilion with picnic tables and a wooden deck near the water wheel while the building on the property will be torn down and replaced with a grassed area.

On November 19, the city voted use the funds from the Hatchie River Project to purchase 122-acres known as the "sand pit" in East Bolivar to create a tourism destination.

"We think it will be a very nice setting for families and groups to come visit for the day and longer if they like," said Mayor Julian Mc-Tizic. "It's very much a place someone could use as a retreat to nature."

May 10 - The Association for the Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities (APTA) 44th Heritage Home Tour was held May 4-6 in downtown Bolivar.

May 17 - Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam joined state and local lawmakers, Kilgore/Chemring employees, government agencies, and other well-wishers in making official Kilgore's plans to spend \$40 million to expand its operations in Hardeman County and create approximately 100 jobs.

Kilgore Flares plans to upgrade and expand operations in Toone

over the next five years. The company will invest in new technology, processes and equipment. Kilgore Flares plans to replace, refurbish, and modernize buildings on its campus. Construction of a new flare extruder and assembly facility and other investments will triple Kilgore Flares' current production capacity in Hardeman County.

The first expansion phase will begin in the third quarter of 2018 and it is anticipated the expansion will be completed in 2022.



The commission approved, as they must do by law, the certified tax rate of \$2.5818 but then lowed it back to \$2.55, agreeing to work with approximately \$97,000 less in the coming fiscal year. The change in the certified tax rate was due to an overall drop in property values across the county as calculated by the State of Tennessee.

"This is the right thing to do for the citizens of the county," said Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain. "We can live within our means."

July 5 - Hardeman County honored a historical legacy created by a lifelong law enforcement official on July 2, as a stretch of highway was named the Sheriff Delphus Hicks, Jr. Highway.

The stretch of highway dedicated runs on Highway 18 from the Hickory Valley city limits south to the intersection of 18 and Highway 57 near Grand Junction.

Hicks, who served as sheriff for two terms adding up to 24 years, was the first African American Sheriff elected in the State of Tennessee. His terms spanned 1978-1994 and 2002-2010. His career in law enforcement began



in Hardeman County in 1968, after serving in the United States Army from 1962-1967.

August 2 - Brian Christopher Lawler, 46, a resident of Hardeman County, passed away on July 29 in Memphis..

Son of Jerry "The King" Lawler, Brian was in the Hardeman County Jail after being arrested in early July on charges of DUI and felony evading arrest.

According to a statement from the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department, Brian was discovered after hanging himself in his Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center cell on Saturday, July 28; he was given CPR and air-lifted to the MED in Memphis.

Lawler was best known for his career in the World Wrestling Federation (now known as WWE), where he performed as Brian Christopher and Grand Master Sexay and won 44 titles within the United States Wrestling Association.

As of December 23, the Tennessee Bureau of Investigations had not vet released their report on the incident.



Year In Review

August 2 - Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain, State Representative Johnny Shaw, the Hardeman County Industrial Board, and the Hardeman County Chamber of Commerce announced on July 30 that Royal Oak Charcoal would construct a plant for lump charcoal in Hardeman County.

The next few months saw the Hardeman County Zoning Board approve the site in northwest Hardeman County, following by



the public hearing opposing the move, ten of which were from outside the county.

While the commission voted 10-6 to give the go-ahead to the project, the company announced later in October they would delay indefinitely, bringing the \$15 million project to a halt.

August 16 - The Bolivar City Council began a controversial march toward dropping the 500-foot from "churches or schools" restriction to allow potential future Bolivar restaurants to serve beer without geographical considerations by passing the first reading of the rewritten ordinance by a 4-3 margin.

Voting for the measure on the first vote were Golden, Rhea, Tracy Byrum, and Page Walley. Against it were Jonathan Joy, Larry McKinnie, and Tommy Woods.

In response, the membership of First Baptist Church in Bolivar spoke out en masse on August 26, asking the members of the Bolivar City Council to "vote against this or any other motion that would allow the sale of beer within 500 feet of our schools and churches."

Approximately 50 people were in attendance at First Baptist Church for the business meeting following Sunday evening services on August 26, and the vote on the resolution was unanimous.

The resolution touched on issues such as "impressionable children and youth," those with "addiction problems," a "disruption to the daily ministry in God's places of worship," the condemnation in "the Word of God" against "strong drink," a correlation of "increased crime and the occurrence of motor vehicle accidents," the "erosion of community values," and ended with "prayers and petitions to God on behalf of our city must be accompanied by a community that has actual reverence, honor and respect for His presence and His places of

Copies of the resolution were delivered to members of the city council prior to the final vote of the council on the issue, which took place September 11 and included a public hearing.

"I understand this is a serious and difficult decision," said Matt Boatwright, one of five speakers on the issue. "But I do not want you to pass this. I don't want us to build our city on the backs of people who abuse alcohol. Not everyone struggles, I understand. But we have an opportunity to stand another way."

After debate and vote by the council, Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic broke a 4-all tie to allow beer to be served in restaurants in Bolivar, regardless of location.

"I'm proud of the council people who stood firm against various pressures to pass this change," he said. "I'm anticipating the development in the entire city and in downtown. I commend them on the hard decision they made for business in our community."

Voting to eliminate the 500-foot space between restaurants that served beer and any church, school, or day care center were Melvin Golden, Todd Lowe, Suzanne Rhea, and Page Walley. With the vote deadlocked, Mayor Mc-Tizic clinched the passage with his vote. Byrum, Woods, Joy, and McKinnie all voted against the change.

August 23 - The City of Bolivar added an arboretum to the growing attractions at the Pleasant Run Creek Park with a ribbon cutting on August 24. The city, led by Parks and Recreation Director Curtis Stack, successfully completed the requirements for a level one arboretum, with 38 tree species scattered throughout the park along a one-mile trail.

The arboretum was certified by the Arboretum Certification Program Committee of the Tennessee Urban Forestry Council in early August. TUFC's certification program maintains standards for public education by state arboreta. A certified arboretum must be open to the public with trees that are labeled, properly protected, and well maintained.

September 27 - The Tennessee Forest Festival began in Hardeman County, bringing back the event that had last been held in Tennessee in 2007. Photo below by Amber Moore.





October 25 - The Smokin' Downtown BBQ Festival concluded Saturday, October 20 with an awards ceremony recognizing the best in bbq chicken, ribs, and pork. Sixteen teams competed in the contest, with a total purse of \$5,500 paid out to the winners, including a separate category for Hardeman County teams.

November 8 - The Hardeman County Schools continued a year of good academic news when the State of Tennessee announced average ACT Scores for the county had increased and that the Hardeman County Schools scored better than four of the five surrounding counties.

The only surrounding school district that scored higher than Hardeman was Chester County. Hardeman County Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross was quick to give credit where credit is due.

"The effort that our staff, students and parents have done in this area is to be congratulated. The work is a result of a deliberate plan and effort and by the entire team. This opens additional doors of opportunity for our students to take full advantage of the Tennessee Promise and other scholarship monies available to students."

That same week, Hornsby Elementary School was named a "Reward School" by the Tennessee Department of Education for the 2017-2018 school year. Reward schools are those with an accountability score greater than three and are improving in terms of achievement and growth for both all students and student

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

Consider Some New Year's Financial Resolutions

As the year winds down, you may want to look ahead to see which areas of your life you can improve in 2019. Perhaps you'll decide to exercise more, eat healthier foods, reconnect with old friends or volunteer at a school or charitable organization. All these goals are certainly worthwhile - but you also may want to add some New Year's financial resolutions to your list.

Here are a few ideas to consider:

Boost contributions to your employer-sponsored retirement plan. Good news! Contribution limits will be increasing for many employersponsored retirement plans.

For 2019, you can contribute up to \$19,000 (up from \$18,500 in 2018), or \$25,000 (up from \$24,500 in 2018) if you're 50 or older to your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan. It's usually a good idea to contribute as much as you can afford to your employer's plan, as your contributions may lower your taxable income, while any earnings growth is tax-deferred. (Keep in mind that taxes are due upon withdrawal, and withdrawals prior to age 59 ½ may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty.)

At a minimum, put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

Try to "max out" on your IRA. Even if you have a 401(k) or similar plan, you can probably still invest in an IRA. For 2019, you can put in up to \$6,000 in a traditional or Roth IRA (up from \$5,500 in 2018), or \$7,000 (up from \$6,500) if you're 50 or older. (Income restrictions apply to Roth IRAs.) Contributions to a traditional IRA may be tax-deductible, depending on your income, and any earnings growth is tax-deferred. Roth IRA contributions are not deductible, but earnings growth can be withdrawn tax-free, provided you don't start taking withdrawals until you are 59 $\frac{1}{2}$ and you've had your account at least five years. You can put most types of investments - stocks, bonds, mutual funds, government securities and so on - into an IRA, so it can expand your options beyond those offered in your 401(k) or similar plan.

Build an emergency fund. Try to build an emergency fund containing three to six months' worth of living expenses, with the money held in a low-risk, liquid account. This fund can help you avoid dipping in to your long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a major

Control your debts. Do what you can to keep your debts under control. Ultimately, the less you have to spend on debt payments, the more you can invest for your future.

Don't overreact to financial market volatility. In 2018 – especially the last few months of the year – we saw considerable market volatility, with huge drops and big gains in rapid succession. What will 2019 bring? It's always difficult – and usually futile – trying to forecast the market's performance over the course of an entire year. But, in any case, try not to overreact to whatever ups and downs we may experience. 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

Year In Review

November 15 - Hardeman County elected officials scored three of the five statewide awards given each year to county officials by the County Officials Association of Tennessee (COAT).

Hardeman County Register of Deeds Lily Barnes (left), who has served for 20 years, grabbed the award for Register of Deeds Official of the Year, while Janice Bodiford (right) was recognized for her work as the Clerk and Master. Bodiford has served for the past 18 years. County Clerk Jerry Armstrong (center) was named County Official of the Year. Armstrong is in his 28th year in office

December 6 - The City of Bolivar began looking for a new chief of police as Pat Baker informed the city November 28 of his decision to retire after a meeting with Mayor Julian McTizic.

"I want to thank Chief Baker for his years of service to the city as both an officer and as chief," said Mayor McTizic. "The city wishes him the best in the future.'

Replacing Baker in the interim is Assistant Chief David Sipes. A more than 30-year veteran of the force, Sipes will serve as Chief of Police until a replacement is named.

Baker was named Chief of Police by then-Mayor Barrett Stevens in July of 2011, replacing Bill Irons.

Baker served 30 years in law enforcement, with the Bolivar Police Department beginning in 1990 and was Assistant Chief of Police from 2007-2011.

December 13 - Using local contractors and labor, the Hardeman County Emergency Medical Services got a new base of operations that opened in early December.

"I'm ecstatic to be able to save the citizens money and provide such an awesome facility for our county," said Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain.

The 22,400 square foot facility, built at a cost of approximately \$980,000 (according to Sain), used local contractors Donnie Spence Construction, Ethan Vickers Concrete, Ayers Electrical and Plumbing, Henderson Heating and Air, Grantham's Overhead Door/Insulation, and Shaw Trucking to complete the job, said Sain.

The building is rated as a Life Safety Category 4 Fire Rating, which equals any medical facility, 10 bays for EMS, four bays for the Bolivar Fire Station, and full living quarters on both sides.

The EMS facility has a 50-seat training room and an emergency backup generator system.

The building has been appraised at \$1.6 million, according to Sain.

December 20 - The Luez Theatre in Bolivar officially opened its doors to the public on December 14, ending the more than six years the circa 1948 theatre has been closed in Bolivar.

The Bolivar Downtown Development Corporation purchased the theatre in 2013, with plans to renovate and re-open the facility.

Brad Grantham Construction was in charge of the renovations.

The theatre has new seats, a stage to accommodate musical acts, and a section upstairs that will be accessed for an upcharge. Future plans include wine and beer offered upstairs only, with seating restricted to those 21 and older.

Opening night was a sellout and the theatre plans to operate four days a week, showing first run movies and hosting special events by request.









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
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Sports Story of the Year


